Corey-Jacob first started attending Brooke's Place after his sister died by suicide. "She struggled to find the light, as I did," he said. "The reason I'm still here is because I found that light. I got counseling, found help, found Brooke's Place."

Julie Rockwood is a former Brooke's Place mom, intern, and current volunteer. Following the death of her husband and mom due to cancer, Julie's daughter participated in the Brooke's Place community outreach program, BP8. After seeing the impact that Brooke's Place had on the children participating, Julie decided to become more involved. "All of a sudden, I heard in-

side me, this was something I could do," she said.

Unresolved childhood grief can substantially increase the likelihood of depression, substance abuse, and poor school performance. Brooke's Place provides families and children hope and healing during their grief journey. In 2021, Brooke's Place provided grief support and education to 2,708 individuals. After attending Brooke's Place, 93 percent of therapy clients, 97 percent of Camp Healing Tree participants, 96 percent of BP8 participants, and 87 percent of ongoing grief support group participants reported having increased coping skills.

Therapists, volunteers, and staff at Brooke's Place work tirelessly toward their vision of children, teens, young adults, and their families living with grief feeling safe, supported and understood.

While we all enjoy the splendid sights this season offers us, we may not enjoy the cleanup the season of autumn entails. Once those leaves have given us their final visual treat and fall to the ground, many of us are left with a yard full of dead leaves that require a considerable amount of work. Have you ever realized that these once beautiful sparks of painted colors in our trees could be just the organic component our gardens could use to thrive?

Composting leaves is an inexpensive and valuable way to get nutrients to your garden. Composting is a mixture of ingredients used to improve soil. There are varieties of things that you can do that add nutrients to the soil in your garden such as coffee grounds or decomposed food, but what about leaves? Composting leaves may come with its challenges. The two biggest issues people run into with composting leaves are that they become matted, and they can take a long time to break down. When leaves mat, it makes it difficult to work with them, so shredding them is an essential step.

You probably either rake your leaves the old school way or you drop the mulching blade of your lawn mower and run them over. Either way, place the leaves in a container such as a trashcan. Adding organic matter containing nitrogen like grass clippings will further enhance the quality of the compost you yield. If you raked your leaves, you will want to shred your leaves a bit.

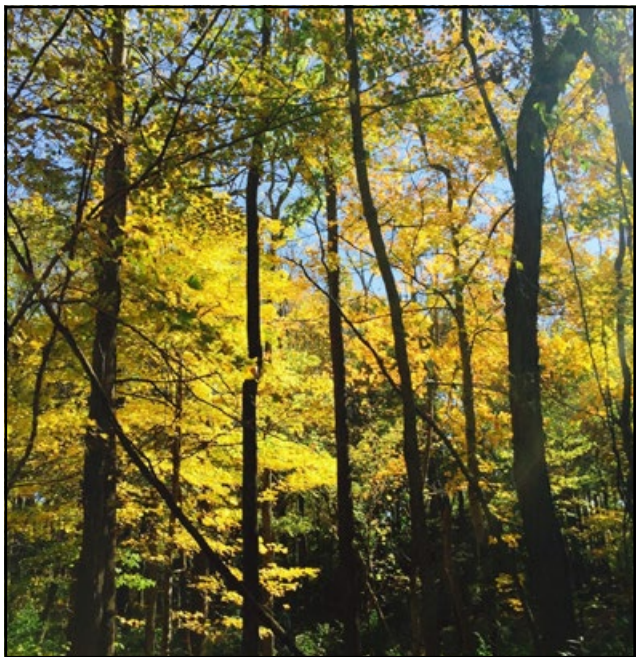

Placing leaves out in the sun will help speed up the process of them breaking down. While you can add the leaves in this state to the soil in your garden, it is best if you place them in a trash bag to allow a bit of moisture to develop on the leaves.


According to [the-compost-gardener.com](http://the-compost-gardener.com), "Leaves contain varying amounts of lignin which is extremely resistant to decomposition. Usually, a year or two is needed to fully decompose leaves." Some examples of leaves that are useful when trying to compost include ash, cherry, elm, linden, maple, and poplar, so be on the lookout if you have those varieties in your yard!

Leaves are one of the best amendments you can add to the soil in your garden. Worms also love them and help break them down

further! Leaves help retain water in our gardens, which is great for our plants. Broken down matter of leaves helps promote healthy fungal growth in our gardens. Depending on the size of your yard and the number of leaves you have, it may not even be feasible to compost all your leaves, but I encourage you to take advantage of this free resource for the soil in your garden and at least try it with some of your leaves this season!

