Noblesville's Promise Road Elementary School Principal Christy Martino and Assistant Principal Billy Fama flew over their school Thursday in World War II Stearman biplanes to celebrate the Promise Road PTO meeting its \$25,000 fundraising goal.

The flights were courtesy of Larry Jacobi, a former school board member and NHS math teacher, and pilot Trip Kellher. Jacobi has been flying for over 50 years and owns the Noblesville airport near Promise Road Elementary. He and Kelher flew the principals over the school three times and then took them on extended flights over Noblesville.

As they were boarding, Martino reported being "terrified, but also super excited." She connected her fear of



The Reporter learned Friday of the removal of a Democratic poll worker from an early voting site in Carmel. The Hamilton County Election Office confirmed the poll worker was removed for electioneering.

Hamilton County Republican Party Chair Mario Massillamany released the following statement Friday afternoon:

"Today, a Democrat poll worker in Carmel was removed from working an early voting site for attempting to pressure voters not to support one of our GOP-endorsed school board candidates. I have been in communication with local election officials to make sure poll workers are reminded that such activity, called electioneering, is illegal.

LETTER

I was well aware of Otis' war experiences largely due to a harrowing 7,000-word account he wrote for the Tell City News not long after the war ended. My grandparents saved a copy, and I often reread Otis' firsthand, heroic accounts involving bullets, bayonets, beheadings, and other atrocities that occurred in the Pacific Ocean theater.

But the typewritten letter sent by Park was totally new to me. Dated Feb. 26, 1946, it was addressed to Mrs. D. E. Beach, of Chelsea, Mich. The letter provides an intimate glimpse into the mind of a soldier who wrote not only of a fallen comrade, but of a best friend.

Here is Otis' letter. (Note: I did fix a few spelling and punctuation issues.) Dear Mrs. Beach:

May I please ask your forgiveness for not writing to you sooner, but I have been in the hospital for some time, and I had lost your address until today. In baggage which just recently arrived from overseas I found the identification tags which I am enclosing.

I realize how fruitless any word of mine may be in trying to heal the wound which no doubt has pierced deeply within your heart when your son Captain Kenneth O. Beach never came home.







Clarifying wording of Westfield Washington Schools referendum

Public Question Clarification

WESTFIELD WASHINGTON SCHOOLS QUESTION

Shall the Westfield Washington Schools continue to impose increased property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and business for eight (8) years immediately following the holding of the referendum for the purpose of retaining and attracting teachers and staff, funding academic and educationally related programs at current levels, and managing class sizes while changing the previously approved maximum referendum tax rate from \$0.20 to \$0.17? The property tax increase requested in this referendum was originally approved by the voters in 2016 and originally increased the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a residence within the school corporation by 16.0% and originally increased the average property tax paid to the school corporation per year on a business property within the school corporation by 14.2%."





According to the Hamilton County Harvest (HCH) Food Bank, Hamilton County ranks seventh highest among Indiana's counties in number of food-insecure individuals – 24,270 people. A total of 21 percent of working adults are not earning enough to afford essential resources for their families.

Food pantries and children's meal programs primarily rely on food banks and donations to supply the food they distribute to people in need.

At HCH, this has been a second record year for food distributions. Food purchases are 48 percent of all distributions, which includes purchased meat, produce,



non-perishable staples and kid-friendly items.

HCH will distribute over 138,000 pounds of healthy food throughout the year. One meal is considered 1.2 pounds of food. To help keep food pantries and meal programs stocked with vegetables, soup, meat, and many more healthy items, HCH has set a goal to collect 50,000 pounds of donated food this 2022 holiday season.

For perspective, that's 40,000 meals.

High School Football Sectional Championships -

ROYALS REJOICE!

Southeastern prevails over Fishers, takes first sectional title in 11 years

FISHERS - Slow and steady wins the race.

Or, in Hamilton Southeastern's case, fast and steady wins the sectional champi-

The Class 6A No. 1-ranked Royals played a game that was steady, yet took full advantage of their sensational runners. When the dust settled, Southeastern had won its first sectional title in 11 years, triumphing over host Fishers 35-13 in the Sectional 3 championship on Friday.

"The goal is to always be a champion," said Royals coach Michael Kelly. Southeastern started its championship run in Week 9 by winning the Hoosier Crossroads Conference trophy, then added the sectional title with two big wins, keeping HSE unbeaten for the season at 11-0.

After a pair of scoreless drives to begin the game, the Royals struck first midway through the first quarter. Jalen Alexander set up Southeastern's first score by making a 63-yard run to get to the Tigers' three-yard line. Azariah Wallace then pushed the ball in, scoring from four yards.

The Royals' second touchdown came at the beginning of the second quarter. Donovan Hamilton tossed a pass to Jack Osiecki, who took it 50 yards for the score. Carter Gutt made both extra-point kicks, and Southeastern led 14-0.

Fishers got on the board in the next drive with a perfect hook and ladder play. Lucas Minns passed the ball to Aidan Zimmer, who flipped it to Khobie Martin, who ran in 15 yards to score.

The margin stayed at 14-6 until late in the second quarter when Alexander took off again. This time, it was a 53-yard rush into the end zone. Gutt kicked the extra point,

and that made the score 21-6 at halftime.

"He ran really hard," said Kelly, who called Alexander's game one of his best nights. "He gave great effort and was able to get off and break some tackles, which was huge," said the coach, who also credited assistant coach Harvey Allen with "coaching him up and getting him ready to play."

'Rocks turn tide on Millers

Westfield powers through second half to third consecutive sectional championship

WESTFIELD - From their first series, it seemed like Noblesville was ready to go toe-to-toe for four quarters with No. 9 Westfield in the Class 6A Sectional 4 football championship.

If it weren't for four extremely key plays that went the way of Westfield, Noblesville could have kept itself in the game. Instead, the 'Rocks took advantage of those situations en route to their third consecutive sectional championship and seventh in the last 10 seasons, 42-21 over the Millers on Friday night at Riverview Health Stadium.

On Noblesville's first drive, it got patient immediately, taking the ball 80 yards in 11 plays, which the Millers finished off by a Logan Shoffner 37-yard scamper to the end zone. Westfield blocked a low PAT at the line to keep the score 6-0 Millers.

Westfield came right back with a solid somewhat short drive of 55 yards that gave them their first lead at 7-6. Kendall Garnett scored on a four-yard touchdown run.

The 'Rocks then forced the Millers to punt. After a punt from Jack Letourneau got a nice roll, punt returner Andrew Lieske picked it up and broke free up the middle for a 64-yard punt return TD, giving Westfield the lead at 14-6, early in the second.

The momentum shifted slightly, but not for long.

The Millers then grounded out a 22-play drive that went 65 yards and used up 11:36 of the first half clock to tie the score on Gabe Bellan's one-yard TD plunge. Shoffner dove over the goal line for the two-point conversion to tie it 14-14 at halftime.

"That was a great play by Andrew (Lieske), but then they scored to tie it up. The second half, I thought we got all kinds of momentum," stated Westfield head coach Jake Gilbert on Lieske's punt return touchdown.

Westfield received the third quarter kickoff and it seemed like they came out with authority and were simply on a mission.

The Shamrocks faced a fourth down and one at their own 49 and went for it. Dillon Thieneman lined up wide left and ran into the backfield. He took the handoff on a reverse and converted the fourth down clear down to the Miller 26 for a 25-yard gain.

That eventually set up Garnett's second TD of the night from two yards out that made it 21-14.

"The game plan was going really well until we couldn't match the 21-14 when we had the fumble and then they were able to convert it to 28-14," said Noblesville head coach Dave Sharpe on his game plan.
