# Fred Glynn wins GOP primary race for Indiana House District 32

The Reporter has learned that the recount for the newly remapped Indiana House District 32 race is complete. Republican Fred Glynn won his party's primary election by a slightly wider margin than originally reported following the May election.

The only changes were found in absentee ballots, some of which were mislabeled as Democratic ballots but were, in fact, Republican. All those votes went in Glynn's favor. While no official has been released from state or county election boards as of press time, The Reporter anticipates Glynn to have won by additional six votes, making his margin of victory 12 votes over Suzie Jaworowski.

When asked for comment, Glynn said, “I am very pleased that the primary victory was confirmed by the recount. I look forward to uniting Republicans and working to achieve victory in the fall.”

The new House District 32 encompasses portions of Clay and Delaware townships in southern Hamilton County, as well as a small slice of northern Marion County.

Glynn will face off against Democrat Victoria Garcia Wilburn in November.

# Carmel, Westfield send 7 students to national leadership conference

More than 150 Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) members, advisers, alumni, and guests from around Indiana gathered June 29 to July 3 in San Diego, Calif., for the FCCLA National Leadership Conference. The students represented 19 schools from Indiana.

Locally, four students representing the Carmel High School FCCLA chapter and three from the Westfield High School Foodies Rock chapter participated in nationals.

The National Leadership Conference had an attendance of over 7,000. The theme of this year's conference was “Make It Count,” which inspired attendees to share how they make it count while exploring career opportunities, developing

leadership skills, and growing personally while making a difference in their families and communities.

FCCLA is a national organization that works with students in Family and Consumer Sciences and is described as the “Ultimate Leadership Experience.” Throughout the conference, members attended sessions focused on leadership and career development in CTE pathways.

Hoosier students competed in skill and knowledge demonstrations, called STAR Events, related to their studies in the field of Family and Consumer Sciences.

To participate at the National Leadership Conference, a student had to place in the top 2 at

# “Indefinite delay”: Rising costs pause building of State Road 37 raised roundabout in Fishers

Soaring construction costs are forcing an indefinite delay on a major State Road 37 project in Fishers. City officials say the 141st Street intersection is scheduled to be the last one of four changed into a raised roundabout, but now they aren't sure when construction will resume.

“We're certainly disappointed that this is the route that we have to take for State Road 37,” said Ashley Elrod, the community and public relations director for Fishers city government. “We were really looking forward to wrapping that project up.”

City leaders decided pausing the project was the best way possible to use taxpayer dollars.

Engineers estimated the cost of the 141st Street roundabout at \$26.6 million, but the three bids the city received were for \$49.4 million, \$39.9 million and \$32.9 million.

“At this point, just because of the market fluctuations, you know, we're starting to see gas prices decrease, but certainly some other materials are continuing to increase,” Elrod said.

The SR 37 project was divided into five phases with a focus on 126th, 131st, 135th, 141st and 146th streets. The reconstruction project aims to replace all the intersec-

tions except 135th Street with raised roundabouts that SR 37 traffic will go under or use off-ramps to access the crossroads. The goal is to improve traffic flow by removing the stoplights, similar to what Carmel has done in creating Keystone Parkway. The crossing at 135th Street will become a right-turn-in, right-turn-out intersection. The raised roundabout at 126th Street has already opened.

Overall construction was slated to end in 2023.

“It's really challenging for us to predict when that timeline might be for the completion of the 141st intersection, but know that it will continue to be a priority,” Elrod said.

Fishers resident Diane Gilbert reacted to the delay. “It's frustrating not to have an end date as someone who lives here because there's just so much construction right now in Hamilton County, in all like the neighboring cities right now, and so we're constantly having to find new routes to go on.”

## Westfield Washington Historical Society seeks donations to help finish rebuilding Barker Cabin

The Westfield Washington Historical Society (WWHS) has received approval from the City Council and the City to reconstruct the 1835 Nicholas Barker log cabin in the vacant lot beside City Hall.

This cabin is original to Westfield, having been built by hand by Nicholas Barker. WWHS plans to use this cabin as an educational structure and welcoming center for the community. Opening is planned for November.

