Marie Osmond coming to Carmel for holiday concert

Hooked on hay bailing

*Unexpected.* That's the title of Marie Osmond's newest album and is also a good way to summarize the directions The Reporter's interview with her took.

The only Indiana date for "Marie Osmond: A Symphonic Christmas Tour" will be Dec. 10 at the Palladium, 1 Carter Green, Carmel.

Marie was getting ready for that upcoming Christmas tour when she spoke to The Reporter about the tour itself, the surprising content of her new album, a

fair bit about her life, and a little bit about the movie *Spinal Tap*.

Hey, we warned you right in the first paragraph that *Unexpected* was an apt title.

"I love Christmas," Osmond said. "It's a loaded statement because I think we need Christmas more than ever. I think we need real gifts – I don't remember what I got in five years, do you? The things that have meant the most to me throughout my life have been the things I did with my children, my family, my friends where you get to go out and be together and talk and lose all the

technology."

She has been associated with what she calls "the great Christmas shows."

"I started with Andy Williams," Osmond told The Reporter. "I did Bob Hope's Christmas shows and his overseas USO tours. I did the Osmond Family Christmas shows and the Donny & Marie

I wanted to have a hook or two for my fall article – a hay hook to be precise.

It hasn't been a complete summer experience until you have had the experience of bailing hay on a hot June or July day. Farmers typically rotated the crops. Corn was followed by beans. Oats or wheat followed beans, and hay completed the rotation. Farmers knew that rotation worked. We now know corn is a grass that uses a lot of nitrogen. Beans are a legume, which contains nodules on the roots containing a type of bacteria. The soybean provides the bacteria with carbohydrates, sugar and oxygen, and the bacteria converts nitrogen from the air into plant available amino acids that feed the plant. (*Bradyrhizobia japonicum* is the bacteria's name). Oats or wheat used up the nitrogen and the hay helped put it back: a beneficial circle of rotation of taking out and adding back.

Midsummer was the time to bail hay. As soon as the wheat or oats came off, straw bailing took place. A recent article about the Sheller farm prompted a memory of the time my son helped them bail hay. I was given the privilege of helping mow back the last two or three loads when I went to pick up my son.

# HC Emergency Management achieves national distinction

After the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, the United States developed a system to streamline how public safety agencies work together.

The National Incident Management System is a standardized approach to incident management. It establishes five key functional areas when responding to an emergency or disaster: management, operations, planning, logistics, and finance/administration.

The system has been used throughout the county for many years, but recently Hamilton County Emergency Management (HCEM) implemented it at a fundamental level by enhancing job descriptions and titles to align with the system. This ensures personnel complete national-level training and applies this new information to their emergency and disaster

preparedness and response roles.

"We are the only county in the state with the staffing, training, and experience to meet these requirements," HCEM Executive Director Shane Booker. "The training has been difficult to find due to COVID, and we were fortunate the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency was gracious enough to allow us to send some of our personnel to courses they offered. I am incredibly proud of the staff who embraced this change to make Hamilton County better

Some farmers used elevators to put the hay into barns in upper lofts called hay mows, but many more used four large L-shaped hooks that were sunk in the opposite sides of a stack of four to six square bales. When I was younger, I drove the tractor that pulled the rope moving the forks and hay to the track in the ceiling of the barn and then to one side or the other of the driveway. When I got older, I had the privilege of stacking hay in the mow under a

tin roof in 90-degree-plus weather. Coming down between loads, I would chill as my sweat-soaked shirt dried in the sun. A quart of lemonade was standard drink between loads.

Neighbors typically shared the cost of a bailer and helped each other, as it normally took five or six to get the job done. Boys could typically stack four bales high on the wagon while stronger men sometimes made it five or six high. There was always one bale

in the middle to help tie the load together. As the hay came out of the bailer, the person standing on the wagon used hooks like the ones above to pull the bale onto the wagon and to help stack it. Some used one hook and some used two, both being careful not to pull one of the strings off and bust the bale. The job in the field was the dirty as the wind often blew the fine chaff into your eyes. Long sleeves were required to handle the hay stubble without scarring the arms.

