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# Fishers schools sweep “We the People” state championships

Two schools in Fishers have received top honors at the Indiana Bar Foundation’s “We the People: The Citizen and the Constitution” 2022 state competition. Fishers High School and Fishers Junior High School were both named state champions.

Hamilton Southeastern with teacher Janet Chandler finished second in the high school division. Fall Creek Junior High School finished second in the middle school division.

Fishers High School will represent Indiana in the “We the People” nationals this coming spring.

The Honorable Derek R. Molter, Justice of the Indiana Supreme Court, delivered the Keynote Address at the high school competition, while the Honorable Indiana Supreme Court Justice Geoffrey Slaughter gave the keynote address at the middle school competition.

During a break in the competition, a Naturalization Ceremony was held in the Grand Hall of Union Station. Eighty individuals became U.S. citizens during the ceremony administered by the Honorable James R. Sweeney II, United State District Judge for the Southern District of Indiana, and Indiana Bar

Foundation Board Member. Paternoster. “It’s student-led inquiry combined with great support from the unit advisers, school leadership, parents, and the community.”

# Secretly playing Santa for 42 families from Sheridan, Westfield & Heights

From 6:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. last Saturday, 300 people came together to give Christmas to 42 families in Hamilton County.

Secret Families of Hamilton County (SFHC) is an organization that delivers Christmas to families with school-age children in need. According to Jay Kern, Secret Families began in 2004 from an agreement between a husband and wife to buy gifts for a struggling family instead of for each other. Eighteen years later, the charity now delivers Christmas to almost 400 families in Delaware County and has expanded to six additional counties in central Indiana, including Hamilton.

It is called Secret Families because it is a secret on both sides: who the gifts are coming from and who they are going to. Shoppers only know first names, gender and ages to buy for. Kern said this is both unique and personalized.

“I think for me what I’ve really enjoyed is when my kids have done the shopping for other kids, and they’ve learned that it’s more fun to give than to receive, and seeing the excitement on their faces when they are picking out the perfect toy for a kid that was on their list,” Leachia Kern told The Reporter.

Leachia and Jay have been volunteering with Secret Families in Hamilton County for about four years. She said since the world is opening back up after the pandemic, more people are getting involved than ever before.

“What I have noticed the most is that we have

Marie Osmond performed last Saturday night for a packed Palladium in Carmel. It was the only Indiana stop on her Symphonic Christmas tour.

A few hours before the show, she and her nephew, David Osmond, spent time talking with a small group of fans during the sound-check session. That session included the Osmond version of “Happy Birthday,” sung to Carmel City Councilman Jeff Worrell. The Reporter is still debating posting that video clip, for the sake of both Worrell and the Osmonds.

The show, in fine Osmond fashion, was a very audience-interactive performance reminiscent of Marie’s variety show days.

Marie called her nephew, David, a living miracle. In his late 20s, he was in a wheelchair suffering from multiple sclerosis (MS). While he said he still feels

great pain from the chest down, he’s dancing and singing and living his life to the fullest. “I have MS,” David told the audience, “but MS doesn’t have me!”

# Noblesville, Fishers, Carmel & Westfield each getting \$1M for road improvements

Hamilton County's four cities will receive \$1 million each to accelerate road and bridge improvements, according to Hamilton County legislators.

House Speaker Todd Huston (R-Fishers) said the local funding from the Community Crossings Matching Grant Program is for road and bridge preservation, road reconstruction, intersection improvements, guardrail replacements and signage, and can cover material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations.

"Thanks to our strong fiscal health, we continue to make significant infrastructure investments in communities both large and small," Huston said. "This program has been a tremendous boost for road and bridge projects in Hamilton County, especially as our population and economic opportunities keep expanding."

State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) said 229 towns, cities and counties will receive over \$119 million in state matching grants.

"Hoosiers rely on our roads to travel safely, whether that's to the grocery store or across the state," Goodrich said. "Maintaining our local infrastructure is vital to our local economy and quality of life."

State Rep. Chris Jeter (R-Fishers) said large communities like those in Hamilton County provide a 50

percent match for the grant.

"These grants help us make strong investments across our communities, which is key to keeping jobs and attracting more economic development," Jeter said. "These dollars will be put toward keeping our roads safe and appeal to job creators and visitors."

