Lincoln Day gives Reporter an interesting opportunity

Janus sculpture needs a name

Janus Developmental Services is asking for the public's help to classify and name a 3-foot-tall, brightly colored, mixed media sculpture created by some of its participants in its newly expanded and redesigned creative space.

Is it a dog? A lion? A unicorn? A completely new form of mythical animal? No one knows for sure, and that's why they need your help.

Janus provides adult individuals with differing abilities the opportunities needed to develop skills that will help them be active participants in the community.

Some of those opportunities include commission-based programs for exploring artistic talents and sharing their art with others. Janus has become known throughout the area for the unique gourd birdhouses and cute pet toys made by their participants.

However, the creative area at Janus Developmental Services has expanded exponentially since January. A grant from Hamilton County Community Foundation allowed Janus to bring in representatives from Creative Abundance Consulting in Columbus, Ohio, to help them rethink their small art studio. The result is an exponentially larger and completely revamped space that allows

participants to engage in everything from sewing to painting to woodworking.

"The new art experience has really generated a lot of energy," said Mary Jane Coffing, chair of the Janus board of directors.

The expansion provides the capacity for bigger, better, and even more creative projects. For example, there is now enough room for participants to enlarge their doodles onto large sheets that other participants have painted. The result has been whimsical collaborative pieces like Zoey the Dog, a larger-than-life wall hanging first drawn by a Janus participant named Annie.

Georgia man shot & killed last week in Noblesville

At approximately 10:18 p.m. last Thursday, police officers from the Noblesville Police Department (NPD) responded to 21506 Raccoon Court, Noblesville, to a report of shots fired.

Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and located a deceased male near the driveway of the address. The deceased appeared to have suffered several gunshot wounds. An official cause of death will be determined by the Hamilton County Coroner's Office.

The deceased did not have any identification on him, so his identity was not immediately known. He was identified earlier Sunday as Grayson Aubrey Rhue, 18, Roswell, Ga. Next-of-kin notifications have been made.

Investigators processed the scene and interviewed three subjects who were lawfully inside the address at the time of the incident. The subjects were not the homeowners but were guests who were house-sitting while the homeowners were away. The subjects were cooperative throughout the investigative process and provided statements to investigators. At the conclusion of their statements, they were released pending further investigation.

Based on information collected thus far, it appears that Rhue came to the front door of the residence and rang the doorbell. There was a brief conversation between the parties and Rhue eventually walked away. A few

The yet-to-be-named fanciful beast came about in much the same way with some participants building and some painting until the quirky 3D

The FabLab contains 3D printers, a laser engraver, and a vinyl cutter with a heat press. Four digital media labs each include a Mac computer and the Adobe

Creative Cloud, and two of the labs are also equipped for post production on audio and video projects. sewing machines available by reservation.

seconds later Rhue returned to the front door and entered the home. Shortly after entering the home, Rhue allegedly drew a handgun and aimed it at the houseguests. One of the houseguests reportedly drew his handgun and fired several rounds at Rhue.

Rhue appeared to immediately flee the house before collapsing just feet from the end of the driveway. Responding officers arrived on the scene a short time later to find Rhue deceased. A hand-

gun was located in close proximity to Rhue and was collected by investigators.

Based on the information gathered to this point, this does not appear to be a random act.

Investigators are attempting to locate another person who was likely with Rhue during the incident. The subject appears to be a male, but any other details are limited due to his face and hands appearing to be covered by a mask and

gloves.

Senator Mike Braun
What are the biggest challenges facing Indiana in the next several years?

When I travel the state, I’ve compiled a lot of good information because I visit all 92 counties from the very smallest to the largest, and this is beginning the fifth year of that. I put a lot of emphasis on visiting small businesses. They are the heartbeat of towns. They are the ones that become larger companies someday.

The number one thing I hear is how we are not training our kids in high school and not meeting the need of the workforce. They are telling me we need better skills generally taught in high school.

We need to start the conversation in middle school. Whether you are going to be in an AP [Advanced Placement] trajectory or you are going to hit the workforce after you are out of high school, only 35 percent of the jobs require four-year degrees. Sixty-five percent need a better high school education. In the idea that you are going to beat those odds, we have left 135,000 jobs unfilled in this state: double what it was pre-COVID. And we export a lot of our great talent into a four-year degree they get, but there’s no demand for it here in state. A lot of those kids would not have needed to spend four years, unless it was just something they wanted to do.

