Humbly Courageous family is ready to run together for MDA

Longtime readers of The Reporter will remember the story of Amy Shinneman, which we have been covering since 2019. Amy was born with an undiagnosed neuromuscular disease that causes very weak muscles and affects her ability to walk. She has never had the opportunity to run, but thanks to the help and support of her family, along with a device called a duo chair, she has been able to participate in multiple marathons, including both the Chicago and New York City Marathons last year.

Amy and her husband Jamie will compete in the Indianapolis Monumental Marathon on Saturday, Nov. 5 this year, and they will do so as a way to raise awareness and money for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

"In January of 2022, I was chosen as one of two National

Ambassadors for the Muscular Dystrophy Association," Shinneman told The Reporter. "I live with a type of congenital Muscular Dystrophy called Bethlem Myopathy. Even though I have lived with the disease since birth, I wasn't formally diagnosed until the age of 44, four years ago. Since then, it has been my passion to reach others who may be feeling alone on their journey."

Shinneman told The Reporter she and Jamie are excited to run a hometown marathon and to be able to include so many family members and friends as teammates.

"While we are raising funds for the MDA, we are running under our team name, Humbly Courageous, which is the name of the blog that I write that shares my life experiences,

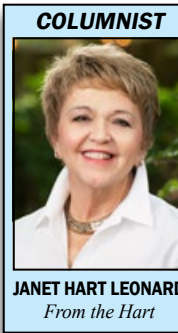
I've sat along the side of broken roads not knowing which way to go. Every path I looked upon seemed to warn me of danger ahead. Dangers I never imagined facing.

At times I've found myself forced into taking a detour to a place I never wanted to go. I pray I never have to go there again.

An additional \$1.8 billion was lost in productivity due to injuries and premature death. Domestic violence is the number one cause of injury for women ages 18 to 44.

past and current, living with a lifelong disability,” Shinneman said. Since starting my blog about 3 1/2 years ago, I’ve been able to connect with people all over the world who also have my same diagnosis. Something I never thought I would be able to do.”

Over 40 teammates who have signed up to do the 5K, half-marathon, or the full marathon. Amy and Jamie will be in the full marathon.

“Last year we got to run the NYC marathon with our oldest son Luke, but this marathon is also exciting because the team includes both of our sons, Luke and Jack,” Shinneman said. “Our son Luke used to run cross country and track for Noblesville High School, and now attends Purdue University. A couple of his college buddies, who are also former members of the NHS running teams, are also joined, and are doing the half marathon, along with several members of the current NHS cross country team, which includes our youngest son Jack.”

tional Ambassadors for the Muscular Dystrophy Association, this race will be is an opportunity to both build lasting memories with her own family, and also to help touch the lives of others.

“We hope to raise awareness, and obviously funding for the MDA to continue their quest to improve the lives of those living with neuromuscular diseases

and ALS,” Shinneman said. “MDA is the nation’s largest nonprofit supporter of neuromuscular disease research. We had some team shirts and hats made, and also are giving shirts to those who donate while supplies last. It has been fun to see our teammates and donors sporting their Humbly Courageous gear.”

I've told God time and time again what the best plan would be. It shouldn't be that difficult for Him to make it happen. But ... it was MY plan, not HIS.

"But God," I argued.

"Be still."

In the waiting, I simply must throw in the towel. I had held onto that towel with every last bit of strength I could muster. Finally, I realized it was not mine to hold.