Barker was a member of the Quaker Meeting of Friends, and WWHS is convinced he was involved in the Underground Rail-

road. The 22-by-20-foot cabin has some extra-special hand-planed wooden beams that are more finely crafted than most cabins of the day. It is a one-room cabin with a huge 10-foot fireplace. Some of the native hand-hewn logs are 23 to 25 inches tall.

Families and businesses located within and connected to the Westfield community have the opportunity to be a part of this cabin by purchasing a Nicholas Barker Log Cabin Walkway Brick. These bricks come in two sizes: a 4-by-8-inch for \$100, or an 8-by-8-inch for \$200. These bricks will be the sidewalk going to and coming from the cabin. ## CCPL CARMEL CLAY PUBLIC LIBRARY Carmel Public Library eliminates overdue fines

The Carmel Clay Public Library (CCPL) is no longer charging overdue fines for items returned after their due dates. As part of its new policy, the library is also erasing past overdue fines from cardholder accounts.

CCPL Director Bob Swanay says the timing was right to move to a fine-free policy.

“As we prepare to open a wonderful new and expanded version of the library in the fall,” Swanay said, “we want to make sure that everyone in our community feels welcome and comfortable visiting and using the library and all of its many resources.”

The library has also increased the maximum number of renewals from three to five for items that are not on hold for someone else.

Library patrons will still need to observe due dates by renewing or returning their checkouts in a timely manner. If an item becomes 45 days overdue, it will be con-

sidered lost, and the patron will be charged a replacement fee. The library will continue to send due date reminders to help patrons know when their checkouts need to be returned or renewed.

Overdue fines have represented a very small percentage of the library’s revenue but can become a significant barrier to library use. Other libraries that have eliminated overdue fines report seeing a better rate of returned materials and library usage. CCPL’s new policy strengthens the library’s ability to provide equitable service to all members of the community while still encouraging patrons to be responsible borrowers.

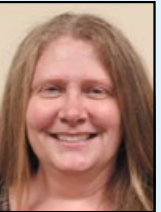

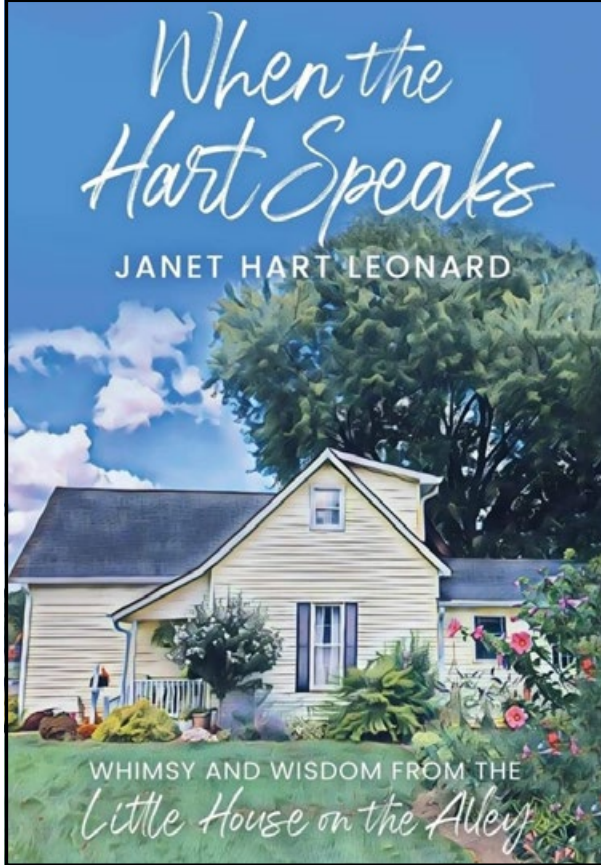

# Gathering non-identifying information

Thanks to a fantastic babysitting co-op through our church, John and I were able to go out on a date with each other twice a month despite our low finances. Sometimes we would just have a picnic

I finally made a decision. I decided I would search for my birth parents after my mother passed away in the future. Mom was in her late 70s at the time. Of course, I loved her very much and wanted her to live as long as possible. I figured waiting 10, 15, or 20 years or so would be OK.

