Gentle ways, kind voices

His ways were gentle. His voice was kind. He always made me feel safe and secure and most of all ... loved.

His name was James Hart. He was my dad.

Father's Day has had a hollow feeling ever since my dad passed in June of 2006. It was one month before I started writing my newspaper column. He never read any of my writing, yet so much of it is about him.

The scent of Old Spice Cologne gets the attention of my nose as well as my heart. My dad always wore it.

White shirts with a plastic pocket guard for his pens remind me that my dad had the heart of a blue-collar worker in a white-collar position at Firestone. A few years ago, one of the men who worked for him called me. He wanted to tell me everyone on the second shift wanted to work for my dad. He was a fair man. He believed the best way to get people to work hard was to tell his workers that he appreciated them.

I never heard him swear – or cuss, as he put it. Once in a while, I did hear a quiet S#&T! He was usually aggravated at himself. Dad never raised his voice to me or my mom. He did get my attention with a "Janet Kay!"

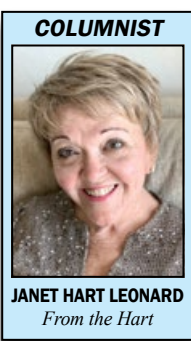
Dad believed I could sell cars and trucks before I ever sold the first one. I felt his presence while writing my book. Occasionally, a redbird would show up at our birdfeeder. I believe it is a sign he is still with me and is proud of me.

In my book, I talk about his four-year-old neighbor, Jonathan, who would call my dad "Mr. Rogers." He may have seen that he looked like Fred Rogers, but I also think he knew he was a kind man like Mr. Rogers.

I never really saw my dad get angry, although I've been told that a relative once made the comment about me not being a "blood" relative and Dad wanted to jerk a knot in his tail. He was always very protective of me.

Dad worked long hours at a hot, smelly and hard job at Firestone, but I never heard him complain. When I was little, we only had one car and if my mom needed it, she would drive him to work, then he would walk the two miles back home from Firestone. He didn't want her to wake me up to come and get him at 11 p.m. even if it was snowing. He was just that way.

I wish my dad could have known my husband, Chuck. Chuck is a lot like my dad. Oh, the conversations they could have had on our back porch.

Art with a Purpose, musical promiscuity at Pasto Italiano

The Reporter met musically promiscuous electric violinist Cathy Morris this month at Pasto Italiano, 3150 E. State Road 32, Westfield, when she was entertaining diners with violin music from a variety of genres.

Morris spoke to The Reporter about her musical journey and about her non-profit organization, Arts with a Purpose, which works with marginalized communities.

"I call myself musically promiscuous because I will play any style with anybody, anytime, anywhere," Morris said. "In a nutshell, I founded this organization that's kind of like a booking agency. I match artists of all disciplines – music, dance, visual art – to communities that don't necessarily have the arts available to them."

Morris works with a group of artists that, while it varies in membership, sometimes has as many as 80 artists available.

"We do work with children and youth, we also work with adults and seniors," Morris said. "We go to the independent adult care centers. They never had really great arts. They always had crafts, but never real art. Communities and neighborhoods. Displaced caregivers. We try to do stuff for nursing caregivers. Just people who can use the arts as an opportunity and maybe therapeutically as an opportunity to heal."

Morris founded the organization as a non-for-profit in 2016. Early in the pan-

demic, Arts with a Purpose produced 35 outside concerts in courtyards for low-income senior housing.

"Before that I was back and forth – but mostly forth – for about a decade because I had grandkids out in California," Morris said.

ART WITH A PURPOSE

Morris has been involved in music since a very young age, and she learned in college that she wanted to learn music from musicians rather than from an institution.

"I came from a family where my dad was a bass player, music teacher and conducted our local symphony in Columbus, Ind.," Morris told The Reporter. "In the 70s and 80s, that was quite the artistic Mecca. My mother was director of the arts council down there. I got to witness from a very young

age how to produce different arts activities working with different disciplines."

Morris attended Indiana University to study classical music, but said she found it all "too serious" for her tastes.

"So, I just jumped in there and started getting gigs and hiring people who were crazy better than me and learning from them," Morris said. "There was everything from bluegrass and country to Cajun to Celtic to blues and jazz. I just really dived

in. I just made it my job to be the Pied Piper of violin. I'm the violin lady!"

Morris told The Reporter she is happy to work with anybody who has an artist, an organization or a location that needs the arts.

Partial closure of 96th Street to begin this week in Carmel

96th Street between Westfield Boulevard and Maple Drive is scheduled to be closed to thru traffic from June 21 through July 19 for

improvements associated with The Edge apartment construction projects. The primary detour route will be 106th Street and Keystone Parkway.

For a portion of this closure period, local access to Lincoln Boulevard and Maple Drive from 96th Street will be completely restricted while the intersection is re-

constructed. Access for properties on Maple Drive and Lincoln Boulevard will be from the north via 99th Street to Maple Drive through The Seasons apartment complex.

