# Hamilton County Council discussing 2023 budget

## Salaries & highway projects top list of new expenditures

Hamilton County Council members, the financial stewards of county government, began budget hearings at the Judicial Center on Tuesday, Sept. 6. They are working to set a budget of just under \$100 million for the 2023 fiscal year.

"It's a big budget. It's a big operation," Council President Steve Schwartz said. "Our biggest expenses are salaries

and benefits for the 800-plus county employees as well as highway improvement projects."

The Council will also be presented with budget requests from every department in the

# Sunbeams of hope

"Come with me into the field of sunflowers; they are far more wonderful than any words about them."

American poet, Mary Oliver, so eloquently describes the golden sunbeams that extend toward the sky, leaving the shadows behind them. Sunflowers are utterly striking both en masse and on their own. Many only think of the brilliant, well-known golden faces of sunflowers, but with a wide range of varieties, they come in many other colors besides yellow. Sunflowers not only add beauty to our gardens, but pollinators also love them, making the joyful flower a wonderful addition to backyard habitats looking to promote pollination.

Sunflowers are heliotropic, meaning their flowers follow the daily movement of the sun. Sunflowers provide a long bloom time throughout the summer and are tolerant of heat and resistant to many pests, making them a practical and gorgeous addition to any garden.

These majestic flowers are fast growing, typically reaching maturity in 80 to 95 days. Sunflowers are annuals; they do not come back the following season. However, their seeds may be harvested from the spent blooms and replanted for years to come or enjoyed as a delicious snack by both you and birds.

Many start sunflowers from seed, but you can also purchase starter plants. They do best when planted after the last frost of the season. Some varieties can grow 14 to 16 feet tall, so it is best to plant them in the back of a garden. Given their tall stature, they can provide shade in a garden, so be mindful of what you plant around the sunflowers in your garden, particularly the plants surrounding them that require full sun as their tall stalks may shade other plants in your garden.

# Father & son killed in crash Saturday east of Noblesville

At approximately 12:48 a.m. on Saturday, a Hamilton County Sheriff's Deputy, after observing heavy black smoke in the area, found the scene of a single car crash on State Road 32 east of Deshane Avenue. A dark-colored Chevy Camaro was located on the creek bed where SR 32 crosses Stony Creek. The bridge is currently being replaced by INDOT and was removed earlier in the year.

The Chevy was completely engulfed in flames and heavily damaged. Once the fire was put out by Wayne Township VFD and Noblesville FD, the bodies of an adult male and an unknown child were found inside.

Preliminary investigation shows the vehicle was traveling westbound on State Road 32, and multiple road closure signs were posted. The vehicle continued westbound past those signs and struck a sign stating "Road Closed" that was in the lane of travel. The vehicle continued to where the bridge had been removed and became airborne. The vehicle would have been traveling at a high rate of speed as it crossed the creek and struck the abutment on the other side.

After a tireless investigation, the driver has been identified as Christopher A. Edwards, 28. He likely lived in Tennessee and is originally from Anderson, Ind. Also in the car was his 4-year-old son. Next of kin has been notified by the Red Cross.

This crash is under investigation by the Hamilton County Crash Investigation Team.

*Football in S. H. S.*

Sheridan has long been known as a “football town.” As Heze Clark once wrote, “They give babies footballs there, instead of rattles.” From the time a boy is big enough to walk, it is drilled into him that he must make the high school football team.

Football has been played in Sheridan high school since 1900, the 1925 season being the twenty-fifth. Since 1905, when football began to be played more generally throughout the state, Sheridan has had nine teams with a clear claim to the state title and they always have had a team among the first ten of the state. Also, the time has never been known when Sheridan failed to get a man somewhere on the mythical all-state high school eleven.

