When he saw the pile of bricks on the site where the restaurant stood, he had an idea. He thought having a brick would be a great keepsake and that others may feel the same way. ## Missing Carmel man found dead in Indianapolis

On Thursday, Nov. 3, Bernard Caillouet, 24, Carmel, was reported to the Carmel Police Department as a missing person. He was reported to have walked away from his residence on the evening of Oct. 29.  
On Friday, Nov. 4, the investigation revealed Caillouet was believed to be endangered and in need of medical treatment, so a Silver Alert was issued.  
On Monday, Dec. 12, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department received a report of a body found in the 1900 block of Bluff Road in Indianapolis. The Marion County Coroner's Office took possession of the body and, through their investigation, were able to identify the deceased as Caillouet.  
The investigation into his cause of death is being conducted by the Marion County Coroner's Office; however, foul play is not suspected. Any questions regarding the cause of death of Caillouet should be directed to the Marion County Coroner's Office at (317) 327-4744.

# Tiffanie Ditlevson announces 2023 campaign for Fishers City Council

Tiffanie Ditlevson has announced her candidacy for Fishers City Council At-Large. She has lived in Fishers for over 15 years, moving from a Washington, D.C., suburb in the early 2000s. The primary for the City Council At-Large seat will be held in May 2023.

“When I moved to Fishers, it was heralded among the top places to live in the USA, so deciding to establish roots here was an easy decision,” Ditlevson said. “Great schools, safe neighborhoods, low property taxes, family-centered amenities, and Hoosier hospitality won me over. My specific needs included two things: access to great schools and living in a safe community where I wouldn’t have to worry about my daughter leaving her bicycle outside or inadvertently leaving my

garage door open overnight.”

Currently, Ditlevson serves on boards at various levels, including her church, the Fishers Armed Forces Commission, the Hamilton East Public Library Board, Catholic Charities of Indianapolis, and the Indiana USO board while running a real estate business and co-chairing the Fishers GOP Club. She was a founding member of Fishers One and remains an active member. She earned her MBA from Indiana Wesleyan, and most recently completed the Indiana GOP Diversity Leadership Series, the Richard G. Lugar Excellence in Public Service Series, and is currently enrolled in the Indiana Leadership Forum.

Ditlevson recently completed the Fishers Government Academy and the Fishers Citizens Fire Academy. “I loved the opportunity to learn about how our vibrant city works,” she said.

When asked why she wants to run for city council, Ditlevson said, “I’m able to freely and completely serve my community in a larger capacity. As your city councilwoman, please know I am passionate about three main things in the City of Fishers: safety, prosperity, and building community. I will work to fully fund our first responders; improve traffic safety – our roads, intersections, and visibility; build business partnerships to

benefit young members of the workforce, and grow our community amenities to ensure Fishers remains a vibrant place to live and call home.”

On top of her service to the Fishers community, Ditlevson is a United States Air Force Veteran and earned her commission at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. After the 9/11 attacks, she was stationed at Masirah Air Base, Oman. As the Services Commander in “tent city,” she led 72 military and 53 foreign employees in the implementation and execution of a \$12 million support structure for 10,000 combat soldiers fighting the war on terrorism.

## AG Rokita secures \$20M settlement with Google under same Indiana law being used against TikTok

### The REPORTER

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita announced on Thursday a **\$20 million settlement** with Google to resolve Indiana’s lawsuit against Google for deceptive location tracking practices.

The attorney general filed a separate, independent lawsuit when negotiations between the company and a coalition of state attorneys general stalled. As a result, Indiana received approximately twice as much money as it would have received as part of the settlement that was later reached with the 40 states that did not file lawsuits against Google.

“This settlement is another manifestation of our steadfast commitment to protect Hoosiers from Big Tech’s intrusive schemes,” Rokita said. “We will continue holding these companies accountable for their improper manipulation of consumers.”

Google’s deceptive practices became widely known following a **2018 story by the Associated Press**. After that story, multiple states began investigating Google’s location tracking practices.

As detailed in Indiana’s lawsuit, Google uses location data collected from Indiana consumers to build detailed user profiles and target ads, but Google has

deceived and misled users about its practices since at least 2014.

Rokita aggressively pursued litigation against Google because even a limited amount of location data can expose a person’s identity and routines. Such data can be used to infer personal details such as political or religious affiliation, income, health status or participation in support groups – as well as major life events such as marriage and the birth of children.

With this settlement, Rokita has ensured that Hoosiers are no longer coerced into trading away their privacy.

This lawsuit was handled by an experienced litigation team including Doug Swetnam, Vanessa Voigt Gould, and Jennifer Van Dame – who tenaciously pursued complex data privacy theories in a Hoosier courtroom against a well-resourced adversary.

# Taking their time to get it right

*From one point behind, Millers prevail in Hall of Fame Classic*

**NEW CASTLE** — In a game full of wild plays and crazy-fast runs, six seconds was enough time for the Millers to make one more.

Noblesville was down by one point to Bedford North Lawrence in the championship game of the girls Hall of Fame Classic Thursday at New Castle. The Millers had the ball out of a timeout. Noblesville's Reagan Wilson rushed down the floor, one end to the other, got to the basket and laid the ball in while being fouled with 0.8 seconds left in double overtime.

Now, Noblesville was ahead. Wilson then made the free throw, then stole the inbound pass as time ran out. With that, the Millers were the Hall of Fame Classic champions, 69-67, over the Stars.

"The play was written up, and it was like '(Meredith) Tippner, throw it in to Reagan and see what happens,'" said Wilson. "Our team had worked so hard for this win and I wasn't going to let them down."

"It's a player making great plays," said Tippner.

"I kept reminding her, you have six seconds," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. "That's a lot of time. Keep the ball in your hands. She just made a great play."

