GOP Fall Dinner was largest in the state so far

The Hamilton County Republican Party Annual Fall Dinner at 502 East Event Center, Carmel on Monday, Oct. 24, was a sold-out event. According to Hamilton County GOP Chair Mario Massillamany, with 550 people in attendance it was the largest party fall dinner in the state this year as of press time.

The event was billed as "An evening with our mayors," and included a Q&A moderated by Massillamany. The evening overall was filled with high energy and positive messaging.

During the Q&A there was some good-natured joking and polite jabs between the mayors. The Reporter tips its hat to both Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen for referring to Ruoff Music Center as "Deer Creek," and

Vote411 offers voter resources

Ahead of the Nov. 8 general elections, the League of Women Voters of Hamilton County offers the nonpartisan election resource Vote411.org. This "one-stop shop" for election information provides access to candidate information, polling place locations and ways to check your registration, among other services.



"Our goal with Vote411.org is to empower all citizens," LVWHC President Lisa Dick said. "The personalized voter guide shows you more than a name on your ballot. It gives you the candidate's position on various issues in their own words."

League members have sought information from all candidates running in the upcoming election. They are contributing this information so that Hamilton County users can see who is running in their areas and learn more about their platforms.

When logging onto Vote411.org, simply enter your address, and all the information on the next page will be tailored to your area. The page includes election dates, links for first-time voters and links to check registrations. Some precincts may have changed due to recent redistricting, so double check your polling locations.

You will see descriptions of the offices, then photos and bios of the candidates who responded to the league's request for info. Dick said each candidate was sent a survey by email or mail, and their responses were entered by their own representatives. The league does not edit candidate responses.

Hamilton County secures \$9M to expand broadband access

Commissioners & Invest Hamilton County committed to extending access

The REPORTER

The Hamilton County Commissioners and Invest Hamilton County have attracted an estimated \$9 million to expand broadband access to nearly 3,600 unserved or underserved homes, businesses, and farms in the county. The funding, which comes from a mix of federal, state, and private sources, will be used to extend high-speed internet ac-

cess, including fiber optic access.

Hamilton County has advanced its broadband expansion initiative through the formation of a Broadband Task Force, a diverse group of stakeholders representing agriculture, education, health, business, economic development, and

local leadership. The group's goal is to identify broadband connectivity issues within the county.

Using mapping information along with analysis from government advisors at Katz, Sapper & Miller, the Commission-

ers, Invest Hamilton County, and the Broadband Task Force have identified areas that are unserved or underserved and will be developing a strategic plan for future investment.

"Commissioners Altman, Dillinger, and I are pleased with the efforts of the county to get broadband to more residents than ever before," Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. "The work done

You'll see your precinct and your Nov. 8 voting location, and lists of each race, candidates' responses and other questions on your ballot. You can read about the requirements of each office and compare candidates' statements with a handy selection tool.

Vote411 has been updated in time for early in-person voting, now through Nov. 7 at various locations in Hamilton County. [Vote411.org](#) connects you with this information when you are on its Indiana page. From there, you

can find links to the Hamilton County early voting dates and locations, or you can go directly to the Hamilton County election office's website for that info.

On your personalized ballot, you also will see township and school board races and candidates. Westfield voters will be able to review the Westfield Washington Schools operating referendum. They will be asked to vote yes or no on this option.

"There's a lot of attention paid to the federal races, but local township and

school boards impact our lives as much, if not more," Dick said.

Her research shows that many voters opt for straight-party tickets. In those cases, voters may not see the referendum question, the school board races or other local options.

However you choose to vote, Dick and the league members encourage you to make a voting plan that includes researching the races and measures before casting a ballot. [Vote411.org](#) is a good first step for that, she advised.

by Invest Hamilton County and our Broadband Taskforce has positioned us to successfully receive grants from federal, state, and private sources both now and in the future. While we are pleased by the progress made, we understand there is much more work ahead of us to get broadband connectivity to as many residents as possible."

Please note, LTD Broadband defaulted on 181 locations (\$151,116) in the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) auction. These locations are no longer funded through this program, and the county is currently seeking new investors in those areas. The RDOF fed-

eral investments are anticipated to be deployed over the next six years, and the county is actively working to reduce this timeline by working with providers to expedite permits, streamline infrastructure investments and provide coordination as utilities seek to serve unserved areas.

