Sheldon Shalley's creative style of painting emerges from one of several methods: pulling images from his dreams, images he meets in meditation sessions,

images he sees during Shamanic journeying and images inspired by models and photographs.

Shalley is a psychotherapist, and he uses dreams, mindfulness, hypnotherapy, shamanic healing, and energy medicine to help his clients. His art honors his encounters and ex-

where they'll get their next meal." MMM works with volunteers to "pack meals" that are then donated to local food pantries. Sheridan teachers Abby Williams and Kayla Gerlach organized the effort at SHS this year – the third year that SHS has participated.

"This year we expanded the event to invite any high school student to participate, whereas in past years it was opened up to service clubs," Williams said. "By opening it up to all students we had quite a few more kids sign up to participate year, making it feel more inclusive and enthusiastic."

Gerlach, who had been involved in a packing event in her previous job, said was excited to be part of it at SHS. She explained that every packing event includes a safety and sanitation debrief as well as talking about the importance and impact we can make in our local community, followed by students working in groups of 10 to 12 to pack meals in an assembly line format.

"This particular event involved packing macaroni and cheese meals to go to our local food pantry, Mama's Cupboard, with 35 to 45 students working each hour, for three hours, packing a total of 10,000 meals," Gerlach said.

Dickenson, who was at SHS on the day of the event, noticed, "All the student embraced helping one another and were more than willing to help. This wasn't something they HAD to do, but really wanted to, and we

saw that with each and every one who participated." She went on to explain that this event was made possible through a grant from the Hamilton County Community Foundation.

Students and sponsors all agreed that the event was uplifting.

"Other than helping the local food pantry with increased donations of food, there are many research studies done showing the impact of service learning by connecting service with what students are doing in the classroom," Williams said. "Giving students a meaningful purpose and opportunity to have a positive impact on their community is an amazing opportunity!"

Dickinson added, "I think having the students participate in something that is giving back – and to their own community – will stick with them and instill volunteerism for the rest of their lives."

Mr. Watson also inspired my two cousins and myself to form a judging team to compete in a contest sponsored by NJVGA. The winning team the previous year had won a trip to Hawaii. NJVGA is the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association. The contest involved identification of up to 100 different vegetables merely by viewing their seeds, identification of common diseases in vegetables, grading potatoes, identifying the different vegetables, identifying the weeds common to growing vegetables, etc. We won first place in the Indiana contest.

We held our breath when the national location was announced, hoping for Florida only to hear that the national contest that year was in Cincinnati, Ohio. Farm boys in the big city. We stayed at the Hilton Hotel during the national contest. It had a machine that would spit out cream soda just by pushing a button. Its restaurant was visited each morning for breakfast. The waitress could not believe that we would eat four waffles each morning. When we were out walking late one evening, we noticed the 'girls' were very friendly. We decided to ignore them and take in a movie.

Mr. Watson encouraged me to become a state FFA officer. That allowed free admission to the state fair, and we worked in the FFA display area. The area I was in had the usual farm animals, chickens, ducks, geese, sheep, a sow and her piglets, goats, rabbits, and a jersey calf. I thought no one would be interested until I heard one young boy looking at the jersey calf and tell his dad, "Look, dad, a deer." Only to hear the father reply, "No, son that is a pony." One girl got visibly sick when I mentioned that the large hog sure would make a lot of bacon.

She had no idea that was the bacon source.

In addition to parliamentary procedure and double entry bookkeeping, we learned about partition fence rules, the more than 3,000 soil types, the rules for managing regulated and mutual drains, net and tare scale weights, animal nutrition, USDA programs, and managing the woods found on nearly every farm. We learned to identify by sight when plants were short of nitrogen, phosphorus, or potash and we learned how to conserve natural resources.

Have I used my mathematical study of trigonometry, calculus, Boolean algebra, logic, statistics, groups, rings, fields, ideals, Laplace transforms, number theory, or topology? Not nearly as much as my training on boundary line fences and drainage regulation learned in Ag classes from Mr. Watson. Thank you, Mr. Watson.

