Two county couples die in Wednesday plane crash

Hamilton County is mourning the loss of four people who died in a single-engine plane crash Wednesday night just off the coast of Venice, Fla., which is just south of Sarasota.

Jeff Lumpkin, 64, and wife Patty Lumpkin, 68, both of Fishers, and Rick Beaver, 60, and wife Bethel Beaver, 57, both of Noblesville.

According to the Venice, Fla., Police Department, at 9:38 p.m. on Wednesday, April 5, police responded to 1600 S. Harbor Drive on report of a plane crash. Several witnesses were on the pier who saw the crash and called 911.

Jeff Lumpkin was piloting a single-engine Piper PA-32R with the other three on board.

According to Venice Police Captain Andy Leisenring, the plane left an airport in St. Petersburg, Fla., and arrived at the Venice airport at 5 p.m. After dinner with friends at Sharky's On the Pier, they left the Venice airport at 9:35 p.m. Wednesday night. The plane crashed into the Gulf of Mexico west of Venice shortly after takeoff on the return trip to St. Petersburg.

Jeff Lumpkin and Rick Beaver were found by emergency crews Wednesday night. Crews also found a debris field approximately one-half mile west of the Venice airport. Authorities were unable to send a dive team to look for the plane or other passengers until Thursday morning.

At 11:56 a.m. Thursday, divers located the main part of the aircraft and both female passengers at a depth of 23 feet.

They loved their family. A quick glance at Rick's Facebook page told everyone he loved being a grandfather and Bethel loved being a grandmother. Our prayers go out to their family. We share in their loss as well. Today, Noblesville is grieving.

Venice Police were leading the investigation. Both the Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board had already been notified.

Those assisting Venice Police included Venice Fire De-

partment, Sarasota County Sheriff's Department, Sarasota Police, Florida Fish and Wildlife, the U.S. Coast Guard, and the Venice District 12 Medical Examiner's Office.

There was a similar plane

crash off the coast of Venice in December 2022. As of Thursday afternoon, officials said it was too early in the investigation to determine if there was any connection between the two accidents.



Shredding & electronic recycling event at Carmel's Creekside Middle School

The City of Carmel will take part in a Community Shred-It & Electronics Recycling Day from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, April 22 in the parking lot of Creekside Middle School, located on the southeast corner of West 126th Street and Shelborne Road.

This event is presented by the Carmel Police Department and Crime Stoppers of Central Indiana and sponsored by a team of organizations including: Republic Services, Indianapolis Zoo, Lamar Advertising, Technology Recyclers, RPM Pizza, Walgreens, Shred-It and Carmel Utilities.

Cost & payment methods

A \$5 donation to Crime Stoppers is requested per banker-box size container or equivalent of paper and \$20 is requested per computer monitor or TV. Cash and credit cards will be accepted.

Shredding

Identity theft is one of the fastest-growing

crimes, and most identity information is still obtained through hard-copy paper sources. Shredding significantly reduces your risk when disposing of confidential information. It is recommended that you shred any documents that include a signature, account number, social security number, medical or legal information. The professional shredding is sponsored by Shred-it to benefit Crime Stoppers of Central Indiana.

Electronics recycling

The recycling drop-off event will be managed by Technology Recyclers. The following items will be accepted:

- All computers, servers, peripherals, wiring, cable, battery backups, monitors, TVs
- All electronics (phones, stereos, headsets, DVD players, any small appliance, IT equipment including hubs, switches, servers, routers, racks, etc.)
- Office equipment including fax machines, copiers or phone systems

• Industrial electronics, test equipment, medical equipment and large appliances

Prescription drugs

The DEA sponsors this program and encourages you to properly remove unused and expired medicines to protect the environment and the community by keeping them out of the water supply and reducing accidental poisoning and prescription drug abuse. Officers will accept pharmaceuticals for proper disposal.

Bulk items

As part of the Carmel city trash program with Republic Services, drop-off of bulky items will be available free of charge to trash customers (for Carmel Utilities trash customers only; an ID or utility bill required). Space is limited and on a first-come, first-served basis. No electronic waste or appliances containing Freon will be accepted in bulk item disposal. Those items are accepted in electronics recycling. Examples of items to drop off include:

- Lawn equipment
 - Carpet
 - Furniture
 - Grills (no propane tanks)
 - Water heaters
 - Swing sets
 - Mattresses
- Items not accepted**

AG Rokita releases tips for Hoosiers to avoid & report disaster fraud

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is warning Hoosiers to exercise caution following another round of storms that rolled through Indiana.

