Uh-oh! Christmas is about to hit the stage in Carmel

A year of concerts in a roundabout way

Kate Hinman had taken a little break from theater before agreeing to direct *Uh-Oh, Here Comes Christmas!* for Carmel Community Players (CCP). Hinman told The Reporter she got a copy of the script from Lori Raffel to help her decide if this was the show to bring her back into the community theater world.

“It is a series of vignettes, and after the third vignette I knew I wanted to do it because it is just a wonderful show,” Hinman said.

This charming show takes a funny, heartwarming and often poignant look at the struggle to find the spirit of the holidays amid the avalanche of commercialism, stress and chaos that crashes down every December.

The play is a collection of Christmas stories taken from Robert Fulghum’s books. Fulghum is the best-selling author of *All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten*.

With a cast of five, there are several characters who only exist in the imagination.

wedding scene where a Catholic man and a Jewish girl get married,” Hinman said. “You never actually see them, but you know that they’re there. Truly, this is an actor’s show. There is no fourth wall. They are constantly moving between narrating and interacting with these unseen characters on stage. It has very minimal props and a lot of stuff is mimed.”

Hinman said she was blessed with easy casting for this show.

“The second night of auditions, four people showed up and they were all perfect,” Hinman said. “So, I just cast them that night. It took me about another week to find the fifth per-

son. After the first readthrough, they just meshed. We are having a ball in rehearsals. We laugh so much every night.”

There are abundant of laughs to be found in this show, but there are also some deeply touching moments.

“I have already said we need

to have Kleenex in the auditorium,” Hinman said. “These are stories people are going to relate to. It’s a very human show. It’s not like any play I have ever directed. It’s not a story that starts at one end and ends at the other.”

It is also a show that will bring audiences both the magic of Christmas and of good theater.

“It is a very non-standard show,” Hinman said. “I want the audience to know they are going to experience magic and to use their imaginations. I’m working very hard with the cast to make sure as they are miming things that the interact with the unseen characters. We know they are supposed to be there, but the audience has to ‘see’ them. I think that will come very easily to audiences once the show begins.”

When I moved here about a year ago, I soon realized how lucky I was to be living near many other music venues as well. The Jazz Kitchen gave us the opportunity to sit several feet away from the great trumpeter/composer/Renaissance music man Terence Blanchard, Spike Lee's movie soundtrack wingman. We are fortunate to have a premier jazz club nearby. Next up, Chuchito Valdés, this January.

Earlier this year, I wrote a column about my failure to land tickets to see Sting at the Palladium at the Center for the Performing Arts in Carmel. The thought of not seeing Sting in the 1,600-seat concert hall crown jewel that is only 30 minutes (an estimated one dozen roundabouts) away was just too much to bear. Somehow, Sting's management read my column, reached out, and offered us sixth row, center seats (free!). Every little thing Sting did that night was magic!

We saw A.J. Croce perform his "Croce Plays Croce" act live at the Tarkington Civic Center, also in Carmel, last March. Even if the show hadn't been an homage to A.J.'s famous old man, I would've seen him anyway. I liked his whimsical chatter between songs, the Juke joint aura of his act, and his reverent references to Big Easy gold standard gods like Allen Toussaint and Dr. John. He delivered a Crescent City state of mind to Carmelites. Mostly at piano, A.J. delivered a melting pot of musical styles, from jazz to blues to rock to soul, with a bit of boogie-woogie to boot.

"He's a good guy and a major talent," says my friend, singer-songwriter Jen Chapin, who is the offspring of another famous '70s singer-songwriter, Harry Chapin. Harry, like Jim, left us way too soon. "I relate to how he is inspired by the legacy of his legendary dad but honors,



in his case, very funky influences," adds Jen, who once toured with him. "A.J.'s music is very much his own." The same can be said about Jen.