I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about. But when I was introduced to Prevail of Central Indiana, I was shocked by the number of individuals who are affected by domestic violence. In 2018 alone, Prevail helped more than 4,000 clients in Hamilton County (nearly 80 percent of clients are women and children). Domestic violence and abuse are hard topics to discuss, so you don't often hear about them. Quantum physics suggests that all things and beings are connected and that our minds are connected with a cosmic mind. Carl Sagan, one of the great science educators, popularized one unbelievable fact: we are stardust. Sagan said that most of the atoms in our body were formed inside of stars, supernovae, and neutron star collisions. In fact, scientists who have measured the distribution of essential elements of life in over 150,000 stars in the Milky Way claim that 97 percent of the human body consists of stardust.

Shalley has created paintings inspired by photos of nebula and stardust to honor our connection to the stars. As an energy worker, he often sees energy in matter. “When working with a client, I may see what is vibrating in their field,” he said. “All matter is energy at its deepest level.”

Mark Timmis has been involved in the arts since the 1970s. After attending Indiana University for undergrad, he received his Master of Arts degree from Western Michigan University. He taught as an art professor in Evansville before transitioning into the IT field.

Timmis took a 15-year hiatus from exercising his artistic abilities before moving back into it as a hobby. Having wanted to get back into art for some time, he got a small studio at The Stutz in Indianapolis and decided to see where his creativity would take him. Some of his first pieces are included in his *Mark Timmis: One Man Show* exhibit and were inspired by artist Robert Motherwell.

Being a very process-oriented person, Timmis says he feels that is where his worlds of technology and art connect. “Painting for me is creating a problem and solving it, plain and simple,” he said. “While it brings a lot of satisfaction, it can also bring terror.”

Timmis doesn’t begin creating any of his paintings with an end in mind; he embraces the present moment and loves to see what surprises will come along the way when he allows himself to be in the flow, focusing fully on his creations and playing around with different types of paints, textures, techniques, and colors in each piece. He embraces the belief that his artwork is the only thing in his life that he can honestly say is all him.

“Our experiences inform every aspect of us, and I make art to fill a place

in me that belongs only to me,” Timmis said. “A place where no one can tell me what is right or what is wrong. I own it. It is me, and I am it.”

Joy Tilson Cobb

Growing up with parents who were both musicians, art has always been a thread throughout Tilson Cobb’s life. Her parents encouraged her to start with a foundation in music, so she decided to first learn how to play the piano.

Tilson Cobb also took voice lessons and eventually learned how to play the harp and saxophone. She went to

college to be an opera singer or musical theater performer, but she never pursued either career due to her focus on her family after marriage. As an adult, she began finding new ways of expressing her creativity and fed her passion through the art of quilling, crocheting, designing window treatments, and learning the intricacies of wallpaper.

Tilson Cobb’s experience as a studio assistant for an artist who did silk painting and had designed a clothing line is what guided her in what she truly wanted to do. Her newfound love for colors and her natural talent for replicating led her to try watercolor painting, needle felting, and wet felting, and she even began studying renaissance scrolls, but she realized these practices did not have the ability to fulfill her passions.

Acrylic pouring is something Tilson Cobb saw on the internet when she

was researching abstract art inspiration for a large painting she was making for a beach condo. She felt inspired by those who would freely go through the process, putting it all out there and sharing their work with others. Not only did she benefit from watching the process of these other artists, but this inspiration is also what ultimately led to the creation and naming of her exhibit.

“You can get pretty results as a beginner, even if you don’t see yourself as an artist,” Tilson Cobb said. “*Free Flowing* [is the exhibit title] because it not only describes the art itself – the flowing water feel of most of my work – but also the process has to be free flowing. The paints combine in unpredictable ways as they’re poured onto the canvas, and that’s when you need to be willing to let go and possibly head in another direction than what you’d

planned. It’s a cliché, but you really do have to ‘go with the flow!’”

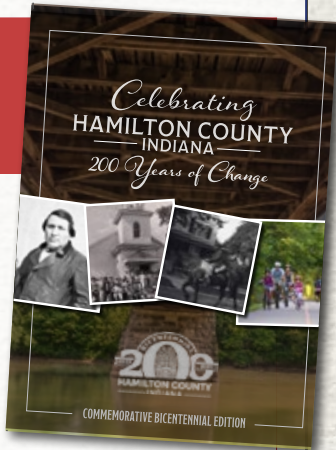

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# Councilman Mark Hall’s April 2023 Timesheet

Welcome to the Timesheet. This column is a report of work done on behalf of the people of Hamilton County. It’s to be informative, too – a place to learn about projects and how our county government works.