State Rep. Donna Schai-bley (R-Carmel) said to date, Hoosier communities are on the receiving end of more than \$1 billion in Community Crossings Matching Grants.

"The Community Crossings Grant program continues to be successful because of the strong partnerships between our state, cities, towns and counties," Schai-bley said. "I look forward to seeing more growth in our area as these projects take shape."

"Hoosiers throughout our community will continue to see improvements to our infrastructure as a result of this program," said State Rep. Jerry Torr (R-Carmel). "These dollars go directly toward keeping Hoosiers safe on the road and improving our overall quality of life."

According to the Indiana Department of Transportation, which oversees and awards the grants, the next call for projects is expected in January. Awards are released two times a year. ## Lee Buckingham honored with prestigious award from Indiana Prosecutors

During the 2022 Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council (IPAC) Winter Conference, Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney D. Lee Buckingham II received the Steve Johnson Award from the IPAC Board of Directors.

Presented to him during a ceremony on Monday, Dec. 5, the award celebrates Buckingham's 12 years as an elected prosecutor, 16 years as a deputy prosecutor, and countless hours dedicated to helping IPAC in many facets, including as a member of its Legislative and Executive Committees.

"I am honored to have served under Lee's leadership and vision," said Andre Miksha, Buckingham's chief deputy of 12 years. "Lee consistently approached the work of a prosecutor with unsurpassed integrity and humility; he has been a model for us all."

The Johnson Award was created in 2014 and named after former IPAC Executive Director Steve Johnson, who served as IPAC's leader for 14 years and spent his entire 38-year career at

IPAC. The Johnson Award is given to individuals who demonstrate the same level of professional dedication and excellence as Steve Johnson. An award is based on sustained periods of outstanding support or service to an individual prosecutor or IPAC.

Buckingham also closes 2022 as the President of the Association of Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys. He will be succeeded by Rodney Cummings the Prosecuting Attorney of Madison County.

**About IPAC**

IPAC is a non-partisan, independent state judicial branch agency that supports Indiana's 91 prosecuting attorneys and their chief deputies. It is governed by a 10-member board of directors of elected prosecuting attorneys. IPAC assists prosecuting attorneys in the preparation of manuals, legal research and training seminars. It serves as a liaison to local, state, and federal agencies, study commissions, and community groups in an effort to support law enforcement and promote the fair administration of justice.

## Cecila Coble running for re-election to Fishers City Council

Republican incumbent Cecilia Coble has announced she will run for another term on the Fishers City Council, At-Large. The election will take place in May 2023.

Coble has been a strong leader on the Fishers City Council since 2015. She made history as the first Latina to be elected on the Fishers City Council in 2014 after Fishers transitioned from a town to a city, and again as the first woman to serve as President of the Council in 2020 and 2021.

She currently serves as Co-Chair on the Fishers Advisory Committee on Disability (FACD), an initiative that was led by Coble. The committee focuses on the challenges facing the disability community and establishes strategies to effect change. The City of Fishers received the 2017 Champions of Inclusion Award by the Indiana Governor’s Council for People with Disabilities for the committee’s efforts.

"I am proud of the work the Disability Committee has done to champion inclusion, accessibility, and in providing more housing and employment opportunities for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities in Fishers," Coble said. "It's led to helping other cities implement the same approach, which is making an impact for the disability community in Hamilton County and beyond."

Additionally, Coble says she takes pride in Fishers' AAA credit rating by S&P, the highest possible rating for a municipality. The City of Fishers is one of the first cities in the state to achieve this designation in 2016 and has maintained the designation every year.

"Cecilia has been an important leader on our council, and our city's success is a reflection of that," Mayor Scott Fadness said.

Fishers was named "Best Places to Live in America" by *Money Magazine* in 2017 and "Community of the Year" by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce in 2016.

Coble says she will continue to focus on diversifying Fishers’ tax base to keep resident’s taxes low, ensure police and fire have the resources they need, and that the city invests in quality-of-life opportunities.

Currently, Coble is on the board of directors of Accelerate Indiana Municipalities (AIM) and is an appointed member of the Fishers Arts & Culture Commission. She is a Charter Member of the Fifty Club of Fishers and a founding member of Thrive Social Club. She is a past President of the Hamilton County Republican Women’s Club.

