# Holocaust survivor Frank Grunwald to speak in Westfield

On Thursday, Dec. 1, the Westfield Chamber will hold a Special Presentation featuring Frank Grunwald. The event will take place from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the IMMI Conference Center, 18880 N. East St., Westfield.

Grunwald was born in 1932 and his homeland of Czechoslovakia was invaded by German troops when he was six. His family was taken to Terezin, a concentration camp. He survived being transferred to three additional concentration camps, including Auschwitz.

His life story was turned into a documentary released in 2012 called *Misa's Fugue*. He has a special desire to impact the youth, and he has spoken at nearly 100 high schools and universities.

# Noblesville Supt. Hile delivers first State of the Schools address

District announces plans to renovate STEM & performing arts spaces

Noblesville Schools Superintendent Dr. Daniel G. Hile presented his inaugural State of the Schools address last Wednesday at the Noblesville Schools Community Center. The annual luncheon was hosted by the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce and covered a wide variety of topics ranging from academics to finances to construction projects.

Hile opened the presentation, themed “Going Places,” with several examples of the district’s academic excellence including:

- “A” rating from the Indiana Department of Education.
- National recognition for Science/Technology/Engineering/Math (STEM), Advanced Placement (AP), and music education.
- First-in-the-nation educator apprenticeship program for high school students.
- Noblesville High School (NHS) student one of only four in state named to Governor’s STEM Council.
- Top 10 percent performer on ILEARN and SAT testing.
- State leader in workforce development initiatives including the largest high school internship program in the state with 275 students and more than 160 businesses.

• NHS graduates are among highest scholarship and advanced college credit earners in the state. The Class of 2022 earned a record-setting \$6.3 million in scholarships.

• The district’s alternative education program, Millers Success Academy, is showing a 94.7 percent graduation rate for students who were previously at risk of dropping out of school.

The district used the address as an opportunity to announce upcoming plans to renovate STEM and performing arts spaces at Noblesville High School due to significant ongoing growth in these programs.

The speech also touched on the district’s commitments to safety and mental health, with over 50 safety and 30 mental health enhancements made thanks to funding from the 2018 referendum. Additionally, Noblesville Schools is one of only a few districts in the state with School Resource

# Hamilton County secures \$9M to extend broadband access to underserved locations

The Hamilton County Commissioners and Invest Hamilton County have attracted an estimated \$9 million to expand broadband access to nearly 3,600 unserved or underserved homes, businesses, and farms in the county. The funding, which comes from a mix of federal, state, and private sources, will be used to extend high-speed internet access, including fiber optic access.

Hamilton County has advanced its broadband expansion initiative through the formation of a Broadband Task Force, a diverse group of stakeholders representing agriculture, education, health, business, economic development, and local leadership. The group’s goal is to identify broadband connectivity issues within the county. Using mapping information along with analysis from government advisors at Katz, Sapper & Miller, the Commissioners, Invest Hamilton County, and the Broadband Task Force have identified areas that are unserved or underserved and will be developing a strategic plan for future investment.

“Commissioners Altman, Dil-

linger, and I are pleased with the efforts of the county to get broadband to more residents than ever before,” Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. “The work done by Invest Hamilton County and our Broadband Taskforce has positioned us to successfully receive grants from federal, state, and private sources both now and in the future. While we are pleased by the progress made, we understand there is much more work ahead of us to get broadband connectivity to as many residents as possible.”

Please note, LTD Broadband defaulted on 181 locations (\$151,116) in the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) auction. These locations are no longer funded through this program, and the county is currently seeking new investors in those areas. The RDOF federal investments are anticipated to be deployed over the next six years, and the county is actively working to

In return, the high school students provide the much needed services of weeding, harvesting, and mentoring elementary students as they plant and tend our

# Humbly Courageous family is ready to run together for MDA

Longtime readers of The Reporter will remember the story of Amy Shinneman, which we have been covering since 2019. Amy was born with an undiagnosed neuromuscular disease that causes very weak muscles and affects her ability to walk. She has never had the opportunity to run, but thanks to the help and support of her family, along with a device called a duo chair, she has been able to participate in multiple marathons, including both the Chicago and New York City Marathons last year.