How can you help attract broadband to your neighborhood?

Underserved residents and businesses play a critical role in helping attract investment to your area. If you still need high-speed internet service, please visit the following two websites to help the county attract investments to your location:

- **Indiana Farm Bureau Speed Test.** Taking the test will allow residents to determine their current internet
- **Indiana Connectivity Program.** The Indiana Connectivity Program is designed to provide faster grant funding to smaller neighborhoods or locations that are currently near, but just out of reach of, an existing provider. Hamilton

County received funding from the program to provide rapid service to 12 locations that were near an existing provider but not close enough to make an extension possible. The residents at those locations signed up for the new program through the Office of Community and Rural Affairs' (OCRA) Indiana Connectivity Program. Residents and businesses are encouraged to sign up for the program so that providers can apply to receive grant funds, on a rolling basis, to serve those locations.

County officials, Invest Hamilton County and the Broadband Taskforce will continue to provide updates and inform residents about how they can help attract investment to Hamilton County.

Hamilton Co. lawmakers: Application deadline approaching for paid Statehouse internships

Hamilton County lawmakers encourage college students and recent graduates to apply for a paid Statehouse internship before the Oct. 31 deadline.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said college sophomores, juniors and seniors, as well as recent graduates and graduate students of all majors can apply for an internship with the Indiana House of Representatives.

"Interning with Indiana House Republicans is a rewarding learning experience where students build on their skills and make connections with legislators and other professionals from across the state," Huston said. "Whether you're interested in working directly with constituents or the media, or you enjoy research and policy, there's something for everyone in our internship program."

State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) said House interns will be paid \$800 bi-weekly while working at the Indiana Statehouse in downtown Indianapolis during the 2023

legislative session, starting in January and concluding at the end of April.

"This program not only offers a chance to get hands-on experience in a professional work setting, but also earn a paycheck," Goodrich said. "Many of our former staffers have moved into full-time positions within our offices or made personal connections that helped them launch their careers."

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) said interested Hoosiers should visit indianahouserpublicans.com/internship and complete the application before Oct. 31. Intern interviews are currently taking place to fill positions in legislative operations, policy, and communications and media relations departments.

"Students with work experience, like an internship, enter the job market with an edge over their peers," Jeter said. "This is a great setting for young professionals to improve their resume and develop professional connections that could help them in the future."

According to State Rep.

Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel), internships are full-time, Monday through Friday, and include free parking, career and professional development assistance, enrollment access to an Indiana government class, and opportunities to earn academic credits through the student's college or university. Interns are also eligible to apply for a competitive \$3,000 scholarship to use toward undergraduate and graduate expenses.

"Internships are a great way for students to build real-world skills on top of what they're learning in the classroom," Schaibley said. "This internship can open doors to numerous opportunities, and I encourage local students to consider applying."

"Interns serve as a valuable resource for lawmakers as they help with meetings, manage schedules, write press releases and more," said State Rep. Jerry Torr. "It's never too late to start looking for an internship, and I hope to see more students from Hamilton County at the Statehouse

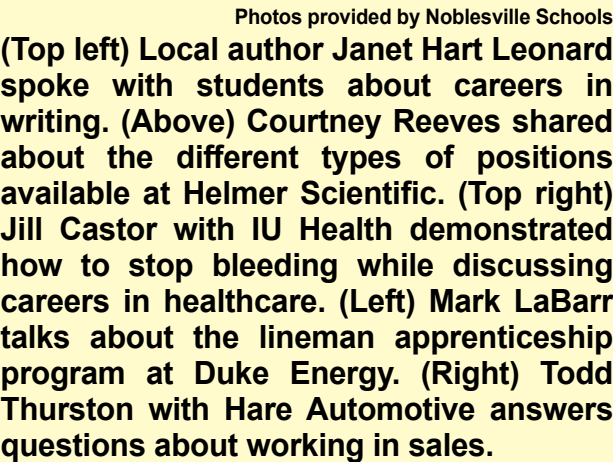

Four HSE School Board candidates earn endorsement of Fishers FOP

Fishers Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #199 announced its endorsement of four Hamilton Southeastern School Board candidates on Monday evening. At the monthly board meeting, the Fishers FOP board voted to approve a motion to endorse one candidate in each district.