I did take one baby step in 2009. I decided to at least find some non-identifying information, hopefully medical. But where to begin?

I contacted Catholic Charities, formerly Catholic Social Services, of Southwestern Ohio. Since I was born in Good Samaritan hospital in Cincinnati, I figured they were the actual agency that handled my adoption. But I discovered that the correct branch was the Fort Wayne / South Bend one in Indiana, where I was raised. I called that office and asked what my options were as far as finding out non-identifying information.

They kindly directed me to the St. Joseph County probate court that handled the legal aspects of my adoption. A warm, courteous woman named Laura told me on the phone that she could look up certain pieces of information and share them with me. She took down my birth date and other information and promised to get back to me soon.

Two days later, Laura called me back. For the first time in 38 years, I learned pieces of my history. I was shaking so hard it was difficult to write down the information she gave me on a legal pad.

# That moment changed everything

Have you ever had a moment in time that defines how your life moves forward?

I stood there holding the harvest gold attached-to-the-wall phone. What I had just heard had such an emotional impact on me that I not only felt my heart crack but also heard it break. My heart would never be the same. I still remember the words she spoke after all these years ... twenty-eight years.

I've come to realize that much of my life is defined by before and after. I'm not meaning before marriage and after kids and before the pandemic and, well ... will there ever be an "after" pandemic?

I'm talking about a ma-

jor crisis, a shattering of dreams, a medical diagnosis or a slammed-shut door. Can you relate?

I've had the phone call that made me question my being a good mother. I've taken the envelope out of the mailbox and upon opening it, finding my suspicions were confirmed. I've had a conversation telling me I was but an option in a relationship I had made a priority.

The phone call, all those years ago, would lead to what I call my chronic "thorn in the flesh" condition.

In the New Testament, Paul talks about his thorn in the flesh. Paul does not specifically speak about what it is from which he suffers.

(Nor will I.) He does say he asked God three times to take it away from him. I might have asked God a few more than three times.

God told Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in your weakness." 2 Corinthians 12:6-7. NIV

Paul is said to delight in his weakness. I struggle with my thorn, and I struggle to delight in my weakness. My thorn keeps me humble and needing God to give me both wisdom and the strength to endure. It's very private and it keeps the crack in my heart hurting.

Truth is that my thorn may always be there.

I can listen for the voice of God to tell me He will never leave me nor forsake me, or I can listen to the voice of the enemy telling me, "I'll get you, my pretty." (Doesn't *The Wizard of Oz* have the best quotes?)

God is good even when the thorns in my life never leave me. In every "during and after" God has brought people into my life who speak to me in ways that give me hope and love. There will always be hope and love in dealing with my thorn.

I simply bring my thorn to the throne of God and leave it there. And then it raises up and I feel its sharp prick. I will keep laying it at the throne of God, possibly, until the day I die.

The harvest gold attached-to-the-wall phone is no longer there, but the voice on the other end echoes to this very day.

Earlier this month, some of the fastest solvers of the Rubik's Cube gathered in Toronto, Canada, to compete in the World Cube Association (WCA) Rubik's North American Championship, the largest speedcubing competition since the pandemic.

The competition was made up of a variety of fun events. From the classic 3x3 all the way up to the 7x7, competitors battled it out to be crowned the fastest. There were even one-handed and blindfolded events.

The competition is officially recognized by the WCA, a worldwide non-profit organization that governs official speedcubing competitions, and sponsored by Rubik's Cube, owned by Toronto-based leading global children's entertainment company Spin Master.

"This is one of the biggest community wide projects Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank leads each year and we are so proud of the 4-H families, donors, volunteers, and community spirit that make it all possible," Hagen told The Reporter. "Thank you again so very much for your extra effort in helping us with our Meating the Need donations this year! This additional \$3,000 will be just phenomenal in helping to provide protein to the 24 pantries who will receive the meat this year."

Reporter Owner Ray Adler said the newspaper is just doing what it should.

24,270 people in Hamilton County are food insecure, and 6,340 of them are children.

According to Hagen, the 24 pantries, all located in Hamilton County, who will receive fresh local hamburger and sausage from this year's Meating the Need project are located in every area of the county, from Carmel to Atlanta, Fishers to Sheridan and all points in between. Each will receive approximately 200 pounds of local meat.