As we become more urbanized, we lose many of the memories of working with friends, family, and neighbors. Such was a summer social occasion. At the end of the day, there was always a large meal and plenty of pie and homemade ice cream. Thanks, Shellers, for the memories.

Christmas shows. I’ve done really wonderful shows, so I know a little bit about Christmas,” she said with a laugh, “and I’m giving everyone the Marie Osmond Good Housekeeping seal of approval that you will leave there feeling fantastic and ready for the holidays.”

Audiences may hear a little from *Unexpected*, which was released in December 2021. The album is filled with music from Broadway and opera.

Osmond told The Reporter she has loved this music since she was a little girl, but she never thought she could sing “legit” soprano, let alone opera.

“Every song on here has a meaning to me,” Osmond said. “When I decided to do Broadway, the first show I did was *The Sound of Music*, and you can’t sing *Sound of Music* with a country accent. That’s an abomination to Rodgers and Hammerstein. It’s really a thing to learn to sing legit. I worked with James Hammerstein, the son of Oscar, so it was a really great experience. A lady who was one of the nuns in the production said, ‘honey, you cannot only sing legit, you can sing opera.’ I said, ‘Shut up!’ And I really spent 25 years preparing myself for this album.”

Having her first single hit No. 1 on the *Billboard* charts when she was only 13, her whole life has, to a large extent, been lived in the public eye. When asked about that she said, “If I could compare it to something I would.”

Then she told the story about going with her husband, was previously

inducted into the Beverly Hills High School Hall of Fame, bringing someone else into it this year.

“I went to this and I’m looking at all these people who have known each other – some of them – since elementary school,” Osmond said. “I’m a big believer in group sports. I think that team feeling, that comradery, teaches a lot of great values and principles and looking out for each other. I looked at it and I kind of got teary-eyed going, ‘Ahh! This is what normal is!’ It was really a lovely thing to see. I don’t really have anything to compare it to.”

On the other hand, she also said that while people think they know a great deal about her, they really do not.

“They know only what I feel is necessary,” Osmond said. “I don’t believe in airing dirty laundry. I believe in sharing things that you feel can help someone else. There are still things in my life that are very private, and I like it that way. Everybody deserves to have a little of that in their life.”

And now, dear readers, we finally get to that *Spinal Tap* reference from many paragraphs ago.

In November 2019, Osmond ended her residency at the Flamingo Las Vegas after 11 years.

“Did you ever watch the movie *Spinal Tap*?” Osmond asked The Reporter.

“That’s why we went to 11: because it was one more. We were getting ready to end our 10th year and we were taking a bow when I said to Donny, ‘Let’s go to 11’ [British accent] He said, ‘Because it’s one more!’ and that’s why we did it.”

Donny Osmond still performs in Vegas. Marie said he will probably become the next Wayne Newton.

“For me, five nights a week for 11 years is a lot of work,” Osmond said. “I kind of enjoy time with my husband and my children and my grandchildren. I’m co-founder of one of the largest children’s charities, so I get to spend a lot more of my time doing those things now. I love touring, but not every single day. I’m so blessed. I feel like I’m in a wonderful place in my life. I love doing the thing I do. I really love people, so I enjoy doing this over the holidays.”

The charity she mentioned in passing is the Children’s Miracle Network, which she co-founded with John Schneider, Mick Shannon, and Joseph G. Lake in 1983.

When asked if there was anything else she wanted our readers to know about her Dec. 10 show at the Palladium in Carmel, Osmond said, “We will make you laugh. We will make you cry. And you are going to love David Osmond. There is a reason he is in that show, and you will know why when you come and see it.”

Maybe he’s going to take it to 11 too? I guess we will find out on Dec. 10.