Amy and her husband Jamie will compete in the Indianapolis Monumental Marathon on Saturday, Nov. 5 this year, and they will do so as a way to raise awareness and money for the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

“In January of 2022, I was chosen as one of two National Ambassadors for the Muscular Dystrophy Association,” Shinneman told The Reporter. “I live with a type of congenital Muscular Dystrophy called Bethlem Myopathy. Even though I have lived with the disease since birth, I wasn’t formally diagnosed until the age of 44, four years ago. Since then, it has been my passion to reach others who may be feeling alone on their journey.”

Shinneman told The Reporter she and Jamie are

excited to run a hometown marathon and to be able to include so many family members and friends as teammates.

“While we are raising funds for the MDA, we are running under our team name, Humbly Courageous, which is the name of the blog that I write that shares my life experiences, past and current, living with a lifelong disability,” Shinneman said. Since starting my blog about 3 1/2 years ago, I’ve been able to connect with people all over the world who also have my same diagnosis. Something I never thought I would be able to do.”

Over 40 teammates who have signed up to do the 5K, half-marathon, or the full marathon. Amy and Jamie will be in the full marathon.

“Last year we got to run the NYC marathon with our oldest son Luke, but this marathon is also exciting because the team includes both of our sons, Luke and Jack,” Shinneman said. “Our son Luke used to run cross country and track for Noblesville High School, and now attends Purdue University. A couple of his college buddies, who are also former members of the NHS running teams, are also joined, and are doing the half marathon, along with several members of the current NHS cross country

team, which includes our youngest son Jack.”

As one of only two National Ambassadors for the Muscular Dystrophy Association, this race will be is an opportunity to both build lasting memories with her own family, and also to help touch the lives of others.

“We hope to raise awareness, and obviously funding for the MDA to continue their quest to improve the lives of those living with neuromuscular diseases and ALS,” Shinneman said. “MDA is the nation’s largest nonprofit supporter of neuromuscular disease research. We had some team shirts and hats made, and

also are giving shirts to those who donate while supplies last. It has been fun to see our teammates and donors sporting their Humbly Courageous gear.”

# Carmel K9 Jax gets new body armor

Carmel Police Department’s K9 Jax has received a bullet and stab protective vest thanks to a charitable donation from non-profit organization Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. The vest was sponsored by Don and Misty Fike of Galesburg, Ill., and was embroidered with the sentiment “Born to Love-Trained to Serve-Loyal Always.”

K9 Jax is a Dutch Malinois that began his service with the Carmel Police Department June 4, 2022. He serves as a patrol dog, with specialized training in narcotics detection. His handler is Officer Branden Owens.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., established in 2009, is a 501(c)(3) charity whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. This potentially lifesaving body armor for four-legged K9 officers is U.S. made, custom fitted, and certified by the National Institute of Justice. Since its inception, Vested Interest in

K9s, Inc. has provided more than 4,845 vests to K9s in all 50 states at a value of \$6.9 million, made possible by both private and corporate donations.

The program is open to U.S. dogs that are at least 20 months old and actively employed and certified with law enforcement or related agencies. K9s with expired vests are also eligible to participate. There are an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. accepts tax-deductible contributions in any amount, while a single donation of \$960 will sponsor one vest. Each vest has a value of \$1,744 to \$2,283, weighs an average of four to five pounds, and comes with a five-year warranty.

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

Community preparedness is essential to ensuring Hamilton County is ready for emergencies and disasters.

It can be hard to know where to start or make time for preparedness. Sure, you can buy some super expensive prepper kits off Amazon, but more importantly, making preparedness a priority will pay dividends when an emergency strikes.

To help county residents focus on community preparedness, Hamilton County Emergency Management (HCEM) has announced Monica Peterson, Community Outreach and Volunteer Coordinator, will move to a new full-time position. She served in a part-time role over the past few years. She bolstered volunteer programs, created new emergency preparedness workshops, and expanded outreach to kids at special events.

“Everything we do in emergency management revolves around community preparedness,” Peterson said. “With our volunteers’

help, we can participate in various events where we can talk to individuals and families about how they can be prepared.”

“Hopefully, the Internet never goes down or the cell towers lose connectivity, but if they do, having a weather radio, which works for all types of emergencies, will ensure you have the information you need,” Peterson said.

The website [Ready.gov](#) has sample plans, checklists for kits, preparedness information for kids, and much more.

“I am incredibly grate-

ful to the support from the County Council for seeing the value in what Monica has done for Hamilton County,” HCEM Executive Director Shane Booker said.

He explained that council members worked very hard to organize, and many other students also were involved.

