### Ten Hamilton Heights robotics teams qualify for state championship

#### Major academic expansion planned for Noblesville High School The REPORTER

Noblesville Schools nounced on Tuesday plans a major academic expansion to Noblesville High School



(NHS) that would add 70,000 square feet of new space in support of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) programming, as well as the renovation of 37,000 square feet for performing arts.

The expansion, which would be the largest at NHS since the 2014 freshman center addition, would include up to 22 new classrooms, STEM labs, enlarged performing arts spaces, an additional café area, a makerspace, room for large group meetings, storage, and more.

#### Stepping up patrols for school bus safety

#### The REPORTER

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will be out in full force this spring to ensure that students remain safe when traveling to and from school. Over the next couple of weeks, officers will be positioned along bus routes and in school zones where they will be on high alert for stoparm violations, speeding, and other forms of reckless driving.

The overtime patrols are part of the state's Stop Arm Violation Enforcement (SAVE) program and funded with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) grants administered by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).







"Beyond addressing some general capacity needs at the high school, this project will significantly expand our academic reach in STEM and performing arts education," Superintendent Dr. Daniel G. Hile said. "Noblesville Schools is nationally recognized in these areas, and new classrooms, they are huge points of pride for our community. This additional space will allow us to meet growing demand and best prepare students for future high-paying, competitive careers.'

Since 2012, the overall NHS population has grown by 25 percent, but STEM class enrollment has seen a 193 percent increase, while performing arts has seen a 76 percent enrollment increase. Some of the career and technical education options NHS offers have seen even larger enrollment growth, such as certified nursing (875 percent), welding (400 percent), and construction (356 percent).

In addition to the increasing demands for these programs, the high school needs general classroom, meeting, and lunch space. They are at full capacity with approximately 3,300 students and are projected to remain so for many years to come. Some teachers are currently challenged to share classrooms or rotate through the building working on moving carts, and

students are turned away from classes they would like to take due to limited

'The state of Indiana and our local employers are telling us the importance of career and technical education and we're listening," Hile said. "This project will allow us to significantly expand student options across a wide variety of college and career pathcost effective, as we'll be able to provide these services inhouse rather than paying other organizations to meet our students' career needs."

The projected cost of the project is \$39 million, which would be funded through a bond (loan) with no use of referendum classroom dollars and no increase to

the tax rate. Hile shared that "we can afford to responsibly fund this project thanks to our strong fiscal health and com-

petitive bond rating. There will not be an increased financial burden on taxpayers because of this project."

The school board has approved moving forward with consideration of the expansion and will formally vote this summer on whether to greenlight the project.

The proposed STEM/ performing arts expansion would be in addition to an athletic expansion currently underway at NHS that will provide new courts, additional girls locker rooms, classroom space, athletic office space, and enhancements for wrestling, cheerleading and volleyball. That project came in under budget at \$17.4 million and is also funded through a bond with no use of referendum ways and will also be more or classroom dollars and no increase to the tax rate.



Quakenbush said. "It may be helpful to slow down, give yourself a greater following distance and removing distractions as these are often contributing factors in traffic incidents."

more than 200 police agencies for the spring enforcement campaign, as part of approaching a school bus an ongoing effort to prevent reckless driving in school zones and around buses. Last year alone, more than 2,700 drivers were cited for stop-arm violations by Indiana law enforcement, ac-

cording to ICJI. To address this, officers will be conducting high-visibility patrols in the morning and afternoon hours along routes identified in cooperation with local bus drivers and school transportation officials. If the overhead lights flash red and the stop arm extends, you are required by law to stop.

"School buses have several highly visible indicators to let drivers know when to stop," ICJI Executive Director Devon McDonald said. "The only way you're going to miss those – the activated stop arm and flashing lights − is if you're on your phone or not paying attention to the



road. That choice can be deadly."

As part of the campaign, the department is urging motorists to slow down, pay attention to the road, and to never pass a bus that has its

Quakenbush red lights flashing and stop arm extended. This applies to all roads with one exception. On highways divided by a physical barrier, such as a concrete wall or grassy median, only vehicles traveling in the same The department joins direction as the school bus are required to stop.

It is also important when to be prepared to stop. Plan ahead and factor in extra time during each commute for school bus stops.

Disregarding a school bus stop arm is a Class A Infraction and a serious offense. Violators could pay a fine of up to \$10,000, have their license suspended for up to 90 days (for the first offense) or up to one year (for the second).

The fungus can invade the blood, heart, and brain. Adams says more than one in three patients have died from the

"This new fungus, as you mentioned, is not only resistant to many antifungal medications," Adams said, "but it's difficult to identify without specialized laboratory equipment, and, so, it's often mistaken for other infections."





A Seat on the Aisle

This past weekend saw my first visit to Indianapolis' Storefront Theatre. Previously occupying space on Broad Ripple Avenue, Storefront is now located just off 55th Street and Keystone Avenue.

Storefront produces its own season of plays in the space, but also serves as a location for other theater companies in the area. Its practical black box space also includes an art gallery, and the new location provides easier parking options. Currently in residence at Storefront is Ankh Productions and their presentation of Tales Out of Twelve 0'8

by Jamal McCray. Producing theater is just one piece of Ankh Productions, which offers branding, social media and design services, as well as photography. I have seen several examples of their efforts on Facebook and elsewhere and have been impressed. This was my first experience with their theater efforts, but it will not be my last.

Tales Out of Twelve 0'8 is billed as "a series of plays about a beautiful weak creature becoming strong..." Different audiences may draw their own connections between the five individual playlets, but the clear single strand throughout is author/ actor McCray himself.