The endorsement came after reviewing an independent investigation of a “Defund the Police” poster that had been displayed in the classroom of the younger

brother of Elwood Police Officer Noah Shahnnavaz. Officer Shahnnavaz, a Fishers High School graduate, was killed in the line of duty this past summer. The FOP statement read that the HSE response to the investigation “failed to address the root cause of the issue, which is that the school district allows anti-police sentiment to be posted in their school buildings.”

Fishers FOP Lodge #199 President Chris Owens released the following statement:

“My fellow Fishers FOP members and I are proud to endorse four candidates for HSE School Board,” Owens said. “Current affairs in our schools have caused hate-filled rhetoric, which only encourages violence and lack of respect for law enforcement. Join us in supporting Pascoe, Albright,

Lang, and Orr, who will stand for safety and quality education.”

This endorsement comes at a time when much media attention recently has been given to the HSE School District. From HSE’s public statement in 2021 on a court case in Minnesota that had nothing to do with HSE schools, to adding progressive microaggression handbook policies in the summer of 2022, to most recently displaying the ‘defund the police’ poster display in a classroom, HSE is making national headlines for all the wrong reasons.

Fishers One Founder Diane Eaton said this in regards to the endorsement, “The endorsement from the Fishers FOP is very significant and should carry a lot of meaning to voters with the upcoming school board elections that are approach-

Jocelyn Vare addresses “misleading claims” about her from Kyle Walker’s campaign

When Democrat Jocelyn Vare made the decision to run for Indiana State Senate District 31, she knew she would face Kyle Walker, an opponent with hundreds of thousands of dollars in his campaign war chest. Further, she knew the Senate seat he was gifted and his history as a Marion County Republican Party Chairman meant he had friends with very deep pockets.

She did not let her opponent’s excessive access to money concern her. Vare simply focused on the residents in District 31 and made a commitment to be accessible and transparent to them. The onslaught of misleading ads and mailers about Vare from her opponent and the Koch Brothers’ Americans for Prosperity are ripped from the pages of the GOP playbook. She is eager to address each misleading claim.

“I did not vote against funding the Fishers Police Department,” said Vare about an April 2021 Fishers City Council vote. “I supported the police department’s purchase of new gun racks. I simply disagreed with which budget line item should fund the purchase.”

The April 9, 2021, vote appropriated \$25,000 from the citizen forfeiture fund, a fund created when law enforcement seizes assets from citizens, to the police department. Vare preferred that the purchase be funded

through existing cash reserves.

“I support our police officers,” Vare said. “I stood alongside our Fishers Police Chief when he opposed permitless carry at the Statehouse. I am a designated Gun Sense Candidate. And I want to openly fund our police department and guarantee public trust. To represent me in any other light, as Kyle Walker has done, is a lie.”

Almost every day, the mailboxes of Hoosiers living in Indiana Senate District 31 have had been filled with Kyle Walker’s messages about Vare’s personal donations. Walker disparages Vare because she did not make a voluntary personal donation to a community fundraiser to benefit a city-funded Gold Star Families Monument.

“I offer my full support for our veterans and am grateful for their service to our country,” Vare said. “I supported bringing a Gold Star Families Memorial Monument to Fishers to unify our community. Lying about my support of veterans is dirty politics and is a disservice to veterans and citizens.”

As a city councilor, Vare supported the creation of the Fishers Armed Forces Commission on Jan. 18, 2022. This new city body leads meaningful community efforts to honor military service as a cornerstone of the community. In addition, Vare is listening to Hoosier veterans and supports their efforts to legalize cannabis.

Finally, Vare openly discloses that she contributed

a personal donation of \$225 to the Biden-Harris campaign. She is a Democrat and she supported Biden. Vare’s donation pales in comparison to her opponent’s \$5,400 donations to Trump’s presidential campaign.

Walker’s advertisements also blame Vare for inflation and the national deficit. While flattered that he sees her influence so far reaching, she is realistic about her role as a public servant.

“As a city councilor, I have responded to inflation that is being felt by every Hoosier household by voting against charging a new tax,” Vare said. “I was the only council member who voted against a new Food & Beverage tax in Fishers.”

Known to be action-oriented about the affordable housing crisis, fiscally responsible and a champion for taxpayers’ dollars, Vare also voted against the City of Fishers providing tax breaks to corporate developers who plan to build condominiums that will hit the market starting at \$1,000,000.

