Last Friday night, the National Weather Service placed much of central Indiana under a tornado watch, meaning conditions were likely.

Hamilton County Emergency Management volunteers and staff activated Storm Operations in the county's Emergency Operation Center (EOC). Trained personnel stand ready to coordinate information, activate the outdoor warning sirens, and support municipalities and the county's unincorporated areas.



Do we need or do we want?

At a school board meeting in April 2022, Noblesville residents were presented with an expansion plan for the high school.

The first phase of that expansion was the

creation of a multi-purpose athletic area. That expansion meant we had to take on a \$17.4 million bond with an estimated \$5.5 million in interest. The school board approved that bond and construction is under-

The second phase of the expansion was to be anothinterest for the construction of five STEM classes, renovation of choral and jazz facilities, band practice rooms, orchestra pit, auditorium stage, additional music practice area, storage, and classrooms. All those additions were to be accomplished within the existing structure and estimated at over 12,000 square feet. Public comments made by Noblesville residents affirmed the NEED for this second phase.

Here we are less than a year later, and what was supposed to be a \$17.4 million expansion has now turned into seeking approval for a \$39 million expansion. The interest on that bond is more like \$22 million. The proposed expansion for the high school has gone from 12,000 to 70,000 square feet. What has changed?

We are moving away from sending our students to J. Everitt Light career center for CTE classes and instead having those classes in Hamilton County under the umbrella of the Pursuit Institute. Also, approximately six teachers are sharing classrooms or rotating through the building working out of moving students by adding more should increase the classroom size for the STEM classes to have space for future demand. We can also re-route some of the congestion at the current cafeteria by providing a café date.

space where students can gather and have a light lunch or snack.

When the five STEM classes, the CTE class, the café area, and the six additional classrooms teachers are add-

ed up we arrive at approximately 25,000 square feet of needed space. In a demographic study, presented to the board at the November 2022 meeting, the projected enrollment forecast for grades 9 through 12 for the next 10 years was zero or slightly below current.

Do we need 70,000 er \$17.4 million bond plus square feet when enrollment projections are almost flat? Do we need an additional 22 classrooms when we have only identified the need for 11 (five plus six)? The additional space amounts to a WANT - or wish list. We certainly do not need a budget that has almost tripled in less than one year. Assertions have been made that the school corporation can afford to take this debt on. Do you believe that just because we can that we should?

Our taxes are indeed capped at 1 percent of property value, but we are facing an increase in property assessments which could significantly increase the dollar amount we pay in a.m. to 3 p.m. property taxes. The board has the final say on how to 7 p.m. the school budget is spent. They will have to differentiate between what is needed and what is wanted.

"I am Hansel Roberts, an African-American pioneer. We were people of mixed African, Native American, and European descent, raised in eastern North Carolina, an area where our families had lived as modest, well-respected, free landowners for at least a generation before the American Revolution. We migrated to Indi-

ana's frontier in large measure because our freedom seemed in jeopardy. In July 1835, I journeyed to the federal government's land office in Indianapolis to purchase homesteads in northern Hamilton County. The claims had been intentionally chosen to be within

several miles of Quakers, a group known to be accepting and supportive of free blacks. In October 1835, we brought our families to our wilderness claims and settled permanently, establishing a farm community later known as

Roberts Settlement. By 1840 the neighborhood included about 10 families and 900 acres of land. In the mid-1920s, growing self-awareness of Roberts Settlement's special heritage led former residents to organize annual homecoming reunions, establishing a Fourth of July tradition that has continued to the present day. My final resting place is the Roberts Chapel Cemetery.'





A Seat on the Aisle

House Hunters, Fixer Upper, Property Brothers, Trading Spaces ... most of us have binge-watched an HGTV series while sick on the couch, or eagerly awaited the next episode of a favorite show. This commonality makes the HGTV setting of Dream Hou\$e a brilliant choice, but playwright Eliana Pipes uses that jumping-off point to plumb much greater depths.

On one level, it's a family drama, as so many of our great plays seem to be. Two Latina sisters have just lost their mother, and the time has come to dispose of the home that has been in their family for generations. Perhaps unsurprisingly, the siblings cannot agree on the best course of action. On a deeper level, the play wrestles with the question of whether gentrification is always wrong. Is it still opportunistic if it presents the singular chance in a hardworking life to make a profit?

As Patricia, the sister who wants to sell the family home, Yolanda Valdivia gives a sparkling and energetic performance. The character is driven and can come across as too aggressive, but that's only because she wants a better life for herself, her sister, and the baby her sister is carrying. As Julia, the sister opposed to the sale, Lexes Rubio provides a foil that is more centered and down-to-earth, although she could have shown more
