Beyond the buses at Heights

Stefan Muehlbauer saves wife Tiffany's life thanks to CPR training

“On April 11, Stefan Muehlbauer graduated from the HCEM Community Emergency Response Team Training,” Hamilton County Emergency Management Executive Director Shane Booker told The Reporter. “Little did he know that four months later, he would rely on his training that would forever change his life.”

In July, Stefan and Tiffany were at work when a minor accident turned life-threatening. After a fall, Stefan realized Tiffany was not breathing and did not have a pulse. He relied on his training by remaining calm, calling 911, and immediately starting CPR. When medics arrived, they took over and transported her to the hospital, where after 21 minutes she was revived. Today, Tiffany is back to work and doing well.

At the Hamilton County Emergency Operations Center

last Friday, the Muehlbauers met the dispatcher who took the call that day and Stefan was given a Life Saving Award from HCEM.

When asked to tell their story, Tiffany laughed and said, “I was just along for the ride.”

“Which is actually a running joke in our home,” Stefan said.

“Tiffany says, ‘I had the easy part. I was down. I was back up. Now I’m feeling great.’”

Featured speakers at the Cicero Kiwanis Club meeting on Aug. 20 enthusiastically and optimistically greeted their audience, despite it being 7:30 a.m. on a non-work-day and barely into the 2022-23 academic year.

After all, scheduling Hamilton Heights’ buses, drivers, aides (if needed), and routes amid a nationwide bus driver shortage could have these transportation directors frazzled and more than tired.

Yet, Hamilton Heights Transportation Director Jaymie Wickstrom and Assistant Transportation Director Dave Hildebrand, happily – and proudly – shared a behind-the-scenes look at the school corporation’s transportation system. From bus and student safety to route planning and maintenance, the two covered what it takes to transport district students. It takes planning, strategizing, ongoing communication with Heights’ personnel, parents, police, and highway departments to provide the roughly 1,200 bus riders safe and timely travel. Hamilton Heights buses cover about 940 miles daily to deliver passengers to both school or home destinations.

Noblesville family farm rebounds from tragedy

Sheller Farms expands, diversifies for the future

Aaron Sheller was a junior at Purdue University with plans for law school when tragedy changed his life’s trajectory.

Aaron’s father, Dave, died unexpectedly, leaving his family devastated and the family farm near Noblesville without a full-time leader. At the time, Aaron’s mom, Sherry, was working as a school bus driver and his brother, Adam, was a teacher.

“We had to make some tough decisions,” Aaron said. “I was dating Lacey, who is now my wife. Her dad farms and he encouraged me to rethink my plans. Ultimately, he helped convince me that my passion was not law but farming.”

That conversation was instrumental in Aaron’s decision to return home to help his mother on the farm. After commuting back and forth from Purdue throughout the week,

Scott Willis launches campaign for Westfield mayor

Republican Scott Willis, current Westfield City Councilor, officially launched his campaign for Westfield Mayor in front of a crowd of more than 160 supporters last week.

"It has been an eye-opening journey over the past 11 months as I have explored my future in Westfield," Willis said during his announcement speech. "I have met with thousands of residents, business owners, and stakeholders discussing the future of our great city and what role I should play in it."

Willis plans to make "Managing the Growth of Westfield" a defining theme of the mayor's race.

"It should be no surprise that we are experiencing significant growth," Willis

said. "In fact, we are currently the 'Fastest Growing City in Indiana.' Westfield is a great place to raise a family and people are noticing," Willis said. "We are slowly creating our own personality and brand as a city and are primed to be a world class city that we can all enjoy, gather, work, and live in."

Willis said his goal for Westfield will be to build upon our community's roots to create a place where you can live, work, and play. A place where you can raise a family, send your children off to college, and see them return home to raise theirs.

"To accomplish this, we need to diversify our tax base to keep taxes low. We need quality and unique housing options. We need world class amenities. We

need infrastructure and a trail system that connects our community together," Willis said. "Through strategic, smart, and intentional growth, I want to take Westfield to the next level ... to its highest potential of being a thriving city."

During his announcement speech last Thursday evening, Willis emphasized the need for a leader with the right kind of experience to take the helm at this pivotal time in the city's future.

"Westfield must be led by someone who has decades of experience - of leading large organizations, sizable budgets, and is a strategic thinker with a vision," Willis said. "Someone who will ask the right questions, involve the right experts, and take responsibility for driving a well-

During Willis' first term as Westfield City Councilor, he has brought a unique

voice and perspective to the council as an 18-year Westfield resident, decorated U.S. Marine who served 30 years and managed a

Hamilton County gets first major zoning ordinance update since 1990

Establishes detailed environmental & development process for commercial solar projects; outlines coordinated plans for new U.S. 31 Overlay District

The Hamilton County Commissioners recently passed a Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) that replaces the Hamilton County Zoning and Subdivision Control Ordinances that had been in effect since 1990.

“Hamilton County has grown and changed immensely since the adoption of its Zoning and Subdivision Control Ordinances some 30 years ago,” County Planning Commission Director C.J. Taylor said. “The revision team took into consideration the county’s recently updated comprehensive plan, road updates, land use best practices, and trending technologies in creating the UDO.”

The two biggest zoning changes in the ordinance concern commercial solar projects as well as growth along the U.S. 31 Corridor.

Article 8 of the UDO establishes a Commercial Solar Energy Systems (SES) Overlay District meant to develop a process and standards for solar generated energy while also protecting prime farmland.

“We’ve watched as neighboring counties lose thousands of acres of prime farmland to large solar installations,” County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. “In surveys and meet-

ings with residents in northern Hamilton County, landowners expressed concern about the effect commercial solar farms could have on home values, topsoil, drainage, and water quality.

The updates are meant to protect northern Hamilton County’s agrarian way of life.”