Through the misleading paid advertisements that are flooding her community, Vare remains centered on her original inspiration to run for office: to represent every voice and to earn every vote. With her opponent’s absence at public forums and unresponsiveness to media requests, Vare trusts voters to see beyond the negativity the GOP Supermajority has brought to Indiana State Senate District 31.

“I knew going in that my opponent had deep pockets,” Vare said. “I am armed with deep relationships in my community, evidence of my opponent working against neighbors’ best interests, and my commitment to public service.”

Vare is a business owner and domestic violence survivor who is dedicated to public service. She proves it through her active roles with community non-profits, public education advocacy organizations, and as an at-large member of Fishers City Council. Vare was the first Democrat elected to municipal office in Fishers and won her election with strong bipartisan support, including an endorsement from the Fiscal Conservatives of Hamilton County.

Hendrix: Public Access Counselor on side of Carmel parents when it comes to school transparency

Dear Editor:

In response to [Diane Hannah's critique](#) (published Oct. 20) of [my previous letter to the editor](#) (published Oct. 14), and in response to her nearly 11 months of repeated libelous attacks on my character, I would like to introduce myself to the broader community so that they hear from me directly.

Throughout the past couple of years, I have provided consulting for several parent and civil rights advocacy groups broadly across the state of Indiana. Education reform requires being informed of the broader context of what is set forth under Indiana laws, and which portions of the law could be amended to better serve Hoosier students. These are incredibly complex conversations, and my role is to help my clients navigate the proper legislative processes required to effect the change they wish to advocate for. This is democracy in action! I have not founded any groups and do not participate in the actions Ms. Hannah has repeatedly claimed. I can't imagine a world in which consultants are responsible for all actions taken by their clients, past, present, and future.

In my previous letter, I highlighted an instance where transparency was lacking in Carmel Clay Schools (CCS) regarding closed-door Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) committees. The transparency laws expert, Indiana's Public Access Counselor (PAC), sided with parents in that the school should not "establish secret committees populated with agreeable stakeholders for the ease and comfort of vetting controversial topics" and that "It will not happen right now on the PAC's watch."

Ms. Hannah asserts that CCS limits transparency due to "concerns for personal safety" and "privacy laws." Citizens of Hamilton County, please be advised that there is no "right to privacy" under Indiana's transparency laws while sitting on a public committee taking "official action" on "public business." These facts are not in dispute by the school. After six inquiries to the school administration

(my "trust but verify" emails), and after asking them to define the committee's role, if not "official action," they ceased communication completely. According to IC 5-14-1.5-2(d), "Official action" means to:

(1) receive information; (2) deliberate; (3) make recommendations; (4) establish policy; (5) make decisions; or (6) take final action.

The school's own recruiting document explicitly indicated which official action they would be taking: to "provide honest and constructive input and feedback," "review Panorama survey data and provide perspective, feedback, and suggestions," "make recommendations on how the district can improve SEL (and DEI) programming and initiatives," provide "recommendations on SEL (and DEI) goals, initiatives, and programming," and "provide perspective on what information needs to be communicated to parents and how information on SEL (and DEI) initiatives is best communicated." These actions drive policymaking and nearly perfectly align with the statutory definition above.

Ms. Hannah asserts that the school follows legal advice; however, in this instance, initial advice issued by PAC in December 2021 was ignored and the committees were kept closed-door for the remainder of the school year. Contrary to Ms. Hannah's claim that parents were uninterested in the identity of the committee members, my clients were astonished to discover the committee members would be analyzing the Panorama data. Parents have the right to be concerned with who has access to their children's sensitive information. Panorama is the company founded by the son-in-law of U.S. Attorney General Merrick Garland for the purpose of collecting SEL data. Panorama is a vast software platform offering behavior analytics, behavioral interventions, and uses heat mapping to track the "student success" of the SEL programming. Where does this student data go? How is it used? Panorama's own contract with Carmel Clay Schools indicates they may use the aggregate data for research; however,

a child's own parent is not allowed to view their data.