That night, he played his own songs, plus covers written by others not named Croce. Mostly, though, he sang the songs written by Papa Jim, a recent departure from his traditional repertoire. I'm not so sure I've seen anyone more musically gifted than A.J. Croce. He is talented with a capital T. Bring him back to the Tark, please.

Thanks to Rock The Ruins at Holliday Park in Indy, we attended another bucket list concert, Bruce Hornsby, and became instant fans of opening act Bonny Light Horseman. This fall, The Cyrus Place in downtown Indy provided us the unique opportunity to enjoy a live quartet performing selections from Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons* within the romantic glow of hundreds of

candles.

The TCU amphitheater at White River State Park proved to be a pleasant surprise this summer. The last time I was there, pre-pandemic, the venue was nothing worth writing home about, merely a hilly lawn with Porta Potties. Now, it is roofed and has real seats and restrooms. This gorgeous, intimate venue's robust 2022 summer concert lineup was the best of any in Indy. We saw Lyle Lovett and John Hiatt there, but our highlight shows were blues god Buddy Guy (who might be older than God) and Chris Isaak, the poster child of stage presence.

Of course, no show we saw in the past year was as fun and nutso as Yacht Rock Revue, also at TCU! Yes, the professional, touring musicians of Yacht Rock Revue did perform mostly cover songs, but it's still rock and roll to me.

Gov. Eric Holcomb was diagnosed Thursday with pneumonia and was hospitalized, his press secretary said in a [Friday afternoon tweet](#).

The tweet did not say where the 54-year-old gov-

ernor was hospitalized.

"Gov. Holcomb went to the doctor Thursday afternoon thinking it was the flu, but he was diagnosed with pneumonia. Out of an abundance of caution he was admitted to the hospital and he's responding well to treatment," said the tweet from press secretary Erin Murphy.

The governor on Thursday had canceled plans to present the Sachem Award to Patricia "Pat" Koch during an event scheduled for Friday morning at Heritage Hills High School in Lincoln City. Koch is an originating partner of Holiday World & Splashin' Safari in Santa Claus.

Three acclaimed vocal groups named to Great American Songbook Hall of Fame

The Lennon Sisters, The Manhattan Transfer & Straight No Chaser honored for contributions to popular music

Celebrating the legacy of vocal harmony in popular music, the Great American Songbook Foundation has selected three acclaimed vocal groups as its 2022 Songbook Hall of Fame inductees.

The Lennon Sisters, The Manhattan Transfer and Straight No Chaser **took part in a video induction ceremony** and will be honored throughout the coming year with programming that explores the traditions of vocal harmony and the impact of these artists on the American Songbook.

"I think there's a magic in vocal harmony, in group harmony," The Manhattan Transfer's Trist Curless said. "There is something about it that just catches people, no matter the style ... Whether it's in a pop song, a rock song, a metal song, a reggae song, when you get to that chorus and there's the harmony parts – everybody is drawn to that."

The Songbook Hall of Fame celebrates lyricists, composers and performers who have helped to create the soundtrack of our lives with their contributions to American popular song. Hall of Fame inductees are selected based on factors including musical influence on other artists, length and depth of career and body of work, innovation and superiority in style and technique, and overall musical excellence. Previous inductees have included George and Ira Gershwin,

Duke Ellington, Ella Fitzgerald, Johnny Mathis, Liza Minnelli, Rita Moreno, and Frank Sinatra.

The Lennon Sisters

One of the most admired and longest-performing female vocal groups in American music history, The Lennon Sisters are marking 67 years since their television debut in 1955 as children on *The Lawrence Welk Show*. Growing up in the public eye with their weekly television performances, the quartet rose to fame as acclaimed recording artists and vibrant live performers throughout the nation.

They are inductees of the National Vocal Group Hall of Fame, honorees of the Hollywood Walk of Fame and the only female vocal group to have performed for seven consecutive U.S. Presidents: Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson, Nixon, Ford, Carter and Reagan. Following the retirement of sisters Peggy in 1999 and Dianne in 2001, the current performing sisters are original group members Kathy and Janet Lennon and their younger sister Mimi.

