students and adults to these work camps. In Group Mission Trips' 32 years, they have repaired over 56,000 homes."

Lohe continued, "This effort is one of four church initiatives called, 'For Our Neighbor.' We are trying to meet, know, enjoy, and serve our local neighbors. Our next community event is our annual Pizza and Punchlines, a free family friendly comedy event held at 6 p.m. on Feb. 18, 2023, for pizza with the show at 7 p.m. at Westfield High School."

CrossRoads wants both to be good neighbors and also engage others in helping neighbors in the community.

"In addition to seeking applications for repair sites, we are also seeking businesses or service organizations to serve with us," Lohe said. "Can you cook up some hot dogs and have them available when the kids come back from sites? Or take out popsicles or water to a couple of work sites during the week to say, 'Thank you. We're glad you are here and thanks for what you are doing'?" It is not just about us as a church trying to do something for our neighbor, it's also about engaging people in our community to be the best neighbors we can be. We have been blessed to have the support to aid in material costs by the Central Indiana Community Foundation and the Westfield-Washington Schools for hosting our students for the week."

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County bucking the trend in fentanyl-related deaths?

We hear in the news that the overdose deaths attributed to the very dangerous drug fentanyl is killing thousands across the nation. So, how bad is this national tragedy here in Hamilton County?

The figures indicate that thus far in 2022 there has not been any dramatic increase in the number of local deaths due to this deadly drug, a drug that is usually mixed with cocaine or other dangerous drugs.

As of Oct. 17, there were 31 drug overdose deaths attributed to fentanyl compared with 36 fatalities in all of 2021. While

this is not good, officials believe this year's death toll by year's end is not going to be much, if any, higher than last year.

This can be considered good news only when compared with the national trend of so many more such deaths each year. County Coroner John Chalfin says the fentanyl supply continues to come from China by way of Mexico where the drug is processed for shipment across the porous southern border to the U.S.

The reason Hamilton County appears to be holding the line on drug deaths is uncertain. But,

Chief Deputy Coroner Jeff Jellison believes that first responders equipped with Narcan and the proximity of most residents to good hospitals is a major factor.

Narcan is a drug that counteracts the effects of certain other drugs including fentanyl if administered quickly after a person suffers first effects.

This year, the coroner's office has been called to investigate a total of 524 cases as of last month. They included mostly cases of non-drug related deaths: suicides, homicides, traffic crashes, etc.

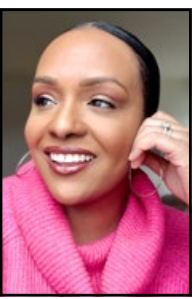

After receiving a Bachelor of Arts in Politics from Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Mass., she earned a Masters of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary where she was awarded the George L. Rentschler prize in Speech Communication.

Her career began in the roles of associate pastor of youth and non-profit public relations director. She served as Director of Mission and Community Development for the United Methodist Church of Greater New Jersey. There she launched hope centers across the region that provide wrap around services for families experiencing poverty. She also preached, equipped, and developed teams of disciples in rural, suburban, and urban congregations.

Prior to her appointment at Noblesville First, she served as the Pastor of Mission and Mobilization at St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Indianapolis, one of the largest congregations in the United Methodist Church. She led a team that served 10,000 people annually in housing, education, justice, and food insecurity while deploying over 3,000 volunteers. She also led the congregation in the launch of a small business incubator, Northside Indianapolis' first Freedom School, and community-wide trainings on becoming anti-racist. An advocate for children's education and equity, she was twice awarded Wash-

ington Township Schools' Superintendent's Service Award.

In 2018, Caldwell-Gross founded The Well, a virtual community of women that grew to 500 members in 90 days. She later

transformed this community into a podcast, *The Well Unfiltered*. Noting her ability to connect with people in digital and physical spaces, she has been tapped to develop resources and convene conversations with Amplify Media and Abingdon Press. In 2020, she co-authored *Justice or Just Us: A Biblical Call to Confront Racism* and this year released *The Big Picture: Seeing God's Dream for Your Life* with co-author Rev. Dr. Jevon Caldwell-Gross.


While God's call has led Caldwell-Gross to Dubai, Calcutta, Johannesburg, and Havana, her most meaningful mission field is here in Noblesville, where she resides with her partner in marriage and ministry, Rev. Dr. Jevon Caldwell-Gross. They are outnumbered by their three children: Joshua, Olivia and Isabella.

Fishers woman with Noblesville foot spa charged with business corruption, prostitution

A Fishers woman who operates a Noblesville foot spa is scheduled to be formally charged today with corrupt business influence and promoting prostitute, online court records show.

Xiaomei Zhao, 55, also is charged with felony counts of theft, tax evasion and failure to remit taxes, and a misdemeanor charge of prostitution.

Police were alerted by Noblesville Fire Department personnel about a patron who'd been to Lucky Foot Spa, 17687 Cumberland Road. That's in a strip mall at the intersection with State Roads 32 and 38.

The patron told authorities he'd paid \$60 for an hourlong body massage, but

that she fondled him during the massage. The patron said he stopped the act, and Zhao apologized and left the massage room.