Nature is speaking to us. Everywhere we turn; nature is dancing around her sunburnt leaves, asking us to return what we can to the earth and our gardens. Are you listening?

require attention to detail and an ongoing collaboration between the county parks department, the state agency and the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers to make sure that the necessary guidelines were followed.

“It required a great deal of patience from all parties involved, knowing that the foundation for future such funding was being formed during this process,” said Tom Laycock, Director of the DNR Division of Land Acquisition, which runs the program.

As land throughout the county is being rapidly rezoned and developed for both commercial and residential use, county officials and park leadership felt it was imperative to secure this property, knowing it holds the potential to provide county residents and visitors with a distinctive park experience. With the involvement of state partners and agencies, such as the DNR, land such as this – previously impacted by development and farming – has the potential to be restored and protected for the natural benefits it offers not only today, but for generations to come.

HCPR Director Chris Stice praised the importance of securing the funding.

Parks feels blessed to be able to procure and preserve this ecological asset on behalf of our county and community,” Stice said. “The department’s intent is to restore the property’s wetlands and stream corridor and expand the existing prairie. Appropriate reforestation measures will also be taken. We are looking to strategically develop and maintain trails on the property, as well.

By restoring the quality of

the land’s natural habitat, we are remaining true to our departmental mission of providing high quality passive parks and serving as responsible stewards of the land entrusted to us.”

HCPR’s leadership team is working with its parks board and a professional consulting firm to identify the best use of the land, consistent with the parks department’s mission. Part of the planning will include soliciting community feed-

back through a variety of communication channels, including public meetings. No timeline for work on the project has been set yet.

Addressing our state’s pressing health challenges

It’s clear Indiana needs to do more to address our greatest health challenges, especially with the high prevalence of obesity, smoking and other chronic conditions. That’s why the state is partnering with local organizations to tackle issues head on through the Health Issues and Challenges Grant program.

Funding is available to local and statewide service providers and planning organizations, and I encourage them to apply. Grants can be used to prevent or reduce mental and physical health issues for Hoosiers, including in the areas of tobacco use, food insecurity, obesity, lead exposure, hepatitis C, and chronic diseases such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease, asthma and cancer. Applications must be completed online at [in.gov/health/grant-opportunities](#) by Nov. 18.

In 2021, I co-authored [legislation](#) to create the grant program so local providers like Aspire Indiana Health can apply for and receive funding to help improve outcomes. In June, Indiana released its first round of grant funding totaling more than \$35 million.

In this first round, Aspire received funds to implement an at-home cardiovascular monitoring program for at-

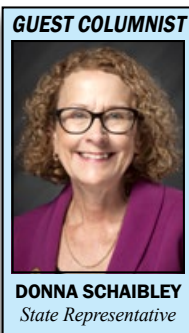
risk individuals. Other local providers like the Heart and Soul Clinic, the Hamilton County Health Department and Teter Organic Farm also received funds. Statewide organizations that serve

our local communities received grants, including the National Kidney Foundation of Indiana, the Indiana Rural Health Association, the Health Foundation of Greater Indianapolis, Health By Design and the Indiana Breastfeeding Coalition.

Hoosiers facing health challenges need access to resources to live happy, healthy lives. As a member of the House Public Health Committee, I will continue to look for new and innovative ways to improve our state’s overall health. # Fishers opens applications for 2023 arts, culture & neighborhood vibrancy grants

The City of Fishers is now accepting applications its 2023 grant programs, including the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission Grant and the Neighborhood Vibrancy Grant. Fishers’ grant programs aim to cultivate creativity, vibrancy, and a sense of place within the community.

Now in its third year, the Arts & Culture Commission Grant invests in artists, art organizations, and cultural events that foster a city where arts and culture activities are a vital component of community life.

Since 2021, the Commission has distributed over \$92,000 in funds to 28 projects or organiza-

tions. The grant is administered by the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission (FACC) and funds are allocated from the City of Fishers’ annual budget. Grant funds range from \$1,000 to \$7,500 and projects must take place within the City of Fishers boundaries. No match is required. Applications for the 2023 grant cycle are due Dec. 18, 2023.