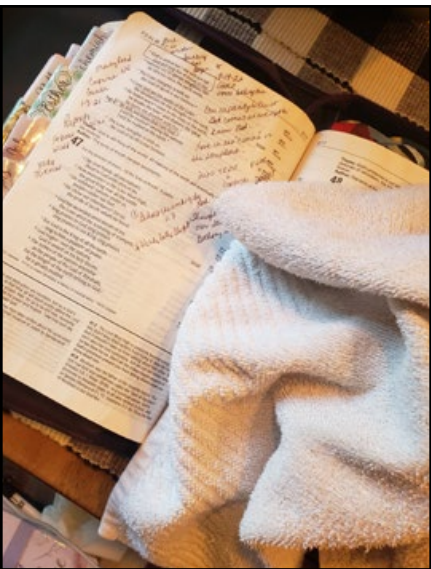

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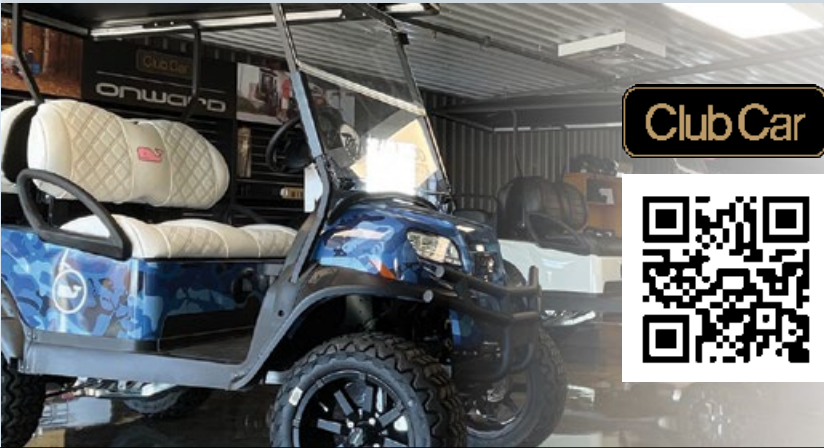

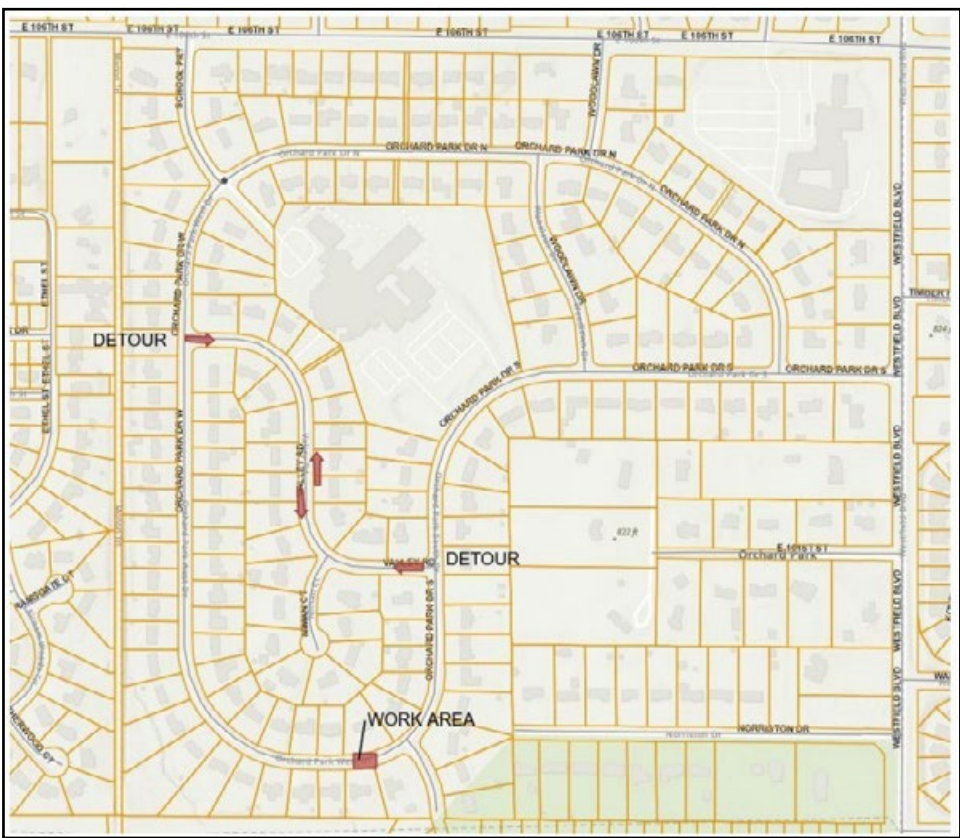

Who wrote *The War of the Worlds*?