Article 8 identifies commercial solar projects as ones that “generate electricity to be sold in the wholesale market.” Anyone wanting to construct a commercial solar project must rezone the property to the Commercial Solar Energy Systems (SES)

District, which requires a public hearing process before the Hamilton County Plan Commission. As part of this process, a petitioner must, among other things:

- Conduct a soil identification study
- Demonstrate post-construction storm water runoff volume and quality mimics or improves upon predevelopment conditions
- Provide a minimum setback of 300 feet between solar equipment and single-family dwellings
- Provide a landscaping screen between solar equipment and adjacent residen-

tial properties

- Provide a process to ensure topsoil is not removed from the site during construction
- Completely enclose ground-mounted solar panels with a six-foot high fence and locking gate

“We want to encourage the use of solar and renewable energy, while also protecting valuable farmland,” Taylor added. “In order to manage that we needed to put some checks and balances in place.”

Article 10 of the UDO establishes a U.S. 31 Overlay District. The Overlay

District will help promote coordinated development and increased architectural standards for properties adjacent to and adjoining Dunbar Road on the west side of U.S. 31 extending from 216th Street to 296th Street.

“This is a prime area for development in Hamilton County,” Heirbrandt added. “The new ordinance encourages capital investment and economic development in this area by promoting increased density and mixed-use developments.”

The UDO was adopted and went into effect on July 25, 2022. Copies of the UDO are available in the Plan Commission Office. A copy has also been posted at hamiltoncounty.in.gov.

In addition to daily routes, drivers also cover athletic event trips, educational field trips, and other school activities. That’s a lot of time on the road!

So, does Heights need bus drivers? Yes.

While Heights is faring better than many schools nationwide that have had to outsource busing, Heights could always use a couple more at any given time.

Wickstrom and Hildebrand say they want to get more drivers in training to be prepared for potential retiring drivers. Multiple drivers have been behind the wheel at Heights for over 30 years. They are dedicated to the school and the students in their care.

Dedication alone doesn’t get someone in the driver’s seat. Potential bus drivers must take four tests to get a permit, pass a CDL physical, participate in on-site training, and take a class on school bus safety.

A Westfield native, Stevens first started working for the county in January 1974 as a jailer and dispatcher in the Old Jail on the Courthouse Square. Just two years later, he was promoted to a sheriff’s deputy where he also served as a Chief Deputy for eight years. Elected Sheriff in November 1986, Stevens served two terms before accepting a job as the Jail Commander for 13 years. Commissioner Steve Dillinger tapped Stevens to fill the role of Director of Administration in 2009 following Stevens’ retirement from the Sheriff’s Office.

“There was no one better for the job than Dan,” Dillinger said. “His working knowledge of the coun-

ty and its leaders was a great asset to the Commissioners. His value to this administration has been nothing less than irreplaceable. He will be sorely missed.”

Stevens has been instrumental in helping county commissioners, elected officials, department heads, and employees provide governmental services and support functions while also administering large-scale capital projects like the expansion of the Hamilton County Jail, construction of the new Hamilton County Employee Parking Garage, and the site master planning of the corrections complex.

“I certainly didn’t plan to make a career out of public service when I started

as a dispatcher,” Stevens quipped. “I just needed a job. But having a front seat to the growth of Hamilton County and helping wherever I could to improve residents’ quality of life and protecting everything we value has been a bonus.”

Stevens and his wife plan to finish traveling to all 50 states in retirement. The couple also has five grandkids ranging in age from 13 years to seven months they’d like to spend more time with.

“There are only so many grains of sand in an hourglass,” Stevens said. “And we still have a laundry list of things we’d like to do. While I’ll certainly miss all the good people

I’ve worked with, the time has come to bid farewell.”

The Indiana Association of County Commissioners (IACC) selected Stevens as its “Outstanding Supportive County Administrator of the Year” in 2020. Stevens is a member of the Fishers Masonic Lodge, the Scottish Rite, Murat Shrine, Federal Bureau of Investigation National Academy Association, and the Noblesville Sunrises Kiwanis. Stevens is also a lifetime member of the Indiana Sheriff’s Association.

The Hamilton County Commissioners have launched a nationwide search for Stevens’ successor and hope to have someone hired by the first of the year.

Hamilton County has hired a new Executive Director of Communications. Michael Hubbs has served as the Director of the Marion County 911 Center in Indianapolis since 2014.

“This is a once in a lifetime career opportunity,” Hubbs said. “Hamilton County’s 911 Center is highly regarded within the industry as one of the best. Its dispatchers are second to none. It will be a true honor to work alongside folks

who are just as passionate about helping people as I am.”

Having dedicated his life to law enforcement, Hubbs has worked as a 911 dispatcher, an Indiana State Trooper, a commander for the Marion County Sheriff’s Office, and a United States Secret Service agent. Originally from the south side of Indianapolis, Hubbs

graduated with degrees in Criminal Justice and Spanish from the University of Indianapolis.

“Public Safety is a top priority in Hamilton County, so we did a national search to fill this position,” County Commissioner Christine Altman said. “Turns out the best candidate was in our backyard. Mr. Hubbs’ extensive law enforcement

background and depth of experience have earned him the respect and support of Hamilton County Public Safety leadership, our Dispatch team, and makes him the perfect person to lead us through the building of a new 911 center.”

Hubbs replaces Jeff Schemmer, who accepted a job in May as Executive Director at the Indiana Statewide 9-1-1 Board. Hubbs’ first day with the county will be Monday, Sept. 19.

There is, however, a fair bit more to their story. The Muehlbauers own a small business and were on a jobsite when Tiffany’s heart stopped.

“Tiffany took a step backward and stumbled over an object and hit her head on the back on the driveway,” Stefan said. “Immediately, from her eyes being opened, I could see something was just not right. On a whim I had joined CERT [Community Emergency Response Team] in February of this year because I thought it was reckless not knowing first aid and CPR and all of those things. I thought it would be a good thing to learn in case I needed it. It was good.”

Thanks to his CERT training, when Stefan realized Tiffany was not breathing and had no pulse, he knew exactly what to do. He told the nearest person to call 911 while he began performing CPR. Nate Nelson took the call and the first responders were on site within minutes.

