# Fox Hollow serial killer's victims may finally all be identified soon

*Jellison works to give families closure after 26 years*

Twenty-six years ago, deputies from the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office searched the grounds of Fox Hollow Farms, located just west of U.S. 31 on 156th Street in Westfield. The search resulted in the discovery of thousands of decomposed and charred remains of what is believed to be at least 25 people.

The property where the remains were found was owned by Herbert Baumeister, an individual that police suspected in luring gay men to his home and then killing them. Baumeister died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound shortly after the investigation began.

From the discovery of these remains, only eight people were identified.

Jeff Jellison, who takes office in January as the new Hamilton County coroner, said DNA technology has advanced, and it is time to identify the rest of the men.

"These remains represent people," Jellison said. "For the past 26 years these people have been placed on a shelf at the University of Indianapolis, and that is not acceptable. We need to make every effort possible to identify these people and return them to their loved ones."

The University of Indianapolis Archeology and Forensic Lab was used during the initial investigation to help police excavate remains. They also as-

sisted in identifying the eight individuals, Jellison explained.

Indiana law requires the coroner to make all reasonable attempts to identify individuals found deceased in their county.

"I don't believe we have met our obligation," Jellison said. "Just because we couldn't do something 26 years ago doesn't mean we should just give up and walk away. DNA was a relatively new tool for law enforcement 26 years ago. It was very expensive and often took months to complete. Now, DNA profiling has become faster and more user-friendly."

Jellison said his office needs

comparison samples. Nearly 10,000 bones and bone fragments were discovered at Fox Hollow Farms.

"We've identified approximately 100 bones that we know are viable for DNA extraction," Jellison said. "Many of these bones are very, very small — small as a fingernail because they were crushed. Many of the longer bones were burnt before they were discarded, so DNA may not exist in those bones."

Baumeister was believed to have coerced young men in Indianapolis gay bars to return to his Westfield house before killing them. He took his own life before law enforcement could arrest him.

## When can I move my vehicle?

An issue has risen over the years when people often inquire about the rule on moving their vehicle after an automobile accident. With the proliferation of iPads, Minis, and cell phone cameras, it is always wise to document the accident scene as soon as practicable after the vehicles come to rest.

It seems prudent to move the vehicles out of the traveled portion to avoid further harm to self as well as to others, but many people are under the impression that they were prohibited in doing so.

Effective July 1, 2016, Indiana passed a new statute. It reads that the operator of a motor vehicle involved in an accident must stop at the scene of the accident as close as possible in a manner that does not obstruct traffic more than is necessary. The driver is then to remain at the scene of the accident until their name and address and registration of the motor vehicle can be given to any other driver or passenger involved in the accident.

Additionally, the driver must exhibit his or her operator's license to any person involved in the accident, including any passengers. If the accident results in injury or death of another person, the driver shall additionally provide reasonable assistance to each injured person and give notice of the accident in the quickest means possible to the local police department or the 911 telephone operator.

Jellison is stressing the need for anyone with a male relative or friend missing from the 1980s to mid-1990s in Indiana or other states to come forward and give a DNA sample or a tip to help the investigation.

“If anyone is a family member of a male individual that went missing in the mid-80s to mid-90s, we need you to step forward and provide us with a DNA sample,” Jellison said. “The process is quick, simple, and only involves swabbing the inside of the cheek.”

In an effort to identify the remains, Jellison will lead a group of investigators representing the Hamilton

County Sheriff’s Department, Fishers Police Department DNA Unit, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department Missing Persons Division, Indiana State Police Biology Unit, the University of Indianapolis’ Archeology and Forensic Lab, and deputies from the Hamilton County Coroner’s Office.

“We have a huge job in front of us; however, I have confidence this team of police officers and forensic specialists will exhaust all efforts to identify the individuals that were brutally murdered and discarded on Herb Baumeister’s property,” Jellison concluded.

The investigation would not be happening without Jellison’s dedication. He said he wants to bring closure and give the men a final resting place.

“I tell people these people were forgotten, but they’re not forgotten any longer,” he said.

If the collision involves an unattended vehicle or damage to property other than a vehicle, the driver shall also take reasonable steps to locate and notify the owner or person in charge of the damaged property. If they are unable to find the owner or the person in charge of

the damaged property, the driver must contact local law enforcement agency and provide the information noted above. The law makes it a criminal offense to fail to provide the information.

