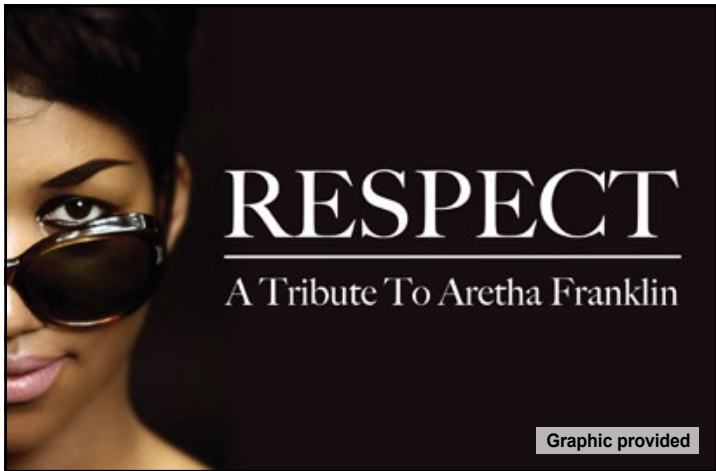

Vintage Baseball Match postponed until May 27

The prediction for potentially heavy rains on Friday and dropping temperatures, accompanied by high winds resulting in poor field conditions and a less-than-conducive event experience, contributed to the decision made by Hamilton County Bicentennial Committee members, Hamilton County Parks and Recreation (HCPR) staff and the players.

Noblesville VFW celebrates Loyalty Day on April 29

The Ralph Lehr VFW Post 6246 will play host to a Loyalty Day block party with food, vendors, kids' activities and entertainment from 2 p.m. to midnight on Saturday,

April 29 at 645 S. 9th St., Noblesville. The street will be blocked from Vine to Walnut. While Loyalty Day is on May 1, the VFW is making the weekend before an event with bands, activities and a chance to learn about the history and importance

of Loyalty Day. In 1958, President Dwight Eisenhower gave his approval of a House Resolution annually recognizing May 1 as Loyalty Day and a "special day for the reaffirmation of loyalty to the United States of America and for the recognition of the heritage of American freedom."

Loyalty Day has been recognized with an official proclamation every year by every president since its inception as a legal holiday in 1958. According to VFW Auxiliary President and Canteen Manager Linda Behrends, while the VFW has held Loyalty Day parades in year past, they opted for an all-day event at the Post this year. Activities for children will include bounce houses, a football toss, and more.

The music lineup includes Craig Thurston from 2 to 4 p.m., Fast Cadillac from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. and Tone Lab Society from 7 to 10 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.

State Senate approves training program for armed teachers

The sponsor of an armed teacher training program on Tuesday said he would prefer a mandatory program but it likely would not become law otherwise.

The state Senate voted along party lines to approve **legislation prescribing a voluntary training program** for any teacher authorized to carry a concealed firearm on school property. A school corporation, charter school, or accredited public school could apply for a state grant to send an authorized teacher to a 40-hour training course.

The curriculum would have to address the specific challenges involved in responding to an active shooter in a school environment. Teachers undergoing the training would have to undergo at least eight hours of live-fire drills based around shooting in a crowded environment, shooting while moving, and engaging multiple targets. Instructors also would have to cover gunshot wound care, legal responsibilities and safely identifying themselves to the police.

Current state law allows a school's governing body to decide whether to authorize teachers to carry a firearm on school grounds but says nothing about training. Bill sponsor Sen. Travis Holdman, R-Markle, has tried for several years to make such a

training program mandatory. He said the House has nixed such legislation every time, so a voluntary program is the best he can hope for. This year's legislation originated in the House.

"We have made it possible for the teachers in our state to be armed in these school districts, but they don't have to be trained in how to use the weapons. That, to me, is problematic," fellow Republican Sen. John Crane, of Avon, said. "I think if you're going to use a weapon, you'd better be trained in how to use it."

Senate Democrats said they agreed with the principle that teachers should undergo training if they are going to carry a firearm on school grounds. But several, including Sen. Fady Qadoura, D-Indianapolis, said they voted against it because they did not like what it represented.

"There are gaps in this piece of legislation," Qadoura said. "If the teacher ends up shooting someone by mistake, who's going to bear that legal responsibility, the school district or the state of Indiana?"