According to both Muehlbauers, the first responding officer was a police officer who delivered three shocks to Tiffany using an automated external defibrillator (AED). Stefan

and the officer then took turns performing CPR until paramedics arrived and reestablished a heartbeat.

“We received the greatest care at every step along the way,” Stefan told The Reporter. “From the 911 call coming in until just a week later being released from Ascension St. Vincent on 86th Street. The care has just been tremendous.”

Tiffany responded to every question with humor. “Everybody keeps telling me I’m a miracle, but I just didn’t know I was supposed to stay down, so I just keep going.”

According to Stefan, when he was talking to doctors, they told him Tiffany is still here because of CPR.

“I just wish that more

people would learn it,” Stefan said. “It definitely saves lives.”

The day Tiffany was released from the hospital was the Muehlbauers’ 20-year wedding anniversary.

There was no history of heart problems with either Tiffany herself or in her family history. According to the Muehlbauers, doctors told them her heart stopped as a result of the head injury.

“I’m just thrilled that Hamilton County EMA were there and the amazing people in Westfield,” Tiffany said. “Everyone needs to learn CPR. It does save lives. And it would be great if Hamilton County could invest more in AEDs – and more businesses as well. They are not that expensive.”

In addition to the Life Saving Award, Stefan and Tiffany Muehlbauer also met the man who took that 911 call: Nate Nelson.

Nelson has worked for Hamilton County EMA for 10 years. He has been a dispatcher for a total of 21 years. He told The Reporter this was the first time he had ever been able to meet a patient after a call.

Booker called all the 911 dispatchers the sentries for Hamilton County.

“They stand there ready,” Booker said. “They go through all this extensive training and they are ready to pick up the phone at any given moment. But no one thinks about what they have to go through with another person on the other end of the phone.”

According to Hamilton County Public Safety Communications Director of Operations Larken Uhrick, getting to know the outcome of one of these calls is expectational and rare.

“It’s like reading a book and you get clear to the last chapter, but you never know what happens to that patient afterwards,” Uhrick said. “It’s nice to celebrate this because we can see what happened and celebrate that there was a happy ending.”

Aaron finished his degree in accounting, opted out of law school and joined Sherry on the farm full time.

“I helped on the farm every day and grew up in a farming family,” Sherry said. “When my husband passed away, Aaron took over the farm management, while others helped us along the way.”

During that transition, family members, friends and supply partners all pitched in.

“We were a mom and a kid learning how to run a farm, and we couldn’t have succeeded without partners like Beck’s with the late Lee Rulon, who sent out an agronomist weekly to help walk the fields,” Aaron said. “Lee told me, ‘If you know the economics of how to make money, we can teach you to farm.’”

Almost 20 years later, Aaron is the seventh generation leading the family’s farm, and the farm has tripled in size. What has not changed is the family’s teamwork mentality.

Almost all family members, including Lacey and Sherry, drive the grain cart, feed livestock and help in other ways to keep the farm running. Adam, who now sells insurance, continues to assist with planting and harvest, as time allows.

“My mom was the foundation of women in agriculture,” Aaron said. “There’s nothing she can’t do on the farm, and that includes driving a semi into Indianapolis traffic to make deliveries.”

Today, Sheller Farms produces row crops, including non-GMO soybean seed and non-GMO food-grade waxy corn. The family also sells farm inputs to other farmers, raises cattle and hogs and operates a direct-to-consumer meat company, Sheller Family Foods.

The family’s success earned them recognition at this year’s Indiana State Fair as a Featured Farm, a program sponsored by Corteva Agriscience.

“We love what we do,” Aaron said. “We are very passionate about farming, and we truly care about our consumers because without them we wouldn’t be able to do what we love.”

Aaron and Lacey have three children, Hallie, Davanee and Luke. Adam, and his wife, Amy, have three children, Annie, Abby and Alayna.

In 2019, Aaron and Lacey received the Indiana Farm Bureau’s Young Farmer Achievement Award. In 2020 they had a top-10 finish in the American Farm Bureau’s Young Farmer and Rancher achievement competition.

“For us, farming is about the next generation,” Aaron said. “I’ve got kids who want to be involved in agriculture and there are so many options for them, including row-crop farming, livestock, retail and more. It’s our job to make sure the ship is big enough for them to set foot on. It’s their job to build the ship as big as they’d like it to be.”

Westfield gets in win column, fends off speedy Lawrence Central in home opener

WESTFIELD – The intensity was high from the opening kickoff and it didn’t let up until late in the fourth quarter. The Lawrence Central Bears and Westfield Shamrocks were both looking for their first win of the young season last Friday.

It became a battle of who could overcome the penalties that mounted up throughout the game. Westfield was able to take advantage and get past the total of 37 yellow flags thrown between the two teams, coming out on top with a 42-27 win over the visiting Bears.

The ‘Rocks wanted to get off to a great start on defense and that’s exactly what they did.

Lawrence Central lined up to punt on 4th down and two at its own 28. Line-backer Charlie Dager broke free through the line to block the punt, deflecting it into the end zone where Ethan Colling dove on the ball just across the goal line for the touchdown. Less than a minute into the game, Westfield was already up 7-0.

“We made a big deal about getting off to a great start in this game, and we typically do. That’s something we’ve been real strong about in the first quarter and we didn’t get that at New Palestine,” stated Westfield head coach Jake Gilbert on his team’s great start on defense.

After forcing LC to punt on the next possession, the ‘Rocks offense didn’t start real well. Cole Ballard threw an interception that was tipped and reeled in by DJ Morton.

The Bears then put a drive together that ended kind of quirky. Ahmaad Duff found an opening, carrying the ball 13 yards to the goal line, diving to the front left pylon. When Duff lunged out, he was still inbounds and the ball came loose, into the end zone for a touchdown.

Westfield then had a statement drive. Running back Terry Williams got it started quickly with a 42-yard scamper down to the 38 of LC. The next play, Ballard called his own number, running untouched 38 yards later for the score. This put the Shamrocks up 14-0.

