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Carmel mayor announces he will not seek eighth term in office

#### **By DENISE MOE** For The Reporter

"Thank you, Carmel, for one of the greatest honors of my life - the opportunity of a lifetime."

Those were the sentiments of long-time Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard.

Brainard announced that he will not seek re-election at a press conference held at 2 p.m. Tuesday outside Carmel City Hall.

The seven-term Republican mayor took office in 1996. A municipal election for mayor and all nine seats on the Carmel City Council will be held in 2023. The mayor humbly and gratefully thanked all the citizens of Carmel, all city employees and all other elected officials for helping to make Carmel the premier destination city that it is today.

During Brainard's time as mayor, the city's population has quadrupled. Carmel is considered one of the fastest growing cities in the United States (and the fastest growing in Indiana). Mayor Brainard is known for his efforts to revitalize central Carmel through the creation of the Arts & Design District, City Center and Midtown areas, the Center for the Performing Arts,

# Sheridan's solar-powered schools about more than saving money

Solar panels are becoming more prevalent as a source of energy, and many schools are embracing the model as a cost-saving strategy, as well as a way to model stewardship for students.

A little over four and a half years ago, Sheridan Community Schools was one of the first schools in the state to begin the move to solar power. As the district nears the five-year anniversary of the implementation of the project, Superintendent Dave Mundy reflects positively of the decision.

Over the past several years the cost of energy has gone up at a fairly significant rate. Mundy explained that due to the decision to go to solar power, Sheridan has not seen any of these increases as they are locked into a consistent rate and will have this rate until



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



#### AG Todd Rokita wins settlement with company over alleged deceptive emails

After filing a lawsuit over alleged misconduct, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has secured an agreement from a Nevada-based company to cease solicitations to Indiana public employees.

Rokita alleged that PERA LLC sent more than 70,000 deceptive email solicitations to Indiana public employees giving the misleading impression that the communications came from the Indiana Public Retirement System (INPRS) or an penalty to the State of Indi- Public Retirement System. approved INPRS provider. PERA is an acronym for

employee's personal retirement fund. Whenever a public employee agreed to the consultation, PERA then sold the appointment to a seller of various prodfinancial ucts

Neither INPRS nor any approved INPRS provider had anything to do with the emails.

"Indiana's Deceptive Consumer Sales Act protects Hoosiers from the very kind of misconduct that we have alleged in this case," Rokita said. "Hoosiers should be able to trust that companies are providing accurate information in an aboveboard. honest, legal and straightforward manner."

Under the agreement, PERA admits to no wrongdoing – but it relinquishes its ability for seven years to solicit, sell or coordinate appointments, discussions, or other similar communications to public employees on behalf of, or in connection with, third-party financial representatives in the State of Indiana.

In the emails sent to public employees, PERA offered to provide consultations with financial representatives to discuss each

The Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation last Thursday honored Corporal Humberto Sanchez who was killed in a bombing attack at the Kabul airport in Afghanistan in 2021.

Kevin Rankel, a member of the Marine Corp, said the event was on track to raise \$100,000 in scholarship money for children of Marines.

Last Wednesday night, an organizer for the golf outing told News 8 the group raised \$150,000 for the Marine Corp Scholarship fund.

Rankel told News 8 he approached the Sanchez family because he has a similar story to them.

"In 2011, the first year this initiative started, the honoree was my son. He was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2010," Rankel said. "We liked what we saw, and we continued 11:30 a.m. last Thursday.

Since 2007, Tyler Mensch, another Marine Corp member, said he's helped organize events honoring fallen Marines.

Sanchez, originally from Logansport, was the first in his family to be born in the United States and serve in the U.S. military.

Macabre musical comedy creeps back onto stage this October

This fall, Beef & Boards Dinner Theatre welcomes back a production that is creepy, kooky, mysterious, spooky and altogether ooky: The Addams Family. This Tony Award nominated and tables and chairs will be macabre musical comedy opens Oct. 6.

Few things frighten the eerie Addams clan. But Gomez Addams faces a nightmare when his daughter, Wednesday, falls in love. What's worse, she loves a boy Gomez has never met - who is from a respectable family. To complicate matters even more, Wednesday pleads with him not to tell her mother, Morticia, and Gomez must do something he's never dared - keep a secret from his wife.

Everything changes forever for the famously frightening family when they are put to the test hosting a dinner for the "normal" boyfriend Lucas and his parents.

Based on the cartoon characters created by Charles Addams that later inspired a television series in the 1960s and several films, The Addams Family opened on Broadway in 2010. The Beef & Boards production stars Eddie Curry, who reprises his role from B&B's 2015 production as Gomez