Officers in every building.

Regarding finances, the district reported that the total property tax rate is expected to decrease for the fourth year in a row. The schools are in good financial health with a balanced budget, an increased credit rating, and secure savings.

Hile also noted that referendums are a critical component of Indiana school funding and that the current operating referendum is set to expire in 2026. He emphasized the district’s commitment to being a transparent and responsible steward of taxpayer dollars.

Labor shortages and competitive compensation continue to be major challenges for the schools. The district currently has over 40 support staff positions, like instructional assistants and custodians, that they are unable to fill. Noblesville Schools is the largest employer in Noblesville.

Hile also reported that the spread of false school information continues to be a challenge and encouraged the public to seek information through the district’s website, board meetings, official district social media and local news media. He stated that

he is committed to transparency and invited the public to contact school staff, including him directly, regarding any school questions or concerns.

Updates on several construction projects were covered, all of which will be funded through bonds (loans) and will not use referendum dollars or raise the tax rate.

- The grand opening of the new Beaver Stadium took place earlier this summer and the venue, which is 50 percent larger than the former field, has seen record fan attendance.
- The high school’s new tennis complex opened recently across the street from Noblesville East Middle School, increasing the district’s overall court capacity by 50 percent for this growing program.
- Updates/expansions are currently taking place at NHS (athletic and office spaces) and Promise Road Elementary (additional classrooms). Both schools have over-capacity enrollment.

The address wrapped up by celebrating Noblesville’s Teachers of the Year and multiple state and national recognitions in athletics, music, and academics.

learn more about their platforms.

When logging onto [Vote411.org](#), simply enter your address, and all the information on the next page will be tailored to your area. The page includes election dates, links for first-time voters and links to check registrations. Some precincts may have changed due to recent redistricting, so double check your polling locations.

You will see descriptions of the offices, then photos and bios of the candidates who responded to the league’s request for info. Dick said each candidate was sent a survey by email or mail, and their responses were entered by their own representatives. The league does not edit candidate responses.

You’ll see your precinct and your Nov. 8 voting location, and lists of each race, candidates’ responses and other questions on your ballot. You can read about the requirements of each office and compare candidates’ statements with a handy selection tool.

Vote411 has been updated in time for early in-person voting, now through Nov. 7 at various locations in Hamilton County. [Vote411.org](#) connects you with this information when you are on its Indiana page. From there, you can find links to the Hamilton County early voting dates and locations, or you can go directly to the Hamilton County election office’s website for that info.

On your personalized ballot, you also will see township and school board races and candidates. Westfield voters will be able to review the Westfield Washington Schools operating referendum. They will be asked to vote yes or no on this option.

“There’s a lot of attention paid to the federal races, but local township and school boards impact our lives as much, if not more,” Dick said.

Her research shows that many voters opt for straight-party tickets. In those cases, voters may not see the referendum question, the school board races or other local options.

However you choose to vote, Dick and the league members encourage you to make a voting plan that includes researching the races and measures before casting a ballot. [Vote411.org](#) is a good first step for that, she advised.

[Vote411.org](#) is free and nonpartisan in keeping with the League of Women Voters’ mission as an organization that encourages informed and active participation in government. ## Westfield’s historic log cabin set to open soon

An historic cabin in Westfield will finally open in November after it was nearly lost.

Westfield Washington Historical Society (WWHS) President Diana Peyton said, “It’s a part of our history, it’s a part of us, [and] it’s a part of me.”

Now, the historical society is doing whatever it can to keep it in their community.

According to WWHS, in the 1830s Nicholas Barker built this cabin for his wife and 11 children. The Barker family moved from North Carolina to Indiana in search of a better life.

“They decided that they’d go west for fertile and more down to earth living and get out of the war area and out of the slavery area,” Peyton said. “Some of our logs are 26 to 28 inches and these were logs from the community out by Shady Nook Road, and of course they chopped the tree down. You see the hack marks where they actually split the log and hacked it.”

“This gentleman had 11 children,” WWHS Program Director James Peyton said. “Some of his children married into families that were involved in the Underground Railroad, so they didn’t write it down. It was against the law.”

The cabin stood inside a barn along Shady Nook Road for about 200 years until plans were made to tear it down for city development.

With help from the community, the organization raised thousands of dollars to preserve the cabin. It was moved to Penn Street, and after a long pause during the pandemic, WWHS is getting ready to open it to the public as an educational center in November.

