

After college at Purdue University, where I was fortunate to graduate with honors in mathematics and chemistry, my uncle called. Uncle Sam.

At that time the draft was still in effect. Because there were more potential draftees than necessary, a lottery



system based on birthdate was utilized. My number was one of the last numbers called. We were bussed to Indianapolis, ordered to strip down and were given a free physical inspection. I passed with flying colors while the guy next to me was disqualified for service because of his flat feet. He had told me that he was a multi-sport letter athlete in high school, but the doctor said he was not fit for military service.

The military assigned me to be a tank mechanic. When I arrived at my destination, Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., I found my bunkmate had been assigned to be the Army chemist! He had just received his journeyman's card as a mechanic and I the honors chemistry degree. Had they switched our paperwork?

It was September when I left home, and hello. Or just come the Museum I was very well tanned having worked that - and we hope this does not occur after dark any evening for the entire summer on the farm. The local barber hated long hair which was then in fashion for men, and mine was below my ears. I knew I would need a haircut in the military so I told him he could do anything he wanted to with my hair if he would pay me \$5. He paid me the \$5 and shaved my head, and away I went to serve my country.

## Noblesville Supt. Hile delivers first State of the Schools address

District announces plans to renovate STEM & performing arts spaces

Noblesville Schools Superintendent Dr. Daniel G. Hile presented his inaugural State of the Schools address Wednesday at the Noblesville Schools Community Center. The annual luncheon was hosted by the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce and covered a wide variety of topics ranging from academics to finances to construction projects.

Hile opened the presentation, themed "Going Places," with several examples of the district's academic excellence including:

- "A" rating from the Indiana Department of Education.
- National recognition for Science/Technology/Engineering/Math (STEM), Advanced Placement (AP), and music education.
- First-in-the-nation educator apprenticeship program for high school students.
- Noblesville High School (NHS) student one of only four in state named to Governor's STEM Council.
- Top 10 percent performer on ILEARN and SAT testing.

education program, Millers Success Academy, is showing a 94.7 percent graduation rate for students who were previously at risk of dropping out of school.

The district used the address as an opportunity to announce upcoming plans to renovate STEM and performing arts spaces at Noblesville High School due to significant ongoing growth in these programs.

The bus stopped in St. every vaccine known to man, Louis. It was shortly after I disembarked that I was arrested by a local police officer. "Son," he said, "the only haircut I see like that is an AWOL (away without leave) from Fort Leonard Wood and we get \$100 to bring you in." It took some explanation and production of my mustering papers before he would let me go. The rest of the trip was uneventful

At Fort Leonard Wood the drill sergeant loudly proclaimed that everyone needed a haircut, "except for that guy," pointing at me. The Native American with hair down his back claimed a religious exemption. The barber granted that exemption and then promptly ran his clippers down the center of the man's head. We were given shots,

and pressed into service. Fort Leonard Wood was beautiful in its unique-

ness. It was said it was the only place you could choke on the dust while crawling through the mud.

Fifteen minutes was the time allowed for the entire company to eat. Eggs were fried by dropping on a griddle so hot that only the bottom half of the egg was fried, and the top was still raw. As soon as they could fit on a spatula they were on your plate. The rest of the food was bad. Needless to say, everyone lost weight.

prescription drug misuse, and can help save lives."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates 100,306 people died of drug overdoses in the United States last year, marking the largest number of drug-related deaths ever recorded in a year. With close to 5,000 col-United States Drug Enforcement Administration, along with its law enforcement partners, have removed more than 15.2 million pounds of medication from circulation since the inception of National Drug Take Back Day in 2010.

"The only safe medications are ones prescribed

by a trusted medical professional and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist," Greer added. "Old and unwanted medicine too often becomes a gateway to addiction. Events like these are a critical effort to curb the historic surge in U.S. overdoses."

Hamilton County residents are encouraged to drop off their expired or unused medications between 9 a.m. and noon. No liquids, sharps, or needles will be accepted. For those who cannot make it, there are opportunities to safely dispose of unneeded medications at local pharmacies, hospitals, and police departments throughout the year.

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

#### Blood donation restrictions lifted for many who spent time in certain European countries

#### The REPORTER

The American Red Cross now invites those who spent time in the U.K., Ireland or France and have never tried to give blood due to concerns over variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (vCJD) - related to mad cow disease – to give blood and help save lives.