# Fishers Arts Council presents Shelley Feeney’s latest works

Fishers Arts Council (FAC) welcomes Michelle “Shelley” Feeney to the Collaboration Hub Gallery for November in her solo exhibit *By Train Light: Travels of Shelley Feeney*. We invite you to join us for our Second Friday Reception on 6 to 8 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 11 to meet Feeney, explore her collection of work, and check out some special items that will only be available during this reception.

Now, let’s get to know Shelley.

Artist Shelley Feeney has loved creating and making things for as long as she can remember. She won her first art award in second grade and still remembers the thrill of attending that ceremony and seeing her artwork publicly displayed.

“I was hooked!” Feeney said. “I loved the feeling of having a ‘voice’ through my artwork.”

Feeney’s grandfather was a printmaker, and as a child, she loved watching him in his studio. Printmaking was her main medium at Indiana University, and it wasn’t until after college that she began to paint.

“I think people can see a lot of print-making qualities in my paintings such as the unblended and layered colors, exaggerated textures, and the use of movement,” she said. “All of these elements of design play an important role in my work.”

Now, her favorite painting medium is oil. She appreciates how she can blend it smoothly or create a heavy impasto effect by using a pallet knife or even her fingers.

She has also been experimenting with putting an acrylic wash down on canvas before applying her final image in oil, which has become a fun way for her to add an unexpected pop of color to a painting.



Feeney

Feeney teaches art at Fall Creek Junior High School in Fishers and says that the best thing about teaching is helping students discover their artistic voice.

“I truly believe every human is an artist,” she said. “We just have to have the confidence in finding our gift. The beauty of art is that there are no right or wrong answers. To see students’ faces light up when they create something that has meaning to them is so inspirational.”

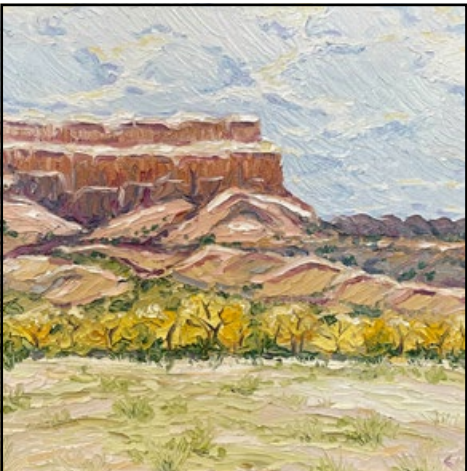

# Using humor to open hearts & minds

## ATI invites you to first reading of EXPOSED; A Melting Pot Musical

Actors Theatre of Indiana (ATI) presents the next in its Lab Series, ATI TheatreLAB No. 1: *EXPOSED; A Melting Pot Musical*. This musical by Laura Goodenow will be given a staged reading performance at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 12 at The Studio Theater at the Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel.

The synopsis of *EXPOSED* is this: After being flashed by a Peeping Tom, undocumented Peruvian immigrant Rosa Maria grapples with the desire to be seen in a world where she must hide. But when her American-born son is bullied – and fights back – she must choose between what’s right and what’s safe.

*EXPOSED* is a musical dramedy that explores the concept of hiding – from each other and ourselves. Set in Queens, N.Y., during the increased ICE raids of 2017-18, it follows two undocumented Peruvian parents and their American-born son, three local police officers, and an Upper East Side-female wisecracker.

The score is varied, the humor, adult, and the take-away, hopeful. This will be the first staged reading and the first time the score is performed live.

Playwright Laura Goodenow is a Carmel native and a 1995 Carmel High School grad. She is a librettist and lyricist, as well as a film producer and distributor. Before her career focused on theatre and film, she was as an award-winning print journalist and newspaper editor, as well as a corporate editor and pharmaceutical advisory board notetaker. She is a mother of two and a Butler University graduate who splits her time between Indianapolis and Nashville, Tenn.