“It’s a huge thing to honor the pioneers of this community that came in here,” James Peyton said. “This was just a wilderness when they came here and to build the foundation of the city that we have now is really something to be excited about.”

# Jocelyn Vare shines light on domestic violence

Fishers City Councilor and candidate for Indiana State Senate Jocelyn Vare spoke at the Hamilton County Democratic Party headquarters in Carmel on Friday, Oct. 28 to build a brighter future for women and girls across the state. Vare will join fellow Democratic leaders who will be signing the “Contract with Women” in solidarity for Indiana’s future.

As part of her pledge, Vare shared her personal experience as a domestic violence survivor.

“Domestic Violence is a public safety issue that affects one in three women in their lifetime,” Vare said.

“As a survivor, I am speaking openly about domestic violence so that Indiana can become a safer place for all women.”

On a recent Fox59 segment that recognized October as Domestic Violence Month, Vare appeared with Hamilton County Deputy Prosecutor Jessica Paxson. Vare told her personal story and experience with Prevail. Prevail is Hamilton County’s advocate and service provider for people experiencing life with an abuser. Vare relied on Prevail in 2010 and is grateful to the Fishers Police Department for their referral to the organization’s free and confidential services. She also experienced firsthand how vital safe and secure housing is for survivors.

“To be safe, my kids and I needed to find an immediate and secure place to stay,”



Vare said. “We had to travel to another county because there were no emergency housing options for us locally.”

Through Hamilton County’s purchase of land and dedication of design funding, plans have begun for safe housing to be constructed. It will be Hamilton County’s first housing option for domestic violence survivors.

“I celebrate the plan to offer safe housing in Hamilton County to survivors,” emphasizes Vare. “I also recognize twelve years have passed since my kids and I needed safe housing in Ham-

ilton County. This is overdue. When Indiana does not prioritize women, it harms the entire community. A commitment to women is a commitment to community.”

Vare’s signature on the “Contract with Women” also includes commitments to repeal Indiana’s abortion ban, codifying the right to birth control and other contraceptives, fixing Indiana’s maternal mortality rate, passing legitimate workplace protections for women – especially pregnant women, repealing the state’s high taxes on hygiene products, addressing

the state’s childcare crisis, and creating a statewide Pre-K system for children.

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
Getting to know my birth father

About that white towel

As my adoption and reunion story continues, I’ve changed some names, places, and dates.

I told Jack about the Notre Dame alumni publication that started the path that led me to find him. I could almost see him rolling his eyes on the other end of the line.

“Oh, there are a lot of stories associated with that,” he commented. “But that will have to be for another time.”



I went on to tell Jack about my family and a little about growing up. He asked some questions about my sons, Jonathon and Jacob. I also let him know about the dilemma with my mother – how she hadn’t supported the idea of me trying to find my birthparents. He was sorry to hear about my struggle on that issue.

Jack shared some information with me about his life. He was originally from Evansville, but he and his family moved to Indianapolis not long after he was born. He did indeed have eight brothers and sisters, and Jack was the youngest boy. One sister had passed away at age 68 due to cancer and one brother had died in an automobile accident when he was young.

“I probably have more than 25 nieces and nephews and over 30 great nieces and nephews,” he said. It was hard for me to wrap my head around the thought of such a big family, although my maternal grandfather did have 10 brothers and sisters. I remembered that their reunions had been enormous.

When we did chat again a couple of weeks later, the hope that had led me to write to him became a reality.

Perhaps at a local coffee shop?” I felt dizzy hearing his question and was grateful I was sitting down.

“Yes!” I exclaimed. “I would like that very much.” I hope I didn’t sound overly eager. But this was yet another dream come true for me.

It was so difficult to not run around the house in excitement after I hung up minutes later. I wanted to share the great news with not only my husband John, but my sons as well. But I was still nervous at that point about burdening them with such a big secret as teenagers.

In just three weeks, I was going to meet my birth father. I could hardly wait.

I sat there looking at it. I’m not sure what I expected to happen. I just had to do it. I threw in the towel, the white towel of surrender.

It lay there in a heap. That towel represented how I was feeling. I was a crumpled mess.

There lay the crumpled towel. Some-



# How does Medicare change when you move to Florida? When short hair was illegal

Medicare and Social Security are federal programs. You'll receive the same benefits no matter what state that you live in. Don't confuse this with Medicaid, which is very different in every state.

