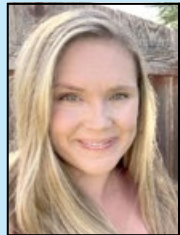
A rose in snow

Duke Energy invests \$20,000 in White River Alliance

"We understand the importance of environmental stewardship and the benefits it provides to the communities we serve," said Mark LaBarr, government and community relations manager at Duke Energy. "We're proud to invest in organizations like the White River Alliance that are creating resources and educational programs that promote, protect and enhance the biological, chemical and physical integrity of the White River ecosystem."

Duke Energy's financial support will fund the installation of two new [White River Art Canoes](#) – one at Conner Prairie in Fishers and one near Duke Energy's substation in Noblesville – to raise

'Twas the storm before Christmas . . .

Are you ready for a white Christmas, Hamilton County? Ready or not . . .

Hamilton County's Hometown Meteorologist Paul Poteet is hot on the case of this cold blast, and the Reporter is here to keep you informed so you can be prepared.

As of late Tuesday evening, only a handful of Hoosier counties in the southeastern portion of the state were not yet under a Winter Storm Watch. Whatever the snow total, what is for certain in the oncoming harsh, bitterly low temperatures that will stick around over the Christmas weekend. Wind chills will reach well below zero across central Indiana.

The forecast remains consistent with steady winds over 30 mph and gusts near 50 mph. The falling and blowing snow will likely result in white-out conditions for Hamilton County early Friday through Saturday.

To highlight the significant impact anticipated to travel, Hamilton County Emergency

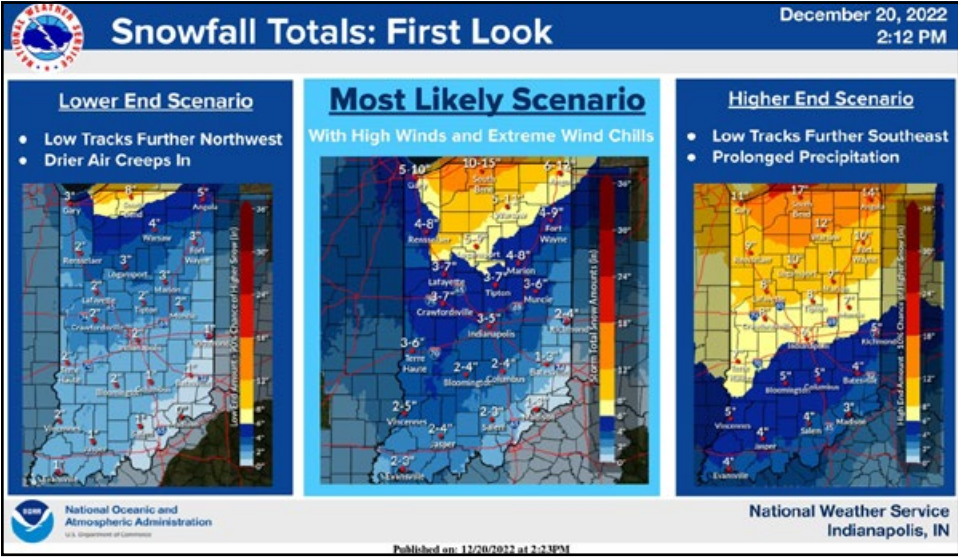

WINTER

Management (HCEM) has issued a Travel Watch effective 6 a.m. Wednesday, Dec. 21. The Travel Watch also corresponds with the National Weather Service's Winter Storm Watch and HCEM standard operating procedures.

A Travel Watch means that conditions threaten the public's safety. Only essential travel, such as to and from work or in an emergency situation, is recommended, and emergency action plans should be implemented by businesses, schools,

*** WHEN...**From Thursday afternoon through Saturday morning.

*** IMPACTS...**Plan on slippery road conditions. Widespread blowing snow could significantly reduce visibility. The hazardous conditions could impact the morning or evening commute. Strong winds could cause tree damage. The cold wind chills as low as 35 below zero could cause frostbite on exposed skin in as little as 30 minutes.

*** ADDITIONAL DETAILS...**A flash freeze is likely Thursday night with temperatures dropping more than 30 degrees in a matter of hours during the transition from rain to snow.

Sheridan teen killed in weekend crash

Two teenagers were killed in a single-vehicle crash early Sunday morning in Tipton County.

Shortly after 2 a.m., police responded to reports of a single-vehicle crash at the intersection of State Road 19 and Division Road just north of Tipton.

According to Tipton County Coroner Bob Nichols, the two teens were traveling in a smart car at high speed when the driver lost control, causing them to rollover, ejecting both from the vehicle.