Goodenow’s company, Real Women Make Waves, developed and produced the award-winning film *Year by the Sea*, then distributed it to more than 100 theaters nationwide. She is also the producer and librettist of *Gold Jade Way*, a sung-through operetta of ancient Chinese poetry translations; the co-bookwriter of *Cleavage*, an over-the-top musical comedy about the origin of breast implants; and the lyricist/librettist for *Crost*, a musical based upon the lost love letters of 12th-century lovers Heloise and Abelard.

“Real Women Make Waves is a mantra,” Goodenow said. “No matter how large the ocean or how small the pond, no one should stop you – FEAR should not stop you – from diving in. For much of my life, I avoided making waves. But still water becomes stagnant. Gratefully, I found mentors to help me splash heart-first into my creative calling. As a company, Real Women Make Waves is the amalgamation of my cre-

ative energies across myriad disciplines: books, movies, plays, musicals, design, photography. I seek to create my own work, as well as support and encourage other artists through development, production, and/or distribution.”

Her goal in writing *EXPOSED* reflects the same beliefs.

“Our goal as artists is to encourage the world to be more empathetic and understanding,” she said. “To see in each other that which connects us, then lean into that shared humanity to work through challenges. We hope *EXPOSED* can use the power of humor to open hearts and minds while honoring the gravity of immigration. And, as with all of our pieces, we wish to bring some light into the world by exploring some of its shadows.”

Justin Rayna is the composer and music director for *EXPOSED*. He is an award-winning musician, composer, producer, performer, coach, husband and father. He graduated from McCaskey High School in Lancaster, Pa., in 2000 with the Louis Armstrong Jazz Award for prolificacy, independently recording and releasing solo piano albums. He marched for Drum Corps International, winning the 2001 Garden State Circuit snare solo competition, and performed in percussion and acrobatic shows at Hershey Park and Dollywood, as well as film stunts. In 2018, he released his debut album *Intensify*, with a concert featuring dance, circus arts, acting, and live orchestra. He studied Music Theory & Composition at the University of Tennessee and graduated with a degree in Interdisciplinary Studies in Music and Theatre from East Tennessee State University. He was KCACTF’s 2020 first-alternate recipient of both the David L. Shelton Award and the National Partners of American Theater Playwriting Award, and he was a semifinalist in the 2021 Eugene O’Neill National Music Theater Conference.

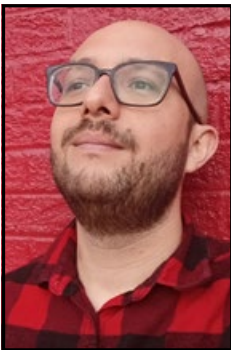
Another essential member of Goodenow’s team is dramaturg Sebastian Eddowes-Vargas. He is a Peruvian theater artist and researcher who focuses on queer stories and how these are shaped and informed by the colonial histories of the Americas. His academic and theatrical work has been presented in Perú, Ecuador, Brazil, Costa Rica, Colombia, the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom. As a dramaturg, he has worked on *Expats Anonymous* by Rachel Chin (Yale Cabaret) and *Between Two Knees* by The 1491s (Yale Repertory Theater). He is an MFA candidate in Dramaturgy and Dramatic Criticism at the David Gefen School of Drama at Yale,

Enrolling in Marketplace coverage  
Indiana Department of Insurance offers tips  
to help guide you through enrollment process

The open enrollment period for 2023 health insurance coverage through marketplaces and other individual plans is open now. You can enroll in, re-enroll in, or change a 2023 health plan through the Health Insurance Marketplace (also known as “Obamacare”).

*Please note: These guidelines do not pertain to people seeking to buy or change a Medicare Advantage plan or Part D drug plan.*

**Important dates**

- Dec. 15, 2022: Last day to enroll in or change plans for coverage to start Jan. 1, 2023.
- Jan. 15, 2023: Last day to enroll in or change a 2023 health plan. After this date, you can enroll in or change plans only if you qualify for a **Special Enrollment Period.**
- Feb. 1, 2023: Coverage starts for those who enroll in or change plans Dec. 16,

2022, through Jan. 15, 2023.

