

Garrison has Dem opponent; most Reps go unopposed

The surprise filing of a candidate for Hamilton County prosecutor was one of a handful of last-minute Democratic candidates reported to the county elections office Tuesday. The deadline for filing was noon Tuesday.



Jessica D. Paxson,

currently a deputy in the office of Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, was chosen to oppose Republican candidate Greg Garrison, who upset Buckingham in the May primary. Paxson is a Noblesville resident with several years' experience as a deputy prosecutor.

The candidate has been voting in the Republican primary in recent years but was endorsed by the Democratic leadership. The party has the option of filling their ticket when there was no candidate filed in their party's primary.

Carmel Fire Department investigating two separate blazes

The Carmel Fire Department (CFD) is investigating two fires that damaged homes on opposite sides of the city.

Sometime between 11 and 11:30 p.m. Sunday, firefighters were called to a house fire in the 14000 block of Trailwind Court. That's on Carmel's north side near 141st Street and Ditch Road.

A family and their pet cat got out of the house safely, according to CFD Public Information Office Tim Griffin.

While responding to the fire on Trailwind Court, firefighters were called to a house fire on Cornell Avenue. That's on the city's south side near 106th Street and College Avenue. No one was hurt in the fire, Griffin told WISH-TV News 8.

Both fires were reported by neighbors who saw flames coming through the roof, the fire department said on Facebook.

Investigators are still trying to figure out what led to the fires, but Griffin says very dry conditions could have been a factor.

There are few other county-level Democratic candidates, so Republicans for judge, sheriff, county clerk, assessor, recorder, coroner, county commissioner and all but one county council member will be re-elected in November without opposition, barring any independent or write-in candidacies. Democrat Nathan Bullock will square off against Republican incumbent Amy Massillamany for County Council District 2.

At the state legislative level, Democrats also announced candidates against Republicans Jerry Torr, Carmel, who represents most of Clay Township, and James Buck, Kokomo, whose district includes portions of Hamilton County.

Josh Lowry, an attorney with offices in Carmel, will oppose Buck in Senate District 21, and Matt McNally, whose website indicates he lives in Westfield, will oppose Torr in House District 39.

The only other candidates fielded by Democrats in the last day for filing were Pam Williams for Adams Township Board and Julia Keller for Clay Township Board.

Republicans are guaranteed eight of nine township trustee positions. In Fall Creek Township, Republican incumbent Doug Allman will face Democratic challenger Nicole Tredup.

Hummingbirds are more than beautiful fixtures in a garden. They are vital pollinators and essential to our wildlife habitats. They are often referred to as "feathered bees" in a garden because of their ability to pollinate flowers at a staggering rate. The hummingbird drinks nectar while pollinating a plant in a beautiful coexisting relationship between these intriguing birds and our treasured flowers. Many of the same flowers that attract butterflies will also draw hummingbirds.

The more appealing you can make your garden to these darting creatures, the more pleasure they will offer. Providing a hummingbird feeder is a wonderful addition to any garden. According to audubon.org, one can very easily make hummingbird mixture at home by mixing four parts water to one part refined white sugar, bringing to a boil and letting cool before filling your feeder at home. "Do not substitute honey, which can promote dangerous fungal growth, or use red food coloring, which is not necessary and could also prove harmful to birds."

hummingbird nectar, and trust me - hummingbirds will flock to your feeder with this homemade recipe. It is very important to change the nectar in your feeder frequently, especially in the summer!

Hummingbirds are very small in stature **com**, "The architecture of the wing permits hummingbirds to fly not only forward but also straight up and down, sideways, and backward and to hover in front of flowers as they obtain nectar and insects from them." Their rapid speed of pollination makes them



I have never once bought commercial a wonderful visitor to frequent your flowers. Hummingbirds are drawn to brightly colored flowers. They like things shaped as a bell that allow their long beaks to drink nectar. If the flower provides a place for them to perch while they drink, they will like it even more!

Some flowers that I happen to love that and have nests that match their petite size. will attract hummingbirds include Trumpet and see one of these tiny winged beauties. Their nests are no larger than a ping-pong Vine, Coral Bells, Salvia, Bee Balm (you ball. Hummingbirds are predominantly mi- cannot have enough of this in your garden, looking for a wonderful native plant to add that will attract them, check out Cardinal Flower! Unlike butterflies and bees that are attracted to sun-loving plants and rely on them for nectar, hummingbirds are attracted to both shade-loving and sun-loving plants,

That same childlike excitement that my daughter felt when she heard the birds singing is still how I feel whenever I see one of those magical little birds.

Nature is talking to us, and the birds are singing. Do you hear it?



They quickly made close friends at their church in Bowling Green, enjoyed summer visits with their 12 grandkids and hosted the Nethery Family "goat roping" every Labor Day weekend.

They returned to Hamilton County in 2000 and their home quickly became headquarters for Saturday morning drop-in family breakfasts featuring Barbara's biscuits and gravy and endless pots of coffee. She enjoyed these Saturday mornings in her recliner, catching up on family news, discussing recipes as well as the latest diet she would be starting on Monday. Barbara was a treasured wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother and close friend to many. She will be dearly missed, but God has called her home.

Bryan Hanan has spent the past six years with the Carmel High School tennis program, helping many young people achieve their goals of winning state championships.


Now, Hanan is heading to Franklin Central, where he will be working toward his goal - teaching at the high school level. And helping the Flashes tennis program along the way.


Sheridan Horseshoe tournament coming Saturday



school opening," said Hanan. "They sound pretty confident that they'll get me in the high school. I miss that the Greyhounds' girls team area. I really do."

In addition, Hanan noted that Franklin Central is due for some big growth over the next few years. He wants to help the tennis program - which is familiar to people in Hamilton County due to the Flashes playing in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference – start to realize its potential.

"I'm excited to start over again," said Hanan, who coached at Greenwood, Southport and Warren Central before coming to Carmel. "There are going to be 4,000 kids over the next five years at Franklin Central. To me, it's a sleeping giant."

Of course, Hanan was part of a giant at Carmel. He started as the boys assistant coach in 2016, then moved championships all six years Hanan was there, a record for most consecutive state titles.

During Hanan's tenure, Carmel also won four individual singles state championships (Patrick Fletchall in 2016-17 and Presley Thieneman in 2018-19), and has a streak of three straight doubles state titles (Uday Lomada/Jones Mc-Namar in 2019, McNamar/ Srisanth Malpeddi in 2020 and Malpeddi/Jack Jentz in

and Jay Natarajan won state doubles in 2016.

Hanan began coaching in 2019. The team fell in the state semi-finals that year to Cathedral 3-2, then had to sit out a year in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. But Carmel came back to win two state titles in 2021 and 2022. Also, Leila Antony and Lauren Littell won the state doubles title in 2019.

"I've had a great time there," said Hanan. "It was a very tough move. I have a lot of strong relationships with parents there. It was not easy."

And that's one thing that Hanan wants to make clear: His move to Franklin Central is strictly a professional move.