“That was a critical juncture for our football team to get off to that fast start,” said Gilbert on his team jumping out to a two-score lead early.

That lead didn’t last long. On the first play of the Bears’ next series, quarterback Bryson Luter passed to a wide open Duff for an 80-yard touchdown strike. Luter then hit Jacob Franklin across the back of the end zone for the two-point conversion, cutting the Westfield lead to 14-8.

Then, it only took 30 seconds for Ballard to loft a TD pass to Gabe Arambolles and 58-yards later, it was 21-8.

“He (Ballard) was fantastic. I don’t think our offense got stopped, if we stopped ourselves with a turnover or a

penalty, but he’s the engine that makes us go. He’s ultra competitive, ultra talented and a great quarterback,” stated Gilbert on senior first-year starting QB Cole Ballard.

The Bears trimmed the deficit to 21-14 on a two-yard run from Elijah Jackson. The two-point pass failed, but here’s the real kicker: Lawrence Central had three different penalties whistled, backing the attempt up to the 38 and they still insisted on attempting the two-point try. The pass failed after they only gained 20 yards.

Westfield came out in the third quarter with intentions of keeping the game out of reach for Lawrence Central.

On the Shamrocks’ second play of the half, Ballard threw a dart to tight end Max Nosler for a 65-yard score, pushing the Westfield lead back to two scores at 28-14.

“We’ve got two great tight ends and those guys are beasts. One’s a junior and the other a sophomore, so we feel pretty good about having those guys in the game. They’re multi-tool players, physical blockers and great receivers, too,” said Gilbert, praising his two tight ends in Nosler and Mikeah Webster.

Bryson Luter punched it in on LC’s next possession to get it back to one score again.

The Shamrocks went to the air again. Nosler pulled in a 33-yard touchdown on a 3rd down and six at the Bears’ 33. That made it again a 14-point lead at 35-21.

The Bears got one more score when Mataio Russell ran in from one yard away, narrowing the gap again to eight at 35-27.

Early in the fourth, Ballard went 19 yards for his second rushing touchdown that would wind up as the final score of 42-27.



Luter led Lawrence Central (0-2) with 86 yards on 14 carries, while Jackson had 85 on 16. Luter also threw for 304 yards, going 21-for-36 with a TD and an interception. Duff caught 5 for 124 yards, while Demarcus Cole snagged nine passes for 99 yards.

The Bears will battle for bragging rights in Lawrence township, taking on Lawrence North (1-1) on Friday, Sept 2. The Wildcats lost at Whiteland, 24-13 last Friday.

Westfield was able to balance the run and pass to keep Lawrence Central’s defense guessing.

“I thought he (Terry Williams) was great. The o-line was special tonight. That’s a great defense. These are the same guys that held HSE to one touchdown last

week and we came out here and scored 42,” said Gilbert on his junior running back in Williams and crediting the offensive line where credit was due.

Williams finished with 87 yards on 12 rushes, while Ballard ran for 72 on just four attempts. Ballard improved and proved himself through the air, going 12-of-21 for 206 yards and three scores and two interceptions.

Max Nosler highlighted the pass catchers with three receptions and 107 yards, the first two for touchdowns. Gabe Arambolles caught six for 91 yards and a TD.

The Shamrocks (1-1) stay home Friday to host the Zionsville Eagles (2-0) to open up Hoosier Crossroads Conference play. Zionsville beat Lebanon at home last Friday, 42-6.

You just can't tame that Fighting Tiger spirit

FISHERS – It turns out you can only tame a Tiger for so long.

The Fishers football team was being held off by Pike for most of the first half of the Tigers' home opener last Friday night. But Fishers kept fighting, and had things rolling by the fourth quarter, turning an early second-period deficit into a 28-17 victory. The Tigers used a mix of big pass plays, resolute running and solid defense to pick up their second win in as many games this season.

"First off, I got to credit our players," said Fishers coach Curt Funk. "They responded. We had adversity to start off, even in that third quarter." The coach said his kids "never quit," and credited the coaches with doing "a good job of just making adjustments at halftime. And our kids bought into it."

Neither team scored in the first quarter. The Red Devils scored the first 10 points of the second period, first by making an early field goal, after which Jeremiah Berry took a 14-yard run into the end zone.

Since it worked so well, why not do it again? That's what they did, with Minns tossing another 35-yard pass. Hall caught it, and went into the end zone. A Jon Tangara extra-point kick got Fishers within 10-7 at halftime.

The Red Devils dealt the Tigers a blow to begin the second half, as Josh Woods intercepted Minns on the very first play, taking the ball 37 yards to score. Just like that, Fishers was down 17-7. Funk wasn't about to let Minns stay down, however.

"That's over," Funk told his quarterback. "Take a deep breath, all right, we'll focus on the next series."

Hall helped out his quarterback with a 58-yard kickoff return, putting the Tigers in excellent field position at the Pike 20. Carson Dunn made a couple of six-yard runs to get Fishers to the 8, Khobie Martin moved the ball to the 6, and Minns took care of business from there, running into the end zone. Another Tangara kick followed, and Fishers was now within 17-14.

The Tigers took the lead on another big play early in the fourth quarter. Minns threw a pass to Joe Syrus, who turned it into an 80-yard touchdown throw. Fishers had the lead, and Tangara kicked another extra point to make the score 21-17.

Meanwhile, Fishers' defense was starting to find its rhythm. The Tigers held the Red Devils to a three-and-out on the next drive. Fishers had the ball back at its own 30, and then it became Martin's turn to shine.

Martin opened the drive with a 23-yard run to get into Pike territory. The Tigers kept grinding it down the field, and Martin finished the drive with an eight-yard TD run up the middle. Tangara then made his fourth extra-point kick of the game.

"We preach discipline, accountability, toughness, never quit," said Funk. "Our kids, they lived that tonight."

Minns finished the game 9-of-15 for 199

Zionsville bests Fishers in boys soccer 1-2 battle

FISHERS – The calendar read late August, but last Tuesday night at Fishers High School, it felt more like October.