According to an email dated Aug. 22, 2022, the school did *not* find records indicating completion of committee member background checks. I find it particularly interesting that the current school board is recommending that parents not be allowed in the lunchroom, meanwhile, staffing committees with unscreened and unverified parents that have access to student data. The importance of this cannot be minimized. When Ms. Hannah asserts "there is no good reason for anyone to know or care who we were," I would vehemently disagree, as does PAC. Who is she to dismiss parents' concerns? There is no basis for which to "trust" since one cannot "verify."

Ms. Hannah, seemingly speaking in official capacity for Carmel Clay Schools, has agreed with the spirit of my original letter. Personal attacks aside, she admits the school *did* intend to hide these committee members under a false pretense of privacy rights while refusing to produce the records they are legally obligated to provide. CCS removed the names of the committee members who wished to remain secret. The original request for records included a *redacted* list of selection criteria and names of committee members. Contrary to Ms. Hannah, no "private" information was ever requested regarding religion, ethnic background, disability, or gender identification, although Panorama collects the latter three.

The point here is not whether the committees themselves establish policy. The point is that parents should be provided with transparency as it relates to matters that impact their children prior to implementation. CCS is clearly not providing this level of transparency. Committee members confident enough to take "official action" on "public business" should expect to lawfully operate in the open, "cannot hide their identities or activities while doing so (Luke Britt, 22-FC-34)", and should stop labelling concerned parents as "hostile."

See Shakespeare's *The Merry Wives of Windsor* thru Oct. 31 at Indy Fringe

Noblesville's Improbable Fiction Theatre Company offers a delightful presentation of William Shakespeare's 1602 play *The Merry Wives of Windsor* at the Indy Fringe Basil Theatre. Jeff Bick directs the comedy, which is sometimes called "the original situation comedy." And for good reason.

Shakespeare's enduring character Falstaff, filled with ardor and a longing for wealth, writes identical love letters to two women he "adores" – and who happen to be the wives of his wealthy acquaintances, Masters Ford and Page. When the women meet and tell each other about their letters, a plan is devised to show the old leech they aren't happy with his intentions. Comedy ensues – filled with misunderstandings, plots gone wrong, and other mayhems. Hello, *I Love Lucy*!

Thomas Sebald takes the Falstaff role with great skill. He has provided the man with a good array of oversized characteristics which flesh out the character with continuously humorous results. Joining him as the ladies wronged are Dana Lesh as Mistress Page and Kelly BeDell as Mistress Ford. This trio provides much of the fun – Ms. Lesh and Ms. BeDell are especially good as enthusiastic plotters of revenge.

John Johnson is a standout as Master Ford, so too Angela Dill as Mistress Quickly. Johnson is multi-layered in his rendering of the jealous husband, excelling in his several scenes with Falstaff. Ms. Dill provides the skillful energies necessary to make her role dynamic and fun. Others of note in the large cast come from Shakespeare's ancillary love story in the piece: Sophie Peirce as the Page's sweet daughter, Anne; Ben Elliott as her unsure suitor, Slender; and Connor Phelan as her selected spouse, Fenton. All three only appear in a few scenes now and again but are none the less very solid in their portrayals.

The Elizabethan costumes are finely done by Sara Musick and her crew, the simple set design is adequate for the many locales of the scenes, and Mr. Bick's direction, assisted by Becca Bartley, moved the action along in as comprehensible a way as a Shakespeare play can be offered.

Some problems were evident to me, however. First of all, a full-out AC unit froze the audience for the first act. That was corrected for the most part in the second act but made for a sure discomfort. Secondly, my old complaint of diction and highly excited vocal levels raised its head here. Shakespeare is so difficult to hear correctly and to understand fully, I feel extra efforts must be made by a cast to provide the best of diction and vocalizations in order to promote good communication, particularly with any accented roles. Certainly not all the actors were guilty of this shortcoming, but enough lines and speeches went by without my clearly understanding them, that I believe it was a significant issue. The solution lies with the directing staff – can you understand your actors if you are not reading along in the script during rehearsals? The venue itself is no friend to proper acoustics and is also a part of this problem.

Bottom line: This cast and crew bring forth a rich, colorful and humorous rendering of one of my favorite Shakespeare plays. It is full of marvelous portrayals with sections of hilarity and is certainly a worthwhile entertainment.