“The Commission is proud to announce its third consecutive grant program,” said David Decker, Chair of the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission. “This year we have raised the grant up to \$7,500 per grantee. We look forward to seeing more impactful projects across Fishers and within the Nickel

Plate District. Since starting the grant in 2021, we have many innovative projects including public performances, gallery exhibits, public art installations, and more. We look forward to another year of incredible applications from the Fishers art community.”

The Neighborhood Vibrancy Grant, formerly known as the Neighborhood Matching Grant, provides funding for creative and innovative ideas that make our community a more beautiful place to live, and that will impact the lives of our community at large in a smart, vibrant, and entrepreneurial manner. The matching grant program awards a maximum amount of \$5,000 and appli-

cants must provide at least 50 percent of the total project cost. Neighborhoods, homeowners’ associations, nonprofits, and homeowners within City limits are invited to apply.

Last year, eligibility was expanded to include community engagement initiatives that contribute to neighborhood vibrancy, such as community gardens, playground, and community gathering hubs. Awarded projects included replacing invasives with native species in neighborhood landscaping, installing new playground equipment, adding benches in common areas, and converting a pasture to a native prairie

to support pollinators and wildlife. Applications for the 2023 grant cycle are due Jan. 31, 2023.

“We are excited to open this year’s Neighborhood Vibrancy Grant application,” said Megan Vukovich, Director of Planning & Zoning for the City of Fishers. “For the 2023 grant cycle we have taken away the requirement that recipients are only eligible once every three years. Any neighborhood will be eligible for funding, regardless of previous year’s awardees. We hope this encourages a competitive process where applicants pursue innovative projects that help keep Fishers a vibrant

community. In addition to beautification, we encourage groups to pursue sustainable initiatives that help HOAs reduce maintenance costs over time.”

Along with these grant programs, the City of Fishers accepts applications year-round for its Stormwater Grant Program. The grant incentivizes neighborhoods, non-profits, and homeowners within city limits to improve local water quality and/or drainage function. Applicants are eligible for up to a 50 percent match from the city.

## Carmel voter sick of “false allegations” made to influence local elections

Unfortunately, after Carmel school board candidates announced their intent to run, social media and letters to the editor have been fraught with misinformation in a blatant attempt to influence voters. It is so sad to see members of our community putting their desire to “win” a school board race above their own personal integrity.

While the areas of focus for these lies and misrepresentations have been numerous, one of the most ridiculous and absurd has been the claims that candidates are receiving and accepting “national” or “dark” money from Political Action Committees (PACs) and other concerning sources. These claims have been made against the campaign of Jenny Brake, Greg Brown, and Adam Sharp (BBS) by members of the community ranging from the former Superintendent of Carmel Clay Schools (CCS), founders and supporters of a local “grassroots” Political Action Committee focused on the school board election and other parents of children who attend CCS.

Ironically enough, when the Hamilton County Campaign Finance Reports were published online last week, EVERY SINGLE DONATION received by the BBS candidates were donations from individuals. There were certainly donations

from out of state family members and friends, but a vast majority of these donations were from local individuals. This information demonstrates that ALL the misguided, ill-conceived, and nefarious claims that have been made against these candidates regarding funding are completely false.

To go further as it relates to PAC funding, there are four candidates who are supported and funded by local PACs. There is also one candidate who has received and accepted money from a state level PAC and used a national, partisan PAC for fundraising. 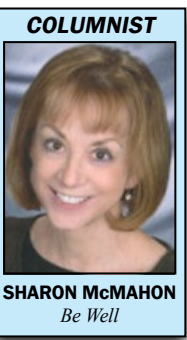
## We live in best of times for nutrition & fitness

Let's examine the "best of times" as it relates to our nutrition and fitness issues of today. Never in human history have we had the access as we do today to detailed anatomical information and what constitutes good nutrition, healthy lifestyles, and a sound physical body. Granted, in my opinion, there is just a bit too much "expertise" out there which is misleading or in some cases, blatantly untrue. Sifting through all of this "expertise" can be difficult and exasperating to most of us. Nevertheless, it is a very positive opportunity for us to learn more about what constitutes the best for our bodies, given the proper direction and assistance.

As we proceed to the "worst of times" we are faced with a plethora of vendors

very willing to sell you their latest "miracle" product, diet aids, and lose-30 pounds-in 10 days-without-working-out fad. That is one reason why it is important to rely on those who have the background

in research and study of diet and nutrition as well as proper fitness methods. Incorrect information from those who have not adequately studied nutrition nor been certified to teach fitness can be detrimental and at best sabotage or at worst harm the individual. Please remember that currently herbal supplements are not FDA-regulated, so use caution.