Unbeaten Fishers faced its first regular-season test against Hoosier Crossroads Conference rival Zionsville, and for 10 minutes, the Tigers passed before the Eagles rallied with three unanswered goals to ultimately flip the ISCA rankings.

A goal by senior Santiago Morales off an assist from junior Kyle Clayton put the host Tigers ahead, 1-0, in the first half, but the Eagles’ defense clamped down the remaining 70 minutes to avenge last year’s 1-0 HCC loss with a 3-1 victory.

“We created enough chances. We have some talented, attacking players. I thought they did a good job in transition, and it was kind of like they were running downhill and played a little bit more aggressive than we did,” Fishers boys soccer coach Phil Schmidt said. “Once we got down, I thought we showed a lot of fight and really put a lot of effort in, but they’re a good team, and we can’t give up three goals and think we’re going to win against a good team like that.”

The Tigers were the aggressor in the early portion of the first half and amassed 15 shot attempts overall. However, the Eagles countered at midfield and strung together multiple attacks to tie the game 1-1 in the 17th minute with a quick change of possession initiated by junior Blake Graves, who fed senior Jackson Jelinek for Zionsville’s first goal.

The Eagles seized the lead 2-1 in the 28th minute with an indirect-kick set play that momentarily caught the Tigers off guard.

AJ Jacklin orchestrated the scoring play with a slick pass to Gino Badalow, who

found Luke Cero battling for position in front of the net and the Eagles’ second goal.

“Give Zionsville the credit. They played really well tonight and exploited some things that we have to get better at. As I told the guys at the end, the question is, how do we respond? Do we get better from it? We’ll go to the tape and learn from some mistakes, and if we can learn from the mistakes, then it’s something we can get better from,” Schmidt said.

In-game, the Tigers learned on the move, immediately responding with a shot on goal in the 31st minute by senior Noah Reinhart, which unfortunately drew crossbar.

The Tigers had recorded 13 goals prior to their third HHC contest and the Eagles’ defense paid close attention to their trio of attackers (Clayton, six goals; Morales, four goals; and Reinhart, four goals).

Fishers finished the night with 10 shots on goal compared to Zionsville’s 11. The Eagles posted more than 20 shots overall.

“I thought we did a good job, but they’re still extremely dangerous. There were some opportunities where we were a slide tackle away from them getting in. It was just one of those days where we had the effort and got on the end of the ball,” Zionsville head coach Rob Jordan said. “But this is a team that is going to beat a lot of people. I fully expect to see Fishers toward the end of the year. They’re going to do well. They’re an exciting team.”

Both teams ramped up the physicality in the final 40 minutes with three yellow cards issued to Zionsville and two for Fishers. The Eagles had four yellow cards in the match.

They had some chances, and they didn’t go in for them. It was a well-fought game. It was evenly played, and it could have been a game that went the other way as well.”

The Tigers pressured Badalow in net with a tip save off a hard shot on goal by Clayton in the 50th minute and a pair of shots that just sailed wide from sophomore Reid Spittler in the 56th and 67th minutes.

Fishers executed a perfect attack with quick passes from Reinhart to Clayton to Morales, who buried a would-be goal before it was waved off for offsides in the game’s final 3 minutes, 57 seconds.

“One shot hit the post when we were down 2-1. If that goes in, then it’s probably a dogfight until the end, but it didn’t. That’s soccer. Sometimes, it falls your

Noticing more stress in your life? Take time to take care of yourself

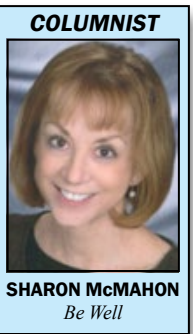
"With the new day comes new strength and new thoughts." – Eleanor Roosevelt

Getting closer to my records

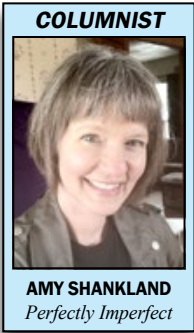
As I continued the search for my biological parents, my husband John cautioned and advised me to be ready for anything.

"I just don't want to see you get hurt," he said.

"I know," I replied. "But no matter what happens, I'll finally have an answer. Some sort of resolution. And I really need that." I began to mentally prepare for what might be ahead.

Of course, I had to continue to keep all this a complete secret. Only John and Mary knew about my efforts, and I intended to let it stay that way. I didn't want anyone else to have to hide this from my mother.

At times it was hard. A good friend of mine named Nancy had reunited years

ago with her birth parents, and it was practically an Oprah Winfrey Show story. She had found them unexpectedly when she was searching for non-identifying information. Nancy's birthparents had deeply regretted giving her up, were still together, and were eager to find her again. Her mother and father had died, so finding her birth parents had been a tremendous blessing to both Nancy as well as her daughters.

I knew my own story might not turn out so perfectly, but I was determined to take that chance.

I contacted Catholic Charities well after the six-month mark in the winter of 2014-2015, and was told

that they were close to finding my birth mother's married name and the state she resided in. I also kept tabs on the Ohio Department of Health web site, which was slowly beginning to reveal the things I would need to do to get information in March. I believe they were simply being cautious so they wouldn't be bombarded with paperwork too soon.

And as I wrote my Christmas cards that year, I made a silent wish. I hoped that in 2015, I would be sending cards to each of my birthparents.

March of 2015 arrived faster than I could have ever imagined. I repeatedly watched a YouTube video that Ohio's Department of Health had created outlining what steps I needed to take to obtain birth and adoption records. I didn't want to make any mistakes that

might delay my potential receipt of these documents.

Mary performed her notarization magic once again, and I mailed the paperwork and a \$20 check to Columbus, Ohio, on Friday, March 20, 2015. The video had discouraged people from overnighting the paperwork and payment, so I sent everything via good old regular mail.

"How long do you think it'll take, Amy?" Mary asked me. I was standing behind the closed door of her office once again that morning after having placed the envelope in the mailbox.

