En Pointe Ballet dancers earn top awards at regional

Hundreds of dancers aged 9 to 19 convened in Carmel in March for YAGP Indianapolis, the Midwest regional portion of the annual Youth America Grand Prix (YAGP) Competition, the world's largest student ballet scholarship competition.

During the annual event, junior, senior, and pre-professional dance students competed within the categories of contemporary solo, classical solo, duet, trio, large and small group ensembles, and Pas De Deux for prizes, scholarships, and invitations to join world-renowned ballet companies. Additionally, dancers also are offered a series of free masterclasses as part of the YAGP experience.

More than two dozen En Pointe Indiana Ballet dancers participated, most from the greater Hamilton County area and two out-of-state pre-professionals studying with En Pointe. Several won awards and acco-

Grandpa Howard had a family of nine, and I was the youngest grandson of his youngest child.

He told me the story of how he came to believe that on exceptional occasions "mechanical stimulus" produces results that could not otherwise be obtained. He told me that youth was the opportune time to establish an invincible character. During the perceptive years of childhood impressions are formed that stamp life's personality to its close. As the twig is bent, so the tree is inclined.

He noted in pioneer days primitive methods of discipline were common which had now become obsolete. He said psychologists teach that freedom of expression is essential in childhood development and when tantrums occur, parents should primarily be concerned about the underlying cause. "Them's my sentiments, too," he said.

Outside the Box expanding to Fishers to support people with disabilities

Local not-for-profit organization Outside the Box (OTB) will open a day program in Fishers to support people with intellectual and developmental disabilities toward living their best lives.

An industry leader currently supporting almost 300 people at their Indianapolis campus, OTB has been working with stakeholders in Fishers for more than five years toward this expansion. An innovative program known for teaching life skills in a peer-matched, curriculum-based, community integrated structure will be the first full time offering of its kind in the city of Fishers. Participants will participate in meaningful, individualized activities that include art and cooking classes as well as prevocational training. The program empowers autonomy and personal independence.

While ultimately, the program will find its future home in the planned Fishers

Community & Recreation Center in partnership with the City of Fishers Parks Department, the organization will start their Fishers program at 9795 Crosspoint Blvd. with a planned opening date of July 10.

"We are thrilled to finally be bringing Outside the Box programming to the Fishers community," said Val Brennan, President of the Board of Directors for the organization. "We are grateful for the support of the city of Fishers leadership and look forward to continued

He vividly remembered a personal experience that dated back a little more than 73 years, which at that time would have been about 1881. He was six and brother William was 15 ½ months younger. Although Grandpa had the advantage in size, William was so quick afoot that they were about evenly matched. Childlike, they had their differences but seldom came to blows. Being the same age, they

grew up together and there was a close attachment that remained throughout their entire lives. One morning while playing in the orchard, their opinions clashed and as they engaged in “self-expression” their mother came out of the kitchen door, broke a switch from the peach tree and said, “Boys come here.”

Instead, they ran in the opposite direction. She made no attempt to follow them and soon went back into the house. They went to a corn crib and occupied the time until noon making false mustaches and whiskers of cornstalks.

When their mother called for dinner, they were apprehensive, expecting there would be a little enforced calisthenics before the meal. To their surprise mother seemed to be in good humor and appeared to have forgotten the orchard affair. The afternoon was uneventful. They went to bed together that night as usual.

Presently mother came in with the switch she had saved, turned down the cover and vigorously connected their bare legs. She never told him why she did it, but there was not the least doubt in their mind.

Grandpa decided it was impractical to run away when mother called. Through the subsequent years he said he found it impossible to run away from just dues. Sooner or later life extracts a toll commensurate with our deeds.

Whether in time or in eternity, every transgression and disobedience shall receive a just compensation of reward.