Consumers in Indiana who currently have marketplace coverage, or will need it in 2023, should make time to shop for plans through [Healthcare.gov](https://www.healthcare.gov). The Indiana Department of Insurance provides a **Marketplace Insurance Providers Map** to help you determine what insurance providers are in your county.

If you already have coverage through a marketplace plan, review your information to make sure it is accurate. You can update your application with any income and/or household changes. You may qualify for a different amount of financial assistance or find a different plan that costs less and/or better meets your needs. The NAIC’s Health Insurance Shopping Tool can help you understand how different policies support your health care needs. The tool provides a 3-step process to compare different health insurance policies.

**What to look for**

If your plan is no longer available in 2023, you should receive a notice from your insurer and the marketplace. Even if your plan is continuing, it pays to shop around and check whether the doctors and/or hospitals your family uses are in the plan’s networks.

If you’re looking for a new plan, there are three categories of health insurance plans to choose from on the marketplace: Bronze, Silver and Gold. They are broken up by how costs are shared between you and your insurer. Another category, Catastrophic, is available for consumers under 30 years of age or who face a hardship in accessing the other plans.

Being a parent has, undeniably, been one of the most difficult yet rewarding aspects of my life. Keeping my children safe is of utmost importance to me, and I never thought our family could experience domestic violence, until it happened to us.	I contacted the Westfield Police Department which turned into an investigation. It was at this time I was introduced to Jessica Paxson. She understood the sensitivity of the situation and assured me that the Prosecutor's office would do everything to ensure that our family stayed safe.	I could have never anticipated the pain and trauma my family experienced, and it is unfortunate that these incidents do happen. However, had Jessica not been the Prosecuting Attorney I worked with, our family would have felt a different outcome than what we experienced.
I have been a resident of Hamilton County, specifically Westfield, since 2018. My son was in kindergarten at the time, and we had a daughter born in 2020. We were living what I thought was a blessed life. That is, until our world was turned upside down.	The amount of compassion Jessica has for my family was more than I could have asked for. She empathized with me for the pain my son endured and helped me understand the process I never imagined would ever happen.	Our community is in need of a prosecutor who will be passionate for any family in need. I wholeheartedly believe that Jessica is the person for the job.

# State party chairs lay out their strategies going into Election Day

The two major parties’ state chairs both said they see openings to flip key statewide and Congressional seats in Tuesday’s election.

Indiana Democrats in recent weeks unveiled their Contract With Women campaign pledge, placing access to abortion services front and center in Democrats’ election efforts.

Indiana Democratic Party Chair Mike Schmuhl defended his party’s choice to focus heavily on abortion and child care issues, saying Indiana’s new abortion ban crystalizes for voters the danger of having a supermajority in the state legislature.

He says voters have shown interest in the Contract With Women’s proposals.

“We are at the bottom of the barrel in so many rankings and to become the first state in the country, in special session, post-Dobbs, to pass a near-total abortion ban, I think is unfortunate,” Schmuhl said.

State Republican Party Chair Kyle Hupfer says he did not believe abortion would turn out to be a deciding factor in the election. He pointed to polls that consistently show the economy and inflation top voters’ lists of concerns.

“Certainly there was some attention around (abortion) at the time,” Hupfer said. “But as we get closer and closer to Election Day, as we’re looking at polling, voters are going back to what they always go back to – pocketbook issues.”

Republicans need to gain five seats to win control of the U.S. House. Polls have put Democratic Con-

gressman Frank Mrvan in a tossup with Republican Jennifer-Ruth Green for the First Congressional District seat in northwest Indiana.

Hupfer says Green has run a “tremendous” campaign and her message is resonating with voters in that district. He says high Republican turnout and support for Republican policies nationally could help her take the seat.