"Although we have many, generous helpers in our communities, we unfortunately have scammers looking to take advantage of others who are hiding in plain sight," AG Rokita said. "But there are ways Hoosiers can take steps to protect themselves as they begin the process of reconstructing what the storms destroyed."

Hoosiers across the state have felt the devastating impact of the latest round of severe storms and tornadoes. Now is the time to do your homework when rebuilding during the aftermath and choosing where to send your charitable donations.

Here are some steps that AG Rokita recommends:

Fake federal or local aid

- Watch out for fake offers of local or federal aid.
- Government and local disaster workers do not solicit or accept money. They don't charge for inspections

or for help in filling out any disaster aid applications.

- Ask any inspectors to show you their identification badge, and don't let anyone in your home

who claims to be working for the government or disaster relief who cannot provide proof of their identification.

Charitable giving

- Donate to trusted, established charities.
 - Beware of charities that pop up after recent disasters.
 - Monitor information from local law enforcement and government officials regarding donation needs and local efforts to raise money.
 - Verify phone numbers and websites for charities before giving.
 - There are a number of sources you can check to verify that a charity is legitimate before giving: [CharityNavigator.org](#), [Charity-Watch.org](#), [Give.org](#), and [Guidestar.org](#).
- Verify information in social media posts**
- Double-check any fundraising campaigns for a history of charitable donations before giving.

- Crowdfunding websites often host individual requests for assistance but are not always vetted by the site or other sources.

Beware of potential contractor and home improvement scams

- Make sure you have an insurance company evaluate damage before arranging repairs to ensure that the work needed will be covered.
- Watch out for companies going door-to-door in neighborhoods hardest hit by the storms; be sure to conduct your own research before signing anything and try to get at least three written estimates.
- Never pay the full amount upfront for a home repair and pause if you are asked to provide a very large deposit.
- Be wary of contractors claiming to be able to complete a repair for a discount using supplies leftover from another job.

Indiana House’s ESG bill should focus on actual threats, not simply seek to make a statement

Dear Editor:

While the nation’s economy has been on a bit of a roller coaster ride over the past few years, Indiana’s economic outlook has largely remained steady due to steady investments made in our state.

New companies from every sector are creating high-paying, quality jobs across the state because of Indiana’s business-friendly economic climate. From the new advanced energy industries investing in northwest Indiana to the statewide business investment that has made us the best state to grow crops, manufacture goods, and host events, Indiana has become a great place to find a quality job, even for public sector employees like firefighters and police officers.

Unfortunately, a hastily created bill that is being considered by the state legislature could threaten further investment from American-owned companies into the state, affecting the pensions of our firefighters, police officers, and teachers in the process.

On its face, **House Bill 1008** (HB 1008) is supposed to ensure that the Indiana Public Retirement System (INPRS) discharges its fiduciary duties solely in the financial interest of the participants and beneficiaries of the public pension and prevent environmental, social, and governance (ESG) factors from being considered in investments for public pensions.

However, INPRS itself claims it is already acting solely upon financial considerations for the state pensions in order to maximize returns for Hoosiers. Due to HB 1008’s vague wording, a fiscal impact analysis from state financial analysts have concluded HB 1008 could end up costing taxpayers millions, if not billions of dollars, as a result of lower returns on investments.

Meanwhile, in a more common-sense approach to many of these issues, the Indiana Senate recently passed **Senate Bill 268** (SB 268), a bill that requires state pension divestment from Chinese Communist Party controlled-interests. I applaud this effort because Indiana currently has more than \$1 billion invested in Chinese state-controlled interests. This bill allows for a five-year runway toward full divestment with clearly outlined guidelines and a clearly defined end goal that would not cost taxpayers.

In contrast to SB 268, HB 1008 does not have clearly defined guidelines nor end goals. The threat of the bill’s arbitrary nature could cause INPRS to unnecessarily divest from American-owned companies in order to ensure compliance with very unclear rules. This could significantly lower returns for state pension holders, reduce competition among companies managing INPRS funds, and potentially dissuade American businesses from investing in Indiana. HB 1008 just threatens pensions for firefighters and police officers by creating more hoops for INPRS to jump through and makes advanced American industries worry we may lower the hammer on them arbitrarily.