As your employee, it’s important to me that you know what is being worked on as transparently as possible in government. You hired me as your County Councilman, and my hope is that you’ll choose to be informed by regularly reading this column, getting involved, and by asking questions.

Council meetings are at 7 p.m. the first Wednesday of every month at the judicial center in downtown Noblesville. They are also available to watch online for those unable to attend in person. Here is where my time this past month has been spent.



Month three is complete. This month has been a whirlwind of listening, learning, note taking and analysis. I’ve begun addressing questions, most notably, how we operate and why? When we spend

taxpayer dollars, how can we spend them more efficiently? Month three also included “doughnut diplomacy” with several departments: I bought and delivered doughnuts as a collective thank you from us all, and a special thank you for getting me up to speed.

This month’s personnel committee meeting was canceled, and the work was completed by email. It consisted of new hire approvals, handbook updates, and compensation adjustments.

The Highway Committee meetings included detailed reviews of pending projects, right of way ground acquisitions, up-

dates on letting schedules and discussions of upcoming project funding. Committee highlights included a review of funding for a traffic study on Olio Road as well as the county’s portion of the cost for a new roundabout at 134th Street and Olio Road.

The full council voted Wednesday on recommendations from the committees. Public meetings are a product of hours of work behind the scenes. To serve well, one must be informed well. Keeping up with the reading, email, helping taxpayers with issues or questions, meeting with department heads, committee meetings and conversations with other council members all require an investment of time.

In addition to County Council public meetings, I attended a Board of Commissioners meeting, multiple Cicero and Noblesville town council meetings, a joint Council & Commissioners meeting, the quarterly joint meeting be-

tween County and Cicero officials, and I toured the White River Campground as part of my review of a pending funding request to mitigate the risk of sewage spillage. This month also included informative planning sessions with the experts at the Surveyors, Highway, Parks, and Tourism departments.

Of note this month was a meeting with the experts at our Highway Department as a first step to begin working on how we can manage tax dollars at risk in today’s construction climate. The challenge, as mentioned last month, is controlling up front dollars spent (ground acquisition, utility relocation, etc.) so as to not unnecessarily delay a project, and concurrently ensuring that total project financing is in place, even if the final project costs are higher than forecasted.

While I don’t want to delay projects that need to be completed, the Council needs the ability to stop or delay a project if the bids

are well beyond our estimated costs but still acceptable under procurement regulations. If the up-front costs we’d lose by terminating a project exceed the higher costs of completing a project, the decision, while still the lessor of two tough choices, could be purely financial in the short term and leave us with the original project incomplete.

This month’s work also included spending half a day at the State House accompanying the State House Chaplain Matt Barnes. We were able to meet with Representative Goodrich and Senator Baldwin and discuss legislation that impacts County government. I represented the County Council at the “Walkthrough the Life of a Client in Noblesville,” presented by the Noblesville Township Trustee’s office, and at the annual “State of the Workforce” event, presented by Invest Hamilton County, and at the Janus Create, Connect & Commit breakfast event, and at two

retirement events hosted by the Parks Department and the Commissioners.

This is my time sheet. This is where my time went during month three. There are quite a few projects in the queue for 2023 and while my job is primarily the financial oversight of the county budget it is important to understand the Board of Commissioners priorities and balance them with the stewardship of taxpayer dollars. That is the job, and I am excited to do the people’s business.

As a taxpayer myself, and listening to so many of you, our employers, it’s important for the taxpayers to have access to all the information you want. I work for you, and although you may not choose to do a deep dive into what your County Council does, it’s important that you always can do so.

# AG Rokita & Sen. Braun issue statements on Indiana banning gender transition for minors

## The REPORTER

Indiana Attorney General Rokita and U.S. Senator Mike Braun (R-Ind.) issued statements Wednesday as Governor Holcomb signed **Senate Bill 480**, which would stop potentially irreversible gender transition drugs and procedures for minors, including puberty blockers, hormone therapies, and irreversible surgeries such as mastectomies for the purpose of gender transition.

AG Rokita's statement was as follows:

"Signing the bill that protects our children from irreversible and damaging decisions was the right move by the governor," AG Rokita said. "Banning these experimental procedures is critical for the health and wellbeing of future generations. My office is thankful for the General Assembly's hard work to ensure this got across the finish line. We are ready to defend it in court."