"I don't really know," I replied. "I'm sure they'll be bombarded and it might take, oh, maybe six weeks?" We grinned at each other almost like conspirators. After I had waited over 44 years, six more weeks seemed like nothing.

Is your student's backpack too heavy?

- Lastly, always bend at the knees to pick up a heavy backpack and use both hands.

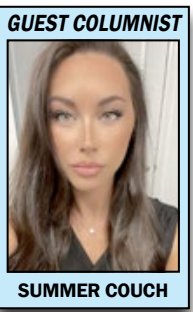

Rep. Spartz: Anti-police rhetoric must stop

We have to support our police officers on the frontlines daily

Amidst an ever-changing news cycle, I remain extremely concerned about rising anti-police sentiment across our country.

Baseless claims of institutionalized police violence, oppression and incompetence avoid a simple and undeniable truth – strong and well-funded police departments make our communities safer. An Obama Administration report confirmed this, concluding that a 10 percent increase in the size of a police force leads to as much as a 10 percent reduction in crime. The bipartisan takeaway is clear – the most important way we can increase public safety is by increasing support for our police, men and women who serve on the frontlines every day to protect us.

An alarming consequence of the anti-police narrative in our country is that it is now more dangerous than ever to serve as a police officer. The num-

bers confirm this – in 2021 there were 73 officers murdered nationwide in the line of duty, and as of Aug. 18, 2022, 42 officers have been tragically killed this year. Historic numbers pale in comparison to what we are seeing today.

One of these tragedies occurred in my district in July, when Elwood Police Officer Noah Shahnnavaz was murdered while conducting a routine traffic stop. Noah dedicated his life to serving and protecting his country and community, spending five years in the military before joining the Elwood Police Department last year.

I recently had the privilege to meet with Noah's incredible parents and learn about their son. His father, Matthew, shared a story with me that truly reflects

Noah's character. Matthew, like many parents, did not understand Noah's "gaming" habit, encouraging him to spend his time more wisely. After Noah's tragic and untimely death, an unknown friend from Canada came through the visitation line, sobbing. Noah had befriended him online, talked him through a difficult time, and prevented him from taking his life. Noah's parents were stunned – they had no idea Noah had saved someone's life while online. It turns out, he had helped multiple people with their mental health struggles in this way.

We must remember that it is individuals like Noah who are placed in danger when anti-police attitudes are peddled by those in power, and we must continue to back our police departments for the support they provide and the safety they uphold. A strong, well-funded police department is the backbone

Caddyshack: the "Citizen Cane of Golf Movies," says former Butler University golf team MVP

"Revolting!"
"Repulsive!"
"Raunchy!"

That was my mom speaking when I asked her if she remembered seeing *Caddyshack* when it came out in 1980.

Suddenly, I remembered her same three-R-worded review about this same R-rated movie in the same kitchen 42 years ago when she and dad returned home way too early from the movie's showing, having walked out way before the ending.

It marked the first time I ever recommended a "grownup" movie to my par-

ents. What the hell was I thinking? They had no idea who Bill Murray and Chevy Chase were, but they always laughed at Ted "Ted Baxter" Knight on *The Mary Tyler Moore Show* so I thought they might enjoy seeing Knight in his scene-chewing role on the big screen, which is how God meant movies to be seen.

OK, at 15, I goofed on this golf movie recommendation.

Ted Knight was OK for my parents, but Rodney Dangerfield and Bill Murray did them in.

Dad was disturbed by Dangerfield's "popcorn fart" gag during the classy dinner scene. ("Whoa, did somebody step on a duck?") It was the Baby Ruth candy bar scene that made mom snap – still the movie's most memorable scene for me, a wonderful parody of "Jaws," with the chocolate candy bar floating in the club's pool playing the shark, sending bathers into a splashy panic, ending of course with Bill Murray taking a bite from what everyone else assumed was a turd.

"Revolting!"
"Repulsive!"
"Raunchy!"
Hearing mom say those words in 1980 substantiated what I already knew: *Caddyshack* was a summer classic!

My golf professional friend Troy Newport, General Manager at Cog Hill Golf & Country Club (and two-time Butler University golf team MVP), is still nuts about the movie. For golf guys like Troy, *Caddyshack* was (pardon the pun) a stroke of comedic sports movie genius.

"It is easily the most quote-worthy movie for any golfer ever!" says Troy. "Even though it was released in 1980, it is the quintessential '70's golf experience with the clothes, the music, the stereotypes. And the dialogue still holds up amazingly well. I saw it with my buddies in Logansport, Ind., and hid the R rating from our parents because I don't think we were 17 yet."

Ask Troy about his favorite scene and you might as well just watch the whole movie: "Ted Knight wiping everything off the desk because his lamp is in the way. Bill Murray hitting the flowers with a weed whip. I used one of those things a lot when I was young. Rodney Dangerfield coming into the Pro Shop with Wang. I've seen a lot of those type of customers in my day! Mrs. Smalls asking Danny to 'loofah' her stretch marks. Ty Webb on the practice green – Mitch Comstein! Pool or the pond. Caddy Day at the pool. Right in the lumberyard. Too many to mention!"

Webb. He was cool, the girls liked him, and he was mysteriously weird too. I loved that he delivered his zingers in a nice way. But I related to Danny Noonan the most, of course. I was a young hot-shot golfer at my course and was pretty naïve about how things really worked. Danny was oblivious to all the politics and class issues, just like me!"

Troy has even gone so far as to dress like several of the characters – Judge Smalls, Bill Murray and Danny Noonan – at various events, including a Halloween party that I attended long ago.

"Conservatively, I have seen the movie at least 50 times. Whenever it's on cable, I try to convince anyone in the room to enjoy it with me. Now that I'm older, I particularly enjoy the Rodney Dangerfield and Ted Knight parts! They were both comedic geniuses in that movie," he says. "Perfect casting and great writing. It is so good that all attempts to top it with another golf movie have fallen flat! I love irreverent movies and this one is one of the most politically incorrect ever without being overly gross or mean."