The statute specifically provides that if the vehicle comes to stop in the traveled portion of a highway, the driver must move the vehicle off the traveled portion to a location as close

to the accident as possible. However, a driver cannot move the motor vehicle if it involves a transportation of hazardous materials or results in injury or death of a person or the entrapment of a person in a vehicle.

# Noblesville farmer credits his technique to raising healthy turkeys for Thanksgiving

Prices have increased for Thanksgiving dinner. Since last year, the traditional meal for the holiday has been impacted by supply chain issues, and now disease outbreaks among farms.

Farmers have worked overtime to bring you a healthy product. That includes Ron Thieme. He's owned **Hoosier Heritage Farm**, 15123 E. 146th St., Noblesville, since 2013. He credits his farming technique to helping him dodge the deadly disease that's

wiped-out birds before the holiday.

"I run a pasture-based farm," Thieme explained. "I don't feed the animals genetically modified substances, and we don't use growth hormones or antibiotics."

Hoosier Heritage Farm has not been impacted by the avian flu that wiped out entire flocks at some Indiana farms this year.

"Our turkeys live out here on the pasture in the grass, so they're very resistant to diseases unlike big, concentrated animal feeding operations where one virus can take 10,000 turkeys in a day," Thieme said. "That

just doesn't happen here."

Farm operations continue to grow each year.

"This year, we raised about 300 turkeys," he said. "Next year, there will be about 400 to 500 turkeys."

Costs have gone up too.

"Inflation is affecting us in a big way," Thieme said. "Almost all our inputs across the board, and I just did this calculation the other day. Probably on the order of 50 percent this year. Sometimes they've doubled."

The farm has **sold their products** to the consumer directly, instead of placing the products on store shelves.

# Man charged in Fishers road rage shooting now connected to road rage case in Noblesville

For the second day in a row, investigators in Hamilton County have connected an Anderson man to a road rage shooting.

Trevor Dahl, 24, is charged with one count of attempted murder, one count of aggravated battery, one count of intimidation, one count of criminal recklessness, and one count of pointing a firearm.

On Nov. 17, an officer with the Fishers Police Department was sent to the 7800 block of the west-bound lanes of East 96th Street on reports of a person shot in their right leg. That's on the south side of Fishers just east of Interstate 69. Upon arrival, officers were told a man, who had been shot in the leg, was sent to a local hospital.

The man later told investigators he was going to Meijer after visiting his girlfriend's apartment. He turned south on the access road leading to the Meijer parking lot and a white sedan was stopped with its brake lights on.

The man said he came close to the car and honked his horn, hoping the white sedan would move. When the car did not move, the man drove around and continued toward the parking lot, court documents say.

The man told investigators that "he observed in his rear-view mirrors the white sedan was now traveling right behind him at a very close distance," court papers say. He then "brake-checked" the white sedan and continued toward the entrance doors of Meijer, but was cut off the car.

According to court documents, he "became fearful and turned around."

As he drove away, the white sedan followed him

and pulled up next to his car.

The man said that "he then heard several shots and immediately felt pain in his right knee. He recognized he had been shot and attempted to bring his vehicle to a stop," court papers say.

The white sedan fled the scene.

Investigators began looking for a suspect. With a license plate search, they found the white sedan belonged to a car dealership in Carmel. The dealership gave investigators five names of people who were leasing white sedans, including Dahl.

According to court papers, Dahl has prior arrests ranging from narcotics to burglary. He is also suspected of discharging a firearm into an Indianapolis home last month.


Investigators found that Dahl worked at a car dealership in Fishers. They went to that dealership and searched Dahl's car.

"Located within the vehicle was two boxes of PMC 9 mm ammunition. This is the same brand and caliber of the casings that were located at the scene," court papers say.

Dahl was arrested and questioned. Investigators found a firearm in his backpack.

"The firearm ... that was recovered from Dahl's backpack, is the same caliber that would have discharged the casings that were recovered from the scene," court papers say.

Investigators later interviewed several witnesses, including the person that was with Dahl in the car at the time of the shooting. The witness told investigators Dahl said in the car that

"that is what happens when you brake-check people," court papers say.

## Road rage in Noblesville

On Wednesday, the Noblesville Police Department linked Dahl to a road rage case that occurred on the evening of Nov. 14.

