Sheridan Museum receives donated pre-Civil War rifle

Sheridan resident Marilyn Bell has had an old rifle in her family for years which she thought may have been a relic of the Civil War. Rather than discard it, she decided to donate it to the Sheridan Historical Society because the Museum does have a small collection of Civil War era gun memorabilia, so we certainly welcomed this addition to the collection.

As it turns out, the firearm is a pre-Civil War .38 caliber hunting rifle.

When Marilyn brought the rifle to the museum, it was in several pieces and there were parts missing, so a restoration gunsmith was contacted to restore the rifle. Retired local educator Joe Rushton worked with Noblesville gunsmith John Schippens to put the rifle together. General Assembly should do the right thing about cigarette taxes

A principal recommendation of the recent Governor's Public Health Commission report is the urgent need to increase state funding of public health. It's an essential component of their plan to improve Indiana's health.



In fact, it recommends that funding

increase from the present \$55 per person to the national average of \$91. That's not enough, but it's a good start.

Historically, the Indiana legislature has placed public health funding at a very low priority; according to the United Health Foundation's America's Health Rankings of the states, Indiana is 45th lowest (alternatively reported as 48th by some sources). It's just an unfortunate Hoosier tradition.

The report demonstrates that Indiana's lack of public health funding is reflected in our miserable state of health; Indiana persistently ranks in the bottom 10 states on key health measures resulting in unacceptable losses - both human and economic. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Indiana ranks 40th lowest in life expectancy. I could go on.

It's time, once again, to consider increasing the cigarette tax, not only to discourage smoking but also to use the new tax revenue to fund the numerous proposals recommended by the Commission. It's an obvious source of funding.

How many times over the past 25 years have I called for increasing the cigarette tax, and how many times has the legislature failed to act? The influence of the tobacco industry on Indiana legislators runs dark and deep, and many times is present indirectly through other entities acting on its behalf.

On Dec. 21, Mark Strothkamp of Carmel unexpectedly passed away after suffering a sudden stroke.

Within hours, the community was already rallying around his family – wife Meg and two children, Ainsley and Braedy - and a GoFundMe was organized to pay for his children's educational expenses, as well as health care expenses related to his passing.

Indiana's tax is \$0.995 crease in 2007. The national average is \$1.91. And look at our surrounding states: Michigan's cigarette tax is \$2 per pack; Ohio is \$1.60; Illinois, \$2.98; Wisconsin, \$2.52; and even the tobacco state of Kentucky is \$1.10 per pack. 



Rokita says TikTok misleads Hoosiers and all Americans – exposing them to sexually lewd messages – even while officials in Beijing take steps to protect China's own minors and consumers from these same hazards.

"China has said they want to be the dominant force in the world," Rokita said. "This kind of technology is part of that strategy. We need patriots who will fight back against the dangers imposed by this app and others that are no doubt on the way."