Indiana State Police and Noblesville Police Department conducted covert operations at the foot spa in October and November, in which fondling also happened.

A March search by Fishers and Noblesville police agencies as well as the Indiana departments of Revenue and Homeland Security at Zhao's business and home had secured records that led to the charges. State records show the business was organized in December 2019.

Online court records show Zhao will be formally charged Wednesday in Hamilton Circuit Court.

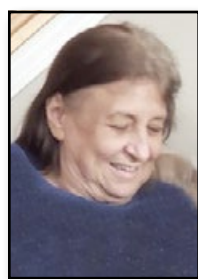

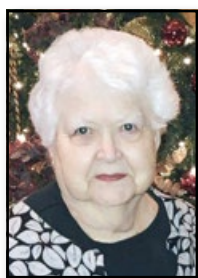

“She’s a great coach,” said Bradshaw. “She sits right at the front of my bench and helps me keep track of stats. She sees things from a player’s perspective, so it’s nice to have those eyes and ears just right next to me during games, as well as the coaches’ eyes and ears.”

Sheridan is 3-4 for the season and plays again Friday against Clinton Prairie, part of a home Hoosier Heartland Conference girls-boys doubleheader.

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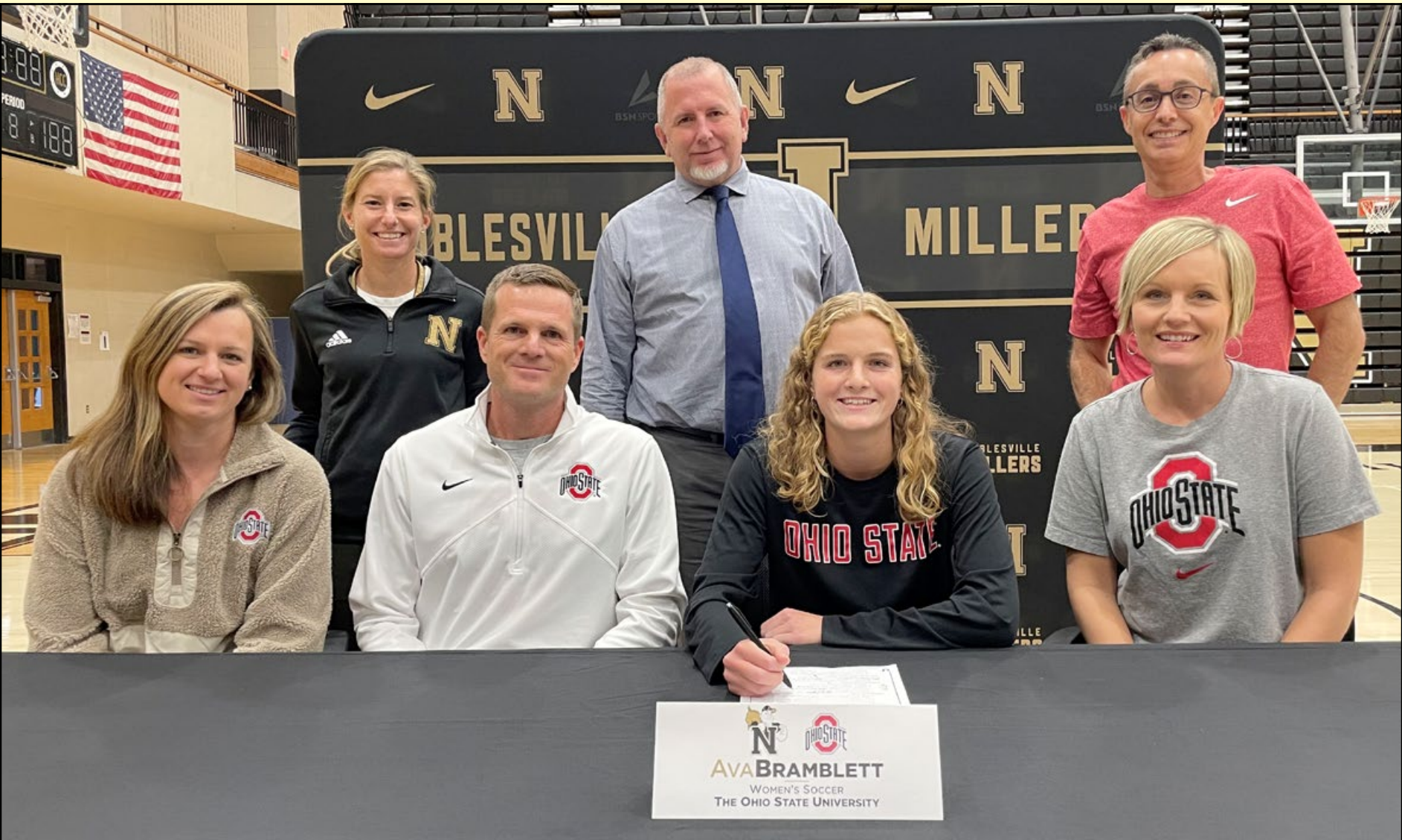