So this brings up a host of questions: Do I need vitamin and mineral supplements? If I do, where do I purchase those – does it make a difference? What about herbal remedies? How can I learn more about organic foods – and are they always the best choice? What types of pesticides are used on my produce? Do the meat and poultry items I consume have antibiotic residue in them? Are harmful dyes added to my snack foods? What kind of fitness program works best for me? Do have flexibility and balance challenges? Do I need more

muscle mass? What kind of aerobic conditioning is best for my age and current health status? Do I have conditions which may warrant specialized fitness programs, such as arthritis or previous head or neck injuries? There are many questions and concerns which should be addressed before making your final decisions on your diet and fitness regimens.

In addition to my many years as an organization management professional, I have been trained and certified as a nutrition and wellness coach, personal trainer, yoga instructor, flexibility and balance progression specialist with over 20 years of experience and my recommendation is – do your homework!

This begins with always talking first with your personal physician, no exceptions here! After you get the green light, talk with friends or family to see if they have professional referrals. Check out your local health food store to see if they work with anyone they might recommend.

Do your research when it comes to fitness centers – whether locally or corporately owned. Inquire about the training and credentials of their trainers. Interview the person(s) with whom you are considering working on your nutrition and/or fitness goals. Does the person hold

credentials/training from a recognized and accredited organization such as ACE (American Council on Exercise) AFPA (American Fitness Professionals Association) or ISSA (International Sports Science Association)? You hire professionals to repair your car, to assist you in planning your financial future, to buy and sell homes, and in many other areas – do at least as much for your physical well-being. After all, we are talking about your irreplaceable body here!

She is joined in the production by Maurice-Aimé Green and Luke Weber as soldiers Flick and Monty. Both young men are accomplished vocalists, and their well-played and impactful roles turn the storyline in surprising directions.

The supporting cast has plenty of punch as well – Eric Olson plays the lively and dismissive Preacher

a multi-talented Music Hall Singer with "Lonely Stranger," Judy Fitzgerald skillfully creates both a helpful Old Woman and a comely Hotel Hooker, while Richard Campea and Cody Stiglich are very solid as a wide variety of characters. Fourth grader Quincy Carmen wows as Young Vi in a very fine performance – both vocally and acting-wise.

Much can be said for the interesting tale we are shown. Themes of self-value, optimism, racism, expectation, and crushing disappointment all find their way into the story arc. Director Roberts has crafted a staging that allows for our imaginations to be included in the process aided by P. Bernard Killian's flowing scenic design and wonderfully expressive lighting designed by Dustin Druckenman. Costumes by Brittany Kugler and wigs by Andrew Elliot and sound design by Barry G. Funderburg effectively complete the imagery.

The onstage band led by music director Nathan Perry provides just the right-level

with great energies, Matt Branic appears as Violet's memory of her loving and supportive father, Tiffanie Bridges' Lula raises the roof with her gospel rendition of "Raise Me Up" Tiffany Gilliam is performance of an interesting score by Jeanine Tesori and Brian Crawly. Most of the songs are more narrative than lyrical. I would call it nearly operatic, not in any classical sense, nor is it of a rock opera style. It seems a uniquely fashioned style of storytelling derived from those genres where spoken lines are more often sung than spoken.

**B o t t o m line:** Mrs. K and I arrived at the performance with small knowledge of this impressively poignant story. Though not a show many have been exposed to and with unfamiliar songs, *Violet* is surprisingly effective and enjoyable as a musical journey. Highly recommended!

# Carmel seeks applications for 2023 arts grants

The City of Carmel is now seeking applications for 2023 City Arts Grants, a program designed to support local arts organizations whose work keeps the city vibrant and appealing to residents and visitors alike. Since 2004, more than \$16.1 million in arts grants has been awarded.

The 2022 Support for the Arts program awarded \$1,181,770 to 28 organizations located in Carmel or who hold programs or performances in Carmel. The money is based on 1 percent of the city budget. The grants are awarded on a competitive basis and the recommendations are reviewed and final

The Center for the Performing Arts, with a diverse

In addition to The Palladium concert hall, many also come for events at The Tarkington and The Studio Theaters and the Feinstein Cabaret at the Hotel Carmichael. In the winter, the Center is also home to the Christkindlmarkt and The Ice at Carter Green. ## Federal judge allows challenge to state’s ballot access law to continue

A federal judge in Indianapolis says a challenge to the state’s ballot access law can proceed.

