What it's like to be a single mom in a crowded airport

Editor's note: Scott Saalman is spending the week in the Caribbean trying to find himself. Thank you to Meghan Quinn for covering for him.

On a September morning in 2004, upset that I would not buy her a doughnut, my two-year-old toddler Taylor bolted away in the Denver International Airport. For non-parents, it's hard to imagine a toddler can move quickly enough to escape an adult, but this is because they have never tried to chase an angry toddler in public. Toddlers are fast, fearless, and completely incapable of being reasoned with.

At security checkpoints across America, airport personnel ask, "Did you leave your luggage unattended at any point during your travels?" This is a question I never imagined having to answer yes to. But when this toddler of mine shot across the crowded airport, I had, in fact, left a stroller, a suitcase, a carry-on, a diaper bag, and a purse unattended while I gave chase.

Sheridan water main flushing begins Sunday night

Indiana American Water will conduct water main flushing in the Sheridan service area from 10 p.m. to 8 a.m. each night from Sunday, April 9 to Thursday, April 13.

The company conducts the annual maintenance program to assure high-quality water service and to help ensure fire hydrants are operational.

According to Senior Operations Superintendent Dawn Beck, "Water main and fire hydrant flushing is an important part of a regular maintenance program for water distribution systems. Indiana American Water consistently meets or exceeds all drinking water standards."

No interruptions in water service are anticipated as a result of the work. Customers may

experience a slight drop in water pressure or temporary water discoloration while this program is underway. Customers should refrain from doing laundry during the time of day the flushing program is taking place in or near their neighborhood.

If tap water is discolored, Indiana American Water recommends allowing several cold-water faucets to run for a

short time until the water runs clear. Using more than one faucet allows the water to clear more quickly.

Luckily, a nearby security guard heard my shrieks, spotted my little speed racer, and scooped her up out of harm’s way. And as I opened my arms and found them filled with the familiar flailing of an over-stimulated toddler, I found myself standing on the edge of a precipice ...

To buy a leash, or not to buy a leash? That was the question.

This was one of those moments in parenting, the ones that gave me a taste of my own medicine, that showed me what it is like to eat my own words. I had railed against child leashes. But here I was – defeated and desperate for a way to keep my little runner safe.

I hesitated only a moment when I saw one in a shop nearby. I swear it was glowing in the window. I bought the most expensive full-body harness they had available. It wrapped snugly around the arms and legs with adjustable loops that met at the back, in a five-point star. This was attached to a long piece of strong, reinforced fabric, which had a padded, ergonomic handle. I paid quickly, thanked the sales lady, and carried my still flailing and squealing toddler to the security line. Then came the question.

“Ma’am, have you left your luggage unattended at any point during your travels?”

I could not lie. “Yes.”

“Yes?” he asked, surprised.

“Yes,” I said.

He sighed and began opening my luggage.

I decided this would be a good time to put my new purchase on my sweet toddler.

I needed her to be on her own two feet, supervised and attached to me. I had not anticipated how excited Taylor would be about this new toy. She could not WAIT for it to be on. Finally strapped in, she was grinning from ear to ear, dimples beaming, red curls matted to her sweaty little cheeks, and then she did it.

She dropped straight to the floor. There, poised on her hands and knees, she looked up at me, showed her teeth, and began playfully snarling and barking at me. I was not prepared for this. It never occurred to me when I purchased this harness that it looked identical to the one we used for our dog Ozzie back home.

“Get. Up!” I insisted. All eyes were on us. “Taylor, PLEASE get up. We’re holding up the line. You cannot be a dog right now!”

Out of the corner of my eye, I saw a woman coming towards us. I could not get a clear view, but I knew from the sound of her footfalls she was wearing high heels, and it had been my experience that there is only one kind of woman who wears high heels in an airport; she’s a business woman. She does not have time for airport nonsense. And she was coming straight for me. As she reached me, she began, “Maybe she would behave if you took that leash off of her and started treating her like a human being.”

I stared at her; tears of injustice sprang to my eyes. Didn’t she get it? I didn’t WANT to buy a leash. I didn’t WANT to be holding up this line.