The bill already passed the House but has to go back to that chamber because of changes the Senate made. Lawmakers have until the end of next week to hammer out any differences between the two chambers on any bills.

Indiana mother pushes state legislators to pass defibrillators law

Senate Bill 369 would make it mandatory for all Indiana schools to have automated external defibrillators, known as AEDs, at all athletic events, including practices.

Julie West and her non-profit **Play for Jake** are lobbying the Indiana Legislature to pass the measure. The bill is now in a conference committee after passing both the House and Senate with amendments.

West's son Jake, a two-sport athlete at La Porte High School, died in 2013

after leaving the practice field.

"Even in high school, he would see someone kind of being left out and picked on and he was the one that would stand up for that child or bring people in, he just had a smile on his face all the time," the mother said.

West said her son never showed any signs of heart trouble or other health issues until he died.

"His first sign of anything being wrong with his heart was sudden cardiac arrest, and that happens often. That could be the first sign of a condition of a heart condition, so that's why it's

so important that we get our children screened on the front end."

Senate Bill 369 could require that AEDs be present in other extracurricular activities, such as band and drama practices. The AEDs would be paid for out of the state's Safe Schools Fund, a pot of money set aside to pay for school safety enhancements.

"I'm hoping eventually mandated for all schools to have these sudden cardiac emergency response plans in their school, we practice every other drill, we know what to do we know how to protect kids," West said.

The Play for Jake Foundation is also teaming up with other nonprofits to hold heart screenings for children and teens so potentially deadly heart ailments

can be revealed before it's too late.

"I had to wake up every day and decide: 'What would Jake want me to do? How does he want me to

live?'" West said. "I know my son well enough, and he's such a great all-around kid, and he would want me to do what I am doing now."

Indiana American Water highlights Safety & Work Zone Awareness Week

- **Slow down:** Follow posted speed limits. Adjust your speed for traffic flows and weather conditions. Keep an eye out for road workers and their equipment.
- **Keep your distance:** Don't tailgate. Leave at least three seconds or more (depending on your speed) of braking room between

you and the vehicle in front of you.

- **Move into an open lane:** When approaching lane closures, move into the open lane as soon as possible. Be sure to pay close attention to vehicles around you that could be in your blind spot.
- **Pay attention and stay alert:** Be prepared for sudden stops. Avoid changing radio stations and using cell phones.
- **Be patient** and make safety your first priority.

"We want our crews to return home safely after each day's work, so we more than welcome the opportunity to spotlight the importance of work zone safety this week and all year long," Prine said.



Indiana Dept. of Agriculture receives \$1.7M in funding for gulf hypoxia zone

The **Indiana State Department of Agriculture's** Soil Conservation Division received \$1,713,333 from the U.S. EPA through the **Gulf Hypoxia Program** created under the federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to help states in their nutrient reduction strategy efforts.

"Indiana's water and soil are some of our most valuable resources," said **Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch, Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development**. "This funding will go a long way in furthering the efforts of the **Indiana State Nutrient Reduction Strategy**."

The Gulf Hypoxia Program seeks to lessen the downstream impact of excessive nutrient loads into the Gulf of Mexico. Eutrophication, or nutrient enrichment of waters, is a concern in many areas of the United States as well as around the world. Nutrients are an essential part of the water system for plant and animal life, however when there is an excess of nutrients, it can cause water quality impairments such as hazardous algal blooms and oxygen depleted water.

"Indiana is grateful to have received funding through EPA's Gulf Hypoxia Program to continue and grow our nutrient reduction strategy," said Don Lamb, director of the Indiana State Department of Agriculture. "The work done through the

strategy is critical in ensuring Indiana's lakes, streams and river's health improves, as well as those downstream."

This funding will allow ISDA to support efforts to improve water quality through the Division of Soil Conservation and partnerships. The agency plans to develop a statewide soil sampling program aimed at increasing the adoption of nutrient management to minimize nutrient runoff and improve nutrient use efficiency across the state. Additionally, ISDA will partner with Purdue University to create an Indiana Nutrient Research and Education Program (INREP) to continue and expand the work of the Indiana Science Assessment to improve methods for quantifying nutrient reduction from conservation practices and to determine conservation practice efficiency.