"Meating the Need serves as the prime example of what communities can accomplish when people work together to do good things," Reporter Owner and Circulation Director Isaac Taylor said. "It's yet another reason why Hamilton County is special, and The Reporter is proud to be a part of it all."

"In 2022, over 33 donors have helped to fund this project," Hagen said. "This does not include the donors who have contributed through The Hamilton Reporter. During the 4-H Fair I am reminded how farmers help feed the world, and how projects such as this can feed our neighbors."

In the six previous years of Meating the Need, 22,611 pounds of meat, or the equivalent of over 90,444 protein requirements for a meal, have been distributed to food pantries in Hamilton County. Last year was a new record of 4,825 pounds of meat. With this year's distribution they will surpass 100,000 portions of protein.

"One of the goals of our stewardship of the Reporter was to always give back to our community," Reporter Owner and Hoosier Weather Daddy Paul Poteet said. "We are helping directly with our contribution, and of course we help by writing the story of those 'meating' needs in Hamilton County."

Hagen told The Reporter over 30 different 4-H members have participated in the Meating the Need program over the years, many of

# Songs that return him to the summer side of life

“ ‘Cause it’s summer / Summertime is here / Yes, it’s summer / My time of year.” – War

My favorite summer songs are those that are soundtracks to a specific memory or simply conjure a general sense of the season.

My auditory recollections remain as indelible as the scent of roadside honeysuckle and sweet cotton-candied air at the Fourth of July fair; the feel of a first baseball mitt fitted over my left hand; dusk-time firefly light shows lingering over my rural route boyhood backyard.

“Bad, Bad Leroy Brown” played anytime my parents’ car rolled. Jim Croce’s *Life and Times* was our only 8-track. To finally have a “modern” car with an 8-track tape player represented, for me, the birth of music. The plastic 8-track cartridge was powder blue. The label, showing a pensive-looking Croce, all mustachioed and denim, bubbled from the Southern Indiana summer heat. A burnt smell emitted when the magnetic tape made its squeaky loops. I was 10 when I first heard the song’s boogie-woogie beat – and here I am, 47 years later, still remembering it.

I remember, too, the song playing on the tin-can-y sounding AM radio station while being driven to the city pool by my uncle and aunt. My backseat-chorus cousins and I shamelessly sang, more so we shouted, the “the baddest man in the whole DAMN town” part with a devil-

ish vivacity. The adults sang too, laughed too. After the song, a deejay mentioned that Croce had died in a plane crash the previous fall. The news’ heaviness attached to me like an anchor as I sunk to the city pool’s bottom where I sat holding my breath and tried to fathom Croce’s fate. I’m still that sinking boy, at times, still grappling with the loss of a legend who created Leroy Brown.

At 19, I was illegally served beer in a small river town dive bar. I fed the jukebox incessantly, queuing replays of “Bad, Bad Leroy Brown” while dancing with local, tough-as-nails, river rat girls; their horrible Eighties hair was frizzed by August humidity; the day became a blur of drunken feet on old-timey wooden, worn, warped floorboards, each shoe’s shuffle and scuff sounding like a match strike, warning us, perhaps, about the fine line existing between a party and a powder keg. “... *Badder than old King Kong / Meaner than a junkyard dog.*”

The Steve Miller Band’s “Jungle Love” time-machines me to the sawdust grounds of Tell City’s Fourth of July Picnic. There was the Pirate Ship funhouse with its hall of mirrors that transformed my body into various grotesqueries. I entered a narrow, pitch-black passageway where unseen carny hands reached through wall holes to molest us. Outside, I passed games of chance – ring toss; paddle wheel; grumbling, cutthroat biddies

playing bingo – and gravitated to the terrifying Tempest. The ride’s four pastel-colored cages moved in synchronized tilted revolutions while the cloudy-eyed, bored ride operator ignored loosened screws and nuts and throttled the noisy engine. The speaker blared, “Jungle love, it’s driving me mad, it’s making me crazy...”