If the General Assembly is going to instruct INPRS to divest from specific industries (which some may disagree with in the first place), I hope they focus on bills addressing actual threats like SB 268, not statement bills, such as HB 1008, which will have serious unintended consequences.

Indiana is already seeing the benefits from investment in advanced energy sources. I believe we need an all-of-the-above approach to energy. Energy demand is only going to increase. To power the future, we need as much energy as possible produced here, in America and Indiana, specifically. Billions of dollars are coming to the state in the form of electric vehicle battery manufacturing, hydrogen hubs, and much more.

The last thing the state should be doing is enacting a law that does nothing but put state pensions at risk while potentially making businesses skeptical of investing in Indiana. I hope the General Assembly will let INPRS continue fulfilling its fiduciary duty to Hoosiers without adding onerous legislation that will have serious unintended consequences that cost taxpayers.

Let yourself be taken away by “extraordinary theatre” of Beef & Boards’ An American in Paris

“An American in Paris” originated as a jazz-influenced musical composition by George Gershwin. It was first performed in 1928 and is considered by many to be one of Gershwin's most evocative pieces. (It is one of my favorite pieces of music, along with Gershwin's “Rhapsody in Blue.”)

In 1951, Vincent Minelli directed the film version based on the piece, which starred Gene Kelly as Jerry and Leslie Caron (in her film debut) as Lise, and which was awarded an Oscar for Best Picture. The stage version came to Broadway in 2015 and garnered four Tony Awards for its choreography and some technical design aspects.

Beef & Boards' production, directed and choreographed by Ron Morgan, is a sparkling display of dance and song. Gershwin tunes augment the storytelling and dance numbers punctuate it. Mr. Morgan engages his cast to offer endless combinations in number after number, and the scenes, especially in Act 1, are a graceful presentation.

An American in Paris is set in postwar France. American GIs are heading home except for a few with artistic skills who feel the pull of Paris. Composer Adam Hochberg begins telling us his story, which includes his new friends: hopeful singer Henri Baurel, a Frenchman, and Jerry Mulligan, a fellow ex-GI with a penchant for drawing and painting. All three wind up in love with the same girl – lovely dancer Lise Dassin.

Jon Rose takes the leading role of Jerry and fills it with his confident singing and dancing talents. Rose brings a winning natural approach to his work and is impressive on every occasion. Jerry falls hard for a resistant Lise, played with equal skill by Sophie Akin. Her array of vocal, movement and acting talents combine to offer Lise as someone I think we all fall a bit in love with. (Her “The Man I Love” has all the ingredients to be a show-stop-

per.) Rose and Ms. Akin are dazzling in their scenes together which feature a good amount of polished dance and song, along with some appealing interplay as Jerry tries to convince Lise to be a part of his life.

But Lise feels she must stay true to Henri, played by Ian Black, whom she knows wishes to marry her. Black's Henri is tuneful and impressive in his big number, “I'll Build a Stairway to Paradise.” Austin Glen Jacobs completes the “love square” as the sardonic composer Adam, adding his own musical gifts to the show.

The boy “meets/longs for/can't have/pursues/loses in a misunderstanding/wins over” girl story arc is brightest in the first act which is full of upbeat music and dance and romance. Act 2 has a more angst filled tone, with less music and dancing, and more straight acting scenes.

The supporting cast is brilliant, especially including the corps of ballet dancers whose work is an impressive feature in the show. I daresay on-point ballet is an extra skill that most musical-comedy performers do not possess, but which is performed here with a wonderful proficiency.

Sarah Hund, as expected, is top-notch in her role as arts patron Milo Davenport, while Tiffany Gilliam and Doug King combine nicely as Henri's parents, Madame and Monsieur Baurel. The many dance ensemble members are tireless and formidable in their list of appearances.

Design work for the show features a colorful array of costumes by Jill Kelly Howe and Kathy Henry, a simple but stunning set design by Michael Layton (who also put together the scene-setting projections), and lights by Ryan Koharchik. Terry Woods adroitly leads the small B&B orchestra through the Gershwin score.

Bottom Line: One cannot help but be drawn into this story as portrayed here by a sharply prepared and

skill-laden cast. The action is pretty to watch, and the performances from all are high level. I would rate the book a step or two below the songs and the dances, but I definitely came away feeling that I had seen some extraordinary theatre.

The Millers are 6-1 for the season and host Castle on Saturday afternoon.