Coble and her husband, Mike, have lived in Fishers since 2011. They have two daughters. As a family, they enjoy going to summer concerts in Fishers.

It wasn’t as bad as a book burning, but my book was definitely burnt by a cookie.

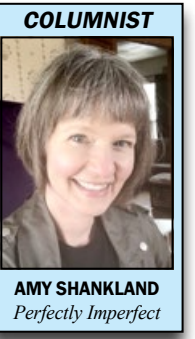
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# The end of my relationship with my birth father?

*As my adoption and reunion story continues, I’ve changed some names, places, and dates.*

We hung up shortly after he told me this news. I was near tears. From the beginning, I had never meant any harm to either of my birthparents. Was this reunion causing marital strife for Jack? And an even bigger question played in my mind. Would I

ever speak with or see him again?

With my friend Mary’s encouragement, I wrote a letter to Jack’s wife, Dawn, that I emailed to him. I tried to alleviate any fears she might have about me and my intentions. Jack was pleased about what I had written and said in a reply that he would share it when the time was right.

I’ve always been a positive person, but I also try to be cautious, especially with my emotions. I had to prepare myself for the possibility that the few months of communication that happened in 2015 might be all I would get with Jack. And it hurt my heart.

My birth mother Linda was furious for me when she heard the news. She and I had contin-

ued to talk on the phone every two or three weeks and we texted regularly. Neither of us could figure out what was going on in Jack’s wife’s mind. Was she jealous? Nervous that I would take attention away from her and her daughters? We just didn’t understand it.

August turned into September, and I tried to stay busy, live my life, and not think about the situation. But of course, it was difficult. At times it would creep into my head, and I would alternate between sadness and anger. I tried to tell myself that I had to be grateful for all I had learned and for the time that we had spent getting to know each other. I knew Jack said that we could still email each other, but I didn’t want to pester him.

on connections with people or with the spirit of Christmas. That's why they bring such positive feelings to mind when watching. These movies are another reminder of great memories.

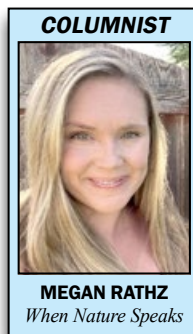

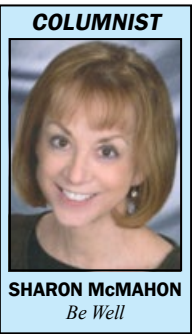

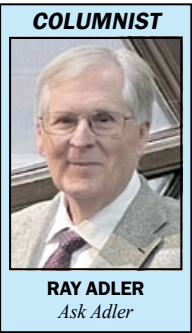

There were many more 1 penny squares than nickel and dime squares and only one \$0.25 square in the very center. A 2-by-4 frame held the thrower back from

the grid.

Murphy's Law struck.

When the game was packed, too many participants leaning too far in on the 2-by-4s caused the whole system to collapse, moving my \$0.25 score making me unable to claim my prize. A traditional Murphy's Law.

The Reverse Murphy's Law lesson came in the greased pig contest. A 40-pound shoat was greased and let loose in a pen and 20 boys tried to grab the pig. The boy who ended up with the pig got to keep the pig. After several minutes of chasing the pig, there was a pile of 20 boys and a pig somewhere in the middle. Feeling I had no chance to get the pig and getting squashed by others, I decided to give up and withdraw from the pile. It was only then that I heard the referee say, "the kid in the black shirt has the pig, everybody else get up."

I realized I had the black shirt and the pig! Or at least by referee decree I had the pig. A Reverse Murphy's Law.

I think it was the same year that I entered a 4-H Flowers project. Having totally forgot about it, I planted no flowers that year. The 4-H fair that late July caught me flat-footed without anything to enter. Necessity became the mother of invention. I grabbed some bull thistle blooms, some Queen Anne's lace, some mustard and a sprig or two of clover and added whatever other flowering weeds I could find. The judge was impressed enough to give me the grand champion ribbon. Another Reverse Murphy's Law incident.