Boston’s “Foreplay / Long Time” finds me seatbelt-free in Uncle Rick’s cherry red Pontiac LeMans rocketing down a roller-coaster-like, two-lane, corkscrew highway. I am in back, snugly wedged between two high-school girls – a good gig for a middle-school boy. The girls sang out the tally of each car we passed (no-passing zones be damned). “Six... seven...” “*Time doesn’t wait for me / It keeps on rollin’...*” The hell car attempted liftoff at each hill’s crest. “... *Sail on / A distant highway, yeah...*” I imagined adjacent cornfields ablaze from the sparks created by the impact of creaking undercarriage on concrete. Up front, Rick and his buddy (he called “shotgun” earlier) laughed maniacally while the screaming girls dug their sharp fingernails into my scrawny kneecaps. “... eight... nine...”

At two minutes and five seconds, The Lovin’ Spoonful’s “Do You Believe in Magic?” is summer tune perfection. It never fails to deliver jolts of pure, positive, summery energy, erasing my worries like an Etch-A-Sketch being shaken. Even though the song never mentions summer, and even though I was a baby when it first hit the radio in the summer of 1965, “Do You Believe in Magic?” became the sun of my

summer song universe. Why? Maybe the 45 RPM record played on Mom’s turntable and soothed me during fitful, fistful bouts at breast-feeding, the song forever singed in my subconscious, a reminder of a patient mother’s magical touch, her warmth.

“The Swimming Song,” by Loudon Wainwright III, brings to mind the carefree, springboard sounds of summer’s past and the feeling of being a child momentarily aloft, shouting “Cannonball!” just before splashdown, sending tiny tsunamis toward unwary, poolside sunbathers. This under-three-minute banjo song demonstrates how the best songwriters know how to say so much in so little time: “*This summer I did swan dives / And jack knives for you all / And once when you weren’t looking / I did a cannonball.*” I feel the need to dry off after each Loudon listen, yet I remain compelled to, once again, warn the world, “Cannonball!”

# Two cultures, a bridge apart

Does anyone know the name of the Man who lived under the Logan Street Bridge?

When my wife and I had the law office at 53 N. 6th St., adjoining the old Logan Street bridge,

my immediate neighbor to the north was a man who lived under the Logan Street Bridge. The armory was across the street to the north. Dellen Oldsmobile was across the street to the east. South across the alley was a “vibrating bowl” manufacturing facility and then a gas station. Jim Jenkins ran an accounting office in the building along the railroad tracks, just east of the armory. Steve Schwartz and his wife, Lori, also adjoined the Logan Street Bridge, but on the west side of the river.

Between the Schwartz and Adler businesses lived the Man under the bridge. We were never exceptionally close, but we did talk on occasion. He told me that he was happy living where he did. He was not looking to live in a home and was not looking for a job.

When the Logan Street Bridge was expanded in the 1980s, I remarked to him that his home was getting a million-dollar makeover at no cost to him. The bridge was being widened to account for increased traffic on Logan Street, and there was a debate over whether the bridge should be expanded even more (which it later was to its current size). Mike Howard commented that everyone on the Dan Ryan Expressway in Chicago would love to have our traffic problems.

Not only has the Logan Street Bridge been widened, but new bridge improvements over the White River are planned for Hamilton County, including a new bridge for the Pleasant Street expansion project, and a major renovation on 146th Street Bridge over White River.

146th Street was originally part of the state highway system. The state sought to abandon 146th Street in the late 70s, and the then county attorney filed a lawsuit, alleging that the state could not abandon the roadway to Hamilton County because the bridge was in disrepair. When I became county attorney, years later, I inherited the 146th Street case, and the court ultimately ordered the state to replace the bridge. When 146th Street was expanded, the bridge was expanded as well. The new bridge will be at least the fifth bridge at that location.

So much has changed in Hamilton County over the last 45 years. The population has nearly quadrupled as fields have been transformed into thriving commercial districts and neighborhoods.

I often wonder what ever came of the Man under the Logan Street Bridge. Did the rapid expansion eventually push him out? Did he move to a different bridge? What stories of our county do you think such a Man has to offer?

# Will Garrison vs. Paxson be the headliner this election cycle, or is it another race?

Greg Garrison won the GOP nomination for county prosecutor in the May primary in a political upset over incumbent Lee Buckingham. Many Republican “insiders” and officeholders were disappointed to see Buckingham lose.