Private Medicare insurance prices are based on the state of your residency. The prices typically go up if you retire to Florida. But, hey, no state income tax!

Medicare Advantage plans can vary greatly from one state to another, and you may get better benefits or reduced benefits. Typically, Florida has very rich plans as it is ground central for retirees, and Medicare Advantage companies are

The amount of Social Security benefits you draw isn't impacted by moving around the country. You can even live out of the country and continue to receive your Social Security checks in many western nations.

"What if I remain a resident of Indiana but spend six months in Florida?" This gets a bit murky. Basically, you are going to choose which state you want to be a resident of and report that address to Medicare. People think if they own real estate in one state, they must be a resident of that state. Many own real estate in several states.

There are many different indicators that can lead to you declaring one state as your residence over another. Typically, you must live in that state for at least six months, register to vote and get your driver's license in that state. People have tried to play fast and loose with

these residency rules and lie to Medicare about where they really spend most of the year. Don't try to save a little money on your Medicare insurance premiums by telling the company you still reside in Indiana. If you later have a claim, they can deny the claim!

Before you move, contact your Medicare specialist to get your plans adjusted before you arrive in your new home. A lady was moving to Florida last year and wanted to wait until she got settled into her new Florida condo before she changed her Medicare insurance. There is a grace period, so you don't have to do it before you move. Tragically, this client had a massive stroke the very day that she moved to Florida. I have a trove of sad stories like this, which is why I urge you, if you are moving, take care of your insurance before you go.

# Sheridan Fire Dept. receives DNR grant

Eighty rural and volunteer fire departments from 50 Hoosier counties have been awarded more than \$351,000 in Volunteer Fire Assistance grants. Locally, the Sheridan Volunteer Fire Department received \$2,367.50 to help with water handling. The grants are administered by the DNR Division of Forestry and made available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service. # It’s a great day to be a Miller

Whenever a Noblesville High School team wins, someone from the athletic department says “It’s a great day to be a Miller.”

And Saturday, Oct. 29, 2022, will probably be the best day ever to be a Miller.

Noblesville won three IHSAA state championships on Saturday, the first school ever to achieve such a remarkable feat. The Millers started their run with a victory at the cross country state finals at the LaVern Gibson Championship Cross Country Course in Terre Haute. Noblesville scored 122 points to win its first-ever state title in that sport.

After that, the Millers’ focus turned to IUPUI’s Michael Carroll Stadium in Indianapolis for the soccer state finals. The Noblesville boys went first, and they defended their Class 3A state championship with a 1-0 victory over Columbus North.

The Millers girls soccer team then had its turn. Noblesville beat Carmel 1-0 to win the 3A girls state title, which marked the third state championship in four years for the Millers. Noblesville also became the second school to sweep the boys and girls soccer state championship in the same season.

All in all, it was a great day to be a Miller.

**Carmel Boys XC, HSE Volleyball are winners**

The Carmel boys cross country team also stepped into the winner’s circle last Saturday by winning a state championship in Terre Haute. The Greyhounds held off Zionsville by three points, 103-106, to claim their record-extending 17th state title, and their first since 2018.

Meanwhile, the Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team is going back to the state finals. The Royals played the Class 4A north semi-state last Saturday at Frankfort’s Case Arena, and swept Lake Central to earn a place at state. Southeastern will take on Yorktown this Saturday in the 4A state championship.



## Soccer — Noblesville boys & girls sweep at state finals

**INDIANAPOLIS**—The mood was celebratory and the smiles were big, but the players on the Noblesville boys soccer team had to hustle off the field minutes after defending their Class 3A state championship by beating Columbus North 1-0 last Saturday.

They had another game to watch, after all. As the boys were leaving, the Noblesville girls soccer team was marching on to the field to play in the 3A girls state title game, against its old rival Carmel.

The Millers girls made it a sweep at IUPUI’s Michael Carroll Stadium, beating the Greyhounds 1-0. That gave Noblesville its third state title in four years, and it became the second school to have both its boys and girls team win state championships during the same season.

While the result was the

same for both teams, the situations were a little different. The Millers girls had several players with experience, including Ohio State commit and Miss Soccer candidate Ava Bramblett, who scored the winning goal for Noblesville. The boys, meanwhile, had graduated several players for last year’s title-winning team.

