



I wholeheartedly believe that he will do a tremendous job representing the Noblesville community!





"Schools need to have three things: a threat assessment team, training and protocol in place, and be sure they assess and then react, not react and assess; heightened security procedures, so if the threat is not credible, they don't close, they continue on under heightened supervision; and a strong communications plan to get accurate information out and to quell rumors within the school community to reduce parent, student and staff anxiety."

When logging onto **Vote411.org**, simply enter your address and all the information on the next page will be tailored to your area.

You'll see descriptions of the office, then photos and bios of the candidates who responded to the league's request for info. Dick said each candidate was sent a survey by email or postal mail, and their responses were entered by their own representatives. The league does not edit candidate responses.

Dick added a few reminders for primary voters. Indiana's is a "closed" primary, which means voters select candidates in one party or another. You choose one party to cast all your votes, but you do not have to be a member of that party to choose its ballot.

"In the general election in the fall, you do not have to declare a party and you can vote for anyone on the ballot, regardless of party," Dick explained. A list of more primary voting reminders is on the league's website home page.

Vote411.org is free and nonpartisan in keeping with the League of Women Voters' mission as an organization that encourages informed and active participation in government. Leagues around the nation work to increase understanding of major public policy issues and to influence public policy through education and advocacy.

The girls high school tennis season is off and running in Indiana, and many teams are beginning their 2023 campaigns with difficult schedules.

"Bella is a gutsy player," said Noblesville coach Kevin Lindley. "She will scrap and fight for everything. I just keep trying to tell her, 'You got to believe in yourself, get out there and play your game.""

Junior Josie Flinchum came from behind to win the No. 3 singles match, 5-7. 7-5, 6-2. At No. 2 doubles, the senior team of Daniella Tuesca and Olivia Gadis pushed their opponents to three sets before falling 3-6, 6-1, 6-4.

Three more juniors rounded out Noblesville's lineup. No. 2 singles Allie Stamm battled before falling 7-5, 6-1. At No. 1 doubles, the Panthers' Rachel Grissom and Caroline Robinson beat the Millers' Lina Hamashuk and Cami Crist 6-2, 6-3.

"Four matches into the first week, I'm super proud of the team," said Noblesville coach Kevin Lindley. "They're a real cohesive group. They've been fighting hard. We've lost some tough close matches, but I'm real proud of the way they're competing."

The Millers began this week with a 4-1 win Tuesday at Brownsburg. The victory gives Noblesville a 2-1 record in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference this season.
