The Reporter spoke with Director Nancy Lafferty about the play itself and about her lifetime of experience with the main

"Mrs. Savage is a little bit of a free spirit, and she decides she wants to take her husband's money and, instead of using it for herself and for her stepchildren, who are all adults, she wants to make a memorial fund to help people who are pursuing their dreams. Those people would be labeled foolish by many standards, but to Mrs. Savage they are deserving of her money."

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# Honoring Mona Stevens, Noblesville's 'Flower Lady'

For over three decades Mona Stevens was the silent force behind downtown Noblesville's potted flowers and Forest Park flowerbeds. During the spring, summer and fall, she was a familiar sight to people on the square and folks who frequented Forest Park. Stevens became known around town affectionately as 'the flower lady.'

Stevens lovingly designed and cared for the Forest Park and downtown flowers during her 31-year tenure with the City of Noblesville Parks & Recreation Department. She passed away in December of 2021.

"Mona's impact on our park system and on our downtown cannot be overstated," Noblesville Parks & Recreation Director Brandon Bennett said. "Mona was passionate about her flowers. That passion and work ethic is what endeared her to so many."

On Sept. 23, Noblesville Parks and Keep Noblesville Beautiful

volunteers honored Stevens' legacy by planting a memorial garden on the southeast end of Forest Park. The garden, designed by city parks department employee Bruce Neal, includes Steven's favorite flowers: varieties of cone-flowers, coral bells, daisies and viburnum. Neal said his choice of location was strategic.

"Mona's memorial garden and bench offer a perfect view of the gardens she created and tended

to, as well as an expansive view of the park she loved," Neal said. "I like to think that with this central placement, she's still keeping an eye on all her plants."

The Noblesville Parks Department's idea of a memorial garden was made possible through a donation from Keep Noblesville Beautiful, and through the volunteer efforts of Peterson Architecture, Martin & Martin Insurance Agency and Duke Energy.

# Westfield Fire sends two chiefs to Florida

Westfield Fire Department Chief Rob Gaylor and Division Chief of Training Charles Johnson, both members of Indiana Task Force 1, were deployed last Tuesday in advance of Hurricane Ian. Forty-five team members and six support personnel were activated as the hurricane advances toward the Tampa, Fla. area.

Chief Gaylor serves as a water rescue specialist with Indiana Task Force 1, and Chief Johnson is a Hazardous Materials Technician.

Gaylor was on the scene of the Surfside condominium collapse in Miami in June of 2021.

"I'm extremely proud of all our

public safety personnel and those that serve with Indiana Task Force 1," Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said. "Not only do they serve the citizens of Westfield, they selflessly use their knowledge and training to help all Americans during disasters."

Gaylor was appointed Fire Chief in January 2022. He's been with the department since 2004. Chief Johnson joined Westfield Fire in 2019.

Since 1992, Indiana Task Force 1 has been one of 28 FEMA urban search and rescue teams in the nation capable of deploying anywhere in the continental United States.

# Work to begin on Pleasant Street bridge in two months

Work should begin in about two months on the long-awaited Pleasant Street bridge over the White River. The new span is the vital link in the new Pleasant Street east-west corridor in Noblesville.

Beatty Construction Company won the bid to build Phase I of the three-phased project. Phase I totals \$38.5 million, with the new bridge costing \$15.5 million. Hamilton County will pay for the bridge over the White River as its portion of the joint county-city project, Noblesville will pay for the roadway and trail.

The county is responsible for all major bridges and has the money with its Major Bridge Fund, according to highway director Brad Davis. County commissioners gave their approval in a meeting on Sept. 26.

Noblesville City Engineer Alison Krupski said work should begin in about two months, and by the end of November 2024 traffic will be able to use the new bridge.

In other action, commissioners were told another bridge project will be ready for a January 2023 bid letting. The Bell Ford Bridge is a very different type of project in that it involves re-assembling of a historic covered bridge.