The judge rejected a [request from state leaders](#) to dismiss the suit.

The lawsuit, led by the state’s Libertarian and Green parties, challenges Indiana’s rules for ballot access for minor parties and independent candidates.

Among the current rules: any party getting 2 percent of the vote in the Secretary of State’s race is guaranteed general election ballot placement, and if the party receives 10 percent, the

election can show up on the primary ballot.

The judge says the lawsuit requires a “fact-intensive” review.

Jeff Maurer, a Carmel entrepreneur and the Libertarian Party’s nominee for secretary of state, [told News 8’s Garrett Bergquist](#) in September that the state’s election laws need to be changed to make it easier for independent and third-party candidates to get on the ballot.

“Our community is not as simple as left or right, blue or red. We are a tapestry of people,” Maurer said. “Let’s get more people and causes on the ballot so you have more choices.”

# CDC report: U.S. flu surge hits highest number in 13 years

According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s Weekly U.S. Influenza Surveillance report, flu infections surged to the highest number since 2009.

Agency data showed an estimated 880,000 lab-confirmed influenza infections, 6,900 people are hospitalized, and 360 people, including one in Indiana, have died.

News 8 spoke with Dr. Shaun Grannis, vice president of data and analytics at the Indianapolis-based **Regenstrief Institute** about what groups of Hoosiers are at the highest risk of infection, hospitalization and death.

“The people at highest risk are those who are older with multiple comorbidities, multiple medical problems, people who might be immune-compromised, very similar to the risk factors for COVID in terms of not being healthy or well, being older, having a weakened immune system,” Dr. Grannis said. “All of those people are more likely to die from influenza.”

Grannis also says current flu activity is highest in southern states including Mississippi, Texas and Georgia.

As of Monday night, flu activity in Indiana was listed as moderate.

# Local lawmakers encourage future educators to apply for scholarship

Hamilton County legislators encourage local students planning to pursue a career in education to apply for the state's teaching scholarship as the application window just reopened.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said the Next Generation Hoosier Educator Scholarship pays \$7,500 per year for up to four years to students earning a teaching degree and who commit to teaching in Indiana for at least five years. Applications can be submitted online now at [LearnMoreIndiana.org/nextteacher](http://LearnMoreIndiana.org/nextteacher) through Jan. 31.

"This scholarship opportunity is a win for our students pursuing a career in education and a win for our local schools who need more great teachers," Huston said. "Our goal is to strengthen the state's pipeline of talented educators who can lead our classrooms, and help



students learn and grow."

"Educators are a driving force behind student success," said State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville), a member of the House Education Committee. "This scholarship inspires the best and the brightest to enter the teaching profession and helps them save thousands of dollars."

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) said scholarships are available to 200 high-achieving high school and college students each year who either graduate in the top 20 percent of their class, earn a score in the top 20th percentile on the SAT or ACT, or have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 3.5 on a 4.0 scale. To continue earning the scholarship, students must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid annually, earn a 3.0 cumulative GPA and complete at least 30 credit hours per year. Current college students who apply must be able to use the scholarship for at least two full academic years.

"Our community is home to many great schools and talented teachers who are dedicated to their students' success," Jeter said. "College is a huge financial commitment, and the Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship helps students to cover some of the costs of their education and focus on earning their degree."

In 2021, more than 600 Hoosier students from 270 high schools in 86 counties applied for the scholarship. High school seniors accounted for 75 percent of the applicants, with current college students accounting for the remaining 25 percent.

"Teachers are important leaders in both our schools and community," said State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel). "They have a crucial role in influencing our young learners, and this competitive scholarship helps ensure we have the best educators in Hoosier classrooms."

"It's important for Indiana to encourage more hard-working and driven students to become teachers," said State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel). "This scholarship is a great opportunity, and I strongly encourage interested students in Hamilton County to apply."

Applicants will be notified of their scholarship status via email by March 24, 2023. Questions can be emailed to [NextTeacher@che.in.gov](mailto:NextTeacher@che.in.gov).

"Having spent more than 40 years as a teacher, coach, principal and superintendent, I know how rewarding a career in education can be," said State Rep. Miksha: Garrison’s “experience shell game” makes him wrong choice for county prosecutor

Dear Editor:

Greg Garrison is not the right choice for Prosecutor. His campaign has been misleading and superficial. Jessica Paxson should be our next Prosecuting Attorney.