Everyone on the Noblesville team had to make great plays to win the game, and that's what everybody did. The Millers had beaten BNL just last week at the Stars' own tournament, so both teams were indeed pumped up.

Noblesville led 12-9 after the first quarter, with

Tippner scoring the first seven points. BNL's Karsyn Norman tied the game with a 3-pointer, then the Millers went on a 6-0 run for an 18-12 advantage. Wilson made two layins, then Tippner hit a jumper.

Another Wilson basket put Noblesville up 20-15, but the Stars finished the half on an 8-0 run, giving them a 23-20 halftime lead. Mallory Pride scored four of those points for BNL.

The second half opened with Brooklyn Ely draining a 3 to tie the game at 23-23. Norman made a layin to push the Stars up 25-23, but No-

blesville answered with an 8-0 run. Wilson scored, then Ely and Kaitlyn Shoemaker both hit triples.

Ava Shoemaker was back on the floor for the Millers, and she made her presence known early with a first-quarter 3. She also hit a layin with around two minutes to go in the third to give Noblesville its largest lead at 35-27.

"That's what makes this group really special," said Buckley. "We have a lot of kids. The last time we played them, Brooklyn didn't score. She got a lot of looks and just didn't capitalize, but she certainly did that tonight, hit some big, big 3s."

But the Stars came back, scoring the next eight points, and the game was tied at 35-35 going into the fourth. Chloe Spreen scored five points, she would be named the tournament MVP once the game was (finally) done.

During the fourth quarter and both overtimes, each team would make a spurt of five or six points, but the other team would come back. Case in point: Bedford North Lawrence led 47-42 after a Spreen triple, but Kaitlyn Shoemaker answered that with a 3, and Tippner tied the game with a layin.

"We see this every game and with the strength of the

schedule, we have the other coaches say, 'Hey, what's your easy game?' We don't have an easy game. Every game comes down to the wire like this, so I think Buckley has prepared us so well for this," said Wilson.

"Yes, and with the tournament last year, we played in championship games every single day," said Tippner. "She's prepared us. We're a

team that's going to fight together until the end."

Wilson and Tippner were both named to the All-Tournament team at the conclusion of the game.

Noblesville trailed 51-49 late in the quarter, but Wilson hit a floater, and regulation ended at 51-51. In the first overtime, the Stars scored the first six points for a 57-51 advantage, but the Millers

went on a 7-1 run to tie it up again. Ely and Wilson both drained 3s.

It was Noblesville's turn to go up fast in the second overtime. Tippner's and-1 and two Dani Mendez free throws put the Millers ahead 63-58. The Stars answered that with a 3 by Emma Brown and a Norman floater.

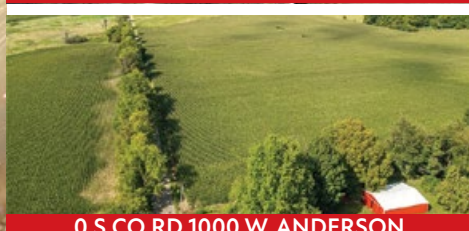

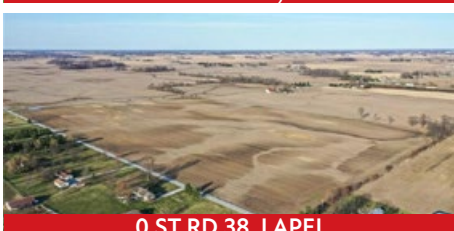

# Blazers bring home runner-up at Roncalli Holiday Tournament

The University boys basketball team split a pair of games against 4A competition at the Roncalli Holiday Tournament to bring home runner-up honors.

The Class 2A No. 8 Trailblazers beat the host Royals 65-46 for their seventh straight win before falling from the ranks of the unbeaten by dropping a 65-41 decision to Mount Vernon.

University made 10 three pointers in the first half of their opening round win over Roncalli. The Blazers ended the half on a 12-1 run. University's last six scores of the half were three-point baskets.

Sabien Cain made the first three pointer of the quarter off an assist from Andre Ozlowski to break a 25-25 tie and put University in front to stay with five minutes left in the half. Cain followed with another triple before Roncalli rallied to within 28-27.

Seth Hogg started the three-point run to end the half off an assist from Bryce Gray. Kahmi Bracey made a steal and advanced the ball to Ozlowski who fed Cain for a three pointer, Ozlowski drained a triple with 48 seconds left before Hogg's triple with six seconds left sent University to the locker room with a 40-28 halftime lead.

The Blazers never led by less than 10 points the rest of the game and steadily built their lead. Bryce Gray

had 12 second-half points.

Cain had 19 points to lead University with Gray coming off the bench to score a career-high 17. Hogg had 13 to give University three players in double figures. Ozlowski had eight points with Jackson Bledsoe, Kahmi Bracey, Rob Russell and Cooper Cammack scoring two each.

University's 10 three pointers in the first half tied for the seventh most in a half in IHSAA history according to the Hickory Husker Book of Indiana High School Records. The six three pointers in the second quarter tie for the ninth most in a quarter. Roncalli made four three pointers in the first half, two in each quarter. The 14 combined three pointers in a half is the fifth most.

Drew Keggreis had 17 to lead Roncalli.

The Blazers fell behind Mount Vernon early in the championship game as the Marauders used their size advantage to control the boards, scoring several points on second chance opportunities. Mount Vernon jumped to an 11-2 lead midway through the quarter and led University 17-7 after the first period. Cain had five points in the first quarter.

Mount Vernon extended the advantage to 27-9 three minutes in to the second quarter. Cain had nine points in the quarter for University, who trailed 36-20 at halftime.

Three pointers by Russell and Cain early in the