State Road 37 & 146th Street

All left-turn lanes are currently restricted on SR 37 and on 146th Street with traffic moved to the interior lanes. Thru traffic and right turns on SR 37 and 146th Street will remain open. Drivers are encouraged to seek alternate routes for all left-turn access. View an al-

On Monday, June 20 and Tuesday, June 21, there will be periodic lane restrictions between 146th Street and Greenfield Avenue to tie in the new SR 37 pavement to the previously built ramps.

Sens. Young, Duckworth author bill to provide TSA PreCheck to disabled vets

On Thursday, bipartisan legislation authored by U.S. Senators Todd Young (R-Ind.) and Tammy Duckworth (D-Ill.) to provide disabled veterans with Transportation Security Administration (TSA) PreCheck passed the Senate by unanimous consent.

TSA Pre-Check is already offered to active duty, reserves and National Guard service members at no cost. The Veterans Expedited TSA Screening (VETS) Safe Travel Act will expand this program to include veterans who are amputees, paralyzed or blind. Currently, there are approximately 70,000 amputee veterans, 100,000 paralyzed and 130,000 blind veterans in the United States. Passing through airport security with prosthetics, wheelchairs or other mobility aids presents a challenge to these individuals when traveling.

“The VETS Safe Travel Act was written for veterans with disabilities who dread the airport because of the indignities they will endure at security checkpoints,” Sen. Young said. “This bill will help veterans travel easier by providing them with PreCheck benefits. I’m glad our bill finally passed the Senate, and I urge the House to pass it quickly.”

Under the VETS Safe Travel Act, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and TSA would be directed

to work together to provide these benefits at no cost to eligible veterans upon request. The VA would be required to conduct outreach to ensure that eligible veterans are aware of this potential benefit before they travel. Additionally, TSA advises that these veterans use TSA PreCheck in conjunction with calling the TSA Cares hotline 72 hours prior to departure to ensure expedited screening.

“Millions of Veterans have sacrificed a great deal in service to our nation and returned home with service-connected disabilities,” Sen. Duckworth said. “For those of us who rely on prosthetics and wheelchairs for mobility, air travel and passing through airport security can be a challenge. I’m proud the Senate passed this bipartisan legislation to make TSA PreCheck available at no cost to these Veterans and make flying and passing through airports a little easier and less intrusive, and I hope we can get it to President Biden’s desk soon.”

Senators Young and Duckworth were joined by Senators Maggie Hassan (D-N.H.) and Rob Portman (R-Ohio) in [reintroducing the bill last year](#).

NeuroHope of Indiana, 6002 Sunnyside Road, Indianapolis, will utilize the funding to grow and expand their clinic, which will focus on the health of patients after therapy resulting from a spinal cord injury, brain injury, or stroke. The Impact 100 Wellness Center will be the first fully adaptive, wheelchair accessible fitness center in Indianapolis. It will feature specialized equipment, supervised access, and daily group fitness classes. When combined with NeuroHope’s existing therapy services, this will create a continuum of care unlike any in the community.”

Organizations submitted grant applications in January 2022. Five focus area committees vetted one finalist in each focus area. NeuroHope of Indiana, finalist in the Health and Wellness focus area, was

one of five organizations providing a presentation during the awards celebration. Additional finalists included: Paws and Think, Inc. (education); FACE Low-Cost Animal Clinic (environmental and animal welfare); Phalen Leadership Academies (arts, culture and preservation) and You Yes You! Project (family). The four remaining finalists received residual community grants of \$16,750 each.

This week in Indiana's history ...

1904 – Phil Harris was born in Linton in Greene County. He went on to a long career in show business as an actor, comedian, musician, and songwriter. He had his own orchestra and was a familiar voice on radio. A regular on the popular Jack Benny program, he hosted his own show with his wife, actress and singer Alice Faye. A star of many movies, he also did voice acting for several Walt Disney animated films. He was the voice of Baloo in *The Jungle Book*, Thomas O'Malley in *The Aristocats*, and Little John in *Robin Hood*.

1921 – Indiana Governor Warren McCray



called a halt to workmen who were applying several coats of paint to the old quartered-oak doors on the outside entrances to the Statehouse. The job had progressed so far that most of the doors were covered with several coats of flat paint. Secretary of State Ed Jackson and Auditor William G. Oliver were among other officials calling the project a "desecration." State custodian Roy Couch was assigned the task of removing the

paint and restoring the doors to their original splendor.

1950 – The United States entered the Korean War. During the three-year conflict, over 33,000 American soldiers were killed, including over 900 from Indiana. The names of the fallen Indiana soldiers are listed on the Korean War Memorial located on the American Legion Mall in Indianapolis.

1972 – FBI agents, along with hundreds of state and local officers, searched a wide area around Peru, Ind., for a skyjacker who had parachuted from an American Airlines jet with over \$500,000 in ransom money. State police helicopters scoured the region looking for the man who might have survived the drop of more than 5,000 feet. Three days later, a farmer found the

money sack in a farm field outside Peru. A fingerprint led authorities to 28-year-old Martin J. McNally in Detroit. He was sent to a federal prison in Illinois.