When police arrived, Connor Gavin Petro, 18, Sheridan, and Adam Michael Gordon Johnson, 17, Kokomo, were pronounced dead at the scene.

Time is now to protect against frozen pipes

With much colder weather in the forecast, Indiana American Water urges customers to act now to secure homes and businesses against freezing pipes.

"With much colder temperatures in the forecast, we are encouraging customers to act now to protect their plumbing system against the extreme cold," said Indiana American Water President Matt Prine. "Failing to protect your plumbing from cold temperatures can be disruptive and very costly. When ice expands inside pipes, it creates tremendous pressure that can crack and burst them, leaving homeowners with a costly plumbing bill, and thousands of dollars in water damage."

Luckily, these problems are preventable by evaluating areas of vulnerability and taking certain precau-

tions. Implementing the following winterization tips now can help avoid headaches later:

- Search your house for uninsulated pipes, especially in unheated areas. Consider wrapping pipes with foam insulation or electric heating tape but follow manufacturer's instructions carefully to avoid a fire hazard.

- Check to make sure your garage door and crawl space doors/vents are closed.

- Leave cabinet doors open in kitchen and bathroom areas to allow warm air to circulate and consider letting a faucet drip to keep water moving through the pipes. If you have young children, relocate any chemicals of cleaners that may have otherwise been out of reach behind the cabinet doors.

- Seal cracks and holes

in outside walls and foundations with caulking, especially where cables or phone lines enter the house, to keep cold air away from pipes.

- Make certain the water to your hose bibs is shut off inside your house (via a turnoff valve), the lines are drained, and the hose is disconnected from the spigot.

- Drain and shut off entirely the water to any unoccupied residence such as a summer or vacation home. A loss of power during a winter storm could cause pipes to freeze. If you intend to leave a property entirely without heat, be sure to drain all water to prevent the possibility of frozen pipes.

- Set the thermostat at no lower than 55 degrees if you're going out of town. Although you may be able to get away with a lower temperature, this setting is generally considered to be

safe for pipes.

- Make sure you know where your main water shut-off valve is in case you need to shut your water off in an emergency.

- Consider wrapping your water heater in an insulation blanket. While not really at danger for freezing, this can lower your heating bills.

Indiana American Water also asks customers to keep fire hydrants clear near their homes and businesses when snowfall accumulates. This small step can save precious time if firefighters need to access it in an emergency. Remove snow and ice within a three-foot perimeter of the hydrant and shovel a pathway from the hydrant to the street so that firefighters can access it quickly.

AG Rokita wins latest court case over COVID vaccine mandates

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has prevailed in yet another legal fight against what he calls President Joe Biden's executive overreach in the form of COVID vaccine mandates.

This time, in a [lawsuit filed by Indiana and two other plaintiff states](#), a U.S. appeals court has struck down a rule requiring vaccination for anyone

working for federal contractors.

"Hoosiers and all Americans should have the liberty to make their own decisions on whether to get vaccinated," Rokita said. "That includes individuals who happen to work as federal contractors. No one should have to fear losing their jobs just because they opt against

getting a shot."

In affirming a district court's injunction, the appeals court observed that President Biden's use of the federal Procurement Act to claim executive power to impose the mandate on third-party contractors is "truly unprecedented."

Previously, Rokita has also prevailed in cases in-

volving 1) Biden's Occupational Safety and Health Administration vaccine mandate, which would have applied to anyone working for a company employing 100 or more people and 2) Biden's Head Start mandate, which would have required all staff and volunteers in Head Start preschool programs to be masked and vaccinated – and even required masks on children ages 2 and older.

Carmel-based Seven Corners awarded contract to provide health care services to Minnesota prison

Seven Corners, the Carmel-based travel insurer for 30 years which also engages in specialty benefits management, was selected by the Federal Bureau of Prisons to become the new Comprehensive Medical Services contractor for inmates housed within the Federal Correctional Institution (FCI) Sandstone, a low-security federal correctional institution located in Sandstone, Minn.

This multimillion-dollar contract with the largest institution in Minnesota will extend over a five-year period, connecting Sandstone's 1,100 male inmates with medical providers and care.

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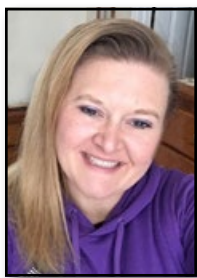

Huskies hammer down, stay undefeated

NOBLESVILLE – The Hamilton Heights wrestling team continued its undefeated season Tuesday, beating Guerin Catholic 66-6 in a dual meet at the Eagles Nest.

