Naturally, I've also learned to be flexible in my meal planning since we don't know John's appointment schedule for a certain day until the evening before. Flexibility is not exactly my strong point, but I'm doing better in this area.

If John and I aren't near the chalkboard, this is one of our typical conversations.

"What's for dinner this evening?" he asks.

"Well, it was salmon ... but now that you have a 6 o'clock appointment, it's leftovers." I reply. "So, salmon will be tomorrow ... or not ... in which case, it will be more leftovers."

God bless him, John doesn't even complain about this.

I know we're not alone on this. In fact, according to studyfinds.org, a survey of 2,000 people found that Americans' weekly diet generally consists of five home-cooked meals, three leftover meals, three take-out meals, and three meals out at restaurants.

Yep, no doubt about it, leftovers make life easier when you're an empty nester. In fact, as I type this, that's what's on the menu for this evening ... and Monday ... and Wednesday ... and maybe Thursday.

WISH Health Spotlight: ion robot targets cancer

It's the leading cancer killer in men and women nationally.

The five-year survival rate is only about 20 percent. That's because by the time you know you have it the cancer has progressed. But if doctors can diagnose it earlier, the cure rate is over 90 percent. A new way to spot it and remove lung cancer is giving patients hope of surviving it.

Cancer patient Rodney Poche said, "These are more of the presidents coins."

Collecting enough special coins to give to his children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren, and that adds up to quite a lot of coins! "Six kids, 30 grandkids, eight great-grandkids, and three on the way."

Poche says he feels blessed for each day he has with his family. Doctors found cancer in his kidney. They removed that two years ago, then it spread to his lung.

Dr. Brian Mitzman of the University of Utah Huntsman Cancer Institute said, "Lung cancers are hard to detect because they usually start at just a few millimeters in size, and you can't see that on a chest X-ray."

Mitzman is one of the first to use an ion robotic assisted navigation bronchoscopy to help pinpoint exactly where the cancer is.

"It's a tiny camera that will go down the airway of the patient and go inside the patient's lung," Mitzman said. "It takes the patient's CT scan and builds us this 3D augmented GPS pathway and tells us exactly where to go, so we could get out to where their tiny little two-millimeter nodule

is. We inject a little dye into it so that when we go to do the lung resection it glows for us."

Poche had a tiny cancer nodule in the upper part of his right lung, a spot, Mitzman says, they would never be able to see on a CT scan.

"So without this technol-

ogy, we would end up having to take out a fairly large piece of his lung to make sure we got all of the cancer," he said.

Instead, he removed just a small piece, about the size of quarter. Poche recovered in days instead of weeks, and he is now cancer-free,

just in time for three new family members to arrive this spring.

Many other hospitals are using this technology in biopsies, but the Huntsman Cancer Institute is one of the first in the country to use this technology to mark tumors during surgery.

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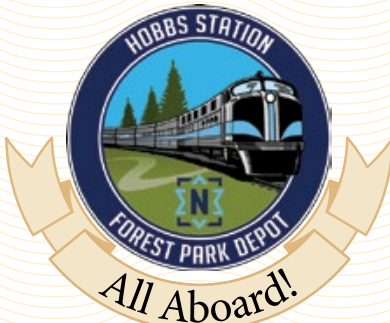

Sara Draper, an immigrant from the United Kingdom and 10-year U.S. citizen, has been on the campaign trail for three and a half months. She's doing all she can after the FEC filing deadline to remind voters of just how possible it is for Democrats to win in Carmel come November.

Small business to lawmakers: Stop dishonest billing & lower health care costs for Hoosiers

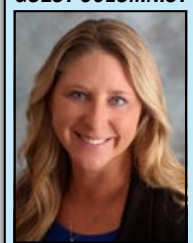
As lawmakers work to wrap up the legislative session, there is a major opportunity to lower the astronomical cost of health care in our state.

Hoosiers have one of the highest health care costs in the country. According to data collected by the federal government on health care spending patterns of families across the nation, Hoosiers spend 32.4 percent more of their family budgets on hospitals than does the average American. State lawmakers must act quickly before time runs out to fix a billing loophole that will help lower costs.

State Senate President Rod Bray recently shared insights on this issue with members at NFIB's Small Business Day program. He told a story about the drastic differences between what a hospital charges for a service compared to a doctor's office. He explained that when he and his wife were both getting the exact same type of blood test, he was charged \$90 for the test administered at his local doctor's office, while his wife was charged \$900 for the exact same test because it was administered at a hospital.

Now imagine being charged the higher hospital rate when you receive the same service at your doc-

tor's office just because it's now owned by a hospital system. That's the sort of thing that is happening and it's wildly frustrating for folks. Hospitals shouldn't be able to bill hospital prices for health care provided at facilities that aren't on a hospital campus.

With the laws currently in place, hospital systems that own doctor's offices, labs, and clinics are allowed to charge hospital campus rates for services provided off campus, which can be 10 times more than their actual cost. This practice is known as "dishonest billing" and it's increasing health care costs and insurance premiums.

Small business owners want to provide their employees with health care coverage, but they just can't afford it. According to a recent NFIB survey, the most important reason that 65 percent of small employers don't offer health insurance is that it is too expensive. The survey found that health insurance is an expected and important benefit for many employees and small businesses compete for talent in filling job openings and retaining employees with competitive compensation packages.

However, many small businesses struggle to offer this benefit thanks to disingenuous and sneaky prac-

tices like dishonest billing that are driving up health care costs.

Another recent NFIB survey found that 60 percent of small businesses were trying to hire workers, but 90 percent couldn't find qualified applicants. Requiring hospitals to simply bill patients for the care they receive at the accurate location the service was provided would go a long way towards lowering costs. We must address cost drivers that are hiking up rates so that small business owners can afford health care coverage for their workers, which would also help them with hiring and retention problems.