We are always talking about how we keep the kids we have raised here in our state, and I think that’s the issue.

Along with that I hear rural broadband. We’re a rural state. That’s at least moving in the right direction.

Affordable housing.

And then a national issue is the high cost of healthcare. Sadly, we are known for having some of the poorest healthcare results and the most expensive healthcare

costs. And then, in our state government, \$18 to \$19 billion, now it’s \$22 billion a year, we need to make sure all the money we are spending we are doing it in a way that’s getting the most bang for our buck.

I, as a CEO and someone that’s actually run a business for 37 years as my career, I think I’ll know how to size that up better than most governors would be able to.

Why do you want to be governor?

I’m a problem-solver. At least you can fix it if you are setting the agenda. You’ve got to lead the legislature in a way to get something accomplished.

Out there we’ve been an effective senate office by not on setting the agenda, just working on practical legislation. I wasn’t going to do that more than two terms. This is either/or and I thought it made more sense to come back and run for governor.

I’m going to be a governor that’s going to be entrepreneurial. I’m going to tackle problems others may not. I got into politics not to make a career out of it, but to enter into it to preserve a lot of what Jim Jordan was talking about: that American dream; what ordinary citizens ought to be able to do despite the government, especially the federal government.

I’m here to come back, work for a state that’s pretty good and make it a little better.

Lt. Governor Suzanne Crouch
What are the biggest challenges facing Indiana in the next several years?

As a governor candidate, I have a real clear vision for Indiana. Let me share it with you.

First of all, as governor I will make sure it is parents – and only parents – who control what is taught to our children. I’ll also invest in an early childhood program

I helped to launch so every child has a chance to succeed.

I will enforce and make sure Indiana is a state that funds and supports our police and enforces our crime laws to the fullest.

Transparency has always been a priority for me. It was as auditor of state. I was able to make that a priority and end wasteful government spending and prevent fraud and leading Indiana to be a national leader. That continues to be important and will as we move forward.

I’ve protected Indiana jobs, helping companies move and grow here, creating the good-paying jobs of today. As governor, I’ll invest in worker training, which is critical to ensure the good-paying jobs of tomorrow.

I’ll continue to work to lower Hoosiers’ taxes.

I have been a relentless protector of Hoosier values that say we will always be here for the most vulnerable and we will never compromise in protecting faith, family, and freedom. Those are the issues that are not only important today but will continue to be important moving forward: education, jobs,

safety, transparency, faith, family, and freedom.

Why do you want to be governor?

As Lt. Governor, as Auditor of State, as State Representative, as County Commissioner, and County Auditor, I have fought for Hoosiers and for values that they hold important, which are, as I’ve mentioned, faith, family, and freedom.

I have a vision for Indiana that as governor, together we can build on the successes that we’ve accomplished, which I have played a key role in, not only as a State Representative, Auditor of State and now Lt. Governor, to move Indiana forward to make it state where we have balanced budgets, we have low taxes, and we have healthy surplus. I want to build on that success and continue to move Indiana forward by growing our economy, by investing in education, strengthening our families and our communities, and then reimagining government.

As we do that, we will create more opportunities for Hoosier families and businesses to succeed.

Hamilton County is an extremely important county to the state of Indiana, and Indiana is only as successful as Hamilton County. I understand and recognize that and want to be a partner and as governor will work to ensure that Hamilton County has even more success than they’ve had because that’s how Indiana succeeds.

Businessman Eric Doden
What are the biggest challenges facing Indiana in the next several years?

I think it’s going to be centered around communities growing. Population growth. Especially our businesses are needing more employees. And our kids and grandkids staying here. I think those are some of the biggest challenges we are going to face.

I think we’ve got to really focus on having vibrant communities all over the state that can attract and retain talent. This region here has set the standard of excellence. We need to see that over 92 counties. Not just three or four counties doing well, but all 92 counties doing well.

A lot of our ideas like In-

diana Main Street Initiative and our idea on regional cities is really centered around empowering local leaders to make sure they have a strong community to attract and retain their people.

