home, not knowing her background, family health history, or anything else, and loved her with all their hearts.

Mom and Dad had given me an incredible life, full of love, travels around and outside of the country, and a solid education. I had a wonderful brother and sister who never treated me any differently than someone who was their own blood. I had numerous nieces and nephews that I grew up with and adored.

I loved Linda and Jack for choosing to give me life. I loved Linda for taking good care of me in the

womb and for making the best decision possible for me. I loved Jack for supporting her every step of the way. Even though I was just starting to get to know them, I loved them for what they had done (at the time) 45 years ago.

However, I knew no matter what happened in my life, I could never call them Mom or Dad. And fortunately, they both understood that completely.

Mom and Dad were the ones who took me to the hospital when I experienced food poisoning at the age of seven. Mom sat up with me many nights when I battled ear infections as a child. Dad worked hard to provide for us and give us a good place to live and food on the table.

They both put up with and still loved a typical,

emotional teenage girl. And they were the ones who supported me before, during, and after college.

It was Mom who helped me move away from my first husband, who was verbally abusive. She was the one who cried tears of joy when I finally met the right man and married him. Mom helped me when I had Jonathan and was alone most of the time during the first week of his life due to John working many hours at Mailboxes, Etc.

All of this flooded over me that summer. I started to feel like maybe I could tell Mom about my discoveries as long as I explained to her how they had brought me closer to her. But one incident that was similar to others in the past made me stop and realize I could never tell her what I had discovered.

Calling everyone who wants to shoot for the stars ... you are invited to explore the solar system with the power of imagination. Come along with two children and a talking astronomy book as they take a tour of the solar system (including a stop at Pluto) and learn about each of the planets along the way.

The presentation will take place at 7 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 18 in the Carmel High School Planetarium. Enter through the main entrance of the school on Main Street, walk past the Dale Graham Auditorium, and turn right. Doors will open 30 minutes before show time. *No one will be admitted after the program begins. Children aged 12 years and under should be accompanied by an adult.*

Why are the worlds of the inner solar system known as "rocky worlds"? What would it be like to fly through the storms of Jupiter or the rings of Saturn? Find out, along with information about what makes each planet unique, in this fully immersive voyage of discovery, suitable for students of all ages.

The planetarium star projector will also be used to simulate the night sky

locally, and then you'll be immersed in an environment as if there was no light pollution. After the show, if weather permits, telescopes will be set up outside the entrance of CHS for the public and students to use to view the night sky. This will be a fun and educational journey for the entire family.

Tickets are available in advance at the CHS Bookstore from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. beginning Monday, Nov. 7. Tickets for adults are \$4 and \$2 for children, senior citizens, and CHS students.

Westfield to break ground on new library & trustee office

New collaborative community space more than a decade in the making

The Westfield Washington Public Library (WWPL) and Westfield Washington Township Trustee will break ground on their new 55,000 square-foot building at 4 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 17 on the southwest corner of Park and Poplar streets.

“This new building will be a centerpiece in the heart of Westfield’s expanding downtown,” WWPL Director Sheryl Sollars said. “While our current buildings have served us well through the years, they don’t allow us room to grow and continue to meet the community’s burgeoning needs.”

The building will be two-story with two separate entrances – one for the library and one for the township offices. The new

library will provide more parking, an expanded teen area, a massive community room, and a coffee shop – as well as outdoor activity space on the 3.6-acre property.

“This is something we have been working toward and planning for nearly a decade, so we are beyond thrilled to see the start of construction,” Westfield Washington Township Trustee Danielle Carey Tolan said. “This partnership is an excellent example of efficiency in government by sharing construction costs, space,

equipment, and staff while providing a new and expanded community asset.”

The library will cover its construction and land costs with a \$16.7 million general obligation bond. The township trustee’s portion will not exceed \$5.2 million. KRM Architects will serve as the project architect. Meyer Najem is the contractor. Construction is expected to last approximately 12 to 18 months.

The public is invited and encouraged to attend the groundbreaking. The trustee’s office will be collecting new hats and gloves for those less fortunate in the community.

Aspire Indiana Health dedicates newly expanded Noblesville clinic

The REPORTER

Aspire Indiana Health dedicated the expansion of its Noblesville health center on Wednesday with a ribbon cutting ceremony and open house.