Recently, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration updated its blood donor eligibility guidance on vCJD, eliminating the deferral for those who spent time in the U.K., Ireland and France between Cross began accepting donations on Oct. 3 from individuals who have not tried giving blood before due to the prior donation criteria.

In combination with prior eligibility updates in 2020 for those who spent time in other European countries, this new change effectively eliminates the deferral relat-

ed to vCJD for all donors. "For many years, the Red Cross has heard from people who have spent time in these countries - often members of the military and their families - hoping for the opportunity to donate blood or platelets," said Julie Brady, Regional Donor Services Executive. "We now welcome all donors who may have spent time in Europe and avoided blood donation as a result to join us in our lifesaving mission to help patients in need."

More blood donors – especially type O donors – are urged to donate now to prevent disruptions to essential medical care this fall. Book a time to give by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCross-Blood.org or by calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). As a thank you, all who come to give now through Oct. 31 will receive a \$10 e-Gift Card by email to a merchant of choice.

#### **Changes in progress** for those with a Red **Cross donor record**

Those who have tried to give with the Red Cross and have been previously deferred from donating will be contacted by the Red Cross once system records are updated. This deferral is more complex to remove than others as there are decades of donors in the Red Cross system who have been deferred under the previous FDA requirements.

#### How to donate blood

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood. org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

It may be one of Shakespeare's most meta speeches. I'm not sure. But when Richard II appeals to his comrades, "For God's sake, let us sit upon the ground and tell sad stories of the death of kings," is it any wonder if we, as knowing audience members, can hardly decide whether to laugh or gasp in recognition of the dramatic irony. We know how events will unfold: his own end is the story being told.

I won't try to detail the intricacies of Shakespeare's plot – the political intrigues, the twists and turns that bring Richard to his fate and propel his cousin Bolingbroke to power. But I can vouch that the production of Richard II mounted for (and, apparently, by) Bard Fest, as seen on its opening weekend, is a worthy rendition of this seldom-performed Shakespeare history play, and that's thanks largely to the deep commitment and spirited performances of its talented cast.

Their love for the language is apparent. In Afton Shepard's portrayal of King Richard, we're treated to language as revelation of a precariously poised mind. In Rayanna Gibbs' Bolingbroke, we hear the steady surety of her well-chosen words and feel the steadiness of her climb to power in the process. While both actors superbly conveyed the music of the language in equal measure, they still managed to reveal character through contrast - the brittle king who poeticizes his problems vs. the



# Millers & 'Hounds all in for state championship play

The three Hamilton County teams that are playing in the IHSAA's Class 3A state soccer state championship games on Saturday are schools that have been quite successful in the post-season over the years.

The Noblesville girls team is going for its third state title in the past four years. The Millers will play Carmel, a team that has qualified for state for the fourth time in five years. Those two teams will face off in the 3A girls game at 4 p.m. at IUPUI's Michael Carroll Stadium.

Before the 3A girls take to the field, Noblesville's boys team will be trying to defend its 3A state title. The Millers will play Columbus North, with that game beginning at 1:30 p.m. Noblesville is the sixth school in the history of the IHSAA state soccer tournament to have both its girls and boys teams reach the state championship game. (The IH-SAA tournament began in

1994.) Noblesville's boys team won its first-ever state championship last season by beating old rival Carmel 3-1 in the title game. The Millers did so with a very talented group of seniors, but the players on this year's team and beat Penn 3-2 to punch have been making their its ticket back to state. mark as well.

#### **GROWING CLOSER**

"Over the course of the season, we have grown closer," said Noblesville coach Ken Dollaske. "We trust one another more. At the beginning of the season, we had a lot of new faces playing roles they weren't used to and trying to find that chemistry was hard, especially when you graduate 10 out of your 11 starters from the previous season. Now, everyone understands their roles and how they can push each other to be the best teammates possible."

There are two seniors on this year's team that started for the Millers in last year's state championship game as juniors: Jake Johns and Jackson Montgomery, both midfielders. Seven of the 11 probable starters on the team are seniors.