Schmuhl says it’s essential for Democrats to hold on to the seat. He says Mrvan is doing what he needs to do by keeping his head down and focusing on delivering results for his constituents. Both parties have diverted national-level funding to the race.

The race for secretary of state has been especially contentious due to questions surrounding Republican candidate Diego Morales’ military service, his stance on the 2020 election, and allegations of sexual assault made by two women.

Morales has denied those allegations and told News 8 in a recent interview he believes Joe Biden is the legitimately elected president.

Hupfer says he didn’t believe those concerns would sink Morales’ campaign. He says one of the women who accused Morales of wrongdoing approached him two months after the state GOP convention in May. When News 8 asked him to detail what she told him, Hupfer said he would refer to the statements both the women involved and Morales have put forward.

Schmuhl, for his part, says all of the questions surrounding Morales are a serious cause for concern and have generated significant interest in Democratic candidate Destiny Wells. He says Wells’ small-town upbringing and long military career appeal to a broad range of Indiana voters.

# AG Rokita files enforcement actions against two alleged illegal robocallers

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita announced on Monday the national Anti-Robocall Litigation Task Force is enforcing investigative demands sent to two voice service providers over alleged involvement in illegal robocalls.

"We're working every day to protect Hoosiers from these annoying and illegal robocalls," Rokita said. "That means holding the telecom industry accountable for doing its part to stop these calls."

The targets of the investigation are Michael Lansky LLC – doing business as Avid Telecom – and One Eye LLC. The national task force is enforcing civil investigative demands (CIDs) against each entity.

Fifty-one attorneys general participate in the national task force, which Indiana co-leads with North Carolina and Ohio. Rokita announced the formation of the task force in early August.

"When we started this task force, we knew that some providers were not going to like us shining sunlight into their operations," Rokita said. "But the task force and I fully intend to get straight answers from these companies."

The enforcement action against Avid Telecom details several instances in

which the task force believes Avid Telecom knowingly accepted and routed illegal robocalls. Further, the task force believes Avid Telecom's CEO, Michael Lansky, helped another telecom provider hide its suspect traffic.

Avid Telecom has objected to answering the civil investigative demand. The State of Indiana, which issued the CID on behalf of the task force, has moved to enforce it.

The enforcement action against One Eye details how an individual named Prince Anand closed another voice service provider, PZ Telecommunication LLC, and became the apparent CEO of One Eye. This transition occurred after the Federal Communications Commission sent PZ Telecom a cease-and-desist letter.

One Eye has stopped responding to the task force, and the State of Indiana has moved to enforce the CID.

"These two companies represent what is wrong with the industry," Rokita said. "More reputable and civic-minded organizations are always eager to cooperate with authorities to protect consumers."

The task force, through evidence detailed in the

enforcement actions, believes it has a reasonable basis for investigating Avid Telecom and One Eye. This national unit continues to work daily to stop the flood of illegal robocalls into the states. While this is the first public enforcement action taken by the task force, it will not be the last.

According to the National Consumer Law Center and Electronic Privacy Information Center, more than 33 million scam robocalls are made to Americans every day. These scam calls include fraudsters posing as the Social Security Administration, Amazon and employers offering work opportunities.

Fraudsters stole an estimated \$29.8 billion through scam calls in 2021. The task force is focused on shutting down the gateways that profit off this illegal scam traffic.

Rokita offers the following tips to avoid scams and unwanted calls:

- Look out for prerecorded calls from imposters posing as government agencies. Typically, the Social Security Administration does not make phone calls to individuals.

- If you suspect fraudulent activity, immediately hang up and do not provide any personal information.

# Heights rallies in season opener, gets Coach Cherry his 100<sup>th</sup> victory

ARCADIA – A great season-opening win for the Hamilton Heights girls basketball team also turned into a special occasion.

The Huskies beat Danville 40-38 in their opener Wednesday at the Heights gym. Heights trailed by seven points in the fourth quarter before rallying, and that gave the Huskies their third season-opening victory in a row, dating back to 2020.

