### My first conversation with my birth mother

As my adoption and reunion story continues, I've changed some names, places, and dates.

I had no idea how long it would take a letter to get from Indianapolis to Boston or vice versa. I tried to keep myself busy and distracted with work and our family's ac-



tivities. But when I went to bed at night, I always wondered - would I get a phone call tomorrow? Or a letter? Or an email? Or would I hear nothing at all?

Perhaps my birth mother wanted to leave the past alone. I had to be prepared for and understanding of that potential outcome.

My boys were at their youth group at church on the evening of Wednesday, April 15. I took advantage of the 60 quiet minutes to pick up the house. Just as I finished, I noticed there was a voicemail on my cell phone. I played it back and had to sit down immediately because I started shaking so badly. It was Linda.

Tears began to flow at both ends of the line. I husband John thanked her profusely for getting back to me.

ter," Linda said, "But then I thought after a couple days, 'Aw, screw it, I'm calling her now.' " We both laughed.

I noticed her voice had a higher pitch than mine and was trembling as much as my own that evening. I explained the process that helped me find her. Linda hadn't even known that the State of Ohio was opening up its adoption records. I told her just how grateful I was to know that she was alive and well. Linda shared with me, however, that she had faced some major medical issues in recent years, such as bladder cancer. But she had been four years cancer free at the time of our conversation.

"I'm so glad... Thank God!" I exclaimed.







I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about. But when I was introduced to Prevail of Central Indiana, I was shocked by the number of individuals who are affected by domestic violence. In 2018 alone, Prevail helped more than 4,000 clients in Hamilton County (nearly 80 percent of clients are women and children). Domestic violence and abuse are hard topics to discuss, so you don't often hear about them. Brake said she saw the ball went "near post and I just made the run from front post and then I put my foot out after I saw that it was past one player and I hit it in the goal."


Noblesville was able to hold the lead from there, challenging the goal again a few times, while holding off Southeastern's challenges during the last 10 minutes of the game.

The IHSAA's football post-season draw takes place on Sunday, and teams are starting to measure the time until sectionals in days, not weeks.

But there are still two regular-season games left to play, including tonight's Week 8 games. That includes an all-county contest: Westfield will travel to Fishers for a 7

The Shamrocks hold a 3-2 Hoosier Crossroads Conference record, and an overall mark of 4-3. Westfield got above .500 last Friday when it beat Avon at home, 35-

"We have had an uneven year," said Shamrocks coach Jake Gilbert. "All three phases have showed flashes of playing great but have also struggled at times. We have to get everyone playing great at the same time to win the sectional."

Senior quarterback Cole Ballard is 89of-151 for the season, with 1,205 yards and seven touchdowns to his credit. Sophomore Gabe Aramboles has 24 of those catches, including two for touchdowns.

Sophomore Kendall Garnett remains the leading rusher with 398 yards, including seven scores, while Ballard has 336 vards and eight touchdowns. Senior Tyler Dikos has been dominant on defense with 81 tackles.

"Westfield is a tough opponent," said Fishers coach Curt Funk. "What impresses me the most is how hard they play on every snap. Their kids play with excitement and give full effort. We will need to match their energy on Friday night."

The Tigers also hold an HCC mark of 3-2 and are 5-2 overall. Fishers beat Franklin Central on the road last week 26-15.

"Our team has room for growth," said Funk. "The past two weeks, we have played in two close games." The coach said his team needs to play four quarters of "solid football to have success in the postseason."

"Fishers has found ways to win," said Gilbert. "I respect that for sure."

Senior quarterback Lucas Minns has completed 59 of 106 pass attempts, totaling 882 yards and 10 touchdowns. Seniors Aidan Zimmer and Carson Dunn have 17 and 16 catches respectively; each have victories against Detroit King 44-26, North caught two touchdown throws.

Junior Khobie Martin has 671 vards rushing with eight TDs, followed by Dunn with 429 yards and six touchdowns. Senior 35-14.

Grady Stanley leads the defense with 54 tackles; junior Brady Wolf has made 14.5 tackles for a loss.

"This is a very good football team," said Gilbert. "Great running backs. Excellent corners. Fundamentally sound defense. Pretty good everywhere."