Civil forfeiture is not the same as prosecution, at least not in the sense that even an educated electorate such as ours would generally understand, and Mr. Garrison’s claims to have been prosecuting for decades capitalize upon the misunderstanding of this distinction. In 2017 the *Indianapolis Star* cited his law firm’s website when explaining that Garrison specialized “primarily in personal injury, business and commercial trial law.” Not prosecution. Contrary to his statements and his campaign’s early literature, his campaign website today avoids using those exaggerated and misleading claims.

Next, add this to his experience shell game: Mr. Garrison’s unwillingness to engage with his opponent or appear at a public, non-partisan event to answer questions. Please understand that Mr. Garrison is being a dutiful partyman by following Chairman Massillamany’s edict that no Hamilton County Republican candidates appear at non-partisan events for fear of being treated “unfairly” or being “attacked.” The edict makes political sense for many offices, but to have a prosecutor candidate shirk such a civic opportunity is extremely disappointing.

Consider that the League of Women Voters posed these questions at its candidate forum in early October: (1) What are the biggest changes you think need to be made to our justice system, and how do you plan to work towards bringing about that change? (2) If elected to serve in this role, how will you measure success on a day-to-day basis and then at the end of your term? (3) What are the most important challenges facing our county and how do you propose to address them? (4) What motivated you to seek this position? (5) Describe the education, training and/or experiences that make you the candidate that voters should choose. And, the coup de grâce, (6) explain the role of the Prosecutor’s Office. These questions – none unfair or attacking – were even provided to the candidates ahead of time! To this point, Mr. Garrison has been following the local party’s lead and political direction; will that stop if Mr. Garrison is indeed elected? The election is political, but the office should not be.

What we are left with is a candidate who misleads the electorate by exaggerating or mischaracterizing his albeit lengthy legal career while refusing to debate or even answer questions. His lack of engagement in the political process beyond fundraising at the heels of politicians is also disturbing when considering that the job of a prosecutor demands engagement with the community, being responsive to the people, and making tough, independent decisions. Hamilton County deserves better, far better. Not someone who testifies in support of someone being convicted of multiple counts of child exploitation, defending and characterizing those criminal actions as “art.”

Thankfully, on the other side of the ballot, we see a deputy prosecutor who has been in the trenches for years fighting for this community, for her community. Ms. Paxson’s campaign has been responsive, engaged, and truthful; her administration would be exactly that, too. She understands what is actually going on in our community and what small tweaks the prosecutor’s office could make to be even better.

For these reasons I support Jessica Paxson for Prosecuting Attorney and ask that you do, too.

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# Term limits would help fix distrust in Congress

America is more polarized than at any time in its history except for the Civil War. American politics has divided families with parents and children no longer speaking. Family get-togethers are fraught with tension over politics. Lifelong friendships have collapsed. Marriages have ended due to this polarization. At work people are frightened to mention politics for fear of being fired or offending a co-worker. Consumers even base what brand of toothpaste they use based upon their politics, according to a study for Colgate.

So, in this political divide, what can Republicans, Democrats, and Independents agree on? The need for congressional term limits.

A recent poll conducted by pollster Scott Rasmussen showed that 82 percent of Americans favor term limits for Congress. Broken down by party lines, 87 percent of Republicans favored congressional terms limits; 83 percent of Democrats favored term limits; and 78 percent of Independents favored the idea. George Washington could not get these kinds of numbers.

For many of our current

members of Congress, serving in Congress has become a lucrative lifelong job. We have one member of the House of Representatives who was first elected in 1972. In the Senate, we have a Senator serving who was first elected in 1974. That is nearly 100 years in Congress between the two of them. Both are seeking re-election in 2022. Things like this led Harry Truman to advocate term limits, saying, “term limits would cure both; senility and seniority – both terrible legislative diseases.”

They see Congress as part of the problem for the dysfunction that we see today in our institutions. According to Gallup, approval for Congress has not reached 30 percent in over a decade. Voters don’t see Congress working for them. They see Congress as part of the problem for the dysfunction that we see today in our institutions.

So, what is the solution? Term limits for Congress.

But Congress will never vote to term limit themselves, right? Probably not. Although there are members of Congress who favor congressional term limits and are backing legislation to enact it, this legislation faces stiff

opposition from entrenched Washington insiders.