This funding will complement and contribute to the efforts and success of the Indiana State Nutrient Reduction Strategy. This strategy represents the state's commitment to re-

duce nutrient runoff from point sources and non-point sources alike, to ultimately improve water quality in Indiana lakes, streams, and rivers, and downstream in the Mississippi River, Gulf of Mexico, and Great Lakes.

"I am very appreciative that ISDA has received this funding from EPA to grow our staff support and expand upon programs with proven success," said Julie Harrold, ISDA Program Manager for Water Quality Initiatives. "With this funding, and future expected funding under the Gulf Hypoxia Program, we will be able to implement a variety of meaningful projects we did not previously have the funding and resources to execute."

Partners for this project include **Indiana Conservation Partnership, Indiana Agriculture Nutrient Alliance**, ag retailers, Certified Crop Advisors, Purdue University and landowners. The funding is expected to sustain efforts through September of 2025, with additional future funding expected through the Gulf Hypoxia Program.

If you learn you are no longer eligible for coverage through the Medicaid program, the Indiana Department of Insurance encourages you to see if you qualify for coverage and subsidies through the Federal Marketplace online at **HealthCare.gov** or by calling (800) 318-2596.

If you are over 65, the Indiana Department of Insurance encourages you to look into coverage through the federal Medicare program at **Medicare.gov** or by calling (800) MEDICARE. Indiana's State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) can also help you with any questions you have about Medicare. Go to **in.gov/ship** or call (800) 452-4800.

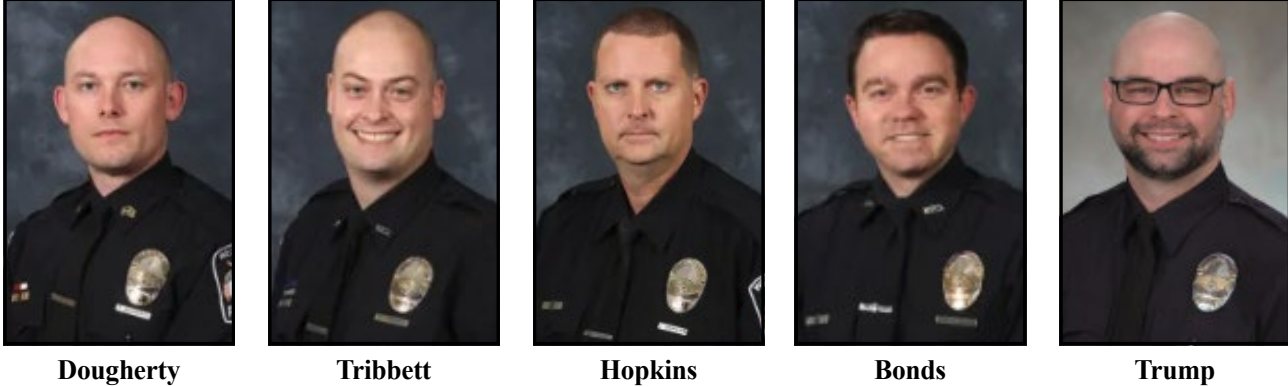

Meet the five resource officers at Westfield Washington Schools

Westfield Washington Schools and the Westfield Police Department (WPD) have a great relationship, which has been beneficial to both parties as well as for the safety of students and community members.

In addition to having five school resource officers (officers whose full-time post is within the school district), every one of Westfield's schools is a police substation, which means any officer on duty, SRO or not, can stop in and get paperwork done and be a presence in the school building.

This school year, WPD has made a total of 4,197 visits to Westfield schools, and this doesn't count the constant presence of the resource officers. This has led to principals, teachers and students having great relationships with local police officers and WPD's timely responses in the event that a school has a safety situation.

Meet each of the five school resource officers (SRO) below.

Sgt. Tyler Dougherty
Sergeant Tyler W. Dougherty is an officer with the Westfield Police Department. He attended Wabash College prior to becoming a law enforcement officer. After graduating in 2009, he became a law enforcement officer with the Wayne County Sheriff Department in 2011. He served as a patrolman, Crash Reconstructionist, and Investigator for Crimes against Children until 2016. He began his career as an officer with the Westfield Police Department in 2015 and is a Crash Reconstructionist. He became an SRO in August 2016 and was promoted to Sergeant in 2020. He covers the elementary schools in Westfield, along with supervising the SRO program.