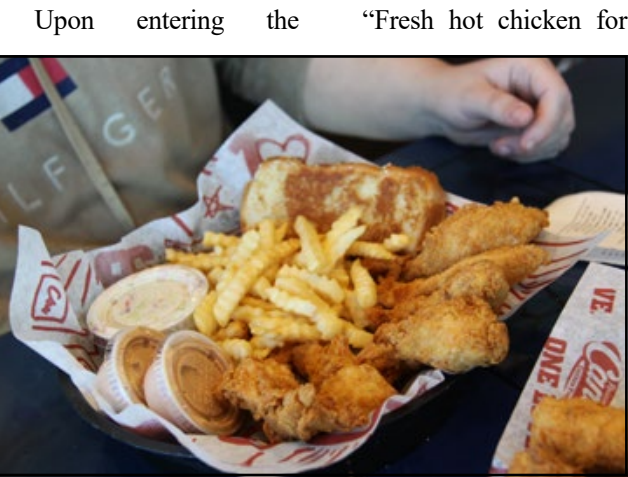

restaurant, you are greeted with three giant disco balls and loud groovy music. Founder Todd Graves said he wants everyone to be in a good mood with the atmosphere of his chicken restaurant. It definitely gave a great first impression to boogie along the big line on opening day.

I have personally seen people raving about Raising Cane’s on Facebook. After three years of being teased with pictures of their juicy fried chicken and freshly toasted garlic bread, we finally have a Raising Cane’s in Noblesville! It’s at 13020 Campus Pkwy. That’s at the corner of Cabela Parkway just north of the Hamilton Town Center.

While I was in line, I bumped into Christopher DeHarde, who has been a Raising Cane’s Caniac Card Member since 1996. He even got it at the original location in Baton Rouge, La. Chris told me it’s time for Indiana to have more Cane’s, and he is happy to get one in his hometown of Noblesville.

Nik” is yelled over the counter and it is time to finally try this rising-in-popularity chicken tender.

Upon the first bite, I am almost brought to tears. It isn’t just good – it tastes exactly like my mother’s chicken growing up at home.

I expected a signature taste. Instead, I got great juicy homemade tenders. I wasn’t disappointed, especially when I dipped it in their signature Cane’s Sauce. There’s where the flavor kicks in. It’s kind of like a tangy, seasoned sauce that is perfect for the subtle, homemade-tasting tenders. Not to mention

that crispy, tasty garlic bread, of which I recommend getting an extra slice when you order because once you get your food, you’re not going to want to get back in that line!

Raising Cane’s chicken fingers come in four options: a “Kids Combo” with one tender, “The 3 Finger Combo,” “The Box Combo” with four fingers, and “The Caniac Combo” with six tenders. They also offer a chicken sandwich featuring Cane’s Sauce. Not only would I recommend it, but I have also been back a second time since opening day, and it was just as good.



The only thing I would tell you before going is to get an extra tender or two than you usually would, as they are on the smaller side in the tender universe.

Aspire Indiana Health will hold its first-ever InSHAPE 5k Fun Run & Walk on Saturday, April 22 at Conner Prairie. The event will raise funds and awareness for the nonprofit's InSHAPE program, which helps Hoosiers with mental illness improve their fitness and reach their health goals.

Participants will receive a comfy T-shirt, finisher medal and swag bag, and can choose between a 5k timed event or one-mile fun run/walk. They can do both races for the same registration price if they wish. There will be post-race refreshments, pre-race warm-up group stretching, face painting and other fun activities for kids.

Registration fees, which will go to support the program, are \$33 for adults, \$15 for youths aged 12 and under, and kids 5 and under are free. A virtual option is also available for \$30.

The six-year-old InSHAPE program is devoted to helping Hoosiers with mental illness work

on improving their physical health and wellbeing. It's very common for people with behavioral health diagnoses to also struggle with excess weight, diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease and other health challenges.

The program pairs patients up with personal trainers who provide them with the tools, motivation, and support to succeed in their personal health goals. By implementing exercise and improving nutrition habits, InSHAPE helps people lose weight, improve cognitive functions, decrease depression and anxiety, improve self-esteem, and decrease social isolation.

"Really it's about extending their life. We want to see them live long past what they're projected to," said program leader Jody Hall, noting that the life

expectancy of people with mental illness is significantly lower than the rest of the population.

The InSHAPE 5k Fun Run & Walk will have a superhero theme, and kids – even grown-up ones – are encouraged to dress as their favorite character for the event.

That's because everyone involved in InSHAPE, from the clients to the trainers to the supporters, are truly superheroes when it comes to helping others.