So, what can be done? When enough states request a convention to add a term limits amendment to the Constitution, Congress is legally bound to comply. This allows states to make an end run around Congress. In fact, Dwight Eisenhower foresaw the need for this and said, “a constitutional amendment for congressional term limits could never achieve the blessing of Congress; it could be initiated only by the states.”

Five states – Florida, Alabama, Missouri, West Virginia, and Wisconsin – have asked for a national convention to amend the Constitution limited to the subject of Congressional term limits. Indiana could be next.

The state legislature can pass a resolution calling for an Article V convention for congressional term limits only. A simple majority in the legislature is all that is required to do this.

Setting congressional term limits would take power away from the Washington insiders and lobbyists and give it back to where it belongs – the citizens of each state. For far too long, we have seen how staying in office for decades leads some of our elected officials to forget that they serve the voters not the entrenched special interests that reside in Washington. As Benjamin

Franklin (who supported term limits) aptly said, “In free governments, the rulers are the servants, and the people their superiors ... For the former to return among the latter does not degrade but promote them.”

And most importantly, it would lead to a Congress that is responsive to the issues facing everyday Americans. This would lead to real solutions to for our nation not the chaos we see daily in Washington.

Setting congressional term limits will be a step to ending the political circus that has polarized and divided our nation. It will restore balance in our electoral process. It will return power to where it should reside with the voters. Term limits means Congress will develop fundamental solutions not incremental solutions that please the lobbyists but forget the voters. Now more than ever before we need congressional term limits. Let’s make sure that the Hoosier state takes the lead in getting this done.

## Letter to the Editor

### Courts will decide if names of people on Carmel schools SEL committee should be made public

Dear Editor:

I'd like to start by noting I'm glad to see Jennifer Hendrix has such respect for the opinions of Indiana's Public Access Counselor (PAC), Luke Britt. I'd like to point out one such opinion that calls into question why the campaign she's running for school board candidates Brake, Brown and Sharp has repeatedly insinuated Carmel Clay Schools (CCS) have lacked transparency when it comes to curriculum on topics such as social emotional learning and sexual education.

In 21-FC-168, Mr. Britt, whom Ms. Hendrix repeatedly quoted as an authority in her letter, had the following to say in response to a complaint that CCS was not being transparent enough with regards to social emotional learning and sexual education curriculum:

"...it has not been reported to this office that schools have shied away from making curriculum materials available. If anything, they have been more proactive in order to demonstrate to parents and the public that materials are acceptable and appropriate for students."

"Schools are indeed implementing procedures to make these materials available even without a request by giving access to programs like Canvas and holding town hall meetings. While this is unlikely to satisfy all constituents, it is hardly anti-transparency."

If we weren't so close to the election, I would look forward to the updates to the campaign website that Ms. Hendrix manages.

To address the thrust of Ms. Hendrix's previous letter, it is worth clarifying what 22-FC-34 lays out as the chain of events.

- 1) CCS included parent members on some committees.
- 2) Ms. Hendrix requested the identities of the parents on these committees.
- 3) Carmel denied this request to avoid potentially subjecting parents to the same

harassment and threats that some teachers and staff had experienced earlier in the year.

4) Ms. Hendrix filed a complaint with the aforementioned Public Access Counselor.

5) CCS had an attorney file a response making its legal case based on the relevant portions of Indiana Code.

6) PAC ruled that the law does not directly address the situation that was at hand, but that it was taking the side of Ms. Hendrix's position until the legislature or courts say otherwise.

At that point, CCS allowed parents to resign from the committees rather than have their identities disclosed, then provided Ms. Hendrix with a list of parents still serving. They did this under the legal argument that the parents did not know their identities would be disclosed at the time they joined the committees. To the best of my knowledge, that argument has not yet been tested in court.

Given the selective quoting of the opinion in Ms. Hendrix's letter, I think #6 above may have been misunderstood by some readers. Regardless, if Ms. Hendrix feels strongly enough to pursue unveiling the six parents who withdrew from the committees out of reasonable fear of harassment, she has legal remedies available and the courts will decide if they should be named to the public.

If any readers are unfamiliar with why some parents or others in the school system may fear harassment, I would recommend starting with the PAC's Informal Opinion 21-INF-8: The Correlation Between Civility and Public Access, followed by looking up local media's past reporting on what CCS's board members, teachers and staff were being subjected to in the summer and fall of 2021.