Why do you want to be governor?

If guys like me don’t run, nothing changes. If you look at some of the ideas we are bringing forward – like zero-cost adoption – these are new ideas, they are a fresh perspective. The people who support me want a new generation of leadership that brings a fresh perspective and brings new ideas like regional cities, Indiana Main Street, how we fix our small towns with 30,000 or less where over 2 million people live – no one’s ever had an idea for that. We have not just published an idea, but we have actually implemented it in Van Wert, Ohio, and have a book about it on how we can implement it across the state of Indiana.

I’m really proud of this region and of all the things that have been accomplished here. I just think we need to see that go across the entire state.

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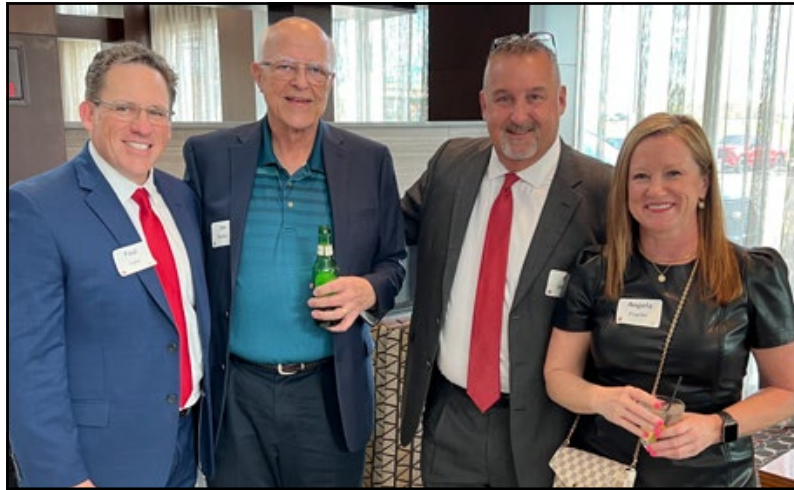
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Lincoln Day packs Embassy Suites

Cities must help protect our planet

Earth Day is coming up on April 22, but caring for our natural environment and the health of our planet shouldn't just be top of mind on one day a year. All year long, we must all do our part to protect the Earth.

Caring about the environment is not a Republican or Democrat issue. We all want to breathe clean air and drink clean water. Our planet should be a concern to all of us.

Across the country, mayors and city councils are at the forefront when it comes to promoting sustainability and positive environmental policies.

The City of Carmel was recognized by EPA for being the first municipality in the state to pass a climate resiliency and recovery resolution. The city has also been recognized as a "Green Community" by the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns and has been presented numerous awards and grants from various natural resource organizations regarding our Urban Forestry initiatives.

As a member of the City Council, I voted to pass our city's climate change action plan and create a subsequent commission to ensure the recommendations are put into place.

But we must remain vigilant. Here are some things Carmel should continue to do to be environmentally friendly:

- Promote walkability with bike paths, sidewalks, crosswalks and more. When people walk or ride their bike instead of driving a car,

it helps reduce carbon emissions.

- Continue to replace traditional intersections with roundabouts. Since cars don't stop and idle, roundabouts help reduce carbon emissions.

- Protect greenspaces and trees. During rezone or development processes, we can insist that trees are preserved or replanted which helps create a lush, green atmosphere while helping absorb carbon dioxide.

- Encourage and incentivize green construction for new buildings.

- Push for more solar panels for city properties and new mixed-use developments.

- Support change out of city vehicles with electric vehicles as the fleet ages out.

- Allow for electric charging stations in city garages and parking lots.

- Reduce paper waste by encouraging e-sign and electronic paper packets for boards and commissions.

- Continue to monitor light pollution created by commercial buildings. Push for energy efficient LED lighting.

- Push for more outdoor recycling receptacles around the city.

Again, most of these suggestions we are already doing or plan to do, but it's important to let people know that Carmel cares about our environment. We have been recognized and awarded for our environmental consciousness and we must continue to remain vigilant.