In the twenty-five years of football, Sheridan has turned out many future college and independent stars, more perhaps, than any other town in the state and they have gained quite a reputation for so doing. Through the efforts of some of these old stars and others not so famous, a High School Athletic Association has been formed, and in operation for the last two years. The purpose of this organization is to foster high school athletics, especially football. In doing so, in the past two years, they have, among other things, instituted an annual high school homecoming.

The first of these was held in 1923 and was the first of its kind in the state. The occasion is always a good football game and old “grads” come from far and near to renew their high school friendships. There are always other forms of entertainment for the affair, which lasts the greater part of two days. This is certainly a big thing for the school and town in general and the association should be praised for their excellent work.

# Heights' own Doug Ozolins continues serving on ISBA legislative committee

Doug Ozolins, Hamilton Heights school board member, has been appointed to the Legislative Committee of the Indiana School Boards Association (ISBA) to help direct the development of the Association's advocacy agenda for 2023.

state legislators from this year's activity are as follows:

### State Budget & Tuition Support – Increase Teacher Pay & Retention

An annual increase in Tuition Support at a percentage matching or surpassing the rate of inflation. The Indiana General Assembly is asked to continue its recent significant effort (during the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 biennia) to boost state tuition support to help fund increases in teacher compensation and classroom operational expenses.

### Indiana Secured Schools Safety Grant – School Safety

ISBA supports a significant appropriation increase from \$19 million to \$30 million annually for this grant program. This increase will offset funding shortfalls of unfunded requests in the 2022 grant award cycle. Ensuring safe, secure, and supportive classroom learning environments have escalated in urgency and priority given the rash of tragic school shootings across the nation.

### Stop Arm Violation Fine & Penalty Enforcement – Bus Safety

Enhanced efforts are needed to enforce school bus stop arm violation penalties and fines to better protect students in school bus zones. Legislation introduced in the 2021 and 2022 sessions proposed that a registered owner of a motor vehicle commits

an infraction if the owner's vehicle is used to violate the school bus stop arm law. Passage of this legislation would lessen the burden of proof to identify the driver of the vehicle.

\*\*\*

The final recommendations will be presented to the ISBA Delegate Assembly for formal approval at

the annual ISBA-IAPSS Fall Conference, which is scheduled for Oct. 3 and 4 at the Indiana Convention Center.

ISBA's Legislative Committee is comprised of two school board members from each of ISBA's 10 geographic regions.

"There will be much at stake for Hoosier children

in the 2023 budget session," ISBA Executive Director Terry Spradlin said. "We all need to be ready to be strong champions for K-12 public education. The school board members on our Legislative Committee play a vital role in helping shape sound education policy. We thank them for bringing forward so many excellent ideas for change,

and we appreciate their dedicated public service."

## Hamilton County Bicentennial seeks volunteer hosts for 2023 traveling exhibit

The Hamilton County Bicentennial Commission, the governing body of the Bicentennial Celebration, is seeking exhibit hosts for its upcoming traveling exhibit in 2023. Becoming a host is free and allows local businesses and organizations to connect to Hamilton County's 200th anniversary.

Businesses, nonprofits, schools, libraries, retirement communities, and any organization with an indoor space capable of housing the exhibit for one week are eligible to host.

Funded by the Hamilton County Community Foundation, the traveling exhibit will include two 8-by-8-foot, one-sided, free-standing panels with educational and historical information about Hamilton County's history. A team of local historians will produce the exhibit content, and a local graphic designer will design it.

The exhibit will encompass all five themes of the 2023 Bicentennial: Art, Diversity/Inclusion, Education, Historic Preservation, and Parks/Environment. The historical content based on these themes will educate the public about history topics that even long-time citizens might not be aware of.

The exhibit will have an opening reception in

February 2023 (date to be determined) and will run from March through the end of October. Each host will receive the exhibit for one week, Saturday to Saturday; pickup and drop-off are to be arranged with the host.

Potential hosts are encouraged to [view and sign up online](#) for an exhibition date. Exhibition dates are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. The deadline for sign-up is Oct. 1, 2022.