The Huskies, ranked No. 5 in the IndianaMat.com's Class 2A state team rankings, won 11 of the 13 contested matches (195 pounds was a double forfeit). Jaylyn Pugh began the meet at 126 pounds with a fall, then Heights took the next three weight classes by forfeit.

The Golden Eagles' Isaac Richardson got the first of GC's two victories, outlasting the Huskies' Blain Zachary in a 9-7 overtime win. After that, Heights cruised through the meet with seven straight falls, all of them coming in the first period.

The fastest pin in that series went to Michael Cain, who won the 160-pound bout in 29 seconds. Evan Tilton needed 1 minute, 6 seconds to get his pin at 182 pounds; Tilton is ranked No. 5 in the state in

that weight class. Guerin Catholic's Peter Nguyen finished the meet with the Golden Eagles' second win, taking the 120-pound division in an 8-2 decision. Nguyen is state-ranked No. 17 in that weight division.

"Overall, I was pleased," said Huskies coach Gary Myers. "Everybody wrestled well."

Heights is back at it today with a long trip to the Rensselaer Central Invitational. The Huskies will be wrestling other small-but-tough teams, such as Cascade, the No. 3 team in Class 1A, and the host Bombers.

"We're 14-0, Cascade's 14-0," said Myers. "So, we're going to find out the pecking order really quick."

The Golden Eagles are off until next week, when they participate in the Mooresville Classic. That one will also contain some tough competition, including two local schools: Class 4A No. 7 Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern.

"If you want to be one of the best, you got to start wrestling with the best,

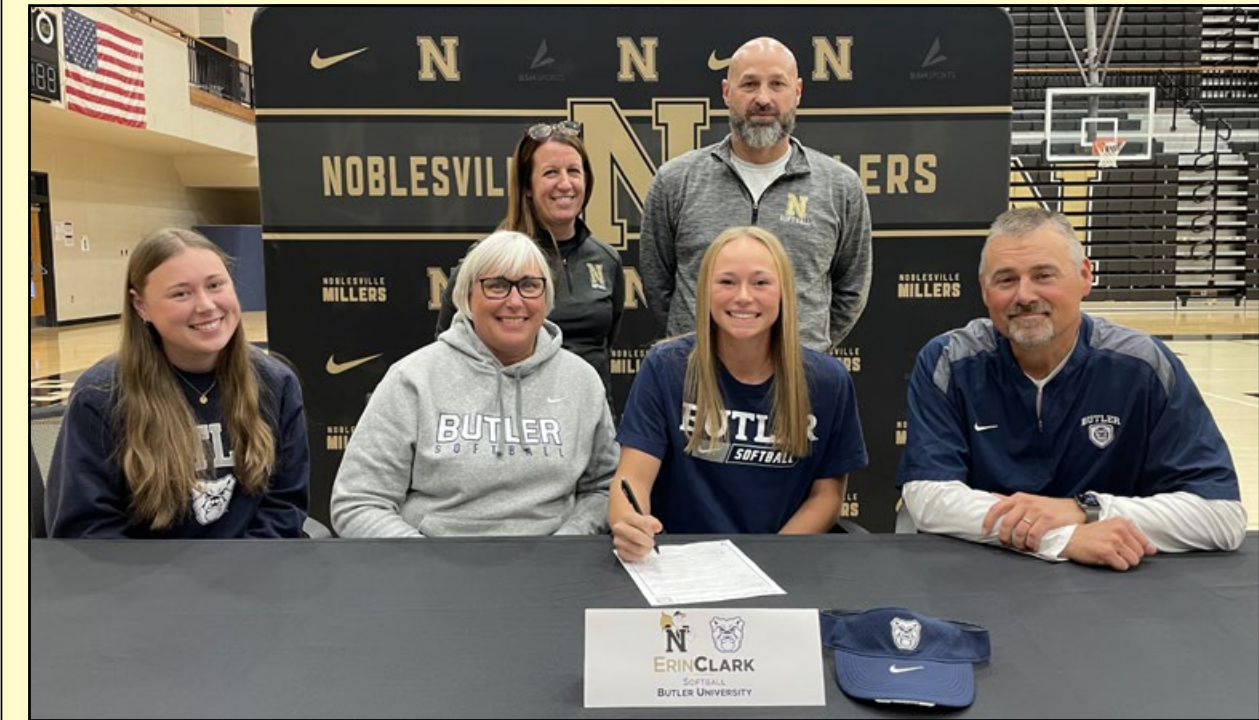
