Carmel K9 Jax gets new body armor

Carmel Police Department's K9 Jax has received a bullet and stab protective vest thanks to a charitable donation from non-profit organization Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. The vest was sponsored by Don and Misty Fike of Galesburg, Ill., and was embroidered with the sentiment "Born to Love-Trained to Serve-Loyal Always."

K9 Jax is a Dutch Malinois that began his service with the Carmel Police Department June 4, 2022. He serves as a patrol dog, with specialized training in narcotics detection. His handler is Officer Branden Owens.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., established in 2009, is a 501(c)(3) charity whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the

United States. This potentially lifesaving body armor for four-legged K9 officers is U.S. made, custom fitted, and certified by the National Institute of Justice. Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. has provided more than 4,845 vests to K9s in all 50 states at a value of \$6.9 million, made possible by both private and corporate donations.

The program is open to U.S. dogs that are at least 20 months old and actively employed and certified with law enforcement or related agencies. K9s with expired vests are also eligible to participate. There are an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. accepts tax-deductible contributions in any amount, while a single donation of \$960 will sponsor one vest. Each vest has a value of \$1,744 to \$2,283,

Plans are in the works to bring a Costco to Noblesville's south side just northeast of the State Road 37 and 146th Street interchange. The store will be located north of Tom Wood Volkswagen.

Meanwhile on the city's far west side, the 90,000 square-foot Meijer will not be a full-size store, but rather what Mayor Chris Jensen called a "specialized grocery" that's new to market. 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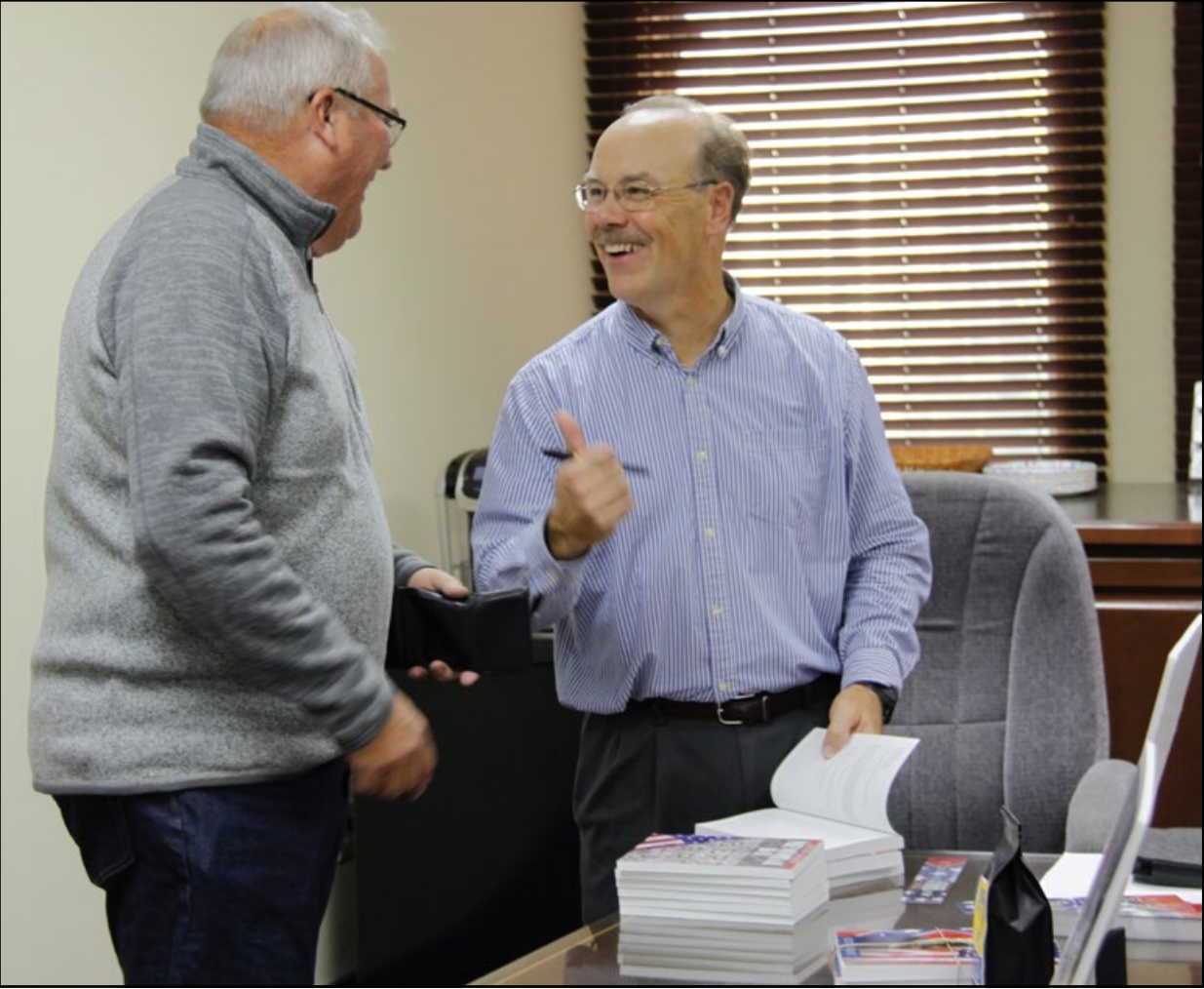