The Bicentennial aims to create valuable, context-driven conversations about Hamilton County history through this exhibit. The support provided by the Hamilton County Community Foundation, as well as lead sponsor Duke Energy, allows the Bicentennial to bring this project to the public.

# IU Health will continue abortion services within confines of law

Officials with Indiana’s largest health care system on Thursday indicated they will use every loophole in the new abortion law they can find. Beginning Sept. 15, abortion will be banned in Indiana. The only exceptions will be for rape, incest, to save the mother’s life, health or in the case of fatal fetal anomalies. The rape and incest exception runs out 10 weeks into pregnancy, while the medical exceptions are only good for the first 20 weeks of pregnancy or when the fetus attains viability, whichever happens first. Hospitals and ambulatory surgical centers will be the only facilities allowed to perform abortions. IU Health Chief Medical Executive Dr. David Ingram said that the health system officials began investigating how to navigate the new law as soon as Gov. Eric Holcomb signed it on Aug. 5. Besides the legal implications, Ingram said the law has numerous practical effects. For example about 10 percent of pregnancies require specialized care such as a neonatal intensive care unit. Ingram said IU Health’s NICU system is al-

ready at 90 percent capacity, so doctors have had to work out ways to deal with the pressure from an increased number of pregnancies. Then there are the staffing effects. Ingram said that according to a survey, IU medical school residents showed 85 percent of them are taking the passage of the abortion law into account as they decide whether to remain in Indiana after they complete their residency. There also have been cases where out-of-state recruits have withdrawn their applications due to the new law. Ingram said no current IU Health employees have quit due to the new law so far but the human resources department will specifically ask about this during future exit interviews. Ingram said IU Health will have support teams available around the clock to help doctors determine whether they would run afoul of the new abortion law for any particular patient’s case. Each team consists of a clinician, a lawyer and a medical ethics expert. “We’re prepared and we feel that this process has served us well,” Ingram said. “The highest priority for us is to provide services to our pa-

tients, to preserve the bounds of the patient physician relationship within the bounds of this new law.” Dr. Caroline Rouse, medical director of maternity services at IU Riley Hospital for Children, said IU Health will continue to provide abortion services to the extent the new law allows. She said doctors will not turn patients away and will provide referrals for services it cannot provide, though it will not provide transportation to other states with more permissive abortion laws. “Providing information to patients is permitted in order to obtain legal abortion services,” Rouse said. “And so we have that information available to give to patients who are seeking those services who do not meet the exception criteria set forth in Senate Bill 1.” The ACLU on Tuesday sued on behalf of Planned Parenthood in an effort to block the law from going into effect. Ingram said IU Health will continue its preparations on the assumption the law become effective as scheduled. If the courts do block the law, IU Health will continue to provide abortion services in accordance with Indiana’s current law.



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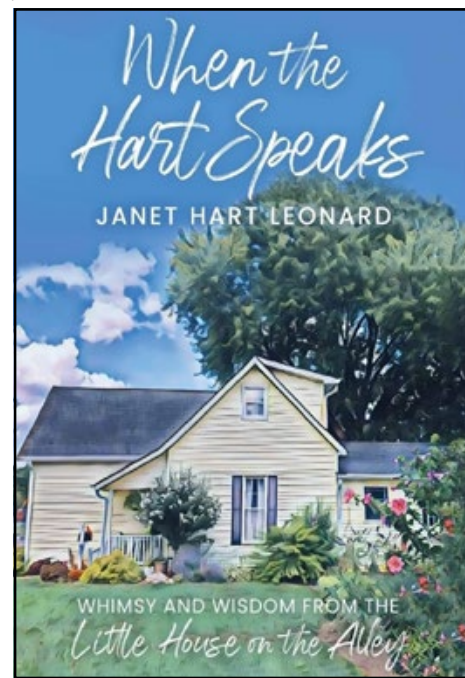