“The fact that we had one returning starter and we still have another state championship under our belt is just phenomenal,” said Millers boys coach Ken Dollaske. “It’s an entire program, it’s an entire culture. Our JV programs, both JV Black and JV Gold, always have tremendous seasons. A lot of our starters last year were on the JV program and they saw the success that we had and they knew that they wanted that as well.”

**Experienced goal**

Ultimately, the goal-scorer for the Noblesville boys turned out to be a player with state champion-

ship experience. Senior Jake Johns put the ball in the net for the Millers during the game’s 17th minute, with senior Sam Divis providing the assist.

“It came to me, and then

Jake was just screaming my name,” said Divis. “I looked over to him and he was under me. And I had full trust in Jake to finish that away and he did.”

Johns said scoring the

goal was like something one dreams about when he was a little kid.

“Just scoring, and then running to the camera and stuff,” said Johns. He said that getting the goal was an

“undescrivable” relief, and since the Millers were now up 1-0, “we’ve still got the rest of the game left to push through.”

The Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team is heading back to the IHSAA state finals.

The Royals punched their ticket to Ball State’s Worthen Arena by sweeping Lake Central last Saturday afternoon at the Class 4A north semi-state at Frankfort’s Case Arena. Southeastern won 25-15, 25-13, 25-23.

Royals coach Jason Young said the game plan was just “try to be who we’ve been all year.” That included being “big at the net, attack and continue to attack, bring the defensive energy,” said Young.

The coach thought his team did that in the first two sets. Lake Central gave Southeastern resistance in

the third set before the Royals were able to prevail by two points.

“They made us earn every single point down the stretch,” said Young. “It was a great fight. It was a great test for us. Really excited that we were able to prevail there in the third set 25-23.”

Avery Hobson led the Southeastern offense with 15 kills, while Lindsey Mangelson put down 11 kills and Lauren Harden hit 10. Macy Hinshaw and Tiffany Snook both served two aces, with Hinshaw also dishing out 21 assists. Ava Hunter handed out 16 assists.

Sophie Ledbetter collected 13 digs. Hobson made five block assists, while Snook had four block assists.

The Royals are now 32-1 for the season and will take

on Yorktown at 7 p.m. Saturday for the Class 4A state championship. The Tigers won the 4A south semi-state at Columbus East by beating Floyd Central in four sets, 25-11, 23-25, 25-21, 25-16. This will be Southeastern’s second appearance in the 4A state finals. The Royals also qualified for state in 2019.

And Noblesville did push through the second half, even in the face of constant pressure by the Bull Dogs. Both teams had seven shots in the first half, but Columbus North outshot the Millers 8-4 in the second half. The Bull Dogs played to the end, getting one last chance with 30 seconds left, but Noblesville was able to hang on. Millers goalkeeper Cole Thompson collected five saves during the game.

“Honestly, we wanted to make sure that we just contained as much as possible, and defensively, just move our feet,” said Dolaske. “Don’t stay up. Don’t dive in. For that, we always want to be the first team to win those 50-50 aerial balls, and I think that we did that, which helps us relieve some of that pressure.”

**Dream result**

The girls state title game was nothing but pressure. The Millers’ offense kept firing throughout all 80 minutes, with 25 total shots in the game. Sophomore Meredith Tippner led with 11 shots; both she and Bramblett had three shots on goal.

The Millers were able to break through in the game’s 36th minute, when Bramblett kicked the ball in from a few yards out. Bramblett called winning the state championship the “dream result.”

“We’ve got three trophies at the end of our career, and it’s the greatest way it could’ve ended for the goal,” said Bramblett. “It doesn’t matter whoever scores. That’s all we need. I was just happy that I was able to put one home and help our team to a victory that we’ve all had the goal

from day one to achieve.”

Bramblett had been dealing with injuries during the season, and had to come off the field briefly at times, but there was no way she was staying off the field in a state championship game.

“Her teammates mean that much to her,” said Millers coach Mike Brady, who also said that Bramblett wanted to do everything she could so her teammates “could feel that success that she felt her freshman year. And she was a big part of that freshman year championship,” which the Millers won in 2019.

“And she wanted everybody to have that feeling,” said Brady. “That’s just how unselfish she is.”

Noblesville took the 1-0 lead into halftime, but senior Meskerem James said “that means nothing” because there were still 40 minutes left to play. Indeed, Carmel continued to press the Millers all the way through the second half, but Noblesville was able to hang on. Bella Wyatt had three saves.