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Noblesville author welcomes history lovers at book signing

How to donate blood

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete

their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

That’s not Mom texting!
How to spot impersonators in your texts

Scammers have long used social media to impersonate people you know and trust, but recently they’ve been using a new tactic: text messages with a spoofed caller ID. This scam can be hard to spot at first glance, so watch out for the warning signs.

How the scam works

You get a text message that shows up in your phone as from “Mom” (or in other variations, “Dad.”) According to the message, “Mom”

is at the store, but she left her credit card at home by accident. Could you send her \$150 to finish her shopping?

The request seems harmless, but don’t do it! Scammers have spoofed caller ID to appear as “Mom” or “Dad.” They are relying on the fact that many people have “Dad” or “Mom” saved in their contacts list. Scammers hope you won’t think twice (or double-check the phone number) before sending help. If you do transfer money to a bank or **digital wallet** account, your money will be gone for good.

- Double check the sender info. Click on the sender information to make sure the name matches your parent’s real phone number.
 - Call your parents to confirm the story. Look up their number in your contacts list and call them to confirm if the message really came from them.
 - Don’t be fooled if a scammer has personal information about you. Because of data breaches and social media posts, scammers may have their hands on some of your personal information, including your name and your parent’s name.
 - If you suspect a scam, don’t answer the message. Just block the number and delete the message. If you reply, scammers will know your number is active and could target you with scams in the future.

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United Way of Central Indiana launches interactive data dashboard

Impact United Dashboard shows community need, response of United Way’s partners

The REPORTER This week, United Way of Central Indiana launched a new interactive data tool that highlights the needs of the community and how United Way’s partners are working to address those challenges. United Way has long collected and analyzed data to understand poverty in

central Indiana and inform its decisions and strategies. Now, the nonprofit is making the data available to the public. “It’s our way of making sure that we are showing how we have been accountable to the community, to donors, to funders – to ensure we are lifting their impact but also (showing) how we’re trying to invest in communities where there are gaps in services,” said Denise Luster, United Way’s vice president of impact research and data analytics. The **Impact United Dashboard** provides snapshots of United Way and its partners’ work in key focus areas, including economic mobility, educational suc-

cess, food, health, housing and transportation. Users can explore the data by focus area, dig into the demographics of those served and filter the data by county, including Boone, Hamilton, Hancock, Hendricks, Marion, Morgan and Putnam counties. “This should be a tool that anyone can use to see some key highlights of what’s happening within their community, no matter where they’re located,” said Stephanie Fritz, United Way’s strategic research and analytics senior director. The tool reflects the most recent data that’s available and is designed to be updated as new data emerges. Throughout the dash-

