

## Heights recognizes Duke Energy for support of summer literacy program

At Hamilton Heights' Year End Recognition Program earlier this month, Duke Energy was recognized for its long-standing support of the JumpStart program at the elementary school. Duke Energy has provided a \$10,000 grant for this year's program that begins in late July.

### Noblesville opens cooling station at Forest Park Inn

The REPORTER

With the forecast showing sustained heat and humidity the rest of this week, the City of Noblesville has opened Forest Park Inn as a temporary cooling center, an air-conditioned facility where residents can go to prevent prolonged exposure to the elements.

"Heat illnesses should not be taken lightly. You have to keep an eye on yourself when your body overheats and drink plenty of water," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "The cooling center is intended as a safe place for individuals and families who experience heat-related illness or those that need a welcoming place to temporarily get out of the extreme heat and cool down."

The goal of the cooling center is to provide a centralized location and safe refuge from the extreme weather. Forest Park Inn will be open 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. each day through Friday, June 24 and provides air conditioning, restroom facilities, seating and bottled water. Trained city employees will also be on hand to assist members of the public.

urday, June 25, until 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 26 at Cox-Gardens, Towne Road, Carmel.

Sponsors of the event include the Central Indiana Amateur Radio Association and the Hamilton County Emergency Management's Radio Ama-

teur Civil Emergency Service (RACES). Ham radio operators will demonstrate their skills and service by establishing temporary radio stations in public locations. Their use of radio signals, which reach beyond borders, bring people together while providing essential communication in the service of their communities. Field Day highlights ham radio's ability to work reliably under any conditions from almost any location and create independent, wireless communications networks. The public is welcome to stop by and see how these systems work.

Many hams are volunteers with Hamilton County Emergency Management who serve in RACES, Community Emergency Response Teams, and the Emergency Operations Center. Most have portable radio





"Boys' bathrooms are for boys, and girls' bathrooms are for girls," Rokita said. "I realize


this concept is difficult for leftist America-haters to fathom, but most Hoosiers are rightly perplexed that we would even need to defend such basic common sense."

A 13-year-old biological female student who identifies as male has sued the Martinsville school district and the principal of John to the boys' bathroom. The sex threatens the privacy student has repeatedly disobeyed the school's policy and used the boys' bathroom anyway – despite the option of using a single-occupant bathroom as an alternative.

The student's lawsuit, filed through the student's mother, also demands that the school require staff and other students to refer to the student as a male. It further demands that the school allow the student to participate on the boys' soccer term.

Failing to accommodate ing the right of Martinsville the student's lawsuit ar-

gues, constitutes discrimination against the student in violation of federal Title IX rules and the Protec-Equal tion Clause of Fourteenth Amendment.



court granted a preliminary injunction in favor of the student, the school district appealed to the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Rokita is leading a 21-state amicus brief refuting the student's arguments and supporting the school

"Opening boys' and R. Wooden Middle School girls' bathrooms to students over being denied entrance of the opposite biological and safety of all students,' Rokita said. "No law requires schools to go down that dangerous path. No controlling precedent holds that Title IX or the Equal Protection Clause means that schools must permit students to use whatever bathrooms they like."