"I am Frank Wolff. I was born in 1855 in Buena Vista, which is now Atlanta. My brother William and I opened a dry goods store in Arcadia, and sold everything from tools to Buster Brown Shoes. I operated the store until I

retired in 1930. William and I built the Queen Anne style Wolff House on Main Street, meant to be a wedding present to William's daughter. When she chose not to live there, my wife Turia and I moved in, later passing the house on to our daughter Maude and her husband Charlie Carter, a local music teacher. We installed the area's first "indoor plumbing" in the 1895 house, which consisted of two horse tanks located in the attic and connected to pipes for a gravity-flow water supply. When I passed away at age 94, I was the oldest living resident in Arcadia. My final resting place is the Arcadia Cemetery."

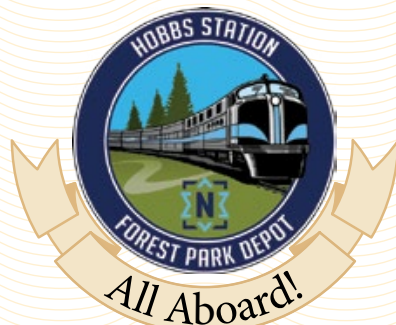

Child care access & affordability focus of new grant program from Duke Energy

The Duke Energy Foundation and the Indiana Economic Development Association (IEDA) Foundation announced on Tuesday the release of a request for proposal (RFP) for a newly launched child care innovation grants program. More than \$100,000 in funding will be made available to support organizations and projects focused on assessing and addressing child care gaps in Indiana communities.

In recent years, the cost of child care has skyrocketed, and the number of licensed child care providers has shrunk. These challenges have put a strain on working parents and their employers.

"A lack of affordable, high-quality child care options can serve as a barrier for businesses to recruit and retain employees," said Erin Schneider, managing director of Midwest economic development for Duke Energy. "By partnering with Indiana communities to make investments in early child care, we can begin to address some of the workforce challenges that hinder job growth and economic development in the communities we serve."

According to Indiana University's Public Policy Institute and Early Learning Indiana, a lack of child care providers has had demonstrable effects on Indiana's economy. **According to research**, Indiana loses nearly \$1.1 billion in economic activity every year due to child care-related absenteeism and employee turnover.

Farming season is here, so be cautious & courteous on the road

Planting season is quickly approaching for Indiana’s 94,000 farmers. With the warm weather and sunshine, Hoosier motorists will also see more large slow-moving farm equipment traveling Indiana’s rural roads and highways.

The Indiana State Department of Agriculture, Indiana Department of Homeland Security, Indiana Department of Transportation, Indiana State Police, and Hoosier Ag Today encourage motorists to slow down, be alert and be patient on roadways this spring.

“Indiana is the eighth largest farming state in the country and a national leader in the production of traditional row crops like corn and soybeans,” said Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch, Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development. “Whether you live in rural, urban or suburban Indiana, remain alert on the road this spring as you may encounter large farm equipment moving between fields.”

In 2020 three vehicles were involved in crashes with farm equipment in Indiana which resulted in two deaths, according to the [National Highway Traffic Safety Administration](#).

“During the spring, Indiana sees a drastic increase of large farm equipment on

our rural roads and highways, and it is important for Hoosiers to know how to safely navigate around them,” said Doug Carter, Indiana State Police Superintendent. “Patience, courtesy and understanding, along with the undivided attention of motorists and farmers will help ensure a safe 2023 planting season.

While the term “farm equipment” encompasses a wide range of vehicles, the most common types motorists will encounter during planting season include sprayers, tractors pulling planters or tillage equipment, and large trucks hauling agricultural products. These vehicles are wide, sometimes taking up most of the road, and often travel at speeds no greater than 25 mph.

The following list includes several safety tips for motorists approaching large farm equipment:

- Farmers will pull over when they are able to let motorists pass, but it may take time for them to get to a safe place to do so.
- Be patient. Farm equipment is wide, sometimes taking up most of the road.
- Be careful when passing. Do not pass in a designated “No Passing Zone” or within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevation

structure or tunnel.

• Do not try to pass slow-moving farm equipment on the left without ensuring that the farmer driving is not planning a left turn. It may appear that the driver is pulling over to allow a pass when the farmer is actually preparing to turn. You will drive right into its path, endangering yourself and the farmer.