1806 – On their return from their famous expedition, William Clark and Meriwether Lewis stopped in Vincennes. During their three-year journey, they had explored lands of the Louisiana Purchase and the Pacific Northwest. In Vincennes, they drafted a letter to send to President Thomas Jefferson in Washington.

1903 – Two trains collided near 18th Street just northwest of downtown Indianapolis. One was carrying Purdue football players and fans to the annual Indiana/Purdue game which was to be held in the capital city's Washington Park. Seventeen people were killed in the wreck, including 14 members of the Purdue football team. Scores of others were seriously



injured. Among the survivors was Purdue team captain Harry G. Leslie, who went on to serve as the 33rd Governor of Indiana (1929-1933).

1932 – On his first campaign for the presidency, Franklin D. Roosevelt spoke to over 80,000 people on Monument Circle in Indianapolis. He was joined by his wife, Eleanor, on the balcony of the English Hotel. In his remarks, he said, "It will be the purpose of the new administration to bring order out of chaos."

1938 – *The War of the Worlds* radio drama convinced many listeners that Martians had invaded the Earth. The classic story by H. G. Wells was presented as a series of news bulletins that interrupted regular programming. In Indianapolis, a woman ran into a church during Sunday evening services to report that the world was coming to an end.

1960 – Comedian Jack Benny appeared on stage as guest soloist with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of

Izler Solomon. For the star of vaudeville, radio, TV, and movies, it was a benefit performance to a full crowd at the Circle Theater. He kept the audience laughing while playing his violin between jokes. Referring to the thousands of dollars Benny raised for the orchestra, newspaper critic Charles Staff said, "The music he makes may be sour, but the money he makes for others in a good cause is sweet."

1963 – On Halloween night, a propane tank exploded during a performance of "Holiday on Ice" at the Indiana Fairgrounds Coliseum. The blast killed 74 people and injured more than 400. The explosion propelled people, chairs, and concrete 40 feet into the air. The gas had been sparked by an electric popcorn machine.

Whenever a Noblesville High School team wins, someone from the athletic department says “It’s a great day to be a Miller.”

And Saturday, Oct. 29, 2022, will probably be the best day ever to be a Miller.

Noblesville won three IHSAA state championships on Saturday, the first school ever to achieve such a remarkable feat. The Millers started their run with a victory at the cross country state finals at the LaVern Gibson Championship Cross Country Course in Terre Haute. Noblesville scored 122 points to win its first-ever state title in that sport.

After that, the Millers’ focus turned to IUPUI’s Michael Carroll Stadium in Indianapolis for the soccer state finals. The Noblesville boys went first, and they defended their Class 3A state championship with a 1-0 victory over Columbus North.

The Millers girls soccer team then had its turn. Noblesville beat Carmel 1-0 to win the 3A girls state title, which marked the third state championship in four years for the Millers. Noblesville also became the second school to sweep the boys and girls soccer state championship in the same season.

All in all, it was a great day to be a Miller.

Carmel Boys XC, HSE Volleyball are winners

The Carmel boys cross country team also stepped into the winner’s circle on Saturday by winning a state championship in Terre Haute. The Greyhounds held off Zionsville by three points, 103-106, to claim their record-extending 17th state title, and their first since 2018.

Meanwhile, the Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team is going back to the state finals. The Royals played the Class 4A north semi-state Saturday at Frankfort’s Case Arena, and swept Lake Central to earn a place at state. Southeastern will take on Yorktown next Saturday in the 4A state championship.

Noblesville boys & girls sweep at state finals

The mood was celebratory and the smiles were big, but the players on the Noblesville boys soccer team had to hustle off the field minutes after defending their Class 3A state championship by beating Columbus North 1-0 on Saturday.