All proceeds of the race

will go toward program participants to pay for exercise equipment, gym memberships, shoes and more.

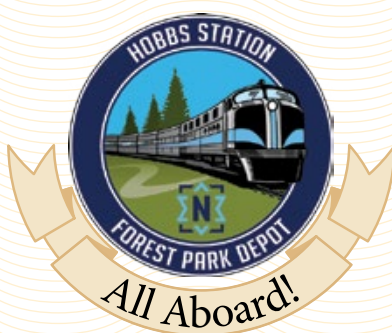

California Senator George Murphy began this tradition more than 40 years ago. Soon after he entered the Senate in 1965, the former Hollywood actor and film executive began stocking his Chamber desk with candy to gratify his sweet tooth.

In 1968, he moved to an aisle desk on the last row near the elevator entrance. Given the member traffic that regularly passed by his new location, he invited other senators to help themselves and soon his desk became known to all as the “candy desk.”

After Murphy left the Senate in 1971, other senators who occupied the desk at that location carried on the tradition of keeping it well stocked with assorted mints, hard candies, and chocolates. Construction season officially underway across Indiana

Gov. Eric J. Holcomb and the Indiana Department of Transportation officially kicked off the 2023 construction season on Monday and shared the importance of work zone safety as road construction projects begin across the state.

INDOT Commissioner Mike Smith joined Capt. Ron Galaviz from Indiana State Police, Indiana Constructors Inc. President Richard Hedgecock, contractors, and industry partners near the Clear Path 465 construction zone on the northeast side of Indianapolis to mark the seventh year of delivering Gov. Holcomb's Next Level Roads plan, which invests \$60 billion over 20 years to improve existing roads and finish major projects in Indiana.

"Indiana is stronger than ever when it comes to infrastructure," Gov. Holcomb

said. "We're doing what we said we would do – maintaining what we have, continuing to deliver on projects like Clear Path and I-69 Finish Line, and planning for the future."

INDOT will deliver nearly 1,200 construction projects in 2023. When combined with preventative maintenance activities, the state is investing more than \$2.5 billion in infrastructure improvements this year alone.

As motorists travel across the Hoosier State, they can expect to encounter plenty of orange signs and barrels, as well as a number of safety measures to keep both drivers and road crews safe. INDOT will continue deploying **back-of-queue warning trucks**, automated queue warning systems, and **HAAS alert systems** in work zones this year. The

agency will also continue partnering with Indiana State Police and local law enforcement to patrol construction zones.

"We've come a long way, but there is more that can be done to make work zones safer," said INDOT Commissioner Mike Smith. "We all play a part in keeping work zones safe. With the number of projects happening this year, I cannot stress enough the importance of slowing down, avoiding distractions and paying attention to your surroundings on the road. We want everyone going home at the end of the day."


To prepare for construction, Indiana drivers are encouraged to "Know Before You Go" by visiting **511in.org** or downloading INDOT's **TrafficWise app** to see real-time traffic conditions and construction project updates. Hoosiers can also

view upcoming projects on INDOT's **Next Level Roads Map**. To report a roadway concern, call 855-INDOT4U or visit **indot4u.com**.

This week, INDOT is recognizing National Work

Zone Awareness Week (April 17-21). Join the agency in promoting work zone safety by sharing messaging on social media and wearing orange or hi-vis gear on Wednesday, April 19. Drivers

are reminded to slow down, avoid distractions, and use extra caution in work zones. More information on work zone safety is available online at **workzonesafety.in.gov**.

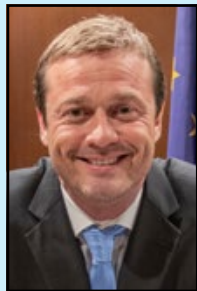

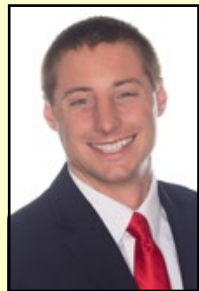

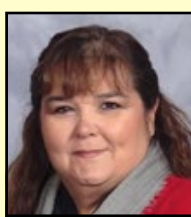