According to investigators, officers were called to Reggie's Motor Works in the 1300 block of South 10th Street around 6:30 p.m. that night.

A man in a truck who was salting the parking lot at the business said he had a confrontation with a man in a car, with the man in the car stopping his vehicle in the street, yelling a threat and then firing a shot into the air.

Noblesville police worked to find the identity of the driver and learned of the Fishers investigation. Fishers investigators were able to track down the make, model and plate number on the suspect vehicle in their case.

A search of the plate revealed that the vehicle was owned by Ed Martin Acura in Indianapolis. Staff at the dealer said the vehicle was being rented out to Dahl, who worked at an Andy Mohr location in Fishers.

Further investigation led police to believe Dahl was the suspect in both cases.

Dahl faces felony charges of attempted murder, aggravated battery, intimidation, criminal recklessness and pointing a firearm in the Fishers case.

Online court records indicate he had an initial appearance in court on Wednesday afternoon where his bail was set at \$1 million, and he was appointed a public defender.

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita warns Hoosiers of Black Friday and Cyber Monday shopping scams this holiday season. While every consumer wants to get the best bang for their buck, it's important to use caution and do some research before spending your hard-earned money.

According to the Better Business Bureau, financial fraud and identity theft reports increase at this time of year, largely due to online scams. In 2021, the BBB revealed 35 percent of fraud reports were the result of an online scam.

"For many Hoosiers, the holiday season is about showing your family and

friends how much you care through generosity," Rokita said. "Sadly, these criminals view it as an opportunity to steal innocent people's money and identities. I encourage everyone to be extra cautious while holiday shopping this year."

Rokita issued the following tips to help Hoosiers shop safely:

- If a product is advertised at an unbelievably low price that sounds too good to be true, it likely is.

- Be extra cautious when booking through an unfamiliar company. Check the Better Business Bureau ratings and reviews of the company to see if there have been any allegations of scams.

- The other party insists on immediate payment, or payment by electronic funds transfer or a wire service. They may insist that

you pay up-front for vouchers before you can access a cheap deal or a giveaway.

- The social media-based store is very new and selling products at very low prices. The store may

have limited information about delivery and other policies.

- An online retailer does not provide adequate information about privacy, terms and conditions of use, dispute resolution or contact details. The seller may be based overseas, or the seller does not allow payment through a secure payment service such as PayPal or a credit card transaction.

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

Panthers pounce on Golden Eagles

Guerin Catholic fights hard in season opener at Park Tudor

**INDIANAPOLIS** — The Guerin Catholic boys basketball team didn't give itself an easy assignment when it traveled to Park Tudor on Wednesday for the Golden Eagles' season-opening game.

That was by design, of course. Guerin Catholic fought hard against a talented and tall Panthers team in an up-and-down game. The Golden Eagles led in the first half before Park Tudor came back and eventually won 70-66 at the Panthers' brand-new athletic facility.

The outside shooting of Park Tudor was difficult for Guerin Catholic to overcome, as the Panthers made 13 3-pointers during the game.

"We are going to be better because of this game tonight," said GC coach Bobby Allen. "That's why we want to play them early in the season. We know it's going to be a hard game. I thought our guys completed extremely hard."

The Golden Eagles trailed only once in the first half, when they were down 5-2 early in the first quarter. Guerin erased that with an 8-0 run; Dylan Murans hit a triple, then Kamea Chandler converted a three-point play and a layin.

Chandler had a sensational game, starting with nine points in that first period. He continued to score in the second quarter, adding another six points. The Golden Eagles' Robert Sorensen added five in that period, including a 3, and Lucas Parker nailed a 3 late in the quarter to give Guerin Catholic a 36-22 lead.

But Park Tudor began its comeback before halftime, as Jermaine Coleman hit two triples to bring the Panthers back within 36-28 by half-

time. Coleman continued his hot shooting during the third quarter with two more 3s; his second triple brought Park Tudor within 41-40. Thomas Ruffin then threw in a 3, and the Panthers were up 43-41 with three minutes left in the third.

"They hit big-time shots," said Allen. "We lost some of their key guys, which we weren't supposed to do."

The remainder of the game was close all the way, with several point swings. Sorensen's layin got GC up 46-43, but the Panthers went on a 6-0 run for a 49-46 advantage. Josh Holba made a

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