board, data that shows community need comes from national, state and local sources. Data showing impact comes from programs and community-based organizations that partner with, or receive funding from, United Way. Community organizations that work with United Way report data to the nonprofit quarterly and biannually. The dashboard reflects the immense efforts of United Way’s partners to serve people in the community, said Daniel Hedglin, United Way’s director of data insights and storytelling. It shows the footprint of United Way and its partners in central Indiana, said Purbasha Dasgupta, United Way’s research and evaluation senior manager, who led the project. According to the dashboard, more than one in three Marion County households are in poverty or are considered Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE), meaning they earn above the Federal Poverty Level but not enough to afford a basic household budget. About 29 percent of households that are in poverty or ALICE in United Way’s seven-county service area are families with children. To explore the data dashboard, visit uwci.org/impactunited. 

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Supporting our country’s veterans, preventing suicide

Veterans Day, Nov. 11, is an important day for every American and is intended to honor America’s veterans for their patriotism, love for their country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good. This day of remembrance celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans. Communities across the country plan events to honor those who have served and are currently serving. As we celebrate and recognize these brave men and women, we should also consider the struggles that they go through with mental illness.

Suicide is a national problem in the U.S. and a major concern for active-duty service members and military veterans. Members of the military may experience a variety of difficult and traumatic events including combat, natural disasters, and physical assault. According to the 2022 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report, there were 6,146 Veteran suicide deaths in 2020. That is 31.7 deaths per 100,000. During that year, suicide was the second leading cause of death among Veterans under age 45. The suicide rate for Veterans was 57.3 percent greater than for non-Veteran U.S. adults.

Veterans can come home from service carrying a weight they did not go in with. Without the right help, that weight can seem like too much, leading some

Veterans to consider, or carry out, suicide. Some of the warning signs that Veterans exhibit include feelings of hopelessness, acting agitated, struggling with anxiety, insomnia, outburst of anger or rage, an increase in substance use or abuse, and isolating themselves from the people close to them. Other factors related to the higher risk of suicide among Veterans are related to undiagnosed or untreated conditions, such as PTSD or mood disorders, which can increase a person’s overall risk of suicide.

The VA offers a wide range of treatment programs for Veterans and their families. Also, “Vets for Warriors” is a peer support network with Veterans answering the phone for those in need. The number is 1-855-838-8255. Veterans may also use the Veterans Crisis Line Number where there is 24/7 crisis support. Dial 988, then press 1.

The Jason Foundation is another valuable resource for those struggling with suicidal ideation. Many times, a Veteran will exhibit clear warning signs prior to an attempt. By knowing the warning signs, and knowing how to help, you could save a life. Carmel native Emmanuel Carter and Fishers resident Tré Bennett have joined their creative talents to form The 116 Collective LLC. The 116 Collective was formed as a place for creatives to come together to showcase the incredible talent that Indiana has to offer the entertainment industry.

Carter is an actor, writer, producer, and director who may be best known as the host of *Noggin Knows*, which airs on Nickelodeon’s preschool network, Noggin. Bennett is a director, cinematographer, and editor who has an incredible way of transforming video into artwork.

Their first project, a remix of “This is Halloween,” was inspired by *Nightmare Before Christmas* and reimagined by Carter and Bennett. ([Click here](#) to watch on YouTube.) Bringing together local dancers, includ-

ing students from 31SVN Street Dance Academy in Fishers, they assembled a production dream team to bring their vision into existence. Filmed entirely at The Thirteenth Hour Haunted Attraction, they captured the spirit of Halloween in a family-friendly magical masterpiece that was released on Oct. 26.