“Carmel is an amazing team,” said James. “They give us a battle every time we play them.” The two teams met in the regular season, with Noblesville winning 3-1.

“Each team just keeps getting better every year,” said James. “It’s tough to play against them. So we just play together and come out as a team.” James said the team left it all on the field – “Today was the last game, we just put everything on the field,” she said.

Noblesville finished its season with a 20-1 record.

The Greyhounds had six shots for the game, with Sophia Shepherd making three of those shots. Goalkeeper Aubree Empie had seven saves, and won the Mental Attitude Award at the conclusion of the meet.

“I practice and work hard every day, and the team also helps me workout every day. I try to keep a positive attitude, because mentally, that’s what helps us win games,” said Empie.

The senior also reflected on how the team improved over the season.

“I don’t think really thought we were going to be here after our first game,” said Empie. “And I think we proved everyone wrong. We just worked our butts off. We played hard. We worked hard every practice, every game.”

Carmel finished its season 18-3-2.

“I thought it was one of the better games I’ve seen in a long, long time,” said Greyhounds coach Frank Dixon. “Our kids gave it everything, their kids gave it everything.”

Dixon said there were “a lot of good players on that field. It was pretty sensational.”

Immediately after the

# “For me, it’s big”: Shamrocks best ‘Hounds for first time in 66 years

**CARMEL** – A strong offense and a stellar defensive effort drove the Westfield football team to a historic win last Friday.

The Shamrocks beat Carmel 28-9 in a Class 6A Sectional 4 semi-final game at Carmel Stadium.

There was a bit of back-and-forth between the No. 6-ranked Greyhounds and the No. 9-ranked ‘Rocks in the first quarter, but Westfield used its running game to steadily distance itself from Carmel as the game went on.

It was the first time the Shamrocks had beaten the Greyhounds since 1956 – “I just assumed it was never,” said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert – and sent them into the Sectional 4 championship game. The ‘Rocks will host Noblesville Friday.

“We talk a lot about, hey, we don’t want to just have had a good team,” said Gilbert. “We want to be a great program. Not a great team, a great program that every single year, you have to count on us to be a factor in 6A. That’s what we’re trying to become. We have our own standards. I’m really proud of how we’re building our team. Our kids worked very hard. I thought they were fearless tonight and really wanted it, and I was really proud of the effort, just the relentless effort.”

Carmel got on the board first, with a 36-yard field goal by Ben Spon-

sler midway through the first quarter. Westfield answered in its next series, using short runs and a handful of passes by quarterback Cole Ballard to get down to the 15-yard line. Maximus Nosler took it from there with back-to-back runs, the latter of which was an eight-yard jog into the end zone.

The Shamrocks would score a touchdown in each of the four quarters, and never trailed again after Nosler’s score. Sponsler kicked a 31-yard field goal midway through the second period to cut the lead to 7-6, and the ‘Hounds got the ball back after a three-and-out.

But Westfield’s defense stopped the drive when Andrew Lieske caught an interception in the end zone. That gave the ‘Rocks the ball at their 20, and they moved quickly down the field. Sophomore Kendall Garnett finished the drive with a 16-yard touchdown run.

“For me it’s big,” said Garnett. “I’m a sophomore playing varsity. Me and my team, we just went out there today and we just told ourselves that hey, we’re going to go out there and fight this battle hard, and we’re going to execute every play and we’re going to dominate on defense. And that’s what we did.”

Westfield led 14-6 at halftime. The third quarter followed the same pattern: Carmel made a drive down to the red zone, and Sponsler kicked a 29-yard field goal. The Shamrocks answered with a long

drive that resulted in a touchdown, with Garnett and Ballard trading runs. Ballard got the score this time, on a five-yard rush.

Ballard said the victory was “a testament to our coaches.” He and the other Shamrocks knew Carmel would be fired up to start the second half.

“Coach Gilbert said the next four or five minutes will be the best football they can give you,” said Ballard. “And they definitely gave it to us.” Carmel held the ‘Rocks to a three-and-out to start the half, and Ballard said the ‘Hounds were giving the Westfield defense trouble.

“We knew that was going to be the hardest part,” said Ballard. “But once we got rolling again, we were ready.”

Westfield’s final drive of the game started with

24.3 seconds left in the third period, and finished with 7:32 left in the fourth, when Garnett made a four-yard run for his second score of the game. Brody Boehm made all four extra-point kicks.