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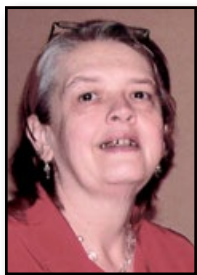
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Patricia “Pat” Denise Cranmore

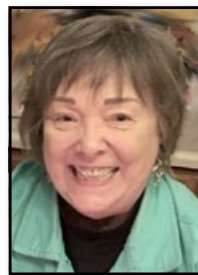

Southeastern’s girls placed third as a team with junior Maggie Powers leading the way. Powers placed fifth in 18:23.9, and scored four points. The Royals other runners scored 17-23-31-34 points, giving them enough for the bronze.

Top six boys scores: Fishers 79, Northridge 84, Hamilton Southeastern 120, Penn 161, Concordia Lutheran 176, Goshen 196.

The Tigers edged out Northridge with consistency across the board. Sophomore Sam Quagliaroli’s seventh-place finish (15:56.6) scored seven points for Fishers, then senior Tate Meaux (16th place), junior Matthew Kim (18th place) and senior Austin Wilson

(20th place) scored 12-13-14 respectively.

Northridge had two runners scored in double digits, including two points from freshman Baylor Miller (who placed fourth overall). But a big difference was in the No. 4 runner, where Fishers outscored Northridge 14-25.

Southeastern was led by senior Ash Caylor, who took ninth place with a time of 16:00.0. The Royals had all of their front five runners score under 40 points of the win.

Westview freshman Noah Bontrager was the race winner in a time of 15:20.8.

SHELBYVILLE

Top six girls scores: Noblesville 68, North Central 82, Carmel 107, Guerin Catholic 192, Zionsville 205, East Central 220.

Noblesville won its first-ever semi-state championship with an outstanding effort from all seven runners.

The Millers had all of their top six runners finish in the top 23, which translated into the following scores: 9-11-15-16-17-18. The 18 points for sixth place don’t count in the total, but that is

significant because it means another team can’t pick up those points. In a semi-state meet, 18 points for a runner is a considerably low score. Junior Kennedy Applegate led the Millers by placing 12th (18:41.4).

Carmel also had a consistent day, with senior Jasmine Klopstad leading the Greyhounds by placing 13th (18:52.6). Carmel had all seven of their runners finish in the top 44 overall, which led to them all scoring under 35 points.

Guerin Catholic advanced to state with Bridget Gallagher leading the way. The senior finished fourth overall in a time of 17:58.0, and scored two team points. The other Golden Eagles all ran consistently well, and that was more than enough to earn a trip to Terre Haute.

The race winner was Bishop Chatard senior Lily Cridge, who finished the race in 16:58.6, her second straight week under 17 minutes. Cridge and Southerland will be an individual race to watch.

Top six boys scores: Carmel 67, Zionsville 74, Center Grove 83, Noblesville 129, Brebeuf Jesuit 163, Franklin Central 201.

The Greyhounds’ top-two combination of senior Kole Mathison and junior Tony Pronvezano proved to be big for Carmel once again on Saturday. Mathison won the race in a time of 14:56.1, while Provenzano was third in 15:07.6. The top seven runners were all on participating teams, so that means Mathison and Provenzano scored one and three points respectively. After that, the ‘Hounds had their next three runners score 13, 22 and 28 points, which would be enough to outlast the Eagles.

Noblesville had two runners score in double digits. Asher Propst placed sixth in 15:31.2, while Caden Click took ninth place in 15:39.9; Click scored eight points for the Millers, and the other Noblesville runners all finished well to clinch a place at state.

Two Guerin Catholic individuals will compete at the boys state meet. Senior Ethan Hines placed 13th and sophomore Luke Moster finished 31st.

The Bull Dogs wrapped up the team championship quickly, with three runners in the top seven. The top nine runners were all on participating teams, so that means Columbus North went 1-2-7 for its first three scores. Seniors Julia Kiesler (17:17.3) and Lily Baker (17:53.4) were 1-2 for the Bull Dogs.

Top six boys scores: Columbus North 55, Floyd Central 117, Bloomington South 127, Bloomington North 131, Jasper 208, Evansville Reitz 223.

The Bull Dogs’ boys team was just as dominant as the girls, with three runners in the top 10, placing third, fourth and ninth respectively. The top 11 were on participating teams.

New Albany senior Aidan Lord won the race in a time of 15:21.1.