The 143-year-old wooden structure originally

spanned White River in Jackson County. It was taken apart, brought to Hamilton County, and will be reconstructed over Fall Creek just west of Florida Road as part of a park department trail for pedestrians and bikers.

Commissioners also gave approval for clearing several houses previously purchased by the county at the intersection of 146th Street and Allisonville Road. The removal of the structures will allow for construction of a major intersection improvement set to start next year, according to commissioners.

The new interchange will allow 146th Street traffic to pass over Allisonville with a roundabout beneath for access to each roadway. The cost of the improvements will depend on bids to be received in the next few months. Clearing of the needed right-of-way will be underway this fall and winter.

Finally, commissioners Monday received bids for creating two new magistrate courts at the county judicial center. They will be built where the county computer department (ISS) is now located. The ISS will be moved to the basement.

Bids were referred to Building and Grounds Director Steve Wood for review and recommendation at an October meeting.

# Ivy Tech Hamilton County to launch School of Nursing in January 2023

Ivy Tech Community College announced last Thursday it will launch its School of Nursing on the Hamilton County campus in January 2023. The program was approved by the Indiana State Board of Nursing last week. This will be the College’s 19th nursing location.

In Fall 2021, following approval of Ivy Tech Hamilton County’s campus board and Ivy Tech’s State Board of Trustees, the College committed \$1.75 million to the Hamilton County campus to begin construction on a state-of-the-art healthcare lab space that now will also permanently house its CNA and Medical Assisting programs.

"We heard from our community that credentialed nurses were a tremendous need in our area," said Dr. Stacy Atkinson, Chancellor of Ivy Tech Hamilton County. "We are extremely proud to help address the public health crisis by adding more credentialed nurses into the pipeline."

The School will admit 20 students for the upcoming spring semester and 20 students for the following fall semester with increases in seats to come. Additionally, the College’s recent partnership with Community Health Network will provide fully paid scholarships for 15 Ivy

Tech Hamilton County students to assist with tuition, course materials, and clinical resources as part of its Scholars Program. Other healthcare partners, including Indiana University Health, have also supported the School with donations to increase nursing enrollment.

"Thanks to the leadership of Dr. Atkinson and her team, we will educate even more highly-skilled nurses that will meet the workforce demand in the Hamilton County region and the State of Indiana," said Dr. Sue

Ellspermann, President of Ivy Tech.

Earlier this year, the Indiana General Assembly passed HEA 1003 – Nursing Indiana Back to Health, which included provisions that give the College greater ability to expand its nursing programs. By 2025, the College will increase the number of nursing students enrolled by 600. Ivy Tech is the largest Associate Degree in Nursing Program in the nation, annually graduating more than 1,300 nurses (32 percent of all new Registered Nurses in Indiana). Ninety percent of those Ivy Tech graduates work in Indiana.

# Tax rate would drop with Westfield Washington Schools’ renewed referendum

The Westfield Washington school district says it’s looking for support in the November election for an updated operating referendum.

The district’s leaders are proposing to renew their current referendum at a lower tax rate for property taxpayers within the area.

If the referendum is approved by voters, the rate would go from 20 cents to 17 cents, which they say is a 15 percent decrease. The funds would be used to keep the current staff, maintain class sizes, keep teachers’ salaries competitive, and add student programs.

If the referendum fails, the district would lay off staff, programs would be cut, and plans for future programs would be halted.

The election will be Nov. 8. Early voting will begin Oct. 12.

District leaders have already held two community meetings to discuss the referendum. The final meeting will be at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 5 at Westfield Intermediate School, 17710 Shamrock Boulevard.

The district serves over 9,000 students. Its enrollment this school year increased by over 350 kids, and leaders expect that number to increase.

District leaders say its previously approved referendums have shown a continuous trend of lowering taxes by 3 percent.

Superintendent Paul Kaiser said, "We think it’s important to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars and the assets’ evaluation, which is the value of all the property in Westfield is going up and because how taxes are done that allows us to drop the rate and we will still bring in the same amount of money."