Last year, Aspire began the expansion of its Noblesville facility that doubled its size to 27,000 square feet. The enhanced facility will better allow Aspire to deliver its model of nonprofit comprehensive healthcare including family medicine,

behavioral healthcare, addiction services and programs addressing social drivers of health.

The \$6.9 million project also included renovation of the existing space and addition of an in-house pharmacy through Aspire's partnership with Genoa Healthcare.

Attendees included Aspire President & CEO Barbara Scott, State Senator Michael Crider and State Representative Donna Schaibley. Representatives from the offices of U.S. Senator Todd Young and U.S. Representative Victoria Spartz were also in attendance. State Representative Gregory Steuerwald was unable to attend but sent a letter of support that was read to the audience.

In her speech, Scott not only celebrated the expansion of the Noblesville facility but educated the community on how the facility fits within an entirely new operating system

for mental health services in Indiana. She explained how federal, state and local leaders are approaching the transformation through two nationwide models including a 988 behavioral health crisis system and specially-designated clinics, called Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC). Both models use effective financing that is expanding the scope of mental health and substance use services by permanently changing how and when people can access treatment services.

In his comments, State Sen. Crider praised Aspire for its work with Hoosiers with mental health challenges and said Indiana lawmakers are looking to expand funding and rethink how behavioral healthcare is delivered in the wake of a recent report issued by Gov. Eric Holcomb's Behavioral Health Commission, on which Scott served. That re-

port found untreated mental health issues cost Indiana \$4 billion per year.

Wurster Construction was the general contractor on the project, with project management by **Colliers** and architectural planning by **Artekna**.

'Fall back' this weekend; future of daylight saving time uncertain

It's that time of year where we get to "fall back."

It means an end to daylight saving time and a return to standard time. Daylight saving time ends at 2 a.m. Sunday. Most people set their clocks back before they head to bed Saturday night.

The sun will rise Sunday at 7:19 a.m. and set at 5:37 p.m.

Now is also a good time to check batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Daylight saving time began in the United States

back in 1918 in an effort to add more daylight to conserve energy costs during World War I. Throughout the next few decades, daylight saving time was used on and off. The clocks were even advanced two hours for a period of time, and daylight saving time was also used year round in the 1940s during World War II.

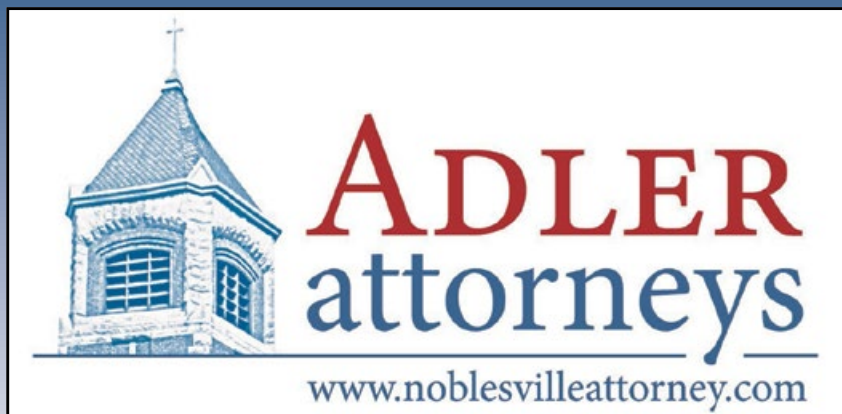
Eventually, the Uniform Time Act began in 1966 and set a specific timeframe of when daylight saving time began and ended.

Earlier in 2022, the Sunshine Protection Act was passed in the U.S. Senate, however it stalled in the U.S.

House of Representatives. If this becomes law, it would make daylight saving time year-round beginning in 2023. However, no discussions have advanced the bill.

If daylight saving time were to become permanent, sunrise would be much later in the morning during the winter months. For example, on the winter solstice in Indianapolis, the sun wouldn't rise until 9 a.m. and the sun would set until 6:24 p.m.

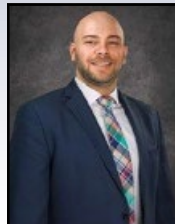

Who's ready for Mudsock Part 2?

Get ready for Mudsock football Part 2 – with another trophy on the line.

Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern will play each other tonight for the Class 6A Sectional 3 championship. The game kicks off at 7 p.m. at the Tigers' field. The winner of this game will not only receive a sectional trophy, but also advance to play another Hamilton County team next Friday in the Regional 2 championship game.

Close Mudsock

When the two teams met back on Sept. 9 in the Mudsock game, the Royals hosted that one. It turned out to be a classic, as Southeastern needed overtime to get past Fishers, 28-27.

The Royals have since rolled to a 10-0 record, beating Brownsburg 31-28 on Oct. 14 to clinch an unbeaten Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship and finish the season ranked No. 1 in both the Class 6A Associated Press and Indiana Football Coaches Association rankings. Southeastern easily won its first sectional game, cruising past Homestead 35-0.

"HSE is sound in all three phases of the game," said Tigers coach Curt Funk. "Their defense makes you earn every inch and fly to the football. They are very balanced on offense and can hurt you in both the run and pass game. I don't see any weakness in their special teams. This is why they are undefeated."

Senior quarterback Ty Bradle has had a good season, completing 120 of 204 pass attempts for 1,503 yards and 16 touchdowns. Junior Donovan Hamilton is on top of the receivers with 43 catches, nine for touchdowns. Senior Clayton Wilke has 35 receptions, two for scores.

On the ground, junior Jalen Alexander has rushed for 999 yards, scoring 11 TDs this season. Senior Griffin Haas leads the tackles with 76, while senior Evan Sherrill has 15.5 tackles for a loss and 7.5 sacks. Senior Dom Burgett has made 5.5 sacks. Senior Carter Gutt is perfect on extra-point kicks, making all 42.

"We are consistently working to get better," said HSE coach Michael Kelly. He said the coaching staff is challenging its players to set high goals, "and challenge them to hold themselves accountable to the standards necessary to reach those goals."

Fishers has had a pretty good season, too. The Tigers are 7-3, having won four of their last five games. That includes a 49-7 victory

over Fort Wayne Northrop in their sectional opener last week.

Kelly called Fishers a very well-coached team. "They have a lot of talent on both sides of the ball," he said. Kelly noted that the Tigers have been able to execute at a high level and "their players made plays."

"We will have to win the line of scrimmage, execute, play fast, physical and relentless football," said Kelly.

Senior quarterback Lucas Minns is 71-of-139 through the air, totaling 1,029 yards and 12 touchdowns. Seniors Aidan Zimmer and Carson Dunn each have made 23 catches, with Dunn getting three touchdown receptions and Zimmer making two.

Junior Khobie Martin has had a great season, with 1,135 rushing yards and 15 TDs. Dunn has totaled 699 yards on the ground and scored nine times. Senior Grady Stanley leads the tackles with 70, while junior Brady Wolf has 19.5 tackles for a loss and 14 sacks.

"I am proud of our team," said Funk. "We have lost some close games and we have responded and worked for improvement. We keep challenging our team to play a complete game."

Noblesville vs. Westfield

The winner of the Sectional 3 championship will take on the winner of the Sectional 4 championship between Noblesville and Westfield. That game kicks off at 7 p.m. tonight at the Shamrocks' Riverview Health Stadium.

The No. 9-ranked 'Rocks are 7-3 for the season and have won their last four games. When the two teams met on Sept. 9 at the Millers' Beaver Stadium, Westfield won a very close contest, 34-33. The Shamrocks beat Carmel 28-9 last week in their first sectional game.

"They've improved tremendously," said Noblesville coach Dave Sharpe. "Beating Carmel very convincingly has our attention."

Senior quarterback Cole Ballard has been outstanding, going 113-of-192 for 1,510 yards and 10 touchdowns. Sophomore Gabe Arambles leads the receptions with 29, including two for TDs, while junior Maximus Nosler has 26 catches, with four touchdowns.

Sophomore Kendall Garnett is on top of the rushing list with 678 yards and nine touchdowns, with Ballard next in line by gaining 534 yards and scoring 12 TDs. Senior Tyler Dikos has 116 tackles to lead the defense, while sophomore

Lennox Cruz Williams has 4.5 sacks and junior Cooper Vondersaar four sacks.

Westfield coach Jake Gilbert said his team is going for its seventh sectional title in 10 years.

"Our team has been pretty giddy after the Carmel win," said Gilbert, but he said the coaching staff has tried to get the Shamrocks refocused on the task at hand, which is taking on Noblesville.