They had another game to watch, after all. As the boys were leaving, the Noblesville girls soccer team was marching on to the field to play in the 3A girls state title game, against its old rival Carmel.

The Millers girls made it a sweep at IUPUI’s Michael Carroll Stadium, beating the Greyhounds 1-0. That gave Noblesville its third state title in four years, and it became the second school to have both its boys and girls team win state championships during the same season.

While the result was the same for both teams, the situations were a little different. The Millers girls had several players with experience, including Ohio State commit and Miss Soccer candidate Ava Bramblett, who scored the winning goal for Noblesville. The boys, meanwhile, had graduated several players for last year’s title-winning team.

“The fact that we had one returning starter and we still have another state championship under our belt is just phenomenal,” said Millers boys coach Ken Dollaske. “It’s an entire program, it’s an entire culture.”

Our JV programs, both JV Black and JV Gold, always have tremendous seasons. A lot of our starters last year were on the JV program and they saw the success that we had and they knew that they wanted that as well.”

Experienced Goal

Ultimately, the goal-scorer for the Noblesville boys turned out to be a player with state championship experience. Senior Jake Johns put the ball in the net for the Millers during the game’s 17th minute, with senior Sam Divis providing the assist.

“It came to me, and then Jake was just screaming my name,” said Divis. “I looked over to him and he was under me. And I had full trust in Jake to finish that away and he did.”

Johns said scoring the goal was like something one dreams about when he was a little kid.

“Just scoring, and then running to the camera and stuff,” said Johns. He said that getting the goal was an “undescrivable” relief, and since the Millers were now up 1-0, “we’ve still got the rest of the game left to push through.”

And Noblesville did push through the second half, even in the face of constant pressure by the Bull Dogs. Both teams had seven shots in the first half, but Columbus North outshot the Millers 8-4 in the second half. The Bull Dogs played to the end, getting one last chance with 30 seconds left, but Noblesville was able to hang on. Millers goalkeeper

Cole Thompson collected five saves during the game.

“Honestly, we wanted to make sure that we just contained as much as possible, and defensively, just move our feet,” said Dol-laske. “Don’t stay up. Don’t dive in. For that, we always want to be the first team to win those 50-50 aerial balls, and I think that we did that, which helps us relieve some of that pressure.”

Dream Result

The girls state title game was nothing but pressure. The Millers’ offense kept firing throughout all 80 minutes, with 25 total shots in the game. Sophomore Mer-edith Tippner led with 11 shots; both she and Bram-blett had three shots on goal.

The Millers were able to break through in the game’s 36th minute, when Bramblett

kicked the ball in from a few yards out. Bramblett called winning the state championship the “dream result.”

“We’ve got three trophies at the end of our career, and it’s the greatest way it could’ve ended for the goal,” said Bramblett. “It doesn’t matter whoever scores. That’s all we need. I was just happy that I was able to put one home and help our team to a victory that we’ve all had the goal from day one to achieve.”

Bramblett had been dealing with injuries during the season, and had to come off the field briefly at times, but there was no way she was staying off the field in a state championship game.

“Her teammates mean that much to her,” said Mill-ers coach Mike Brady, who also said that Bramblett

wanted to do everything she could so her teammates “could feel that success that she felt her freshman year. And she was a big part of that freshman year champi-onship,” which the Millers won in 2019.

“And she wanted every-body to have that feeling,” said Brady. “That’s just how unselfish she is.”

Noblesville took the 1-0 lead into halftime, but senior Meskerem James said “that means nothing” because there were still 40 minutes left to play. Indeed, Carmel continued to press the Mill-ers all the way through the second half, but Noblesville was able to hang on. Bella Wyatt had three saves.

“Carmel is an amazing team,” said James. “They give us a battle every time we play them.” The two teams met in the regular season, with Noblesville winning 3-1.

“Each team just keeps getting better every year,” said James. “It’s tough to play against them. So we just play together and come out as a team.” James said the team left it all on the field – “Today was the last game, we just put every-thing on the field,” she said.