"After 67 years, there is still nothing like sitting on a stage, and looking at your sisters, and as we blend our voices, we just feel as one heart," Kathy Lennon said.

The Manhattan Transfer

One of popular music's most innovative vocal bands, The Manhattan Transfer is celebrating 50 years since the formation of its classic lineup in 1972.



With hits including a signature arrangement of the jazz standard "Birdland," the quartet has won 10 Grammy Awards and sold millions of records worldwide.

The current lineup features original members Alan Paul and Janis Siegel; Cheryl Bentyne, who replaced Laurel Masse in 1979; and Trist Curless, who replaced founder Tim Hauser after his death in 2014.

Straight No Chaser

The men's ensemble that has brought vocal traditions to new generations of fans, Straight No Chaser is celebrating the 25th anniversary of its founding at Indiana University. Discovered on YouTube by Atlantic Records, the group is known for tight arrangements, impeccable harmonies and a lively sense of humor.

They have built a massive fan base through a series of successful album releases, many national TV appearances, and collaborations with artists including Paul McCartney, Stevie Wonder, Elton John, and

Feds: 2 from Fishers indicted in Texas for laundering stolen money through crypto

According to court documents, 21 people, including two from Fishers, were indicted in Texas for their involvement in a scheme to launder stolen money using crypto currencies.

According to a release from the U.S. Attorney's Office Eastern District of Texas, all 21 people are being charged in a wire and mail fraud conspiracy. Fnu Ankush, 35, and Jenisha Katuwal, 40, both of Fishers, were involved in these schemes.

The release says those involved created a financial infrastructure in the United States to establish shell companies with names that were intended to resemble names of real companies.

"These defendants orchestrated highly organized and sophisticated schemes to launder fraud

proceeds through cryptocurrency," U.S. Attorney Brit Featherston said. "Today's announcement sends a clear message that money laundering networks that service fraud schemes targeting American victims, especially the elderly, will not be tolerated, and those operating such networks will be held accountable. By acting as domestic money launderers for foreign co-conspirators, these defendants played indispensable roles that allowed foreign actors to reach from overseas to target victims in communities across the United States."

Those involved in the scheme also opened and controlled business bank accounts in the names of the shell companies to go through with the computer tech scheme, the release states. They created websites for many shell companies to make the companies appear real,

and persuaded people to deposit, wire, or transfer funds into the bank accounts and mail funds to certain addresses.

The operation has disrupted more than \$300

million in annual money laundering transactions, forfeited millions of dollars in cash and cryptocurrency, and identified thousands of victims, the release states.

Office of the Indiana Attorney General issues statement regarding Dr. Caitlin Bernard case

The Office of Attorney General Todd Rokita on Wednesday released the following statement: "Today, the Office of the Indiana Attorney General filed an Administrative Ac-

tion against Dr. Caitlin Bernard before the Indiana Medical Licensing Board. Based on the physician's own testimony under oath, she violated federal and Indiana law related to patient privacy and the reporting of child abuse. "First, the physician failed to uphold legal and Hippocratic responsibilities by exploiting a 10-year-old little girl's traumatic medical story to the press for her own interests. The Hippocratic oath provides, in part: "I will respect the privacy of my patients, for their problems are not disclosed to me that the world may know." Dr. Bernard violated the law, her patient's trust, and the standards for the medical profession when she disclosed her patient's abuse, medical issues, and medical treatment to a reporter at an abortion rights rally to further her political agenda. Simply concealing the patient's name falls far short of her legal and ethical duties here.

