Teaching the next generation how to build the future is as easy as ABC

The ABC Commercial Construction Prep Academy, 11837 Technology Lane, Fishers, held forklift training for students from Oct. 28 to Nov. 4. Students were able to operate the forklifts between Nov. 1 and 3.

Enrollment in the academy has increased by 33 percent this year. Last year, ABC had a 100-percent placement, with a start date in writing, for any student who wanted and was available for a paid summer internship, paid adult internship leading to full time employment, or full-time employment. The academy expects the same this year.

The ABC Commercial Construction Prep Academy is a two-year program with a focus on the carpentry, electrical, and plumbing trades.


Construction of Carmel's first mosque will move forward after multiyear zoning fight

The first Mosque is being built in Carmel. Al Salam Foun**dation** is moving forward nearly three years after a judge blocked an effort to stop it. Mosque representatives say the groundbreaking felt like a holiday.

Al Salam founders dreamed up the idea for the Islamic Life Center roughly a decade ago, so finally getting the go ahead to build now is exciting. They say at the end of the day, they



H. H. Holmes' murder castle

Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School's 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams.

After a long drive or a day away from home, a hotel is the perfect place to stay. Fairly affordable, ho-



tels are a home away from home! But what if the hotel you were staying in was booby-trapped?

This was a shocking reality for the victims of H. H. Holmes' "murder castle," who were not warned of the dangers inside. They didn't know until it was too late.

Holmes' original name was Herman Webster Mudgett. He was born in New Hampshire in 1861, according to history.com. He had a family - a wife and two children - soon abandoning them to move to Illinois, where he changed his name to H. H. Holmes. A while after, he got a job at a pharmacy near his new home. He eventually became the owner of the tiny shop and began building a castle-like structure which would soon be titled the "murder castle."

Holmes built the castle with soundproof rooms, secret passageways, and a disorienting maze of hallways and stairs. There were trap doors in the guest rooms so he could drop the victims down to the basement, where he did unspeakable things to them. He is said to have killed over 200 people. but the exact number is not known. Holmes killed his assistant and two of his children, soon running away with his wife while living off his assistant's insurance money.

Holmes was arrested because the police found one of the child's bodies. He admitted to killing children and many people; however, he was only "charged" for killing one child, since there was no proof of other killings. He dissolved his victims' bodies in acid, leading to many victims being unnamed. There are many people who will never be identified, for there were barely any remains. Another way he got rid of his victims was by putting them through a crematorium, meaning they were burned to ash. Little to no evidence of these crimes remained. Holmes could not be prosecuted without this evidence.

Holmes had a choice, and he chose to create a labyrinth to torture people. It was like a thirst or hunger for killing people he could not explain. Killing his assistant's children led to the discovery of one of their bodies, leading to his arrest, then to his death.

Next time you check into a hotel, do some research on the backstory of it. You might find something creepy or something cool!

Who were Indiana's first two Senators?

1811 – The Battle of Tippecanoe was fought at Prophetstown, near the junction of the Wabash and Tippecanoe rivers. Native American forces, led by the Prophet, the brother of Shawnee Chief Tecumseh, attacked United States soldiers led by William Henry Harrison. The battle, which lasted two hours, was a victory for Harrison's army and broke Tecumseh's dream of a Native American Confederation.

1816 – The Indiana General Assembly, preparing for statehood, elected the state's first two United States Senators. They chose James Noble, an attorney and circuit judge from Brookville, and Waller Taylor, a territorial iudge from Vincennes. Both men served in the Senate until their deaths, Waller in 1826 and Noble in 1831.

1918 – World War I ended with the signing of an armistice at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month. More than 130,000 men and women from Indiana served in the war, which had started for the United States in April of 1917.

1967 – Attorney and Civil Rights Leader Richard Hatcher was elected mayor

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of Gary. He was one of the first African Americans to be elected mayor of a large American city. He served five terms and became known for developing innovative approaches to solving urban problems. A statue of Mayor Hatcher was unveiled outside the City Hall in Gary in 2019.

1978 – Janet Flanner died in New York City. Born in Indianapolis in 1892, she attended the Tudor Hall School for Girls. She was a long-time Paris correspondent for the New Yorker magazine and associated with fellow Americans Ernest Hemingway, F. Scott Fitzgerald, E. E. Cummings, and Gertrude Stein.

1986 Hoosiers premiered at the Circle Theater in Indianapolis. Loosely based on the 1954 Milan High School basketball team, the movie was shot entirely in Indiana and has become one of the most popular sports films of all time. Film Critic Roger Ebert awarded the picture a full five stars. "Hoosiers works a magic," he wrote, "in getting us to care about the fate of the team and the people depending on it ... it is a movie that is all heart."

MUNCIE – Hamilton Southeastern powered its way to a first-ever volleyball state championship on Saturday.

Yorktown took its momentum from the end of the first set and ran away with the second set. The Tigers put up leads of 8-3, 11-4 and 20-6. Southeastern fought back at the end of the set with a five-point run, which

included an ace by Kaylyn Christy and another Hobson kill. But Yorktown sophomore Charlotte Vinson got the last two points to tie the match at one set all.

That set the stage for a hard-fought third set. Yorktown again jumped out to a big lead, going up 14-6. at Ball State University's But the Royals' Goss hit a Worthen Arena, the No. kill to start a huge South-