The Millers ended a long drought last Friday by beating Zionsville 35-10 in its sectional opener. It was the first sectional-game victory for Noblesville since 2012. The Millers are 4-6, having won their last two games.

"We are also a very improved team from several weeks ago," said Sharpe. The coach said the sectional win was "a very big deal to this senior class," as well as the coaching staff, the rest of the team, the town and the program in general.

"Noblesville looked great last week," said Gilbert. "It was their best defensive performance. Their offense has been explosive many games this season, so that was something I've seen a lot. To win, we have to get off the field defensively. We only stopped them one time last game, so we have to do much better to extend our season. I think we also have to get the ball to our playmakers in space so we can score enough to win. Lastly, I think we have to win the special teams battle. Our last game was so close that the game was essentially even. We have to make plays on special teams. That could be the difference."

The Millers' three junior runners have led the way.

Logan Shoffner has gained 1,266 yards, Gage Gulley has totaled 554 yards and Blake Widget has run for 447 yards. All three have scored eight touchdowns this season.

Freshman quarterback Landon Hughes is coming along fine, with 467 yards and six touchdowns. Sophomore Aiden Brewer has 14 catches, and both he and Gulley have three TD receptions. Junior Austin Hastings leads the tackles with 129 stops, including three sacks.

"I think our confidence as at an all-time high," said Sharpe. "We've proved to ourselves that we can do this."

Guerin Catholic vs. Bishop Chatard

Guerin Catholic will host Bishop Chatard Friday in the Eagles Nest for the Class 3A Sectional 28 championship. The kickoff is at 7 p.m. between the two Circle City

Conference schools. The Trojans are ranked No. 3 and the Golden Eagles are No. 9, and both have 7-4 records.

The two teams played in the regular season on Sept. 23, with Chatard edging out Guerin Catholic 31-30. The Trojans reached the championship game with wins over Northwestern 47-19 and Hamilton Heights 41-14.

In the regular-season game against the Golden Eagles, quarterback Drew Vanvleet was 21-for-29, with 207 yards and two touchdowns. Aiden Duncan had five of those receptions, with Jef Waugh and Colin Guy each catching one touchdown pass. Jack Weybright had 135 yards rushing and Joe Bridenstine totaled 78 yards, with both scoring one TD.

Guerin Catholic has won its last three games, including sectional wins over Oak Hill 24-21 and Tippecanoe Valley 34-14. For the season, sophomore quarterback Malcolm Houze has thrown for 1,332 yards and 12 touchdowns. Senior Will Fremion has 50 receptions, including nine for scores.

Senior Justin Zdobyak has been solid on the ground, rushing for 1,152 yards and 10 touchdowns. Senior Luke Moody leads the defense with 104 tackles, followed by junior Gavin Stella with 92 stops, 10 for a loss.

Sheridan vs. Hagerstown

Sheridan will go on the road for the Sectional 45 championship, traveling to Hagerstown for a 7 p.m. kickoff.

The Tigers are 7-4 for the season, with regular-season wins over Knightstown 50-26, Union City 56-14,

Union County 26-7, Cambridge City Lincoln 55-12 and Winchester 27-19. Hagerstown has lost to Centerville 47-7, Shenandoah 36-8, Tri 41-0 and Northeastern 42-6.

In the sectional, the Tigers have cruised to wins over Wes-Del 39-7 and Tindley 41-0. Junior quarterback Kayne Ervin is 89-of-148 through the air, with 1,203 yards and 13 touchdowns to his credit. Senior Mason Romack has 38 receptions, six for scores.

Romack is also the leading rusher, with 803 yards and 12 TDs, followed by sophomore Aiden Grover, who has 793 yards and 13 touchdowns to his credit. Junior Peyton Meyer dominates the defense with 147 tackles, 17 for a loss, while sophomore Roy Thornbury has made 10 tackles for a loss, with 4.5 sacks.

The No. 5-ranked Blackhawks are 10-1, and reached the championship with wins over Union City 62-0 and Monroe Central 42-26. Senior Peyton Cross has had a sensational season rushing the ball, with 1,854 yards and 23 touchdowns. On defense, Bales leads with 123 tackles, followed by Jones with 120 and Cross with 108. Jones has made 17 tackles for a loss, with Bales getting 11 and Cross 10. DeCraene has made four sacks.
