### Floating down the creek

It was my job as a young man to help rope and wrangle young calves. At one to two weeks old they were amazingly strong. Nub horns would be removed. Any needed medical treatment would be applied. Young bulls would be rubber banded so we



could have steers. It was also my job to keep the cattle fed and watered.

We had a herd that varied in size from 20 to 30 head of cattle. I say "we" had a herd because Grandpa Adler had paid me for work I had done for him. The payment was him giving me a registered polled Herford heifer. Her name was Mabel III, and I was proud to hold her registration documentation.

It took a while to watch the cow water tanks fill. It took that project longer than getting down the hay and spreading out some chop. So, every now and then, my attention would get diverted and I would let the tanks overflow. Not a happy day when Father found out. Additionally, it was my





### Having a healthy immune system is more than keeping it "boosted"

"Good health and good sense are two of life's greatblessings." – Publilius Syrus

How often have you, during the past few years, thought of your body's immunity? Probably more than you ever did



You may be very aware of the many supplements which promise "immune boosting" properties, and in truth some are quite beneficial. However, the word "boost" does not give us an accurate picture of how we need for our immune systems to work with us. If your immune system is working properly, it does not need a boost as such. According to Frank Lipman, M.D., co-author of The New Rules of Aging Well, "I know it's semantics, but I wouldn't use the word 'boost.' You don't want your immune system to overreact any more than you want it to underreact."

What should we do? and you have heard it many times! Eat healthy whole foods, get adequate sleep and hydration, and avoid smoking and excessive alcohol. Unfortunately, the people most affected by COVID-19 are those people who are not relying on the aforementioned suggestions but also suffer from diabetes, obesity, and heart disease. Having a healthy immune system would go a long way in the prevention of many of those obstacles.

Suzanne Cassel, M.D., an allergist and clinical immunologist at Cedars-Sinai in Los Angeles says that a healthy immune system isn't the same thing as never getting sick.

"It means your body has an appropriate response when eventually you pick up an infection." The simplest way to stay healthy, according to Dr. Cassel, is to



"stay away from sick people, large group gatherings, washing your hands, and getting your vaccines."

While food always should be your primary source of nutrients, sometimes supplements can

play an important part of your healthy immune system goals. Your primary physician will check your Vitamin D levels during your annual checkup and bloodwork. If your Vitamin D levels are low, he/she may suggest a daily supplement. Some of the best food sources of Vitamin D are egg yolks, beef liver, salmon, and certain cheeses. Personally, as a vegetarian, I do take the Vitamin D supplements at the encouragement of my physician. Please check with your physician before beginning any supplementation, as some may affect any medications you are prescribed.

Remember, too, lack of activity and stress can greatly affect your immune system. Keeping our immune systems strong will assist us as we strive to stay healthy during a critical period of battling a significant coronavirus. We cannot change the world, but we can change and improve our own "world of wellness."





## **Hamilton County** receives over \$3M in road project grants

Holcomb and the Indiana Department of Transportation ted applications for funding (INDOT) have announced 224 Indiana cities, towns, call for projects in January. and counties will receive a Applications were evaluated combined \$133.4 million in state matching funds for local road projects through Community Crossings, a component of Governor Holcomb's Next Level Roads program.

"The continued success of the Community Crossings program becomes more evident each year," Gov. Holcomb said. "Improving transportation infrastructure

Funding for Community Crossings comes from the state's local road and bridge matching Well over \$3 million grant fund. The Community Crossings initiative has provided more than \$1.27 billion in state matching funds for local construction projects since 2016.

"Safe, modern infrastructure at the local level makes Indiana's transportation network stronger," IN-DOT Commissioner Mike Smith said. "Partnering with something INDOT looks at the most local level makes forward to each year. The communities that much hard work and dedication of more attractive for business local entities to secure these

and Hoosier families alike funds and make improvements in their communities does not go unnoticed."

To qualify for funding, local governments must provide local matching funds of 50 percent for larger communities or 25 percent for smaller communities and have an asset management plan for maintaining existing roads and bridges. Indiana law requires annually that 50 percent of the available matching funds be awarded to communities located in counties with a population of 50,000 or fewer.