When I make a conscious decision to see my primary care doctor instead of rushing to the hospital, I expect my health care costs to reflect that. There is no justifiable reason that I should be charged higher rates for that service simply because a hospital bought out my doctor's office. This billing loophole must be addressed, and dishonest billing practices must be stopped.

Don't be swayed by opponents that claim charging accurate and honest rates when billing for health care services at the appropriate location will close rural hospitals because the proposed legislation addressing this issue expressly protects rural hospitals.

AG Rokita wins round in defending Indiana’s sovereignty against EPA

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has won a round in the legal fight to protect Indiana’s sovereignty against what he calls the federal overreach of the Biden administration’s U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

He and 23 likeminded attorneys general successfully obtained a preliminary injunction against the enforcement of an EPA rule redefining “waters of the United States” under the Clean Water Act.

The new Waters of the United States (WOTUS) rule would force Indiana landowners to beg the permission of federal bureaucrats before using their own property in ways deemed to impact certain ponds, streams, ditches, or other wet areas of ground.

“With our lawsuit, we aim to protect Hoosiers’ jobs, property and freedom from the Biden administration’s excessive regulations,” AG Rokita said. “Our legal victory in U.S. district court proves that our cause is justified and valid. We will continue fighting for free enterprise and individual liberty.”

The attorneys general

Rokita

filed the lawsuit in February.

“We all want to conserve and preserve our natural resources,” Attorney General Rokita said at filing. “At the same time, exercising wise stewardship over the environment does not require citizens to surrender their legitimate liberties and rights to the federal government. And, in fact, we cannot tolerate edicts designed to subjugate free people in such a manner.”

BILLING

The ability for employees to receive and afford quality care is important. Having strong hospitals across our state is important. The two are not mutually exclusive. The good news is that there is still time for the General Assembly to prohibit dishonest billing and lower healthcare costs for Hoosier small business owners that are struggling to provide health care coverage to their employees.

To this point, I encourage state lawmakers to

support legislation, which would protect Hoosiers from this unfair and dishonest billing practice that takes advantage of health care consumers.

Update: Senate Bill 6 failed to get a hearing in the House Public Health Committee this week. To lower healthcare costs, it is imperative that we get the language from SB 6 amended into HB 1004 on the floor to stop dishonest billing. This is a bipartisan issue that is also being addressed by Congress. Indiana has an opportunity to act now and make an immediate impact on lowering costs.

Federal update: Hospital outpatient billing draws bipartisan heat

Hospitals could be play-

ing defense this year as bipartisan scrutiny builds in Congress over the way facilities charge more for outpatient services that can be done in less-expensive settings, like a private doctor's office.

Why it matters

So-called site-neutral payment reforms could save Medicare upward of \$100 billion over a decade, according to various projections, and those with private health insurance could see savings, too. But hospitals are fighting hard against the changes, saying they're subject to more regulatory requirements and need to cover their higher expenses.

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

Tigers double up on triples to get win over Noblesville

FISHERS – Jack Brown and Carson Dunn had everyone doing a triple take on Thursday.

The two Fishers baseball players saw their team in a 2-2 tie with Noblesville in the bottom of the fifth inning. With one out, Dunn smacked a triple into center field. Seconds later, Brown put a triple in right field. The Tigers had the go-ahead run, and would go on to win 4-2 over the Millers in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game at Fishers.

The Tigers never trailed in the game, with Dunn and Brown each scoring a run for Fishers in the first inning. Dunn led off with a triple, then Brown drew a walk. After absorbing two outs, Caulin Brown hit a double into center field, sending in both runners.

“Whenever I hit a ball to the fence, I’m always thinking three and I always try to stretch it out to give us an extra bag,” said Dunn. The Tigers played Zionsville last week, and split the series. Both games ended with dramatic walkoffs, so Dunn was happy to get a first win in this series.

“We had a solid first game last week,” said Dunn. “Faced a pretty good arm.” The Eagles wound up winning that game – “It was a great game and we were right there the whole time,” said Dunn. “I’m just glad to get up on top early this week and start the weekend off great.”

Noblesville got the first run back in the top of the third inning, also with two outs. Hunter Corbett lined a single into right field, then was brought home by a double from Trevor Corbett. The Millers tied the

game in the fourth inning after Aiden Ramsey scored on a wild pitch.

“We had a scouting report on (Noblesville pitcher Nolan) Decker, who is really, really good,” said Tigers coach Matthew Cherry. “I thought we executed really well in the first and got the two runs, and then we kind of went away from the approach a little bit and he started carving us up. He pitched really well. And so we challenged them a little bit going into that inning.”

And it worked. Cherry said Dunn’s triple helped “get us going and get some energy,” then Brown stepped in and gave the Tigers back-to-back triples.

After the Tigers got their run in the fifth inning, they led for the remainder of the game. Fishers added another run in the sixth inning when Ben Hammond doubled in Noah McPeek, who got on base with a two-out single.

“They played really well,” said Millers coach Justin Kever. “They had some big hits with two outs against us.”

Noblesville fought to the end, with Jack Shade hitting a triple in the top of the seventh with one out. But Jack Brown finished the game strong on the mound, with two strikeouts. Brown put together a splendid complete game, tossing seven strikeouts and allowing only two hits and one walk.

Brown said he “made adjustments throughout the game. I felt like I was very strong at the end, which is what’s important to me. Tight situation there and I got us out of it. It’s my fourth appearance of the year and I saw some improvements that I wanted to make, and I’m ready to go for next week.”