Suddenly, a sweet, gray-haired woman pushed her glasses up on her nose and moved towards me, placing her hand gently on my arm. Taylor was still on all fours, panting now, looking back and forth from person to person, wagging an invisible tail, oblivious that a scene was taking place.

My new friend looked at Ms. High Heels and said, “Spoken like someone who has never had a child. Move on. Come back when you know how to behave.”

The high-heeled woman turned, her own invisible tail tucked between her legs, and vanished into the crowd. I bent down and picked up Taylor. The woman, whose name I never caught, patted Taylor’s cheek and smiled, “My second one was a runner. You just never know until you’ve had a runner.” She winked at me, then disappeared into the busy terminal. I looked at Taylor. She licked my cheek and smiled. “Put me down, Mommy.”

“Not until we get on the plane, Taylor.”

“I’m not Taylor anymore. I’m Ozzie. WOOF!”

The security guard handed my luggage back to me, a sly smile twitching at his lips. He told us both to have a good day, and we slowly made our way into the boarding area.

Taylor proudly wore her harness for the next three years, anytime we were in a crowded place. It carried us both safely on many more adventures, through airports, festivals, street fairs, farmers’ markets, amusement parks. We faced occasional comments over the years, both supportive and rude. But do you know what didn’t happen? Taylor didn’t get lost. She and I could travel together, side by side, without a care in the world.

I was grateful for that harness, but perhaps what I was most grateful for was the day when, in a bitter-sweet moment, the harness finally bit the dust, and I realized we no longer needed it. Taylor had graduated from runner to careful explorer, and finally ... the dog days were over.

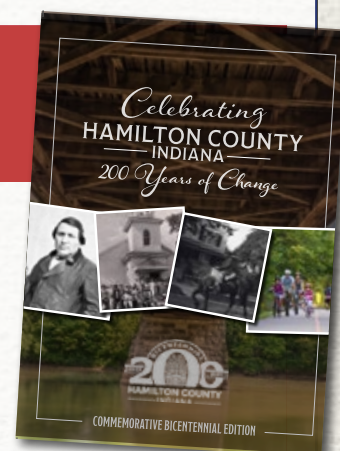

ing character. Creed II, just like its predecessor, does an excellent job at pulling at your heart strings and playing with your emotions, a trend that is carried over into the trilogy's final installment.

"I am Newton Roads. I was a prominent citizen and businessman in the town of Atlanta. I founded and built the Roads Hotel, a historic, two-story Queen Anne style frame

building in Atlanta in 1893, which remained in use as a hotel until the 1920s. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1987, and has recently gained fame for possible paranormal activity. Upon my suggestion and with my hard work, Atlanta received a Carnegie Grant for construction of the area's main library, which was erected on the corner of Main and Walnut Streets in 1916. It remained the largest of the three town's libraries until Hamilton North Public Library was built in Cicero in 1997. My final resting place is the Arcadia Cemetery."

Product recalls in March

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is alerting Hoosiers of important consumer protection concerns for products recalled in March. Consumers are encouraged to take advantage of opportunities available for those who purchased the recalled items.

"Spring has sprung and so have house projects," AG Rokita said. "That means making sure household products are working correctly. Hoosiers shouldn't have to deal with faulty items. If you have one of the recalled products, stop using it immediately and pursue resolution from the manufacturer."

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the following consumer products were recalled in March:

- PRO XL501 Chipper Shredders from DR Power Equipment

Last year, AG Rokita’s Unclaimed Property Division returned \$62 million to Hoosiers, and you could be next. You never know what the Easter Bunny might leave in your basket.

Some property owners in the Unclaimed Property Division’s database include such holiday-appropriate first or last names of Easter, Egg, Spring, Church, and Sunday. Don’t put all your eggs in one basket though – make sure you also search for your loved ones or your business.

Test your “cluck” at the egg hunt, and check out

some of the types of property that might go unclaimed:

- Unclaimed wages or commissions
- Money orders
- Safety deposit box contents
- Savings and checking accounts
- Refunds

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Can your husband work longer to beef up your spousal Social Security benefits?