Garnett totaled 147 yards rushing for the game, while Ballard had 52 yards on the ground. Ballard had a fine passing game, going 7-of-14 for 92 yards.

Carmel quarterback Jack Kazmierczak played well for the ‘Hounds, with a 16-of-25 effort totaling 151 yards. Alijah Alfayyad was Carmel’s top rusher compiling 71 yards.

“Hats off to Westfield,” said Hebert. “They played really well and they did a good job preparing. They earned this victory.”

Westfield improved to 7-3 with the victory.

# Millers quench sectional thirst

## Noblesville headed to sectional championship for first time since 2001

**NOBLESVILLE** – The Noblesville football team knew it would be a tall task as the Millers faced yet another Hoosier Crossroads Conference opponent in the state tournament.

The Millers used a dominant rushing attack in the first half and swarming defense throughout the game en route to a Class 6A Sectional 4 semifinal win over Zionsville 35-10 last Friday at Beaver Stadium. Noblesville football had lost its previous nine sectional openers. Prior to last night, the Millers’ last sectional win was in 2012. Those streaks are now over.

Noblesville wasted very little time on the opening drive of the game, marching 81 yards on nine plays for its first score. Gage Gulley finished it off, breaking free from an Eagle defender for a 13-yard touchdown.

“This game was different from the last game, because we

had first down success. That’s really what the game came down to on offense and defense,” said Noblesville head coach Dave Sharpe.

The Millers forced Zionsville to punt after four plays on their first set of downs. Then it only took Noblesville four plays on its next possession to get their next score. Logan Shoffner found a hole and bounced outside the tackles, sprinting 66 yards to the end zone for the touchdown.

After the Eagles turned the ball over on downs at the 11, the Millers put together another great drive. Noblesville went 89 yards, capping it off with Blake Widget diving up the middle for a three-score lead at 21-0.

The Eagles had another opportunity in the middle of the second quarter to get something going offensively, but they were intercepted by Noblesville linebacker Trey Speck.

“They played a full 48 and some of those deep balls were right on the money and at the

last second, guys like Christ Degni and Trey Speck just swatting down,” stated Sharpe.

# Rob Cutter ‘84 to be inducted into Noblesville Hall of Fame

The Noblesville High School Athletic Hall of Fame Executive Committee has announced that Rob Cutter, a 1984 NHS graduate, will be inducted into its Class of 2023.

Cutter earned letters in both football and basketball for three years. He was the quarterback for the Millers football team, throwing for 3,413 yards (third on the all-time Noblesville yardage list) and 22 touchdowns. Cutter was twice named as First-Team All-County and All-Conference. During his football career, the Millers had three winning seasons, going 8-2 his senior year (1983).

In basketball, Cutter was a three-year starter and an integral part of Noblesville’s 1983-84 team that was undefeated in the regular season. Cutter played on three sectional championship teams, and was named to the All-County, All-Sectional and All-Regional teams. During his playing career, Noblesville compiled a 53-16 record.

Cutter went on to play football at Butler University, graduating in 1988. He then went on to a very successful football coaching career, where he was an assistant at Lebanon (1988-1990) and Franklin Central (1990-92) before getting promoted to head coach for the Flashes. Cutter was in that position from 1992-95, winning a sectional title in 1993 and compiling a 30-13 record.

In 1995, Cutter enjoyed a long run as the head coach at Hamilton Southeastern, where he supervised the team through the 2006 season. During his run, the Royals finished as state runners-up twice, in Class 4A in 1997, and in Class 5A in 2005. Southeastern won sectional titles in 1995, 1997, 1998 and 2005, as well as five conference championships. Cutter was 132-49 as a coach at HSE, and was inducted into the Indiana Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2021.

Cutter will be formally inducted during the Noblesville boys basketball team’s varsity basketball game with on Jan. 7, 2023.

through the air, totaling 201 yards. Cooper Vondersaar made eight of those catches.

The Millers amassed 426 yards rushing on 55 carries for a stout 7.7 yards per rush and 18 first downs on the ground. Shoffner led the way with 149 yards on 10 rushes and two touchdowns. Bellan had 95 yards on 10 carries, while Guley added 75 yards on just seven runs with a touchdown and Widget had 31 yards and a TD.

Noblesville (4-6) will be playing for just its first sectional championship since 2001. The Millers and Westfield will play for the Sectional 4 championship at the No. 9 Shamrocks’ River-view Health Stadium (7-3) Friday.