"Look how many people were caught at their peak in this movie! Harold Ramis, Rodney Dangerfield, Chevy Chase, Bill Murray, Ted Knight, Brian Doyle Murray. It has the only movie

History of the Supreme Court

The Indiana Supreme Court was established by the Constitution of the State of Indiana by Convention at Corydon on June 29, 1816.

The first session of the General Assembly, under the state government commenced in Corydon, on the first Monday in November 1816. In conformity to the provisions of the Constitution the act organizing the Supreme Court was approved on December 23, 1816. The first justices were James Scott, John Johnson and Jesse L. Holman with their commissions bearing the date of December 28, 1816. The first term of the Supreme Court in Indiana began May 5, 1817, and the justices appeared, took their seats and heard the case of *M'Dowell v. David* which had originated in the general court of the late Indiana territory. Legislation transferred the case to the Supreme Court in their first session. The Supreme Court ordered the papers and the suit be transmitted to the Circuit Court of Warrick County in which the cause of action had accrued. Ind. Stat. 1816, P. 13(1).

In the December term of 1817, it was noted that while the court was on vacation, the Honorable John Johnson had died at his residence in Knox County – a universally esteemed honest man and an independent, intelligent Judge. During that time Isaac Blackford was appointed one of the justices of the court.

In *Carty v. Rhea* found at 1 Blackford 54 the Court held:

"Copeland under his seal made the following writing: 'received of William Ray a certain note, eight pounds, on Moses Ray, which I promise to pay, or deliver said note on or before the 3rd day of April 1814.' William Ray assigned the writing to Thomas Clark and Thomas Clark assigned it to the Plaintiff who, being unable to find Copeland commenced an action of assumpsit against Ray on his assignment." The court noted "this is not a paper that would come under the usage of merchants in England, from the manner in which it was drawn, being in the alternative to pay money or deliver a note. But, if it

would have been subject to the usage of merchants in England as a promissory note, it would not be so in this State."

A later case was *Lambert and Another v. Blackman*. The justices noted that it was a case upon a promissory note. They went on to say "the note was in the French language, but was declared on as if it was in English. The variance, at trial was held immaterial. The damages were laid in the Declaration at three hundred dollars (\$300.00). The jury gave a verdict for three hundred twenty-two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$322.28) in damages; for which sum, together with costs, judgment was entered during the term." The court went on to say that one error complained of was that the note, being in the French language, should have been set forth in that language in the declaration rather than in English. The court held that, stating a note in French and the complaint in English was not error.

Most of the original cases were about the collection of money. *Piatt v. Eads* presented the issue of whether the Law of the Merchant was part of the Common Law of England and, if so, whether inland bills of exchange are governed by that law and whether the Law of Merchant of England is enforced in Indiana. The court went on to say "the whole current of authorities, from the commencement of the history of our system of jurisprudence down to the present day, goes to establish the doctrine that the Custom of Merchants is and always has been regarded as part of the Common Law of England."

These early cases deciding disputes by referring to the Law of England or whether French documents could be translated as opposed to being set forth in French show early Indiana trying to establish its common law and case history on which lawyers now routinely rely on resolving disputes.

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE, HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA

Midland Pointe

Super-Voluntary Annexation

WHEREAS, the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana received a petition requesting that certain territory generally located adjacent to the southeast intersection of State Road No. 32 (Westfield Road) and Hazel Dell Road, as herein after described (Annexation Territory”), be annexed by Noblesville; and

WHEREAS, the petition has been signed by the sole owner (i.e. 100%) of the property within the Annexation Territory; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana Code §36-4-3-5.1 (e), on or around August 9, 2022, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing regarding the Annexation Territory;

WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana Code §36-4-3-1.5, the Common Council has determined that the Annexation Territory is contiguous at least by one-eighth (1/8) of the aggregate external boundaries of the Annexation Territory and coincides with the boundaries of the City.

WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a non-capital nature (including police protection, fire protection, street and road maintenance and other non-capital services normally provided within the corporate boundaries of the City) to the Annexation Territory within one (1) year after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those non-capital services provided to areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography, patterns of land use, and population density; and

WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a capital nature (including but not limited to street construction, sewer facilities, and storm water drainage facilities) to the Annexation Territory within three (3) years after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those capital services provided to areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography, patterns of land use, and population density; and in a manner consistent with federal, state and local laws, procedures, and planning criteria; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council now desires to annex the Annexation Territory generally known as “Midland Pointe”.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana as follows:

Section 1. Contiguity. The petition requesting voluntary annexation for the Annexation Territory, further described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein and graphically depicted in Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

Section 2. Annexation Territory. The real estate containing approximately 34 acres, more or less legally described in Exhibit A, and graphically depicted in Exhibit B, both attached thereto and incorporated herein, and generally known as Midland Pointe, is hereby annexed to and declared to be a part of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana including all rights-of-way adjacent to this property as required by law.

Section 3. Council District. The above described real estate is hereby assigned to City Council District 2 and shall become a part thereof immediately upon the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 4. All prior Ordinances or parts thereof that may be inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby superseded. The paragraphs, sentences, words, and Annexation Territory of this Ordinance are separable, and if a court of competent jurisdiction thereof declares any portion of this Ordinance or the Annexation Territory unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the remaining portions of the Annexation Territory or this Ordinance.

Section 5. The effective date of this annexation shall be as soon as allowed by law following its adoption, execution, and publication as required by law.

Upon a motion duly made a seconded, the Ordinance was fully passed by the Members of the Common Council this 23rd day of August, 2022.