The value of taxable property in the Westfield Washington district multiplied by the tax rate equals the amount of money going to the public schools. Kaiser said that as the value of property increases, the district can drop the tax rate and bring in the same amount of money.

Joshua Andrews, the director of communications for Westfield Washington Schools, said as people

move into the area, they can spread that tax impact amongst the higher population of taxpayers. "So, each individual person feels that less while we continue to make the same strides as a school district."

The referendum renewal came a year earlier than expected for the school district’s leaders, who put it on the ballot.

If the referendum passes Nov. 8, it will replace the current operating referendum and last the next eight years.

"If this doesn’t pass this year, we have one more year on our current operating referendum and then we have to either let that fall off and we lose all of the money that we could get, or run another referendum in 366 days," Andrews said. "If it were to fail this year, we would immediately have to start making cuts and changes and reducing programs because we have to plan for the unfortunate event that if it does fail now and again fails in 366 days, that’s \$8 million out the

door."

Kaiser said, "We’ll still bring in the same amount of money to serve our teachers and our kids within the school corporation. The key thing to understand is that we’ve been very good about taking care of money for the school district and, if we don’t win, we’ll have to increase class size from 24 to 30, which will be devastating for our teachers."

The programs and future programs that would be at risk in the referendum doesn’t pass include "science and orchestra, programs for welding, landscape management, fire safety production, that we’d want to start, all of those would be put on the back burner if we lose the referendum," Kaiser said.

The League of Women Voters of Hamilton County will play host to two nonpartisan candidate forums this fall to give voters a chance to hear from candidates in time for the Nov. 8 general election.

Forums will start at 7 p.m. and end by 8:30 p.m. Here’s the schedule:

- **Tuesday, Oct. 4, Carmel City Hall:** candidates for Senate Districts 21 and 29 and House Districts 24, 32 and 39.
- **Thursday, Oct. 6, Noblesville City Hall:** candidates for Senate Districts 25 and 31, House District 88 and Hamilton County Prosecutor. Citizens can attend in person or register in advance on the event calendar at [LWVHCIN.org](http://LWVHCIN.org) to receive the Zoom link.

“It’s important for voters to interact with candidates before they cast a ballot,” said Lisa Dick, LWVHC president. “I used to be one of those people who walked into the voting booth and sometimes felt like I was guessing after I got past the federal and state races. I started attending the forums when I joined the league, which gave me a better sense of who the candidates are beyond their name and party.”

She said all candidates in contested races for Indiana Senate and House seats and Hamilton County offices have been invited to participate. Candidates who are unable to attend have been offered the opportunity to respond to the questions that will be asked at the live event. Written and/or video responses will be required to meet the same time limits as the live forum events.

The league also traditionally hosts a forum for the 5th Congressional District



candidates, but due to Federal Election Commission regulations, it cannot hold a federal election forum if only one candidate agrees to attend. Dick said the League has been unable to find a date when 5th District Rep. Victoria Spartz could commit to participating.

For residents who cannot attend the forums or those who want to rewatch, recordings will be available afterward at [LWVHCIN.org](http://LWVHCIN.org) and [Vote411.org](http://Vote411.org), the league’s online voter guide.

[Vote411.org](http://Vote411.org) also provides additional information for voters. All candidates on the November ballot have been invited to submit biographical information and answers to race specific survey questions. Voters may enter their street address to receive personalized ballot information.

“When I talk to people about the league’s role in voting, I always tell them that it’s none of my business who you vote for,” Dick said. “But I want every voter to have the resources he or she needs to make an informed decision.”

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# ‘Hounds Homecoming hoopla!

*Carmel first team to hold rival Ben Davis to 14 points this season*

Carmel and Ben Davis had yet another one of their classic football battles last Friday, which was also the Greyhounds’ Homecoming game.

In the end, Carmel made it one to celebrate, as a fourth-quarter score sent the Greyhounds past the Giants 21-14. It was a relatively even game between the two rivals, with both teams finishing around 300 yards of total offense.