It also marked the 100th victory for Heights coach Keegan Cherry.

“It feels great,” said Cherry. “I told the girls, though, at center court, not one time in seven years have I but the basketball through the net. I get to 100 because of girls like them, ones that have come before and then them to-night. They just compete, play hard. We were on the ropes tonight. Danville was great. (Coach) Kaley (May) does an awesome job.”

The Warriors led for most of the game, and seemed to have things in hand when they led 28-21 early in the fourth quarter. But Heights began to amp up its defense, forcing a handful of turnovers. The Huskies used that to go on an 13-0 run that took them to a 34-28 lead with 59.9 seconds left in the game.

Juniors Hadleigh Cherry and Ella Hickok nailed back-to-back 3-pointers to start the run. Junior Camryn Runner, who was already having a good game, helped out with two free throws to push Heights in front for good. Kaylee Rhoton added a free throw, then Runner and Hickok each made two more foul shots. (All of the above-mentioned Heights players have varsity experience from last season’s sectional championship team.)

With that, the Huskies had gone from being down seven to up six. Danville’s Isabelle Wooten ended the run with a layin, and the Warriors got within two a couple times. But Heights finished from the free-throw line, with Runner going 4-of-4 and Hickok 2-of-2 during the game’s final 44.4 seconds.

Keegan Cherry called the free-throw shooting huge, “and everybody that was out there, I’ve got confidence in all of them to step up and shoot them,” he said. “But when Camryn

Runner has the basketball, I’m already calling my defense, because I’m pretty confident they’re going to go through the net.”

And that confidence is well-deserved. Runner was 13-of-13 from the line on Wednesday, finishing the game with 21 points.

The first half was pretty much all defense, with the two teams playing to a 7-7 tie after the first quarter and Danville leading 16-13 at halftime. Runner scored 11 points for Heights, including a score off a steal to end the half.

The Warriors jumped ahead 22-13 midway through the third quarter. Rhoton hit a 3-pointer to cut into that lead, then she also made a buzzer-beating triple at the end of the peri-

od to get the Huskies with- in 24-21. Danville’s Emma Ancelet hit two free throws and Addison Davis made a basket to push the Warriors up by four, before Heights began its comeback.

“Really proud of all the girls,” said Cherry. He said they were “good enough in their role tonight to win.

We’ll get to work tomorrow and clean some things up. Danville was really good defensively. They were. Credit to them. We were fortunate to win tonight.”

The Huskies go on the road for the first time this season Saturday night, playing at Clinton Prairie.

# Royals get second chance at state title

When the Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team steps on to the floor at Ball State's Worthen Arena Saturday night, the Royals will be taking on a team that's familiar to them – and volleyball in general.

Southeastern takes on Yorktown at 7 p.m. Saturday for the IHSAA's Class 4A state championship. It will be the second time the Royals play in a state title game. Southeastern made it to state in 2019, falling to New Castle in four tough sets.

When the two teams met in the regular season, Southeastern beat Yorktown in five sets. Since then, neither team has lost a match, and haven't lost very many sets, either. The Royals have dropped only eight sets to their opponents, while the Tigers have only given up 11 sets.

The Royals are 33-1 for the season while the Tigers are 34-2. Yorktown lost in five sets to Brebeuf Jesuit early in the season and has won 22 straight matches since then, while Southeastern dropped its season-opener to McCutcheon and has won 33 consecutive matches after that. Not surprisingly, these two teams hold the top spots in the final coaches poll of the year, with HSE ranked No. 1 and Yorktown No. 2.

"They play defense at a higher level than any other team in the state," said Royals coach Jason Young. "They run a fast offense. They are very talented and have probably the best coach in the game."

The Tigers' coach is Stephanie Bloom, who pretty much is Yorktown volleyball. Bloom graduated from Yorktown in 2001 and was part of the Tigers' 2000 Class 3A state championship team. She returned to Yorktown to become head coach of the team in 2008, and has guided the Tigers to four more state titles, with 3A championships in 2011 and 2016, then 4A titles in 2018 and 2020.

