It hasn't been a complete summer experience until you have had the experience of bailing hay on a hot June or July day. Farmers typically rotated the crops. Corn

was followed by beans. Oats or wheat followed beans, and hay completed the rotation. Farmers knew that ro-

tation worked. We now know corn is a grass that uses a lot of nitrogen. Beans are a legume, which contains nodules on the roots containing a type of bacteria. The soybean provides the bacteria with carbohydrates, sugar and oxygen, and the bacteria converts nitrogen from the air into plant available amino acids that feed the plant. (Bradyrhizobia japonicum is the bacteria's name). Oats or wheat used up the nitrogen and the hay helped put it back: a beneficial circle of rotation of taking out and adding back.

Midsummer was the time to bail hay. As soon as the wheat or oats came off, straw bailing took place. A recent article about the Sheller farm prompted a memory of the time my son helped them bail hay. I was given the privilege of helping mow back the last two or three loads when I went to pick up my son.

HC Emergency Management achieves national distinction

After the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, the United States developed a system to streamline how public safety agencies work together.

The National Incident Management System is a standardized approach to incident management. It establishes five key functional areas when responding to an emergency or disaster: management, operations, planning, logistics, and finance/ administration.

The system has been used throughout the county for many years, but recently Hamilton County Emergency Management (HCEM) implemented it at a fundamental level by enhancing job descriptions and titles to align with the system. This ensures personnel comapplies this new information to their emergency and disaster

Emergency Management Hamilton County Emergency Management is a county public safety department tasked with supporting all municipalities through information coordination, resource management, and consequence management. HOOKED

Some farmers used elevators to put the hay into barns in upper lofts called hay mows, but many more used four large L-shaped hooks that were sunk in the opposite sides of a stack of four to six square bales. When I was younger, I drove the tractor that pulled the rope moving the forks and hay to the track in the ceiling of the barn and then to one side or the other of the driveway. When I got older, I had the privilege of stacking hay in the mow under a

tin roof in 90-degree-plus in the middle to help tie the weather. Coming down bemy sweat-soaked shirt dried between loads.

Neighbors typically shared the cost of a bailer and helped each other, as it normally took five or six to get the job done. Boys could typically stack four bales high on the wagon while stronger men sometimes made it five or six high.

A quart of lem- on used hooks like the ones onade was standard drink above to pull the bale onto the wagon and to help stack it. Some used one hook and some used two, both being careful not to pull one of the strings off and bust the bale. The job in the field was the dirty as the wind often blew the fine chaff into your eyes. Long sleeves were required to handle the hay stubble There was always one bale without scarring the arms.

As we become more urbanized, we lose many of the memories of working with friends, family, and neighbors. Such was a summer social occasion. At the end of the day, there was always a large meal and plenty of pie and homemade ice cream. Thanks, Shellers, for the memories.




The charity she mentioned in passing is the Children's Miracle Network, which she co-founded with John Schneider, Mick Shannon, and Joseph G. Lake in 1983.

is an artist," she said. "We just have to have the confidence in finding our gift. The beauty of art is that there are no right or wrong answers. To see students' faces


has meaning to them is so inspirational." Being accepted to The Penrod Arts Fair





Using humor to open hearts & minds

ATI invites you to first reading of EXPOSED; A Melting Pot Musical

Actors Theatre of Indiana (ATI) presents the next in its Lab Series, ATI TheatreLAB No. 1: EXPOSED; A Melting Pot Musical. This musical by Laura Goodenow will be given a staged reading performance at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 12 at The Studio Theater at the Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel.

POSED is this: After being flashed by a Peeping Tom, undocumented Peruvian immigrant Rosa Maria grapples with the desire to be seen in a world where she must hide. But when her American-born son is bullied – and fights back – she must choose between what's right and what's safe.

EXPOSED is a musical dramedy that explores the concept of hiding - from each other and ourselves. Set in Queens, N.Y., during the increased ICE raids of 2017-18, it follows two undocumented Peruvian parents and their American-born son, three local police officers, and an Upper East Side-female wisecracker.

The score is varied, the humor, adult, and the takeaway, hopeful. This will be the first staged reading and the first time the score is performed live.