Many men have told me that they plan to delay starting their own Social Security until age 70, not only to increase their own benefits by 25 percent, but also to enlarge the amount their spouse will be able to draw in spousal benefits.

I think this is sweet every time a husband tells me this, but it's not quite true. By delaying his benefit, he will receive a higher monthly check. But while he is alive, the most his wife is eligible to draw is 50 percent of the amount *he was eligible for at his full retirement age*.

If your spouse chooses to draw early, it won't hurt you. If he chooses to wait to draw later, it won't help you. Again, the key point here is "while he is alive." If your spouse predeceases you,



you are then eligible for Survivor or Widow Benefits. This type of benefit is based on the amount he was drawing at his death. If he maxed out his benefits by working till age 70, and you didn't start drawing any

type of Social Security benefit prior to your full retirement age, you will benefit from your spouse having worked longer.

Typically, I advise against delaying Social Security till age 70. In the above scenario I would argue that the husband gave up a lot of money by delaying Social Security by four years. If his monthly payment was around \$2,000 per month, he lost about \$100,000 by waiting. "Yes," he'll say, "but my payment is \$300 more each month." Unfortunately, many people

die before breaking even. The government knows this, that's why they pay you more to delay taking it at your full retirement age.

Insurance – and this is a type of insurance – is a gamble. I don't like to gamble. I never recommend delaying Social Security. I know that extra monthly amount is enticing, but statistically you'll not live long enough to break even.

Take that \$100,000 and invest it aggressively. You'll be able to get a higher return than the government, and at death, the money is in your husband's estate.

Another wrinkle in your

retirement planning is when there is a large age difference between you and your spouse. In order to draw spousal Social Security off your spouse, he must be drawing his own benefits. If he chooses to wait, you must wait. If you were a stay-at-home mother without enough work credits to qualify for benefits based on your own work record, you'll have to wait to draw as a spouse.

If you married a much younger man, again, you'll have to wait until he draws, and the earliest age he can draw is age 62. (These rules are different for divorced couples).

Spousal Social Security benefits automatically turn into Widows benefits ... except when they don't. With the size of the Social Security Administration's burden, mistakes do happen.

If your spouse dies, the death is reported to the SSA by the funeral home. You don't have to do anything. You won't be able to get both your spousal benefit and your widow benefit. If your benefit doesn't increase, you will have to notify the SSA. A widow is eligible to get up to 100 percent of what her spouse was drawing at the time of his death. But in order to get the

full 100 percent, she must wait until *her* full retirement age to draw benefits. A widow is able to draw as early as age 60 (widows on SSDI can draw at age 50), but the amount will be permanently reduced.

Fishers road construction updates

The REPORTER State Road 37 & 141st Street

A pre-construction phase at SR 37 and 141st Street is currently in place. During this phase, 141st Street will be transitioned to a Right-In-Right-Out (RIRO) traffic configuration.

This is not the permanent configuration. This will allow for traffic to flow more freely along SR 37 until the next phases of construction can be activated. This will eliminate all backups along SR 37 that have caused dangerous stops to the free flow traffic and backups on the 146th Street interchange. Again, this is not the permanent configuration for 141st Street.

The full timeline for the 141st Street interchange will be provided after project bids are accepted in the summer of 2023. View detour routes here.

I-465 & I-69

Drivers will see an increase in construction along

the Interstate 69 corridor in the coming months. This work will focus on reconfiguring the interchange at I-465 and I-69. New ramps will provide direct movements from eastbound I-465 and northbound I-465 to northbound I-69.

Binford Boulevard will also be reconstructed to separate local traffic from traffic entering and exiting I-69 and I-465. Access to I-69 from Binford Boulevard will remain open. Drivers can expect to see significant activity on I-69 at the 82nd Street interchange.

Nickel Plate Trail

The City of Fishers is working on the completion of the Fishers portion of the Nickel Plate Trail. The remaining paving work from 96th Street to 106th Street is underway, and construction crews are currently working to clear and prep the area for paving. In the coming weeks, construction crews will begin the paving process.