# Millers best Greyhounds after wild fourth quarter

**NOBLESVILLE** — Here's a lesson for all basketball players: It's always a good thing to trust your teammates.

Trust became a big intangible for the Noblesville boys team last Friday at the end of the Millers' game with Carmel in front of a large crowd at The Mill. Noblesville had the ball out of a timeout with 4.8 seconds left and the score tied at 42-42.

When play resumed, Luke Almodovar had the ball at the top of the key, but he sent it to Cooper Bean, who was just beyond the 3-point arc to Almodovar's right. Bean got a 3-point shot off before the buzzer and it went in, giving the Millers a 45-42 victory over the Greyhounds.

"The play was for me to drive and go downhill," said Almodovar. "But he told me that he was going to

be ready. In the back of my mind, I knew that I had him, pass it to him and trusted him, and he made it."

Bean was aware of how much time was left on the clock when he got the ball, and saw Carmel's defense coming at him, "so I just pump-faked and then I let it go," he said.

"I trust the kid with my life," said Almodovar. "The last play, I'm giving him the ball every time."

"When we knew we were going to have a last-second shot, I said 'I'm ready' before the timeout," said Bean. "And then after the timeout, I told him again. I said, 'I'm going to be ready, pass me the ball.' And I was ready."

The win marked the first time Noblesville had beaten Carmel since Dec. 2, 2011 — exactly 11 years and one week ago.

"Proud of our guys," said Millers coach Scott McClelland. "This is a huge confidence boost. Just a big

win for our program."

Noblesville came out blasting through the first quarter, at one point leading 14-4. Almodovar made a traditional three-point play just 11 seconds into the game, then later nailed

two more 3s. Aaron Fine hit a triple as well, and Hunter Walston's floater gave the Millers a 10-point lead.

The Greyhounds came back, of course. Carmel sailed through a 15-2 stretch that lasted over eight minutes

and gave the 'Hounds a 19-16 lead. Jake Griffin got hot during that time, pouring in nine points, including two 3s.

Almodovar had the last word in the first half, sinking a 3-pointer at the buzzer to tie the game at 19-19.

**CARMEL** — If a senior is near the ball when the clock is winding down, there's always the potential for a good thing to happen.

Carmel senior Sam Orme was near the ball when the Greyhounds played at Fishers last Tuesday night, with time running out in overtime. Orme got a steal, rushed down the court, and laid the ball in to give Carmel a 60-58 win over the Tigers in an exciting game at the Tiger Den.

The contest was tied at 51-51 at the end of regulation, this after many lead changes and big baskets during the four quarters. Fishers' Jalen Haralson was quickly fouled and made two free throws nine seconds into the extra period, and Orme answered that with a layin.

Aidan Zimmer drained a 3-pointer, but Orme came right back and hit his own triple. Haralson made two more foul shots to put the Tigers up 58-56, but Jared Bonds went up for a dunk, and the game was tied once more.

Fishers held the ball for nearly a minute and a half waiting for a last-second shot, but after a timeout with 14.2 seconds left, Orme stole the ball, and took it in for the game-winner.

"It was something I saw developing," said Orme. "As he was going over that screen, I thought maybe I can get om his hip, get a deflection, get out on the run. And it just led to a fast break, and converted and then a key stop at the end. Just win the game."

"Sam just made a play," said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. "He's had a great start to the year. He's been super-efficient on the of-

Both teams made small runs throughout the game, but since neither team led by more than seven points, even those small runs seemed big. # Proud Miller Walt Morris inducted into Hamilton County Basketball Hall of Fame