State lawmakers identified long-term funding for Community Crossings as part of House Enrolled Act 1002, passed by the legislature and signed into law by Gov. Holcomb in April 2017.



Just Meridian St., Carmel, is doing just that: helping people because that's what owners Erika and Peter Steele have

In May 2020, Erika, Peter, and their twins decided to pack up their bags and move to Indiana.

"We thought that that would be the time to start our own business since we had talked about starting one for years, even though it was during the rough of COVID," Erika said. "I'm a person of faith and always just said, 'If God leads us there, then it'll happen."

They had always talked about making sure their business would be one that would give back to the community, and they decided on a cafe-style business so kids and young adults could have a safe place to hang out. 



### Customers love Quack Daddy Donuts

A decade ago, a seed was planted in their minds when Andy Arrendale and his wife, Nicole, stumbled upon a made-to-order donut shop in Florida. Both nurses, the pair loved the madeto-order concept and thought how great it would be if they could one day bring it back to Indiana.

At the time, they had one young their child with another on the way, so the timing wasn't right to launch a new business. Through the years, the family continued to visit that donut shop in The Sunshine State, and the desire to open their own place back home only

"I finally got the okay from my better half to look into it further," Arrendale said. Helearned that there was a franchise in Pendleton called Quack Daddy Donuts, and the owner was looking to exit the business.

The original owner named his shop Quack Daddy because the Pendleton doughnuts are area (especially Falls Park) attracted a lot of ducks.

"It's a cute and catchy name that's memorable," Arrendale said.

When the Arrendales began hunting for a location to open Quack Daddy Donuts, they looked on the Butler campus and in Carmel, but neither place felt right. Then they found a location in Westfield just a half a mile from Flavored Cake Friday, which offers their house, and it was a no-brainer.

"It was perfect for us!" Arrendale said. He signed the lease for Quack Daddy Donuts in February 2020, just before the COVID closures. Although the original plan was to open in the summer of 2020, it got pushed to November, and they officially welcomed the public on Small Business Saturday. Ultimately, it all worked out well. Not being a sit-down restaurant was a good thing at the time. Operating in a carry-out capacity meant they could maintain social distancing requirements.

"With my wife and I having a medical background, we were overly cautious anyway," Arrendale said. The community welcomed the new donut establishment with open arms. "We feel like if we can ride through that [pandemic], we should be able to take anything that comes our way."

Upon entering the shop, customers

fill out a made-to-order order form, choosing from seven different icings and 17 different toppings. The staff then ices and tops the doughnut in front of you.

One most popular flavors is the maple bacon doughnut with maple icing and warm bacon.

As for toppings, sprinkles top the list! It isn't just the kids who them; want those sprinkles, too.

Their vanilla cake only. Some-

times when customers learn that they don't make yeast doughnuts, they're bummed.

"I'll usually offer them a free cake doughnut to at least try," Arrendale

They kick off every weekend with various flavors such as chocolate, blueberry pie, or apple pie. In the fall, they may offer apple cider or pumpkin. In December, they have crushed candy cane topping. They also sell local milk from Dandy Breeze Creamery in Sheridan and local roasted coffee from Indy Coffee Roasters out of Carmel.

"We're a full-service café, so that we can make all your espresso, lattes, cold brew, and Nitro coffee," Arrendale said.

They provide catering, so if you'd like Quack Daddy to come to your office, they'll bring their doughnuts, icings, and toppings and basically do what they do in the shop at your event. They also can accommodate large orders for pickup. Plus, they host events like birthday parties in their store.

Arrendale loves partnering with different organizations and entities in the community to benefit local schools, churches, and nonprofits. They have a program called "Ducks Dollars," which they sell lit-

they ask for some Indy car drivers' favorite desserts and turn them into specialty doughnuts. For four-time Indy 500 winner Hélio Castroneves they transformed a famous Brazilian dessert - chocolate with toasted coconut and chocolate shavings on top - and made it into a delicious doughnut. For racer Graham Rahal, they made a banana pudding doughnut. At the end of every month, the staff is always gearing up to try something different.

"There have been times when we've not transitioned to our new doughnut by the first of the month, and customers are like, 'Hey, where's the new Flavor of the Month?" Ar-