116th Street

On Sunday, April 9, there will be an overnight lane restriction between 9 p.m. and 4 a.m. on 116th Street between Commercial Drive and Fishers Pointe Boulevard for sanitary sewer cleaning.

On Tuesday, April 11, there will be an overnight lane restriction between 9 p.m. and 4 a.m. on westbound 116th Street between Cumberland Road and Exit 5 for storm inlet repair work.

131st Street

Comcast is currently doing utility work on 131st Street from Howe Road to

Promise Road then north on Promise Road to 141st Street. Lane restrictions will be in place between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

126th Street

On Friday, April 14, lane restrictions will be in place on eastbound 126th Street between Spire View Drive and Champions Boulevard for storm inlet repair work.

Cumberland Road

There are daily lane closures currently on Cumberland Road just south of 126th Street for sanitary and water line work. The northbound right turn lane and the southbound passing blister will be closed.

Southeastern Pkwy. & Cyntheanne Road

On Monday, April 10, lane restrictions will be in place at the Southeastern Parkway and Cyntheanne Road roundabout for storm sewer cleaning.

106th Street & Hoosier Road

Utility relocation is currently taking place at 106th Street and Hoosier Road as part of the roundabout project. For additional project information, view the Capital Project Dashboard here.

Fall Creek Road

Citizens Energy Group is mobilizing the lift station on Fall Creek Road near Geist Woods Way, resulting in the closure of Fall Creek Trail in the area until the project is complete in August.

Geist Greenway

Construction of the boardwalk is currently taking place as part of the Geist Greenway Project. When material is brought in for fill sections, there will be an increase in construction traffic on Valley Crossing Drive. Traffic will be briefly stopped as trucks are enter-

Masters Road

During the week of April 10, road resurfacing operations will begin taking place on Cyntheanne Road between 96th Street and Lin Road, Georgia Road between 96th and 104th streets, Willowview Road between Allisonville and Masters roads, Wind-ing Creek Woods, Britton Park Road between 131st and 135th streets, and 131st Street between Allisonville Road and the Nickel Plate Trail. Rolling lane restrictions and flaggers will be in place.

Indiana Department of Insurance directs companies to implement grace period for Hoosiers in impacted storm areas

On Tuesday, Indiana Department of Insurance (IDOI) Commissioner Amy L. Beard issued Bulletin 268 directing insurance companies to implement a 60-day cancellation moratorium for any policyholder directly affected by the recent weather events in Allen, Benton, Cass, Clinton, Howard, Johnson, Morgan, Owen, Sullivan, and White counties.

"The last thing we want those Hoosiers impacted by the recent tornadoes and severe storms to worry about is missing a premium payment or losing coverage," Commissioner Beard said. "We hope by granting this extension, it will give them some peace of mind."

Affected policyholders in impacted counties will be granted an extension of 60 days to make premium payments without risk of penalties or policy cancellation. After the 60-day period, policyholders will be required to resume making premium payments. The IDOI requests insurance companies work with the impacted policyholders in paying the premiums that would be due during the moratorium period by either allowing a payment plan or extending the payment due date.

In addition, the IDOI is providing similar courtesies to companies and licensees by implementing a 60-day grace period relating to renewal and cancellations for all licensees, certificate holders and registrants from

the impacted areas. This includes premium tax and surplus lines premium tax filings. Any penalties assessed due to late payment during this period will be waived. The 60-day extension also will be applied to the Continuing Education requirements to those producers from impacted areas.

ers by monitoring and regulating the financial strengths and market conduct activities of insurance companies and agents. The IDOI monitors insurance companies and agents for compliance with state laws to protect consumers and to offer them the best array of insurance products available. April 10, 1827 – Lew Wallace was born in Brookville. The son of Indiana Governor David Wallace, he became an attorney, Civil War General, Governor of the New Mexico Territory, and best-selling author of *Ben Hur*.