Senator Braun's statement was as follows:

"A child cannot consent

to irreversible sex change surgery, and Indiana will no longer allow children to take dangerous drugs with long-term consequences like puberty blockers and hormone therapies in the name of extreme gender theories," Sen. Braun said. "These kids are clearly having a hard time, and we need to give them compassion and mental health help rather than

dangerous, un-tested, unapproved drugs and irreversible surgeries."

Puberty blockers and hormone therapies have not been approved by the FDA for gender transition.

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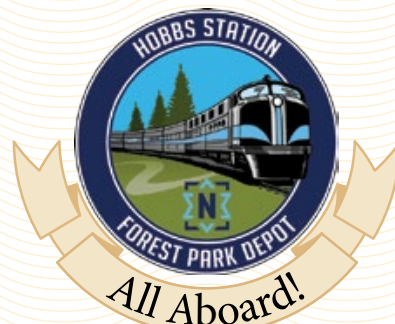

## Two Mile Hollow: consider it as it is, rather than as you wish it to be

Questions currently swirling in this ASOTA writer's head: does satire need to be dark in order to be cutting or insightful or even sharp?

I wish I had an answer because it would really help me describe the Phoenix Theatre's Indiana premiere of *Two Mile Hollow* by Butler University graduate Leah Nanako Winkler. I am trying to stay very conscious of some advice a playwright once gave me. He said to consider the play as it is rather than as I wish it to be. In the case of *Two*

*Mile Hollow*, I was hoping for something along the lines of a 21st century version of George C. Wolfe's *The Colored Museum*. It is not that. It is, however, an enjoyable spoof that is frequently hilarious and sometimes thoughtful.

The setup makes clear the sort of satire the audience is in for. The Hampton's estate of a wealthy white family is the setting for a tale of dramatic family tensions and revelations one sees in O'Neill or Letts or Albee. Well, not quite. The playwright has turned everything up to "11" and nearly all the humor comes from the very extreme por-

trays of a family of archetypes.

The cast is made up of African American actors, satirizing not just the genre, but the characters themselves. Vain, self-involved, and shallow are just a few of the adjectives that describe the Donnelly Family. The single outlier is Charlotte, an Asian American executive assistant to a Donnelly who has a major movie career and who is dragged into the high drama of a family weekend.

The playwright offers a skewering of these people and of this very familiar familial angst. The casting

of non-white actors to play these archetypes seems to suggest that the audience is in for a sharp satire of race. Here is where my dark versus sharp quandary comes in. For me, the racial satire never got hot enough. And the socio-economic satire never felt as incisive or original as it wanted to be.

The cast, on the other hand, was in top form from start to finish.

Arianne Villareal's Charlotte was thrown in every direction by the Donnelly clan and Villareal's performance matched the sensation. She earned the final moment, alone onstage. The Donnelly's were equally well performed. Paige Elisse as Mary, Eddie Dean as Joshus, Jay Fuqua as Christopher and Millicent Wright as Matriarch Blythe. Each actor brought vibrant life to their portrayal. Even more than the over-the-top characterizations, I enjoyed the small bits of language and references.

Also, the technical aspects are in perfect harmony. Inseung Park's set, Tonie Smith's costumes, Eric Watkins' lighting, Brian Grimm's sound, and Mikael Burke's precise direction all provide the cast ample support.

No "Bottom Line" this time. The performances are all well worth a look. The

play is a definitely parody, and I can't make it change to suit my tastes.

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# Business is Fore The Girls

*Two Westfield graduates working to fill the gap in women's golf attire*

Cailyn Henderson and Margaret Wentz have been friends since they were young girls.

They started playing golf at Bridgewater at a young age, then became high school teammates for Westfield High School, helping the Shamrocks to great success. Now, Henderson and Wentz are partners in a new business that's getting off to a good start.

Henderson and Wentz are the owners and founders of Fore The Girls, a new company that aims to "fulfill the market gap in women's and girl's golf clothing," according to a fact sheet they provided to the Reporter.

"We started this whole new business, we grew up playing golf together," said Henderson. The women say they believe there needs to be a change in women's fashion because, as Henderson said, "you've probably seen, there's not a lot of options for girls and women."