“We ran the ball a little better than them, but they threw the ball, a lot more completions than us,” said Carmel coach John Hebert. “But it didn’t feel like there was this big imbalance. There were moments where it just seemed we couldn’t

stop Ben Davis, and then somehow we would.”

The ‘Hounds were leading 14-7 after three quarters, but the Giants scored on a two-yard run just 45 seconds into the fourth. Carmel eventually got the lead back with 4:20 left when Reece Bellin caught a three-yard touchdown reception from Jack Kazmierczak.

That was Kazmierczak’s third touchdown throw of the game, which meant he was responsible for all of the Greyhounds’ scores. With less than a minute to go before halftime, Kazmierczak tossed a 73-yard touchdown pass to Bellin, finally getting Carmel on the board after a near-scoreless first half.

Ben Davis opened the third quarter with its own 73-yard touchdown pass, but Kazmierczak answered that with a 61-yard throw to Nathan Rodgers for another touchdown.

Kazmierczak finished the game 10-of-18 for 204 yards, with Bellin’s six catches totaling 138 yards. Alijah Alfayyad led the rushing with 94 yards.

The Giants were averaging 34.7 points per game coming into Carmel Stadium, and it was the first time this season a team had held Ben Davis to 14 points.

“Our defense was just outstanding,” said Hebert. “We watched all of Ben Davis’ games and their offense was just so prolific. We were able to stop the run.”

Carmel is 5-2 and plays Friday at Warren Central.





Medicare Advantage doctor networks are shockingly cruel

When you purchase a private Medicare plan, your agent will have confirmed that all your doctors and specialists currently accept the plan. Key word: currently.

The government basically locks Medicare members into their plan for a calendar year. Plans can be changed each fall between Oct. 15 and Dec. 7. The first quarter of the new year brings the option to make one change. After March 31 (or earlier if you change in January) you can no longer change plans unless you have a special circumstance. Moving to a new state, going into a nursing home, getting Medicaid – there are many special exceptions. In general, most people must keep the plan they have on Jan. 1 of each year. This is called “lock in.”

What comes as a shock is that the plan your agent

carefully vetted to ensure all your doctors and hospitals were in the network – those networks are not locked in along with you. Those network contracts can change during the year.

This famously disrupted Fort Wayne a few years ago. One of the largest insurance companies couldn’t reach an agreement with Parkview, the largest hospital system in the city. The hospital sent out letters to alarm members that they would soon have to pay higher out-of-network costs if the negotiation didn’t resolve. Parkview took out full-page ads in the newspaper. I had many clients send me the ads and share their dismay at the situation. I told them that I see this all the time on a national level. Since I work in all 50 states, I know that the fights between the hospitals and

insurance companies get ugly, but almost always resolve before the deadlines, which is what happened in Fort Wayne. Sometimes it doesn’t resolve and creates an unfortunate mess for the Medicare members.

The takeaway here is that this is something that is legal and could happen to you. Since Medicare members are locked into their plans for a calendar year, while the doctors and hospitals are not locked in for the same calendar year, you could buy a PPO and three months later get notice that your doctor is no longer in network. It doesn’t seem fair.

Before you complain about your insurance agent – we hate this rule more than you do.

Insurance agents are not privy to the expiration of these doctor and hospital contracts. All we can see if who is in the network today. Agents have no way to know which contract is expiring soon. Yet, Medicare

members who get caught in this trap and likely to call 1-800-MEDICARE to complain about being misled by their agent. Even though this is out of the agent’s control, a complaint process against the agent will commence. This system drives us agents crazy.

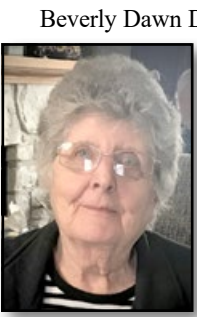
This is an easy fix. The government could require that network contracts coincide with the calendar years and make contract expiration data available to all. Since this will likely not be fixed anytime soon, just be aware and stay flexible.