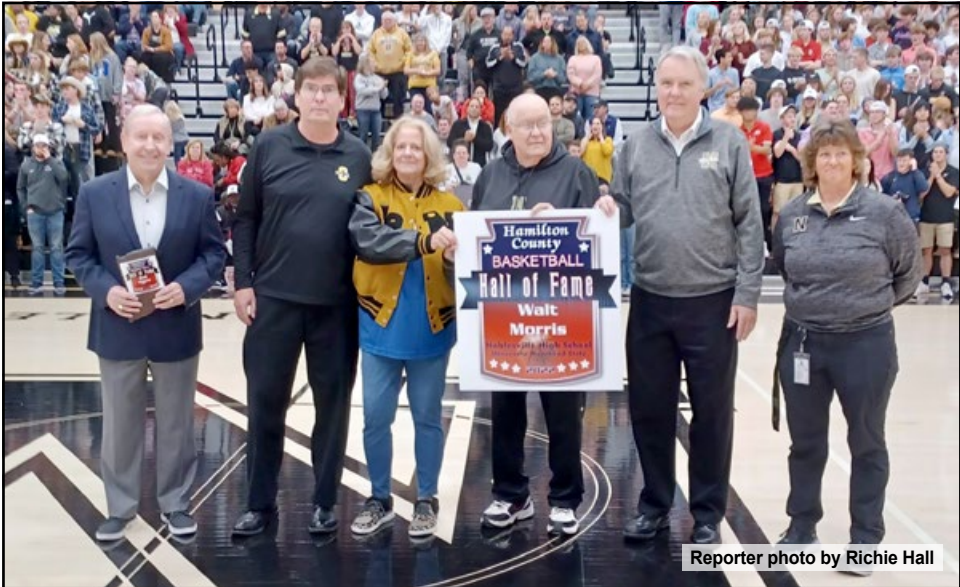

**WESTFIELD** – A new boys basketball rivalry is getting started in Hamilton County.

170 and Jacob Jones at 182. CC got a pin at 195, Peyton Cross’ pin at 220 gave the Blackhawks a 30-9 lead.

“They do a great job when it’s time to get ready for the match,” Leonard said of Jones and Cross. “They’re both very focused and they help other people get focused. They’re good leaders.”

**FISHERS** — An all-county dual meet at the Tiger Den went Carmel’s way last Wednesday.

The Greyhounds wrestled at Fishers, and used a six-match win streak in the middle of the meet to claim a 49-21 victory over the Tigers. It was an exciting meet all the way through, with Carmel getting pins in seven of its nine match wins to take the dual meet.

The contest also was a homecoming from the most decorated wrestler in Hamilton County history. Mitch Sliga, a 2013 Fishers graduate, joined the Carmel wrestling coaching staff earlier in the year, and was there as an assistant coach during the meet. Sliga said it was “cool” to be back, and to see some familiar faces in the Tiger Den.

Ed Pendoski is still the Greyhounds head coach, but he deferred to Sliga for the post-meet interview. Pendoski coached Sliga in youth wrestling; Sliga went on to win two state titles for Fishers High School and had a successful college career at Northwestern University.

“It’s just great to be back in the sport,” said Sliga. “After college I was away from it for about five years, so just getting back into it.” Sliga was happy to get to coach again with his father and his old coach Pendoski.

The meet started at 113 pounds, and Jackson Elliott got Carmel on the board right away with a second-period pin. Fishers took the next two matches, with Chayce Yant winning at 120 by decision,

then Griffin Ingalls, who is state-ranked No. 6 at 126 pounds, won a 14-2 major decision.

The Greyhounds then ran off the next six matches, including four falls. Two state-ranked wrestlers got pins for Carmel: Isaac Ward, ranked 10th at 138 and Nayl Sbay, who is rated seventh at 152, although he wrestled at 145 in this match. Trevor Gallagher wrestled at 152 on Wednesday and scored a pin, as did Matthew Green at 170. Meanwhile, Embry Horal took the 132-pound match by major decision, while Nate Powell, ranked 15th at 160, won that class by decision.

“The big thing that we want to do it just keep scoring points, pushing the pace in matches,” said Sliga. “A lot of times pins will come from that.”

Fishers broke the streak at the 182-pound bout, when Chris Quarles won a second-period fall. Quarles is a sophomore, one of several young wrestlers on the Tigers team. Fishers coach Frank Ingalls called him a “big surprise.”

“He came out last year, but he was injured and just was never able to get into the groove of things,” said Ingalls. “He decided to give it another shot. He worked hard over the summer and got better and got ready. He’s a great surprise for our team this year.”

Carmel’s Seth Richardson got the quickest pin of the night, winning at 195 pounds in 40 seconds. Jacob Carroll toughed out a decision for Fishers at 220 pounds, then Jack Milligan, the No. 16-ranked wrestler at 285, got a pin for Carmel. The Tigers’ Will Hruskoci