Playwright Laura Goodenow is a Carmel native and a 1995 Carmel High School grad. She is a librettist and lyricist, as well as a film producer and distributor. Before her career focused on theatre and film, she was as an award-winning print journalist and newspaper editor, as well as a corporate editor and pharmaceutical advisory board notetaker. She is a mother of two and a Butler University graduate who splits her time between Indianapolis and Nashville, Tenn.

Goodenow's company, Real Women Make Waves, developed and produced the both the David L. Shelton award-winning film Year by the Sea, then distributed Partners of American Theit to more than 100 theaters ater Playwriting Award, and nationwide. She is also the producer and librettist of Gold Jade Way, a sungthrough operetta of ancient Chinese poetry translations; the co-bookwriter of Cleavbreast implants; and the lyricist/librettist for Crost, a musical based upon the lost love letters of 12th-century

lovers Heloise and Abelard. "Real Women Make Waves is a mantra." Goodenow said. "No matter how large the ocean or how small the pond, no one should stop you – FEAR should not stop you – from diving in. For much of my life, I avoided making waves. But still water becomes stagnant. Gratefully, I found mentors to help me splash heart-first into my creative calling. 

Being a parent has, undeniably, been one of the most difficult yet rewarding aspects of my life. Keeping my children safe is of utmost importance to me, and I never thought our family could experience domestic violence, until it happened to us.

I have been a resident of Hamilton County, specifically Westfield, since 2018. My son was in kindergarten at the time, and we had a daughter born in 2020. We were living what I thought was a blessed life. That is, until our world was turned upside down.

My son is a victim of domestic abuse and neglect caused by a family member. The situation, while sparing

intimate details, became a real-life a prosecutor so compassionate about true crime documentary I did not subscribe to.

I contacted the Westfield Police Department which turned into an investigation. It was at this time I was introduced to Jessica Paxson. She understood the sensitivity of the situation and assured me that the Prosecutor's office would do everything to ensure that our family stayed safe.

The amount of compassion Jessica has for my family was more than I could have asked for. She empathized with me for the pain my son endured and helped me understand the process I never imagined would ever happen.

Being able to communicate with

the residents of Hamilton County is something I've not forgotten since the day I was introduced to her.

I could have never anticipated the pain and trauma my family experienced, and it is unfortunate that these incidents do happen. However, had Jessica not been the Prosecuting Attorney I worked with, our family would have felt a different outcome than what we experienced.

Our community is in need of a prosecutor who will be passionate for any family in need. I wholeheartedly believe that Jessica is the person for the job.





AG Rokita files enforcement actions against two alleged illegal robocallers

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita announced on Monday the national Anti-Robocall Litigation Task Force is enforcing investigative demands sent to two voice service providers over alleged involvement in illegal robocalls.

'We're working every Lansky, day to protect Hoosiers from these annoying and illegal robocalls," Rokita the telecom industry accountable for doing its part to stop these calls."

The targets of the investigation are Michael Lansky LLC - doing business as Avid Telecom – and One Eye LLC. The national task force is enforcing civil investigative demands (CIDs) against each entity.

Fifty-one attorneys general participate in the national task force, which Indiana co-leads with North Carolina and Ohio. Rokita announced the formation of the task force in early Au-

"When we started this task force, we knew that some providers were not sunlight into their operations," Rokita said. "But the task force and I fully intend to get straight answers from these companies."

One Eye has stopped responding to the task force, and the State of Indiana has moved to enforce the CID.

"These two companies going to like us shining represent what is wrong with the industry," Rokita said. "More reputable and civic-minded organizations are always eager to cooperate with authorities to protect consumers."

Royals get second chance at state title

When the Hamilton volleyball Southeastern team steps on to the floor at Ball State's Worthen Arena Saturday night, the Royals will be taking on a team that's familiar to them - and volleyball in general.

Southeastern takes on Yorktown at 7 p.m. Saturday for the IHSAA's Class 4A state championship. It will be the second time the Royals play in a state title game. Southeastern made it to state in 2019, falling to New Castle in four tough sets

When the two teams met in the regular season, Southeastern beat Yorktown in five sets. Since then, neither team has lost a match, and haven't lost very many sets, either. The Royals have dropped only eight sets to Tigers have only given up 11 sets.

The Royals are 33-1 for the season while the Tigers are 34-2.