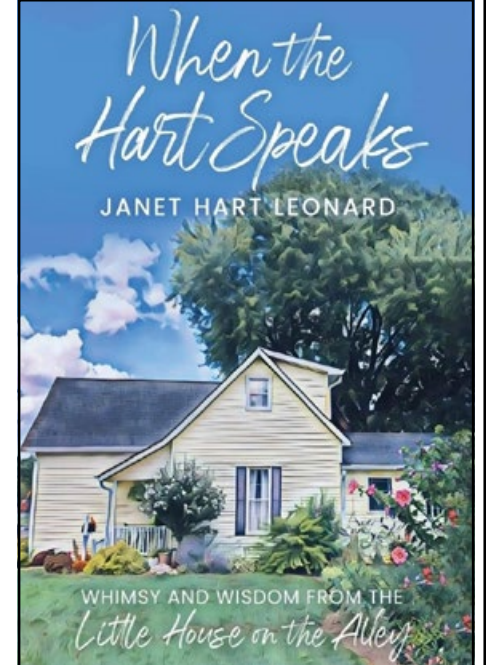

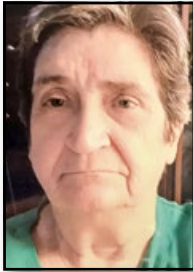

# Westfield girls give their new coach memorable first victory

**INDIANAPOLIS** — Kelsey Key’s first game as the Westfield girls basketball head coach turned out to be a memorable one.

The Shamrocks opened their 2022-23 season at North Central on Tuesday, and it was a tight contest all the way through. Westfield gained the upper hand in the last minutes of the fourth quarter and was able to hang on for a 46-44 victory.

“Ultimately, it’s just fun to get out and compete with the girls,” said Key. “They’ve been working really hard. I’m most excited for them and just the program itself and just the direction that we’re going.”

The ‘Rocks got a statement win for their opener, a game between two teams ranked in the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association’s pre-season poll (turn to Page 18 to see the rankings). Westfield is ranked No. 13 and the Panthers are rated No. 11, and the game was that close: Neither team led by more than five points for the entire contest.

The two squads traded the lead six times during the fourth quarter. North Central led 44-43 during the last couple minutes, but Aubrey Crockett put the Shamrocks in front for good by making a layin. Then with under a minute to go, Crockett came up big under the Panthers’ basket, grabbing a rebound from a North Central player.

“That’s huge,” said Key. “We talked about rebounding after the first quarter. We felt like we gave up way too many offensive rebounds. And we wavered throughout the rest of the game. But I would say after that first quarter break, we got a lot better.”

The Panthers played tough defense for the entire game, and used it to get a five-second call on the Shamrocks with around 16.5 seconds left. But Westfield returned the favor and got a turnover with three seconds to go, then hung on from there.

Key said there were some nerves and “butterflies in your stomach” at the beginning of the game, but her players were able to shake off those nerves by the end

# Colts trade RB Nyheim Hines to Buffalo for RB Zack Moss, draft pick

Indianapolis Colts running back Nyheim Hines is going to the Buffalo Bills.

The Colts say they are getting running back Zack Moss and a conditional sixth-round draft pick in return.

NFL's trade deadline was at 4 p.m. Tuesday, and at least deals were made Tuesday across the league.

Hines in mid-October entered the concussion protocol after wobbling off the field early in the Colts' overtime victory Oct. 6 at Denver. He returned to the game play in the Colts' 19-10 loss Oct. 23 against the Tennessee Titans.

Hines had expressed frustration after the Colts'

17-16 loss Sunday to the Washington Commanders. "We walked the ball up and down the field," Hines said to a Colts.com reporter, "and it's like, we come up with 16 points."

"We can't keep beating ourselves," Hines added in the Colts.com report. "Those guys get paid too but offensively we got to execute."

Hines joined the Colts in 2018. He has a contract that runs through the 2024 season.

## Players react

After the Colts traded Hines to the Bills, he thanked Colts Nation for its support over the last five years on Twitter.

Hines was drafted by from North Carolina State. Since then, he's scored 19 touchdowns for the Horse-shoe, including his six-

yard rushing touchdown against the Washington Commanders on Sunday.

Hines had reportedly been open to a trade after a quieter year with the Colts struggling offense.

Hines was a strong presence on the field and in the locker room the last five years with the Colts. His now former teammates reacted to the trade on social media.
