

Four years ago, my future bride and I were lost in the jungle of The Gaylord Opryland Resort, a luxury-hotel behemoth that includes nine acres of tropical plants, trees, waterways, and waterfalls all indoors.

We grew weary and grouchy trying to find

our room, one of 2,888 rooms somewhere out there on the edges of our rainforest-ina-dome destination. The cordial check-in woman verbalized our room's location, but anytime anyone gives me verbal directions to anywhere, all I really hear is "mwa-mwamwa." (Note: I never did find the Empire State Building when walking Manhattan. In hindsight, I realized I had walked right by it several times.)

The resort is so expansive it has zones: Cascades, Garden Conservatory, Delta. Our room was in Magnolia, wherever that was. Heart of Darkness would be a more fitting

With each wrong turn; with each miscalculated footstep – often a flip-flop flew missile-like off a foot due to walking too closely to each other (Brynne calls this "flipping your flop") -; and with each erroneous direction taken on stairways and elevator chutes, our faces grew more flush, our foreheads more damp. trees previously passed, as if going in circles. Though we packed lightly, our travel bags became leaden. We wished for pack mules.

Our temperaments were finally tested as soon-to-be newlyweds. During our then blissful, two-year courtship, there was never an "issue," no contrariness to our compatibility. But I sensed a change. Where once her eyes contained the calming hues of Caribbean waters, there now boiled a fury of Vesuvius lava within her irises as I stubbornly insisted on guiding (in her eyes, misguiding) us to our elusive room, its existence as improbable as The Lost City of Z.

But, oh, those feverish, raging, bugged-out eyes before me.

Brynne looked dangerous, as if deep inside her purse one might find a garrote or blowgun with poison darts, causing me to pause, worry and wonder, "How well do I really know this woman I'm to marry? How do I even dare close my eyes to sleep?" Brynne finally declared mutiny and took control of our expedition. I followed her. We found our room within five minutes.

We were in Nashville to see guitar god Carlos Santana bring his Global Consciousness Tour to the nearby Grand Ole Opry stage. Santana's ability to go beyond musical, cultural, and geographical boundaries, combined with our overnight stay among the ecological wonders of the resort, seemed like the perfect Earth Day 2019 thing to do.

The older I get, the more conscious I've become about our earth's condition. Now, when I hear Santana sing, "You've got to change your evil ways, baby," the song's true meaning has morphed into something totally different from the songwriter's intent. It is a mantra guiding me to better citizenship. My mea culpa to Mother Earth.

See redemption through power of music on stage at **Basile Westfield Playhouse**

A Seat on the Aisle

A stranger with a mysterious past comes to a small town and shakes things up: it's a familiar storytelling device because it's such an effective hook, and The Spitfire Grill is no exception.

Based on the 1996 independent film, the musical tells the story of Percy Talbott (Chrissy Crawley), a young drifter who settles in Gilead, Wis. She begins working at the Spitfire Grill, owned by Hannah Ferguson (Georgeanna Teipen) and is soon befriended by coworker Shelby Thorpe (Katelyn Maudlin). The small cast is rounded out by Shelby's husband Caleb (Daniel Draves), town gossip Effy Krayneck (Susan Smith), Sheriff Joe Sutter (Scott Fleshood), and The Visitor (Tom Riddle).

This is a simply told story of redemption that's all about the music, most of it rendered in a folk/bluegrass style. Powerhouse singers are needed, and Main Street Productions delivers. The cast is led by Chrissy Crawley as Percy Talbott, who simply could not have a more perfect voice for the task at hand. Her voice is yearning, evocative, and true, everything we want it to be. Katelyn Maudlin as Shelby Thorpe also contributes gorgeous vocals with a sweet and pure tone. When the two of them are singing harmonies or a trio with Georgeanna Teipen as Hannah Ferguson, the audience is transported. Special mention must be made of Teipen's "Way Back Home" and of Scott Fleshood's

each and every vocalist in the space and how fortunate

this production is superb. We're given rock-solid performances from veteran actors Susan Smith as Effy Krayneck, Daniel Draves as Caleb Thorpe, and Georgeanna Teipen as Hannah Ferguson, but the acting is not as flawless across the board as the vocals. This is a show where not much happens, so there should be a good deal of active listening when one actor is singing a song and another is just sitting with them, which didn't always happen. Some strange blocking choices also served to erode the overall feel of excellence; when one or two or three characters are doing beautiful work singing their songs, we don't want to see other characters entering in preparation for their next scene. This happened several times and broke the hard-won magic of the moment.

This was my first visit to the recently constructed Basile Westfield Playhouse, and it would seem remiss views from A Seat on the Aisle

Main Street Productions is to have it. The set, which mostly consists of the Spitfire Grill restaurant itself, is beautifully constructed of various woods and makes great use of the space. The lighting is at its best when multicolored lights are used for rainbow and sunrise effects, but there are a few times when actors were doing scene work far downstage and their faces were partially obscured/poorly lit.

This musical should be better known than it is, and director Brenna Whitaker has created a heartfelt, honest production that deserves to be seen.

The Spitfire Grill runs at the Basile Westfield Playhouse, presented by Main Street Productions, through April 23. Curtain times are 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, and 2:30 p.m. on Sunday. Tickets may be purchased at WestfieldPlayhouse.org.