An interesting side note is the fact that the video was shot with hand-held equipment totaling around \$3,500 for camera and lens, which is a fraction of the cost of Hollywood film equipment, but with the same high-quality results. This is a testament to Bennett’s skills behind the camera and in editing, but it is also a lesson to anyone who wants to get into filmmaking but thinks that they can’t because they can’t afford expensive equipment. One of Bennett’s mottos is that you can get high quality with less, and this

project proves it.

Also interesting is how the two came up with the name The 116 Collective.

Both artists live off 116th Street in Hamilton County. Coincidentally, or maybe more aptly described as serendipitously, they first met on a commercial project that just so happened to be shooting on 116th Street. This same street has been the connective tissue to link Carter and Bennett with so many other like-minded artists that are also part of the collective, including the dance studio which, as you guessed it, is also off 116th Street.

Indiana’s Film and Media Tax Credit established by Indiana Code §6-3.1-36 provides tax credits that can be applied to offset certain production expenses. Carter and Bennett plan to utilize The 116 Collective to bring attention to Indiana filmmaking and encourage other companies to bring their pro-

ductions here, boosting the local economies in the areas where they film. Longtime proponents of bringing film to their home state, Carter and Bennett will be creating opportunities for actors, musicians, dancers, set designers, costumers, make-up artists, film crew positions, and other Hoosiers while putting a spotlight on Indiana film because, as Carter says, “Great film and great people aren’t exclusive to Hollywood or other major production hubs.”

There has been an overwhelmingly positive response to their first project. As soon as “This is Halloween” was posted, Carter and Bennett were already discussing their next project, so there is more to come. As The 116 Collective’s website says, “All you need is a camera and a group of passionate creatives.”

“For me, it’s big”: Shamrocks best ‘Hounds for first time in 66 years

CARMEL — A strong offense and a stellar defensive effort drove the Westfield football team to a historic win on Friday.

The Shamrocks beat Carmel 28-9 in a Class 6A Sectional 4 semi-final game at Carmel Stadium. There was a bit of back-and-forth between the No. 6-ranked Greyhounds and the No. 9-ranked ‘Rocks in the first quarter, but Westfield used its running game to steadily distance itself from Carmel as the game went on.

It was the first time the Shamrocks had beaten the Greyhounds since 1956 — “I just assumed it was never,” said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert — and sent them into the Sectional 4 championship game. The ‘Rocks will host Noblesville next Friday.

“We talk a lot about, hey, we don’t want to just have had a good team,” said Gilbert. “We want to be a great program. Not a great team, a great program that every single year, you have to count on us to be a factor in 6A. That’s what we’re trying to become. We have our own standards. I’m really proud of how we’re building our team. Our kids worked very hard. I thought they were fearless tonight and really wanted it, and I was really proud of the effort, just the relentless effort.”

Carmel got on the board first, with a 36-yard field goal by Ben Sponsler midway through the first quarter. Westfield answered in its next series, using short runs and a handful of passes by quarterback Cole Ballard to get down to the 15-yard line. Maximus Nosler took it from there with back-to-back runs, the latter of

which was an eight-yard jog into the end zone.

The Shamrocks would score a touchdown in each of the four quarters, and never trailed again after Nosler’s score. Sponsler kicked a 31-yard field goal midway through the second period to cut the lead to 7-6, and the ‘Hounds got the ball back after a three-and-out.

But Westfield’s defense stopped the drive when Andrew Lieske caught an interception in the end zone. That gave the ‘Rocks the ball at their 20, and they moved quickly down the field. Sophomore Kendall Garnett finished the drive with a 16-yard touchdown run.

“For me, it’s big,” said Garnett. “I’m a sophomore playing varsity. Me and my team, we just went out there today and we just told ourselves that hey, we’re going to go out there and fight this battle hard, and we’re going to execute every play and we’re going to dominate on defense. And that’s what we did.”