The only candidate for county-wide office on the Democratic ticket is Jessica Paxson running for prosecutor against Garrison. This may be no accident as party leaders may feel Republicans who are unhappy with Buckingham’s loss will jump the fence for Paxson, who is a deputy in Buckingham’s office.

But, Paxson’s chances are still not great. It will be something akin to paddling

upstream on White River at flood stage. No Democrat has won countywide office for 64 years, and that’s a big reason the party has no candidates for most local offices.

Democrats filed Paxson’s candidacy and a handful of others at the last minute before a July 5 deadline. One of those is Matt McNally who will oppose longtime State Rep. Jerry Torr. While probably not in great danger, Torr will need to campaign vigorously in a district that includes most of Clay Township and

a portion of Washington. It is virtually all suburban, and some of its voters have shown a willingness to “scratch” for a Democrat.

Torr won a relatively close re-election (by Hamilton County standards) in 2020. On issues such as abortion and gun rights, the candidates’ positions this year may prove important.

So, while some may think the interesting race locally will be between Garrison and Paxson, it may in fact be more the Torr-McNally contest that becomes the one to watch.

Can you tell the difference between a real Duke Energy text message and a text from a scammer? Duke Energy wants to equip its customers with the knowledge to filter out the scams and protect their

personal information and their money.

- **Check the link:** Duke Energy uses abbreviated links in text messages. They always start with “duk.us/.”
- **Read carefully:** Duke Energy texts always start with the company name and

never display your full, personal information.

- **Feeling pressured?** Slow down. Duke Energy NEVER demands immediate payment.
- **Suspect a scam?** Call Duke Energy at (800) 521-2232 or visit [duke-energy.com](http://duke-energy.com)

before clicking the suspicious link.

Text and other digital scams are on the rise. Remember that a scammer’s main goal is to frighten or intimidate you into giving away money or personal information.

Ulmer would go on to spend over two decades in teaching and administrative roles in La Porte Community Schools before coming down to Hamilton Southeastern Schools. She was the principal at HSE High School for the past two years.

On July 1, Ulmer began her tenure as an assistant commissioner for the IHSAA. Ulmer took over for Sandra Walter, who left to accept a position as athletic director at Franklin Central. Ulmer has been in her new role at the IHSAA for a little over two weeks now, learning about the role the IHSAA plays in its support for student-athletes.

“Lucky for me, the staff members at the IHSAA are knowledgeable, professional, and patient so I have been learning about the many resources available for schools, athletic directors, officials, and coaches as well as the many supports for our student athletes,” said Ulmer. “Now that we are heading into the second part of July, my goal is travel around the state to meet and support our member schools.”

Ulmer played varsity basketball for the Slicers and later served as an assistant coach for the team, in addition to holding a supporting role with La Porte’s baseball team, a program that has won eight state championships.

“As a former student athlete, administrator, and mom, I have seen the impact that education-based athletics can have on kids, and I have also seen firsthand the positive culture that exists in schools that have a high rate of student participation in extra-curriculars,” said Ulmer. “When I became aware that there was a po-

sition available at the IHSAA, I was intrigued with being able to work with schools to encourage student athlete participation and support that positive culture across the state. So, I took a chance and applied. I think my role as a principal has provided me with a unique perspective on how to support schools and communities and I am looking forward to the opportunity.”

Ulmer graduated from Valparaiso University in 1989 and spent 19 years teaching mathematics at Kesling Middle School in La Porte before becoming Director of Virtual Learning, an alternative high school within LPHS, from 2012 to 2017.

“As an educator and administrator, I have always viewed my role as one that provides information, resources, and support so that students and colleagues can be successful,” said Ulmer. “I consider my role with the IHSAA to be the same. In this position, I hope to be a resource for coaches, athletic directors, officials, and the overall sports community so that we can provide a positive high school athletics experience for student athletes which is why we are all here – for the kids.”

Once at HSE Schools, Ulmer was the Director of the Hamilton Southeastern Fishers Academy, an off-site alternative education program she helped launch for Southeastern and Fishers high schools. She was the Director of HSEF for three years before accepting the Southeastern principal job in 2020.