**Rokita** have possibly stopped this little girl from being sent home to endure possible future harm by her alleged rapist. "This case is not about whether an abortion was performed. It also is not about the Office exposing anyone's medical file. Those were arguments designed to thwart our investigation into the physician's behavior. "As the Office of the Attorney General, it is our duty to ensure that doctors meet the standard of care. In our opinion, Dr. Bernard fell short in this situation. Now, it is up to the Medical Licensing Board to determine whether there are consequences for violating a patient's privacy rights and the obligation to immediately report child abuse to Indiana authorities." **Click here** to read the administrative complaint.

Millers dunk Tigers in conference win

NOBLESVILLE – Another game, another fine defensive performance for the Noblesville boys basketball team.

The Millers hosted Fishers Friday night, and the two teams put on a show for the near-capacity crowd at The Mill. Noblesville got off to a solid start and carried that momentum all the way to the end for a 55-47 Hoosier Crossroads Conference win.

It was the first time the Millers had beaten the Tigers since Dec. 1, 2017. Noblesville never trailed in the game, and while the Class 4A No. 7 Tigers stayed in it for the entire contest, the Millers used solid defense and timely play-making to secure the victory.

“We knew that if we were going to have a decent year, we had to get a lot better on the defensive end,” said Noblesville coach Scott McClelland. The coach said that defense became an emphasis during the pre-season, which included putting the team in tough situations in practice.

“I thought we did a pretty good job,” said McClelland.

The game was only tied once at 2-2. The Millers’ Aaron Fine scored the opening basket, which was answered by a layin from Fishers’ Jon-Anthony Hall. After that, Noblesville skipped off on a 7-0 run: Luke Almodovar scored, then Cooper Bean threw in a 3-pointer and followed that with a layin, and the Millers were up 9-2.

Noblesville’s Hunter Walston hit a 3 during the late stages of the quarter to make it 12-4, and a layin from the Tigers’ Jalen

Haralson to finish the period cut it to 12-6. That set the stage for a big second quarter for the sophomore, as he scored 12 points for Fishers.

But the Millers were able to stay ahead with timely baskets of their own. An early quick five points from a Fine basket and another Walston triple gave the Millers a 17-8 lead. Fine made a traditional three-point play with 4:32 left in the quarter to put Noblesville up 22-12. That would be the Millers’ largest lead, but they achieved that 10-point margin several times in the game.

Noblesville led 26-22 at halftime. Aiden Brewer,

a 6-3 forward starting as a sophomore, opened the second half with a layin. Almodovar got going for the Millers in the third quarter with seven points, including a 3. Fine hit a 3 as well. Bean added the final four points of the quarter, which ended with Noblesville up 42-32.

“I thought Cooper had a really nice drive there at the end of the third quarter, kept some momentum for us,” said McClelland.

The Millers still led 46-36 early in the fourth quarter. The Tigers then went on a 7-0 run to cut that advantage to 46-43. Parker Perdue hit a 3 (his second of the game), Haralson was good on a layin, then Keenan Garner, a 6-6 junior, made a layin.

Fine and Haralson traded layins, and the score was 48-45 with three minutes to go. But Noblesville was able to get some separation during the next couple minutes, as Fine made two free throws, and an Almodovar layin put the Millers up 52-45. Haralson kept Fishers close with a dunk to cut it to 52-47, but that would be all. The last basket summed up the game: Walston made a steal, which Bean took to the basket for a layin.

Noblesville had solid balance, with four players in double figures. Bean and Fine each scored 15 points, Almodovar added 13 points and Walston totaled 10, including two 3-pointers.

“Just a good win over a very good team, well-coached team with one of the best players in the state,

maybe the country,” said McClelland.

Haralson led the Tigers with 25 points.

“It’s a young team,” said Fishers coach Garrett Winegar, who noted the Tigers have one starter back from last year’s squad.

“They’re good kids, they’re going to keep trying,” said Winegar. “They’re going to keep learning. Coaches are going to keep trying. I’m confident we’re going to figure it out, but right now, we haven’t figured it out.”

Noblesville is 2-0 and hosts Carmel next Friday. Fishes is 2-2 and goes back on the road tonight to play at Mount Vernon.