Noblesville finished its season with a 20-1 record.

The Greyhounds had six shots for the game, with So-phie Shepherd making three of those shots. Goalkeeper Aubree Empie had seven saves, and won the Mental Attitude Award at the con-clusion of the meet.

“I practice and work hard every day, and the team

also helps me workout every day. I try to keep a positive attitude, because mental-ly, that’s what helps us win games,” said Empie.

The senior also reflected on how the team improved over the season.

“I don’t think really thought we were going to be here after our first game,” said Empie. “And I think we proved everyone wrong. We just worked our butts off. We played hard. We worked hard every practice, every game.”

Carmel finished its sea-son 18-3-2.

“I thought it was one of the better games I’ve seen in a long, long time,” said Greyhounds coach Frank

Dixon. “Our kids gave it ev-erything, their kids gave it everything.”

Dixon said there were “a lot of good players on that field. It was pretty sensa-tional.”

Immediately after the 3A girls game finished, the 1A girls game took place between Park Tudor and Fort Wayne Canterbury. The Panthers won 3-0. On Fri-day night, Park Tudor’s boys won that 1A game, beating Greenwood Christian Acad-emy 9-0. As a result, the Panthers joined the Millers and Evansville Memorial as the only schools to have their boys and girls teams win state in the same season.

The weather couldn't have been more favorable for the IHSAA cross country state championships Saturday at the LaVern Gibson Championship Cross Country course in Terre Haute. Sunny skies and seasonably warm fall temperatures gave runners from across the state the perfect weather to compete for state championships, both as a team and individuals.

The Noblesville Millers girls cross country team did something it has never done. The Millers can now add the 2022 state championship to their trophy collection. This is a first in program history.

Noblesville led all teams with 122 points, with top-ranked Columbus North finishing second with 153, the

fifth-ranked Carmel Greyhounds were third with 177, No. 4 Homestead wound up fourth with 187 and third-ranked North Central rounded out the top five with 197 points. That gave Hamilton County two teams to reach the podium.

No. 15 Guerin Catholic (332) was 11th and ninth-rated Hamilton South-eastern (357) ended its season in 15th.

The individual champion Lily Cridge from Bishop Chatard, who made it back-to-back state titles with a time of 17:14.6.

Guerin Catholic senior Bridget Gallagher finished sixth (17:59.8) and Hamilton Southeastern junior Maggie Powers was 16th (18:26.5), with both earning All-State honors. Gallagher was also named the Mental Attitude Award winner.

The Millers were able to get six runners in the top 45, which was a big plus in bolstering them to their first team state title. They bunched five of those from 34-45. Carmel also ran in a pack, including five from places 47-77.

Carmel's 1-2 punch helps 'Hounds grab 17th boys state title; Noblesville reaches podium for fifth, Fishers sixth

The Carmel Greyhounds were tested in the boys race, but when it came down to it, they were able to edge out Zionsville by three points on Saturday to capture their 17th boys cross country state championship and their

first since 2018.

The top six finishing teams ironically landed exactly where they stand in the rankings. The top-ranked 'Hounds would lead the way with Zionsville narrowly in second, followed by Center Grove, Columbus North and Noblesville all with podium team finishes.

Carmel was able to secure the top two spots. Senior Kole Mathison was the overall race winner, becoming just the second Greyhound ever to perform that feat and he did so in 15:02.8. Junior teammate Tony Provenzano was right there at the top with Mathison and grabbed second place with a time of 15:11.2.

Noblesville senior Asher Propst was sixth (15:33.7). Miller junior Caden Click at 14th (15:44.6) and Fishers sophomore Sam Quagliaroli 18th (15:49.8). All three were recognized as members of the All-State team, giving Hamilton County five boys all-state individuals.

Carmel's Kole Mathison was also named the Mental Attitude Award winner. He becomes the fourth Greyhound to earn the award and the first since Ben Veatch in 2015.