April 14, 1865 – On the evening of April 14, Indiana Congressman Schuyler Colfax walked Abraham Lincoln to the door of the White House as the President and Mrs. Lincoln left to attend a play at Ford's Theater.

April 9, 1965 – Sherman Minton died in New Albany. Born in Floyd County, he was a United States Senator before his appointment in 1941 to the U.S. Court of Appeals. In 1948, President Harry Truman nominated him for the U.S. Supreme Court, where he served until his retirement

seven years later. In 1962, Indiana governor Matthew Welsh announced the arch bridge spanning the Ohio River, carrying Interstate 64 and U.S. 150 over the river between Kentucky and Indiana would be named the Sherman Minton Bridge.

April 11, 1965 – Palm Sunday tornadoes struck several states in the Midwest. In Indiana, at least 20 counties were hit. The death toll in the state was 137, with over 1,700 injured.

April 11, 2007 – Kurt Vonnegut died at his home in New York. Born and raised in Indianapolis, he attended Shortridge High School. His experiences in World War II helped launch a career that included novels, short stories, plays and works of non-fiction. His best-selling books include *Slaughterhouse-Five*, *Breakfast of Champions*, and *Slapstick*.

The Tigers scored their first run in the second inning. Caulin Brown reached on error, then Evan Doran came in to pinch run for him. Doran stole second, then Huston Dunn drew a walk. More ovals, please!

The NTT Indy Car race at Texas Motor Speedway this past weekend was the best Indy Car race I've seen in quite a while.

That's not to say that we haven't had good races recently. Despite ending under caution, the Texas race had everything: long green flag runs and tire degradation, exciting pit stops, fuel strategy, and tight, wheel-to-wheel action. Simply put, Indy Car needs more ovals.

It wasn't long ago that oval racing dominated Indy Car. In 2013, Indy Car competed at six ovals and 10 road/street courses. In 2007, Indy Car competed at 12 ovals and five road/street courses. In 2003, all 16 Indy Car races were on ovals. This year, Indy car will compete on four different ovals.

However, only Texas and Indianapolis Motor Speedway are greater than 1.5 miles. Safety concerns played a large part in the decrease in the number of ovals, especially ovals larger than 1.5 miles.

In 2011, Dan Wheldon was killed in the season finale at Las Vegas Motor Speedway (1.5-mile oval). In 2015, Justin Wilson was killed at Pocono Raceway (a 2.5-mile tri-oval). Again, in 2015 at Pocono Raceway, Robert Wickens was paralyzed after his car was launched into the catch fence. Much of the danger of larger ovals arise from the high speeds. Average lap speeds at Texas this year, even in race trim, was well over 200 mph. Speeds on tracks larger than 1.5 miles, such as Indianapolis Motor Speedway or Michigan International Speedway, are even higher.

In recent years, however, Indy Car has made significant strides in safety. The implementation of the aero screen was a massive advancement in driver safety. Moreover, Indy Car has collected large amounts of data in order to understand where the cars and drivers are vulnerable and where changes are necessary. Given the advancement in safety, it is time to re-evaluate oval racing, particularly at the larger ovals.

From my perspective, Indy Car is at its best when it is being run on ovals. The aero package that was brought to Texas gave the drivers more control and allowed for the use of multiple grooves, which provided side-by-side action. Yet, the tire degradation was enough to allow the cars to spread out over a long green flag run.

Indy Car has hit on something with its oval package for Texas, and I hope that translates into more ovals in the future. As much as I enjoy the road races, I love the ovals. There are so many great tracks that Indy Car does not currently race on (Michigan, Richmond, Kansas, to name a few) and oval racing has been Indy Car's bread and butter for some many years. I recognize that the current trend is the road courses, which is not likely to change any time soon, but I would sure like to see a few more ovals in the schedule.

I hope Texas was not a fluke. If Indy Car can produce more races like that, its popularity was skyrocket.

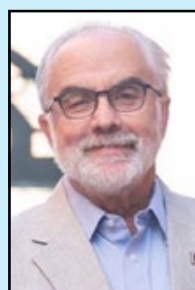