The offensive leader is a junior, Sam Holland. The forward has scored 13 goals for Noblesville and handed out eight assists. Right behind Holland is senior forward Sam Divis, who has scored 11 goals and leads the assists with nine. Starting goalkeeper, junior Cole Thompson, has made 67 saves and compiled a goals against average of 0.873 and six shutouts. Senior Owen Mejia and junior Miles Tucker both have scored five goals, while senior Pavlos Michaeloff has four goals and two assists.

The Millers are 15-3-3 for the season. Noblesville began its tournament march with two wins at the Fishers sectional, beating Pendleton Heights 5-0 and Hamilton Southeastern 3-0. The Millers hosted Warsaw in the regional semi-final, and won that game 2-1.

regional championship at Kokomo, and made a big comeback against Fort Wayne Carroll. The Millers were down 3-1 before tying the game by the end of regulation, then won the eventual penalty kick shootout for a 4-3 regional title victory. Noblesville went back to Kokomo for the semi-state

The Bull Dogs come into the state title game at 19-1-1. The lone loss was a 1-0 decision to Carmel, while Columbus North played to a scoreless tie with Columbus East on Aug. 25.

The Bull Dogs faced Columbus East again in the opener of the Roncalli sectional, winning that game 1-0. Columbus North the beat the host Royals 2-1 and Franklin Community 3-1 for its first sectional title since 2016. The Bull Dogs hosted Center Grove in the regional semi-final and beat the Trojans 3-1, then cruised past Floyd Central 5-0 in the final at Flovd Central.

That sent Columbus North to the semi-state, and it defeated Cathedral 2-1 to win that championship. The Bull Dogs were now back at state for the first time since

Junior Christian Gomez Cardoso is CN's overall leader on offense with nine goals and 16 assists. Senior Nathan Imlay has the most goals scored with 11, while senior Flynn Keele also has nine goals to his credit. Another senior, Anthony Johnson, has handed out 11

"CN has some nice players in key positions," said Dollaske. He noted that Gomez Cardoso "is very strong on the ball and has great field vision." Dollaske said that the Bull Dogs have a rightwing player, junior Raul Oliveria, that is left-footed, "so he is able to cut inside and provide dangerous crosses or shots on goal."

So, the Millers have put their focus on the above two players, "as well as putting pressure on CN's center backs," said Dollaske. "If we can do that, we should

"The programs feed off of one another, and our players are the boys' biggest fans, and we know they support us as well," said Brady. 'It's really special when both teams can play for a state title. We want them to win, as they want us to win. It's certainly a great time to be a Miller."

In order to win its third state title, Noblesville will have to beat a team that's won more state soccer championships than any other: Carmel. The Greyhounds girls have won 10 IHSAA state titles, plus a pre-IH-SAA championship in 1991.

The Millers hosted Carmel in a regular season game on Sept. 19, with Noblesville winning 3-1. Neither team has lost since then. The Millers have won all their games, while the Greyhounds' only setback was a scoreless tie against Zionsville on Sept. 24. The Eagles also handed Noblesville its only loss of the year, a 1-0 result on Sept. 14.

Other than that, the Millers have won every game, and hold a 19-1 record coming into the state champion-

ship game. Noblesville hosted Sectional 8 this season, and won it by beating Fishers 3-1, Hamilton South-Heights 3-0.

The Millers then welcomed Homestead for the regional semi-final, and beat the defending 3A state champion 3-0. In the regional final at Kokomo, the Millers took care of Fort Wayne Carroll 5-0, then sailed past Crown Point 7-0 seven days later for the Kokomo semistate title.

Carmel coach Frank Dixon said that Noblesville "has had an incredible run with three state finals appearances, including this year," over the past four years. Dixon noted his team's run with four appear-

ances in the 3A title game over the past five years.

"It is a tribute to the strength of competition in eastern 1-0 and Pendleton IHSAA Sectionals 8 and 10 that the winners of those competitions match up well with the other 3A schools around the state," said Dixon. "You know the old saying, you have to beat the best to be the best. This definitely applies to the Noblesville/Carmel rivalry."

> "To win Saturday, both teams will have to avoid mistakes and play with composure," said Dixon. "I think goals will not be easy to score. We will have to take full advantage of the few chances that will be available."


> The Millers have had two outstanding leaders on their team all season. Senior