Private Medicare Advantage plans have a lot of attractive extras, but you must remain flexible. Flexibility may mean changing doctors and hospitals mid-year.

# McEnroe documentary takes him back to court

I’ve been thinking about tennis.

I miss the “ker pock ... ker pock ... ker pock” during the long rallies of my youth, the ball bouncing off the asphalt (“ker”) followed by the quick collision with catgut (“pock”), the squeaks of sneakers and the wonderful poof at the opening of a new can of balls, each connection of tight strings on fresh balls filling the air with bursts of yellow fuzz.

I have been thinking about tennis because I just watched the recent, great Showtime documentary, *McEnroe*. In high school, I wanted to be John McEnroe.

But before then, in 1976, I was given my first tennis racket on my 12th birthday. Mom wrapped the racket so as not to ruin the surprise. My parents must’ve thought I was really stupid, not being able to identify a wrapped tennis racket. I bet tuba-playing kids go through the same thing. “Is it a Big Wheel?” I asked, holding up the wrapped package, just to make Mom and Dad feel good.

I was excited about the tennis racket but was overcome with disappointment when I discovered it wasn’t the metal-framed Jimmy Connors-endorsed T-2000 I wanted. Instead, it was a used, wooden-framed racket with the name Ann Jones written on it. A girl’s racket! I feigned appreciation, taking a few half-hearted strokes in the living room, fearing any second I would begin developing breasts. “At least it’s not a tuba,” I likely mumbled. Luckily, it was late November, too cold for outdoor tennis. By summer, I forgot I even had a racket. That’s one benefit of winter birthdays.

A few years later, though, something life-changing happened. I watched the dramatic 1980 Wimbledon Championship between Bjorn Borg and McEnroe on NBC. Suddenly, I wanted to be McEnroe. I loved his bad-boy antics. I begged my parents for a new tennis racquet. I assured them I would pay them back once I won Wimbledon. They fell for it. They had no idea what Wimbledon even was. With my new racket, a male one this time, tennis became an obsession.

Two or three matches during a single summer day were not unusual. Hand and foot blisters were common. The 90- to 100-degree days of July and August didn’t matter. To stay hydrated, I filled the tennis ball can – they were metal then – with warm water from the nearby fountain, each sip tasting like rust and tennis ball chemicals. It likely stunted my growth. Made my hair fall out. Between matches, I’d get a chili dog at Dairy Queen and resume play without gastrointestinal repercussions. My skin went from lobster red to bronze in just a few days.

I was a scrappy, top-spinning, loudmouthed, human backboard type of

player. I had no backhand. My second serve was so slow it actually went in reverse. My canvas tennis shoes would rip after only a couple of matches, and I would wrap them with Dad’s electrician’s tape.

With no prior lessons, I joined the Tell City High School Marksmen tennis team. Our coach, also new to the sport, sat in his car and sipped a beer while we ran laps. He reminded me of the coach (Walter Matthau) on *The Bad News Bears*. We were The Bad News Marksmen.

I played number three singles my first year.

Inspired by McEnroe’s showmanship, I made a spectacle of myself, grunting and jumping with each stroke, diving for the out-of-reach shots as if the asphalt were Wimbledon grass (a little blood never hurt anyone), rolling, sliding like a clay court specialist (this technique caused me to tear my ACL during a match in my 30s), climbing fences, yelling at myself for my boneheaded blunders, and cussing out the tennis ball for its mutinous spirit when losing a point. I would hold the ball up to my face and exclaim, “There’s one in every can!” My teammates ate it up. They nicknamed me “Gazelle” because of my exaggerated, ballet-like leaps during returns.

Though I was a local bad boy of tennis, Mom never missed a match. She applauded with zeal when opponents double faulted, making her, I guess, “the bad mom of tennis.” An Evansville kid, after hearing her squeal with unsportsman-like delight when he served a ball into the net, asked during changeover, “Who is that \$#%&?” To which I replied, “That \$#%& is my mom.” I hacked him to death in the third set – in Mom’s honor.