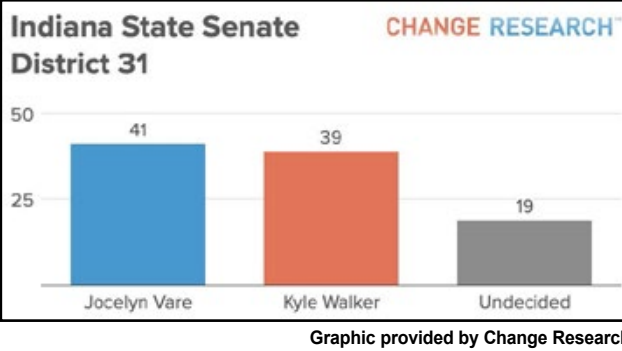
OVERALL LEGAL DESCRIPTION

Part of the Northwest quarter of Section 3, Township 18 North, Range 4 East of the Second Principal Meridian, Hamilton County, Indiana, the following description was based on surveys prepared by Timothy D. Higbie, L.S as Survey First LLC project numbers 2021-0022 and 2022-0006, is described as follows:

Commencing at a brass pin in concrete at the Northwest corner of said Northwest quarter; thence along the West line of said quarter (bearings are based on the State Plane Coordinates, Indiana East Zone, on the NAD83, using GPS derived North from NTRIP CORS network) South 00 degrees 02 minutes 09 seconds East 430.67 feet; thence South 89 degrees 31 minutes 33 seconds East 45.62 feet to the East right-of-way of Hazel Dell Drive per Instrument number 200300090653 and Instrument number 200400005003 recorded in the Office of the Hamilton County Recorder, and a rebar with yellow cap stamped “HIGBIE 20100067” set flush (hereafter “rebar with cap set”) at the POINT OF BEGINNING; the following three (3) courses are along the East and South lines of said right-of-way; 1)thence North 01 degree 44 minutes 15 seconds East 310.83 feet (a concrete right-of-way marker found 0.40 feet North and 0.2’ East of the corner); 2) thence North 33 degrees 02 minutes 35 seconds East 72.39 feet (a concrete right-of-way marker found 0.06 feet South and 0.20 feet East of the corner); 3) thence North 89 degrees 31 minutes 21 seconds East 97.25 feet (a concrete right-of-way marker found 0.03 feet South and 0.40 feet West of the corner); thence North 89 degrees 26 minutes 58 seconds East 264.69 feet along the South line and the Westerly extension of the South line of the right-of-way parcel per Instrument number 200100002817 in said Recorder’s Office to the Southeast corner thereof (a concrete right-of-way marker was found 0.3 feet South and 0.4 feet West of corner); thence North 00 degrees 34 minutes 33 seconds West 9.06 feet along the East line of said right-of-way to a rebar found with cap stamped “Structurepoint #0094” (hereafter “Structurepoint rebar”) on the South right-of-way line of State Road 32 as described in Deed Record 143, page 70, Deed Record 141, page 435, and Deed Record 141, page 250 in said Recorder’s Office; thence North 89 degrees 26 minutes 10 seconds East 883.87 feet along said South right-of-way line to a Structurepoint rebar found on the East line of a parcel conveyed to Herbert E. and Betty Lou W. Boone in Instrument number 200000061947 in said Recorder’s Office; thence North 00 degrees 02 minutes 22 seconds West 52.11 feet to the North line of said quarter section; thence along said North line North 89 degrees 25 minutes 18 seconds East 160.60 feet to the Northeast corner of the land of Gary Alton Hinshaw Trustees Deed per deed recorded in said Recorder’s Office as Instrument number 2012023283, said point is referenced as 1171.47 feet from the Northeast corner of said Northwest quarter; thence along the East line of said Hinshaw, South 00 degrees 02 minutes 23 seconds East 1091.05 feet to the North line of a parcel conveyed to the City of Noblesville in Instrument number 2017043039 in said Recorder’s Office, a rebar was found 1.2’ West and 3.5’ North; thence along the North line of said City of Noblesville, South 87 degrees 58 minutes 18 seconds West 73.14 feet; thence along said North line North 89 degrees 43 minutes 39 seconds West 87.51 feet to the Northeast corner of a parcel conveyed to the City of Noblesville in Instrument number 2016004263 in said Recorder’s Office (a one-inch diameter iron pipe was found 1.4 feet West and 2.8 feet North); thence North 89 degrees 43 minutes 42 seconds West 812.16 feet along the North lines of the parcels conveyed to the City of Noblesville in Instrument numbers 2016004263 and 2016009905 in said Recorder’s Office to a rebar with cap set at the Northeast corner of a parcel to the City of Noblesville in Instrument number 2017042702 in said Recorder’s Office; thence North 89 degrees 43 minutes 39 seconds West 456.49 feet to a rebar with cap set on said East right-of-way of Hazel Dell Road by said Instrument number 200400005003; the following three (3) courses are along said right-of-way; 1) thence North 01 degrees 58 minutes 45 seconds West 473.28 feet to a concrete right-of-way marker found 0.20 feet East of the corner; 2) thence North 04 degrees 24 minutes 11 seconds West 143.80 feet to a concrete right-of-way marker found 0.2 feet North and 0.4 feet East of the corner; 3) thence North 01 degrees 44 minutes 14 seconds East 24.63 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING, containing 34.272 acres more or less and subject to any easements and rights of way of record.

Includes all rights-of-way adjacent to the legal description that are required by law to be a part of the annexation.

Poll: Vare & Walker in dead heat for State Senate District 31 seat

The race for who will be the next State Senator representing District 31 is closer than one might think, according to poll released this month conducted by Change Research (change-research.com).

The district includes all of Fishers, parts of Noblesville, and portions of Indianapolis’ northeast side. Republican Kyle Walker currently holds the seat.

The poll of 552 likely voters within the district shows that Walker is statistically tied with his Democratic challenger Jocelyn Vare, who currently serves on the Fishers City Council. Vare currently enjoys support 41 percent of voters while Walker has 39 percent. Undecided voters make up 19 percent of those polled. The margin of error is 4.7 percent.

What will make the race interesting is the fact that neither candidate is well-known within the

district; 58 percent of the poll’s respondents say they’ve never heard of either candidate. However, Vare’s net favorability among those who do have an opinion is 7 points up, which leaves Walker at a 7-point favorability deficit.

The results of the poll also show that Vare is outperforming President Biden’s 2020 numbers within a district that voted for President Trump.
