Fishers schools sweep "We the Flowers & People" state championships

Two schools in Fishers have received top honors at the Indiana Bar Foundation's "We the People: The Citizen and the Constitution" 2022 state competition.

Fishers High School and Fishers Junior High School were both named state champions.

Hamilton Southeastern with teacher Janet Chandler finished second in the high school division. Fall Creek Junior High School finished second in the middle school division.

Fishers High School will represent Indiana in the "We the People" nationals this coming spring.

The Honorable Derek R. Molter, Justice of the Indiana Supreme Court, delivered the Keynote Address at the high school competition, while the Honorable Indiana Supreme Court Justice Geoffrey Slaughter gave the keynote address at the middle school competition.

During a break in the competition, a Naturalization Ceremony was held in the Grand Hall of Union Station. Eighty individuals became U.S. citizens during the ceremony administered by the Honorable James R. Sweeney II, United State District Judge for the Southern District

greased pigs Have you ever had an experience with Murphy's Law? You know, the old adage that states something like "things will go wrong in any given situation if you give them a chance" or "anything

that can go wrong will

go wrong" or more importantly "anything



that can go wrong will go wrong, in the worst possible way, and at the worst possible time."

Something brought to mind a couple of experiences I had many years ago. I'll label it the Law of the Reverse Murphy's Law.

Growing up in a farm community, the local fundraising events for the volunteer fire department included the traditional tractor pull, the penny pitch, and of course the greased pig contest. Not wanting to damage the good tractors, many times the tractor pull involved the older tractors. Some of them had been souped up with special modifications. The older men stood around talking strategy of how to hook up the sled to the tractor and women were generally selling baked goods and "sodie pop" at a stand nearby.

The penny pitch consisted of a checkerboard with grid squares approximately ³/₄ inch size. Each square had a number: 1, 5 10, and 25. If the penny landed without touching any grid, the person throwing the penny won the amount of pennies listed. There were many more 1 penny squares than nickel and dime squares and only one \$0.25 square in the very center. A 2-by-4 frame held the thrower back from the grid.

Murphy's Law struck.

When the game was packed, too many participants leaning too far in on the 2-by-4s caused the whole system to collapse, moving my \$0.25 score making me unable to claim my prize. A traditional Murphy's Law.





Enjoy holiday treats without derailing your health goals

Healthy eating during the holiday season is a common concern for a lot of people, whether they're concerned

about weight loss or overall healthy health. Actually, 75 percent of annual weight gain occurs over the holiday season.

Listed below are six fast and easy healthy holiday swaps you can incorporate and enjoy your holiday festivities:

1. Avocado-based dips instead of mayo-based dips

2. Wine spritzers instead of wine or cocktails

You don't have to abstain completely from alcohol during the holidays. However, you may want to

To make a wine spritzer, simply combine half a glass of wine (about two ounces) with sparkling water. You can use plain or flavored sparkling water, depending on your preference. This gives you a chance to enjoy the wine you love without all the calories and alcohol.

3. Fresh veggies instead of casseroles

Green bean and sweet potato casseroles are popular holiday staples. They may taste delicious, but they don't rank very highly on the health meter. These casseroles are often made with sodium-laden soups (in the case of green bean casserole), butter, and sugar (in the case of the sweet potato casserole).

Beam me up! Carmel invites public to beam topping ceremony at new Police Department expansion