“I am so grateful for the five years that I have the opportunity to serve Hamilton Southeastern Schools and the Fishers community. When hired in 2017 to create an alternative high school, I was challenged to create a learning environment that would meet the needs of students with unique challenges. Our district and building leaders were supportive of the interventions needed and it was so exciting to create

options for students! Each and every day we were able to provide resources and supports to help students achieve in school and also in life.

“In 2020, I was hired to be the Principal of Hamilton Southeastern High School which happened to be at the beginning of the pandemic. It was a very challenging time to be the leader of a building of approximately 170 teachers, 100 support staff, and 3,500 students – especially when we began the year with students at home and learning virtually. As I worked with our faculty and staff to manage that year of virtual and hybrid instruction, I realized what I had seen since 2017 – HSE High School and HSE Schools are truly committed to student achievement. Our teachers are passionate about student learning and thus, are willing to do whatever it takes to help a student be successful. They needed and deserved a leader who was willing to show up and do whatever she could to support them and that was my goal.”

Each IHSAA sport has an assistant commissioner that serves as a contact. At this time, Ulmer said she will be the contact person for soccer, “which is really exciting,” she said.

But you can expect Ulmer to be at other sporting events as well. She attended the IHSAA boys golf state finals, and had good reason to do so: The Royals finished third in the state. Ulmer was with the team as the players received their state medals.

“As I reflect on my time with HSE, I am grateful

# Carmel grad wins Junior Golf championship

Recent Carmel graduate Owen Sander picked up a big victory earlier this month when the Indiana Golf Association's Howard Bailey Junior Golf Tour conducted its Age Group Championship July 6 and 7 at French Lick.

Sander won the Boys 18 division, running away with the trophy by finishing with a three under par, 36-hole round of 139, 10 strokes ahead of second place. Upchurch made an eagle on hole No. 15, in addition to five birdies. Noblesville's J.T. Kelley scored a 165 to tie for first in the Boys 11 group.

Three Hamilton County girls won their respective

age divisions. Michaela Headlee, an incoming junior at Carmel, won the Girls 16 flight by seven strokes. Headlee had to stop play with five holes left in the second round due to weather, finishing eight over par with three total birdies at the tournament.

Another Carmel girl, Sophie Mock, finished first in the Girls 15 division with a two-day total of 155, draining five birdies along the way.

Fishers' Janelle Garcia had a spectacular effort in winning the Girls 13 flight, going under par both days for a total of 139. Garcia made one eagle in the first round on the eighth hole, then drained two more eagles in the second round, on hole Nos. 10 and 13. She also had six birdies total for the tournament.

Since his stunning retirement from the National Football League in August of 2019, Luck has maintained an extremely low profile, including no

on-the-record interviews regarding his decision to walk away from football at the age of 29.

On July 11, WISH-TV Colts Insider Zak Keefer released ‘Luck’, a six-part podcast series from The Athletic which chronicles Luck’s football journey from childhood through retirement. The podcast skyrocketed up the charts overnight, becoming the most downloaded sports podcast in the country

last week.

Last Wednesday, Luck paid his former Colts teammate Robert Mathis’ a visit, helping out at The Gridiron Gang, Mathis’ local Indianapolis youth football skills academy at Grand Park in Westfield.

Luck previously made similar visits to give back to the game, including volunteering at Summit High School in Colorado with its prep team in August of 2021.

This January, before the 2022 College Football Playoff National Championship game in Indianapolis, Luck joined the College Football Hall of Fame Class of 2022 and briefly spoke on the national broadcast ahead of kickoff.

This September, Colts Quarterback Matt Ryan is slated to become the fourth different Week 1 starting quarterback in Indianapolis over the four seasons since Luck’s retirement.

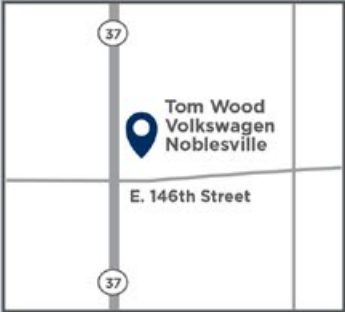