1985 – President Ronald Reagan had lunch at Mac's Family Restaurant in Mooresville. He sampled their well-known peach cobbler as he spoke to members of the local Chamber of Commerce. He traveled on to the Convention Center in Indianapolis where he addressed the national meeting of the United States Jaycees. Talking about his plan to change the outdated tax system, he took note of the nearby Speedway, saying, "America, start your engines."

2002 – Indiana First Lady Judy O'Bannon helped dedicate the historical marker at Lyles Station, an early African American community in Gibson County. At its peak in the late 19th century, the town had over 50 homes, a post office, a railroad station, two general stores, and a school. The school has been restored and now serves as a museum and cultural center.

Coach Heffern: No signs of slowing down

From Park Tudor to Fishers, tennis coach Dave Heffern still loving every moment

When Dave Heffern took over the head coaching position for the Fishers High School tennis teams, he said, “Well, it’s probably a 10-year program to try to get it to the top.”

Heffern just finished his ninth year as coach of the Tigers’ boys and girls teams. Fishers’ girls nearly made it to the top this season: On June 4, the Tigers played in the state championship match.

Fishers lost to Carmel 5-0, but that loss certainly didn’t diminish the Tigers’ season. In fact, the appearance of Fishers in the final two was significant, as it made the Tigers the first Hamilton County team besides the Greyhounds to play in the championship match.

“The only team that we lost to all year was Carmel,” said Heffern. “We lost to them in the regular season, we lost to them in the state championship match. We had a great season. We won a few tight matches, even though we had some injuries and everything. A great bunch of kids, fun to

work with.”

Heffern was speaking on June 10 at the individual singles and doubles tournament at Park Tudor, a place with which he is very familiar. Prior to coming to Fishers, Heffern was the Panthers’ tennis coach, guiding them to remarkable heights between 1995 and 2013. In the team tournament, Park Tudor won six boys state titles and six girls state titles during Heffern’s tenure.

In the individual tournament, the Panthers claimed three boys doubles and a singles champion, while the girls won six singles titles, including four in a row from Katie Martzolf from 1998 to 2001. The Park Tudor girls scored a rare triple crown – winning the team, singles and doubles championships – in 1998. Brookley Crews and Brooke Sagalowsky won the doubles title that year.

After leaving Park Tudor, Heffern was immediately hired at Fishers. He said that when he arrived at the Tigers’ program, the goal was to get the tennis program consistently ranked in the top 10. Fishers continued to improve over the next few years, with the boys

team winning sectionals in 2017 and 2018.

“And last fall, the boys team was ranked fifth or sixth at the end of the year and I thought we were probably the fourth-best team in the state,” said Heffern. “Unfortunately for us, HSE was the third best team.” Hamilton Southeastern won its third straight sectional last fall.

As for the girls, Fishers made its way to the state championship in 2021, winning its first sectional title since 2012, then triumphing at the regional and semi-state for the first time. The Tigers defended all those championships this season, including a tough sectional where they beat No. 15 Noblesville and No. 10 Southeastern.

“It’s been exciting,” said Heffern. “It’s something I’ve expected because we have a nice summer program going and the kids seem more interested in tennis out in Fishers now.”

Heffern had come to Park Tudor after spending the morning at his summer program, and he said there were 30 players in the

younger group, and 34 more in the high school group.

“It’s a good opportunity out at Fishers,” he said.

The Tigers also have a great opportunity to do well again next season, as everyone that played varsity for this year’s team is back. Fishers had a freshman – Mischa Briggs, playing at No. 1 singles, while junior Izzy Mokra played No. 2 singles. Everyone else is a sophomore: No. 3 singles Caroline Ober, No. 1 doubles Cassie Maurer and Emma Beehler and No. 2 doubles Madelyn Barron and Meredith Ober.

“Hopefully, the success they had this year will make them work hard to get back to that point and to finish next year, to win the whole thing,” said Heffern. “Anytime that you’re so close that it inspires you to want to take that last step, and I’m hoping that’s what all the girls do.”

Next year will be the 10th year for Heffern, but he doesn’t plan on stopping anytime soon. He told his assistant coach Matthew Foley that he would coach until Foley’s daughter graduates.

HSE state doubles tennis team honored at North South cup

“She’s going to be an eighth-grader,” said Heffern. “I got five more years anyway.”

“I figure I’ll be around 80 when I finish, when I give it up,” said Heffern. “But I’m still feeling as good as I feel now. I love this. Here I am showing up to cheer on HSE because I’ve coached those girls privately and in clinics since they were 10 or

11 years old.”

Heffern was there to cheer on Southeastern’s Misha Bukkasagaram and Emily Orme, who were playing in the doubles tournament and eventually reached the semi-finals.

“And I see all sorts of kids here that I’ve worked with over the years,” said Heffern. “I really enjoy this.”