Our team never won a title, often thwarted by the dreaded Jasper Wildcats, historically one of the best tennis programs south of Indy. Anytime Jasper was next on our schedule, we’d plead with our coach, “Do we really have to show up?” He’d burp.

I experienced only one memorable match against Jasper. I scrapped my way into a third set. “Hit it to his backhand. Hit it to his backhand,” my opponent’s teammates shouted then. Even their parents shouted, “Hit it to his backhand.” It was such an infectious chant that I swore I heard my own teammates shout it. Yes, every shot my opponent made went to my backhand. I looked at Coach for advice. I read his lips: “I need a beer.” The third set ended quickly. I lost.

In tennis, I was better than some but worse than most. I never made it to Wimbledon. Sorry, Mom and Dad. Still, God love you, Johnny Mac.

I liked the brevity of it and that it didn’t give a lot of information away if someone other than Linda were to read it. But it also would leave no doubt in her mind about who was writing to her. I proofread the letter at least three times.

I finally folded it, stuck it in an envelope, addressed and stamped it, and put it in the mailbox before I could change my mind. My hands were shaking the whole time. Now, once again, I would have to wait and see what happened.

ORDINANCE NO. 54-08-22  
AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE, HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA  
Red Fox Pointe  
Super-Voluntary Annexation

WHEREAS, the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana received a petition requesting that certain territory generally located along the north side of East 191st Street and west of Little Chicago Road, as herein after described (Annexation Territory”), be annexed by Noblesville; and  
WHEREAS, the petition has been signed by the sole owner (i.e. 100%) of the property within the Annexation Territory; and  
WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana Code §36-4-3-5.1 (e), on or around September 13, 2022, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing regarding the Annexation Territory;  
WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana Code §36-4-3-1.5, the Common Council has determined that the Annexation Territory is contiguous at least by one-eighth (1/8) of the aggregate external boundaries of the Annexation Territory and coincides with the boundaries of the City.  
WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a non-capital nature (including police protection, fire protection, street and road maintenance and other non-capital services normally provided within the corporate boundaries of the City) to the Annexation Territory within one (1) year after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those non-capital services provided to areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography, patterns of land use, and population density; and  
WHEREAS, the written fiscal plan and definite policy adopted by resolution provides for the provision of services of a capital nature (including but not limited to street construction, sewer facilities, and storm water drainage facilities) to the Annexation Territory within three (3) years after the effective date of this annexation in a manner equivalent in standard and scope to those capital services provided to areas within the current corporate boundaries, regardless of similar topography, patterns of land use, and population density; and in a manner consistent with federal, state and local laws, procedures, and planning criteria; and  
WHEREAS, the Common Council now desires to annex the Annexation Territory generally known as the Red Fox Pointe Planned Development.  
NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana as follows:  
Section 1. Contiguity. The petition requesting voluntary annexation for the Annexation Territory, further described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein and graphically depicted in Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated herein.  
Section 2. Annexation Territory. The real estate containing approximately 18.4 acres, more or less legally described in Exhibit A, and graphically depicted in Exhibit B, both attached thereto and incorporated herein, and generally known as the Red Fox Pointe Planned Development, is hereby annexed to and declared to be a part of the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.  
Section 3. Council District. The above described real estate is hereby assigned to City Council District 2 and shall become a part thereof immediately upon the effective date of this ordinance.  
Section 4. All prior Ordinances or parts thereof that may be inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby superseded. The paragraphs, sentences, words, and Annexation Territory of this Ordinance are separable, and if a court of competent jurisdiction thereof declares any portion of this Ordinance or the Annexation Territory unconstitutional, invalid, or unenforceable for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the remaining portions of the Annexation Territory or this Ordinance.  
Section 5. The effective date of this annexation shall be as soon as allowed by law following its adoption, execution, and publication as required by law.