• Avoid tailgating, as some farm equipment might have to make sudden stops along the road.

• Allow plenty of time to get to a destination, be aware of alternate routes and avoid distractions.

Indiana State Department of Agriculture Director Don Lamb reminds motorists that farmers work hard to ensure they are being as safe as possible.

“Indiana’s corn and soybeans are utilized for a magnitude of products we depend on every day, such as food products like corn chips and sweeteners, livestock feeds so we can enjoy our favorite meats, fuel for our cars

and more,” Lamb said. “It is critical that farmers get their crops planted in a timely manner to ensure

Carmel drops season opener to four-time Kentucky state champs

CARMEL – The Carmel girls tennis team has had a remarkable amount of success over the decades, so it should come as no surprise that the Greyhounds are always ready for a challenge.

Carmel got a big challenge on Tuesday to open its 2023 season. The 'Hounds hosted Sacred Heart Academy from Louisville at the Todd Witsken Tennis Center. It was a battle of state champions: Carmel is the two-time defender in Indiana, while Sacred Heart has won four in a row in Kentucky.

third-set super tiebreak, 7-5, 1-6, 10-5.

Sacred Heart won the other matches in straight sets. In singles, No. 1, junior Nora Perkins lost to Ellie Hammond 6-1, 6-0. It was a tough start, but Brunette said it was a "good opportunity for her to go out and start to feel what it's like to play the best player on the other team." Perkins played primarily No. 2 singles last year and was a integral part of Carmel's run.

At No. 2 singles, sophomore Rumi Kim fell to Avery Voss 6-2, 6-0. Perkins is a junior and Kim is a sophomore. The No. 1 doubles team of seniors Elyse Nelson and Alexa Lewis lost 6-2, 6-4.

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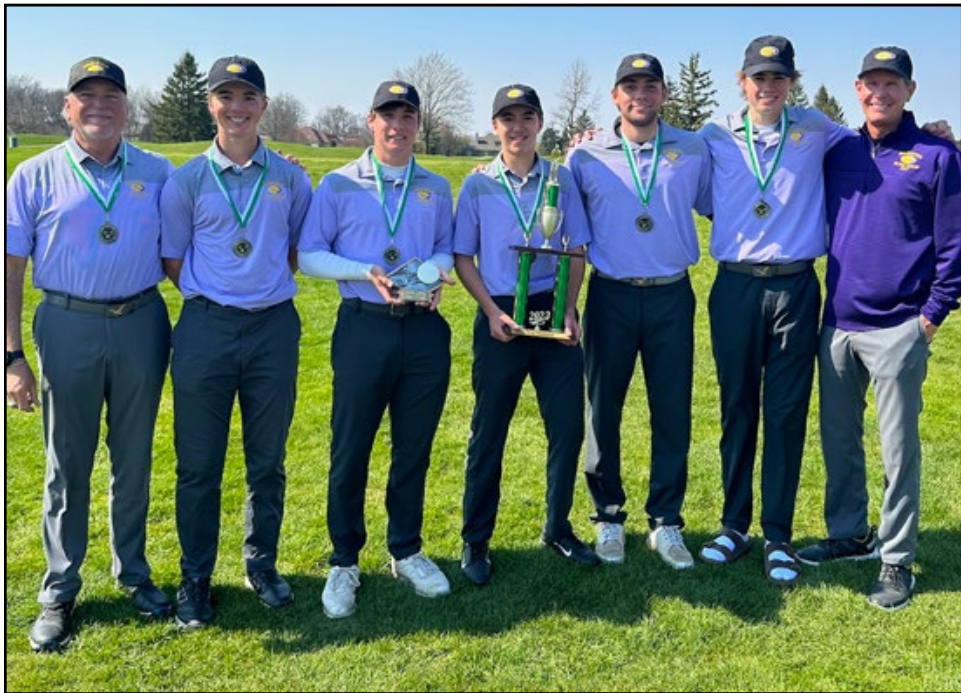

The Royals weren't done scoring, as it would put up one last valiant effort in the bottom of the seventh with a six-run output.

It wouldn't quite be enough as Mt. Vernon's four-run sixth became the demise, giving the Royals their lone loss so far this season.