"Stacie Taylor (my assistant coach) and I were on the first State Champion-

ship team at Yorktown High School in 2000 and went on to be teammates in college at Ball State," said Bloom. "We were also college teammates with Sarah Steele, the assistant coach at HSE. Being at Worthen all together but not all on the same side of the net will be a first for all of us!"

The Tigers hosted their own sectional, sweeping past Richmond, Mount Vernon and Pendleton Heights for the title. Yorktown played at the Greenfield-Central regional, where it avenged its lost to Brebeuf Jesuit with a four-set semi-final victory, then beat Brownsburg in the championship. The Tigers then defeated Floyd Central in four sets to win the Columbus East semi-state.

Yorktown has four players with at least 200 digs on the season. Sophomore libero Addi Applegate has collected the most digs with 459, while senior Emilee Hill has 387 digs. Junior Addi Rains has 286 digs and sophomore Charlotte Vinson has collected 230.

Vinson is also the Tigers' leading hitter, working on the outside and hitting 451 kills for the season. Hill, on the right side, has 316 kills, while senior middle hitter Gretchen Moore has 214 kills. Hill also plays the setter, with 574 assists, and junior setter Kynnadi Bell has dished out 557 assists. At the net, Moore has 94 blocks, with sophomore middle hitter Shanese Williams making 84 blocks and junior right side Jayde Garrett getting 82 blocks.

Once in the tournament, Southeastern swept through its sectional, beating Carmel, Westfield and Fishers to win. The Royals then trav-

eled up to the Noblesville regional, straight-setting Fort Wayne Carroll in the semi-finals before avenging their loss to McCutcheon in four sets for the trophy. Southeastern swept Lake Central to win the Frankfort semi-state.

"They have been very focused and committed to playing for each other," said Young. The coach said his team had three goals this season:

1. Have fun. "Winning is a lot of fun," said Young.
2. Complete like crazy. "We play one of the most competitive schedules in the state," said Young.
3. Be a great teammate. Young said his players "have been amazing teammates to each other this year. They cheer for each other," said the coach.

The Royals have had a strong offense, with six players hitting over 100 kills. Leading the way is outside hitter Avery Hobson, the lone senior on the team. The Duquesne commit has 414 kills for the season. Next is junior outside hitter Lauren Harden, a Florida commit with 320 kills. Sophomore right side hitter Lindsey Mangelson is next in line with 21 kills, followed by junior middle blocker Tiffany Snook (166), junior middle blocker Breonna Goss (154) and junior right side hitter Madison Evett (125).

Goss, a Duke commit, is the leader at the net with 118 blocks, while Snook has made 89 blocks. Junior setter Macy Hinshaw has 703 assists, while sophomore Ava Hunter has handed out 425. Junior libero Sophie Ledbetter leads the digs with 444, with Hinshaw collecting 253 and Hobson get-

ting 252. Sophomore Kaylyn Christy has 185 digs.

It's been a fun ride for the Royals, one they hope ends on Saturday night with a big trophy in their hands. Young said he has been communicating with Providence coach Terri Purichia, whose team will be playing in the 3A state championship game against Bellmont at 4:30 p.m. Purichia has a local connection, as she was an assistant coach at Noblesville from 1995 to 1999, and her husband Jeff served as the athletic director at Hamilton Heights several years ago.

"I read my team what she wrote me and it is so true," said Young. "HAVE THE BEST TIME WITH YOUR PLAYERS AND COACHES! These moments don't come along often and it sure makes for a great experience when it does!"

"This team has been special and so enjoyable," said Young. "I hope our players, coaches and families have enjoyed the journey. Saturday Night will be bittersweet as it will be the last time this group will be able to play together. I am so grateful for this year and it will be some of the fondest memories I will cherish for a lifetime."