Westfield led 14-6 at halftime. The third quarter followed the same pattern: Carmel made a drive down to the red zone, and Sponsler kicked a 29-yard field goal. The Shamrocks answered with a long drive that resulted in a touchdown, with Garnett and Ballard trading runs. Ballard got the score this time, on a five-yard rush.

Ballard said the victory was “a testament to our coaches.” He and the other Shamrocks knew Carmel would be fired up to start the second half.

“Coach Gilbert said the next four or five minutes will

be the best football they can give you,” said Ballard. “And they definitely gave it to us.” Carmel held the ‘Rocks to a three-and-out to start the half, and Ballard said the ‘Hounds were giving the Westfield de-

fense trouble.

“We knew that was going to be the hardest part,” said Ballard. “But once we got rolling again, we were ready.”

Westfield’s final drive

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Millers quench sectional thirst

Noblesville headed to sectional championship for first time since 2001

NOBLESVILLE – On Friday night, there was a lot at stake for the Noblesville Millers football team and they knew it would be a tall task as they faced yet another Hoosier Crossroads Conference opponent in the state tournament.

The Millers used a dominant rushing attack in the first half and swarming defense throughout the game en route to a Class 6A Sectional 4 semifinal win over Zionsville, 35-10.

Noblesville football had lost its previous nine sectional openers. Prior to last night, the Millers’ last sectional win was in 2012. Those streaks are now over and they will be playing for a sectional championship next week.

They wasted very little time on the opening drive of the game. Noblesville marched down the field, going 81 yards on nine plays for their first score. Gage Gulley finished it off, breaking free from an Eagle defender for a 13-yard score to start it off 7-0.

“This game was different from the last game, because we had first down success. That’s really what the game came down to on offense and defense,” said Noblesville head coach Dave Sharpe on one of the biggest keys to the Millers’ win.

The Millers got off to a great defensive start that propelled them to play full throttle all game long. They forced Zionsville to punt after four plays on their first set of downs.

And, it only took Noblesville four plays on its next possession to get its next score. Logan Shoffner found a hole and bounced outside the tackles, sprinting 66 yards to the end zone for

the touchdown, putting the Millers up 14-0.

Zionsville started its next series at their own 41 and started putting together a drive that made it look like they were going to cut the Millers’ lead in half. The Eagles got all the way down to the Noblesville 11. And, with a fourth down and six, the Eagles turned the ball over on downs at the 11.

The Millers put together another great drive, this time going 89 yards, capping it off with Blake Widget diving up the middle for a three-score lead at 21-0, completely puzzling the Eagles.

The Eagles had another opportunity in the middle of the second quarter to get something going offensively, but that would be put to a stop pretty quick.

Quarterback Christian Abney was trying to get the ball to speedy receiver Wrigley Bumgardner all evening. On this possession, one pass that Abney would like to have back was intercepted by Noblesville linebacker Trey Speck.

“They played a full 48 and some of those deep balls were right on the money and at the last second, guys like Christ Degni and Trey Speck just swatting down,” stated Sharpe on his defense playing their best game of the season and at the right time.

“We’ve been talking about it being a game of inches. Our struggles this year, we’re in the right spot and an inch away on both offense and defense. It’s been a frustrating year. But, it’s not how you start, but how you finish,” continued Sharpe on how close the Millers have been and the better team they are for it.

Logan Shoffner showed again why he is one of the best running backs in the state. Again, he busted off

another big touchdown run, this time for 49 yards and a dominating 28-0 score.

The Eagles drove down the field again, but would be limited to a field goal for their first points. Trevor Henkle sailed a 23-yard field goal to make it 28-3 at halftime.

During the second half, it was a big uphill climb for Zionsville. The Eagles were in a position they had not been with a deficit like this since losing 50-3 to Brownsburg four weeks ago. It forced them to have more of a sense of urgency and in turn resulted in another turnover.

Already having a great game in pass coverage, Christ Degni put the icing on his great defensive night by intercepting an Abney pass at the Millers’ 2-yard line.