Wentz said that growing up, she noticed that pro shops had "very little" clothing sections for younger women.

"And a lot of times they were unflattering clothing, or other times they just didn't fit or were too boxy, or there weren't enough color options," said Wentz.

Fore The Girls already has its first product out: The FTG Blossom Bucket Hat. The hat is both fashionable and practical. It comes in three different colors (white lily, pink peony and blue poppy). It also has a hidden magnet for golfers to keep their ball markers secure.

"You can wear it in two styles," said Wentz. "You can flip the rim up, (Henderson) usually wears it flipped up."

"And then she always wears it down," said Henderson. "We like it different ways."

The hat is washable (there are instructions on the Fore The Girls website, look in the "FAQ" section) and also comes with an adjustable drawstring so girls and women of all ages can adjust the hat size accordingly. Wentz also said the hat is

wind resistant and provides additional sun coverage, so golfers are prepared for any kind of weather.

The hats went on sale March 1, and started selling right away. Wentz said they were already advertising the hats on social media, so when they dropped at noon, the sales started coming in.

"The first five minutes, we had a lot of orders," said Henderson. She noted that most of the hat sales are from out of state, with Wentz listing such states as California, Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina, New York and Massachusetts. The company already has a nationwide presence, and also worldwide.

"We just had an order from New Zealand that we packaged today, which was fun," said Henderson. "That's just from social media. We don't know anyone from New Zealand."

Hats are just the begin-

ning, of course. Wentz said that in the future, Fore The Girls plans to "come out with more apparel. So, we'll go into golf dresses, and then we'll go into polos, skirts, jackets, rain jackets and also accessories that you'll need on the golf course as well."

### Beginnings

The Fore The Girls concept actually dates back to Henderson and Wentz's senior year of high school, when they expressed interest in starting a golf business at some point. After graduating from Westfield, both women played golf in college (Henderson at the University of Indianapolis and Wentz at Sewanee: The University of the South).

Finally in January 2022, Henderson and Wentz began making Fore The Girls a reality. They took things slow – "baby steps," according to the fact sheet – making sure they completed all business-related tasks before

launch. They contacted Anna Mariacher, a Purdue University fashion student, to help design the Blossom Bucket Hat. After that came designing the website, creating a tech pack, packaging and fulfilling orders, and then designing, filming and editing all of the marketing material.

"You don't realize how long something actually takes until you go into it," said Henderson. She and Wentz noted that it took about a year-and-a-half from starting the business to getting the hat ready for sale.

"We definitely had to be very patient," said Wentz. "So it was a long process to get one product out there. But we learned a lot. We jumped over a lot of hurdles during the process."

### Larger vision

There is a larger vision behind Fore The Girls than just hats and clothes. Henderson and Wentz want to encourage women and girls who play the

sport of golf, especially since it has been growing quickly over the past few years.

The Fore The Girls fact sheet noted that according to the National Golf Foundation in 2020, the number of female golfers in the United States rose from 5.6 million to 6.0 million, with women accounting for 36 percent of beginners that year. In 2021, 25 percent of golfers were women, while 35 percent (1.1 million) of junior players were girls, a number that was just 15 percent as recently as 2000.

Many new female players are joining the sport, and Wentz said that while they don't know much about golf, they want to learn how to play "because you're outside, you're getting lots of exercise and you're meeting people. And so we want to help teach women and young girls how to play." Wentz said that one of the company's goals is to "provide

clothing options for them so that they feel more confident and feel better on the golf course while they play."

"People are nervous to go to the golf course because they don't know what to wear," said Henderson. "They don't know how to act on the golf course." So, the women are using their social media to post golf tips for beginners, fashion tips and other videos to encourage women and girl golfers to enjoy the sport.

Henderson said they want people to know that golf is for "everybody, and it's fun. It's positive. It's not like all these rules that you have to follow. It's supposed to be fun. And so that's what we want our brand to show, is that golf is a lot of fun."

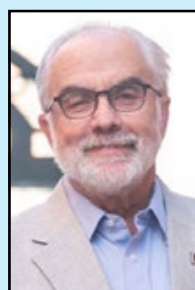

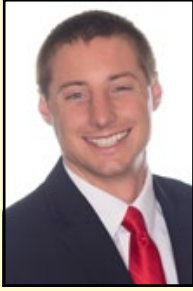