Spring construction underway in Fishers

City enhances roads, pedestrian trails & resurfaces over 21 miles of roadway

The City of Fishers' Engineering and Department of Public Works teams are gearing up for a busy season of roadway and trail improvements to enhance safety and connectivity for motorists and pedestrians.

"Over the past few years, we've made dramatic improvements to how residents and visitors experience and navigate our community, from State Road 37 to the Nickel Plate Trail and new pedestrian tunnel across 116th Street," said Jason Taylor, City of Fishers' Director of Engineering. "With these new amenities in their final stages of construction, we're shifting our focus to ensuring that our roadways and trails are updated to best suit the needs of our growing community – making intersection improvements and widening roads to improve traffic flow, expanding our trail system, making ADA improvements, and investing in new infrastruc-

ture." Nickel Plate Trail Paving

Paving begins next week on the last remaining section of the Fishers Nickel Plate Trail from 106th Street to 96th Street. Paving is anticipated to be completed in August. A pedestrian bridge over 96th Street, connecting the Fishers trail to Indianapolis, will be constructed next

Geist Greenway Trail

Currently under construction, the Geist Greenway Trail is a five-mile pedestrian path connecting 96th Street and 131st Street in east Fishers. Currently, construction is focused on connecting the existing neighborhood trail system in Enclave at Steeplechase to South Avalon Estates. The trail is anticipated to open next year.

Road Resurfacing

Resurfacing is underway on roadways throughout Fishers and will continue through October. Lane restrictions will be in effect during resurfacing and residents will be notified via signage of any street parking restrictions.

The first phase, which continues through July, includes Fall Creek Road between Mollenkopf Road and Olio Road; Geist Road between Fall Creek Road and 106th Street; 131st Street between Allisonville Road and Britton Park Road; Britton Park Road; Willow View Road; Winding Creek Lane; Brooks School Street and 113th Street.

Also beginning this spring are road resurfacing in neighborhoods including Rolling Knoll, Spyglass Hills, Sunblest, Wildwood Estates, and The Parks at Harvard, Oxford, and Princeton that will extend through October 2023.

In addition, casting adiustments will be made on 96th Street between Lantern Road and the Walmart traffic signal, with lane restrictions to be announced ahead of the project.

ADA Improvements

ADA ramp and curb reconstruction has begun in neighborhoods around the community and will continue through September 2023. Homeowners will be notified via door hangers prior to any curb reconstruction near their home.

Cumberland Road Reconstruction Project

Reconstruction and improvements to Cumberland Road begin this month and will continue through 2024. The project includes new pedestrian paths on both sides of the roadway, widening travel lanes, and installing a grassed median with openings for north-south access. Hamilton County Bridge 162 will also be replaced.

Investing in new infrastructure is also on the list of spring and summer construction projects. 


"Offensively we had our opportunities and we just didn't have the timely hits," said Westfield coach Ryan Bunnell.

The dirt has run its course

Dirt racing just isn't for NASCAR anymore. We can appreciate the heritage and origins of NASCAR and the many dirt tracks it raced on in the early years; however, that should not require NASCAR to go back.

Prior to the 2021 Bristol Dirt race, the

last dirt track the NASCAR Cup Series ran was at North Carolina State Fairgrounds on September 30, 1970 – more than 50 years before the 2021 Bristol Dirt Race. For a point of comparison, the first race sanctioned by NA-SCAR was on February 15, 1948. Therefore, dirt racing was relatively short-lived in NA-SCAR's 75-year history.

When I first heard that the spring race at Bristol was going to be run on dirt, I was intrigued. It was an outside-the-box idea and hadn't occurred in more than 50 years.

As it turned out, however, the race was not that captivating. Sure, it was cool to see the track covered in dirt, the dirt tires, and the cars moving around a bit more, but it did not have the qualities of a great dirt race. Almost more important, a former dirt racer did not win the race and a majority of those who finished in the top 10 were not dirt racers.

The 2022 race was somewhat better and featured an exciting ending with two former dirt racers, Tyler Reddick and Chase Briscoe, crashing on the final corner, which handed the victory to Kyle Busch.

Of the three Bristol dirt races, this year's race was clearly the best. The track appeared to be in excellent condition and cars were able to run the bottom to the top. The track conditions changed throughout the race, forcing drivers to search the racetrack for grip. Lastly, the former dirt racers dominated the race and claimed the first five finishing positions. The race was more representative of a true dirt race. I really enjoyed the 2023 Bristol Dirt race.

Nevertheless, I believe dirt racing should end in the Cup Series.

First and foremost, Bristol on concrete is far too good of a racetrack to cover with dirt. Bristol is one of the premier tracks on the NA-SCAR circuit and has consistently provided excellent races. If NASCAR needs to have a dirt race, it should be at an actual dirt track.

Second, the cars are not made for racing on dirt. Every piece and component on Cup cars, especially the NextGen cars, are designed for asphalt and/or concrete surfaces.

Third, the drivers do not enjoy running dirt tracks in their Cup cars. Kyle Larson, undoubtably the best dirt racer in NASCAR, was adamant that NASCAR should not be racing on dirt. Many of his fellow competitors expressed similar sentiments this weekend.

Given the dismal attendance at the dirt race this year, I would not be surprised if NA-SCAR goes back to the traditional configuration for the Spring 2024 Bristol race. There is a reason NASCAR left dirt racing in 1970; stock cars are better on asphalt.
