

It was very expensive and often took months to complete. Now, DNA profiling has become faster and more user-friendly."

"We've identified approximake all reasonable mately 100 bones that we know are viable for DNA extraction," Jellison said. "Many of these bones are very, very small -"I don't believe small as a fingernail because they were crushed. Many of the longer bones were burnt before they were discarded, so DNA may not exist in those bones."

## When can I move my vehicle?

An issue has risen over the years when people often inquire about the rule on moving their vehicle after an automobile accident. With the proliferation of iPads, Minis, and cell phone cameras, it is always wise to document the accident scene as soon as practi-

cable after the vehicles come to rest.

It seems prudent to move the vehicles out of the traveled portion to avoid further harm to self as well as to others, but many people are under the impression that they were prohibited in doing so.

Effective July 1, 2016, Indiana passed a new statute. It reads that the operator of a motor vehicle involved in an accident must stop at the scene of the accident as close as possible in a manner that does not obstruct traffic more than is necessary. The driver is then to remain at the scene of the accident until their name and address and registration of the motor vehicle can be given to any other driver or passenger involved in the accident.

Additionally, the driver must exhibit his or her operator's license to any person involved in the accident, including any passengers. If the accident results in injury or death of another person, the driver shall additionally provide reasonable assistance to each injured person and give notice of the accident in the quickest means possible to the local police department or the 911 telephone operator.



"I tell people these people were forgotten, but they're not forgotten any longer," he said.

an unattended vehicle or damage to property other than a vehicle, the driver shall also take reasonable steps to locate and notify the owner or person in charge of the damaged property. If they are unable to find the owner or the person in charge of

If the collision involves the damaged property, the driver must contact local law enforcement agency and provide the information noted above. The law makes it a criminal offense to fail to provide the information.

> The statute specifically provides that if the vehicle comes to stop in the traveled portion of a highway, the driver must move the vehicle off the traveled portion to a location as close

to the accident as possible. However, a driver cannot move the motor vehicle if it involves a transportation of hazardous materials or results in injury or death of a person or the entrapment of a person in a vehicle.





# Noblesville farmer credits his technique to raising healthy turkeys for Thanksgiving

Prices have increased for Thanksgiving dinner. Since last year, the traditional meal for the holiday has been impacted by supply chain issues, and now farms.

Farmers have worked overtime to bring you a healthy product. That includes Ron Thieme. He's owned Hoosier Heritage Farm, 15123 E. 146th St., Noblesville, since 2013. He credits his farming technique to helping him dodge can take 10,000 turkeys in

holiday.

"I run a pasture-based farm," Thieme explained. "I don't feed the animals genetically modified substances, and we don't use growth hormones or antibiotics."

Hoosier Heritage Farm disease outbreaks among has not been impacted by the avian flu that wiped out entire flocks at some Indiana farms this year.

"Our turkeys live out here on the pasture in the grass, so they're very resistant to diseases unlike big, concentrated animal feeding operations where one virus the deadly disease that's a day," Thieme said. "That

wiped-out birds before the just doesn't happen here."

Farm operations continue to grow each year.

'This year, we raised about 300 turkeys," he said. "Next year, there will be

about 400 to 500 turkeys." Costs have gone up too.

"Inflation is affecting us in a big way," Thieme said. "Almost all our inputs across the board, and I just did this calculation the other day. Probably on the order of 50 percent this year. Sometimes they've doubled."

The farm has sold their **products** to the consumer directly, instead of placing the products on store