Ofc. Chad Tribbett
Officer Chad Tribbett has served with the Westfield Police Department for nine years. He started as an SRO in February 2019. As a graduate of WHS, he's honored to be back in the building as the SRO to serve the staff and students.

Ofc. Joe Hopkins
Officer Joe Hopkins has been with the Westfield Police Department since 2004. He has served as a bike patrol officer, field training officer, traffic accident reconstructionist, and is an FAA-licensed drone pilot. He served in the U.S. Army prior to entering law enforcement. He is originally from Houston, Texas, and is a cum laude graduate of Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Okla. He became and SRO in October 2021, and he is enjoying the new opportunity and challenge.

Ofc. Nick Bonds
Officer Nick Bonds graduated from Decatur Central High School in Indianapolis. He attended Vincennes University and graduated with a law enforcement degree. He has over 10 years of experience in law enforcement.

Ofc. Daniel Trump
Officer Daniel Trump started with the Westfield Police Department in February 2022. Prior to switching departments, he was a law enforcement officer with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department for three years. During his time with WPD, he has been certified as an Evidence Technician and serves on the WPD Honor Guard. He became an SRO in January 2023.

Jim Brainard recognized as Hoosier Resilience Hero for commitment to Carmel’s environment

Westfield gets the better of conference rival Fishers

The Westfield baseball team earned a split with county and Hoosier Crossroads Conference rival Fishers on Thursday, winning 6-2 in a game at the Shamrocks' field.

The Tigers scored their runs in the top of the second inning. Evan Doran sent a base hit into left field to bring Quinn Seefeldt and Noah McPeck home.

Westfield answered with three runs in the bottom of the inning. Leadoff man Evan Russ was hit by a pitch, then moved to third base on Ty Anderson's right field double. Nick Alm walked to load the bases, after which Eli Manbeck came in to run for Anderson.

Austin Knott came up to the plate next, and he was safe on a fielder's choice that sent Russ and Manbeck home. The 'Rocks loaded the bases again later in the inning, and Alm scored when Alex Rudolph was hit by a pitch.

Westfield added two runs in the third inning. Russ scored on an error, then Anderson got home when Alm hit a sacrifice bunt. The Shamrocks scored one more run in the sixth inning, with Tyler Gentry coming home on Collin Lindsey's left field hit.

Russ finished with two hits, while Anderson got the pitching win, striking out six over five and two-thirds innings.

McPeck had two hits for Fishers. Kyle Manship pitched four and a third innings in relief, tossing nine strikeouts.

Both teams are 3-3 in conference play. Westfield is 5-5 overall and hosts New Castle on Saturday. The Tigers are 8-7 and play a doubleheader Saturday afternoon at Huntington North.

Noblesville picked up an HCC sweep of Franklin Central on Thursday, beating the Flashes 14-6 at Don Dunker Field.

The Millers scored in every inning in which they batted. In the first inning, Trevor Corbett drew a lead-off walk, then Aiden Reynolds sent him home with a left field home run.

Reynolds struck again in the second inning, as he smacked another left field homer that also brought in Hunter Corbett and Trevor Corbett. In the third inning, Josh Peek hit a sacrifice fly to send Aiden Ramsey home.

Ramsey got a big hit in the fourth inning, a center field double to score Nolan Decker. Hunter Corbett got his own center field hit later in the inning, a two-RBI single to send Jack Shade and Ramsey home. That gave Noblesville a 9-2 lead.

Franklin Central scored four runs in the top of the fifth inning, cutting the Millers' lead to 9-6. Noblesville got three runs back in the bottom of the inning: Shade singled in Bryce Riggs, then Decker and Logan Shoffner scored when Ramsey reached on error.

The Millers finished with two runs in the sixth inning. Reynolds batted in Jacob Schlueter with a left field single; it was Reynolds' sixth RBI of the game. Riggs then got a base hit into center field to score Reynolds.

Shade and Reynolds both had three hits for the game. Riggs went four and a third innings for the win, striking out 10.

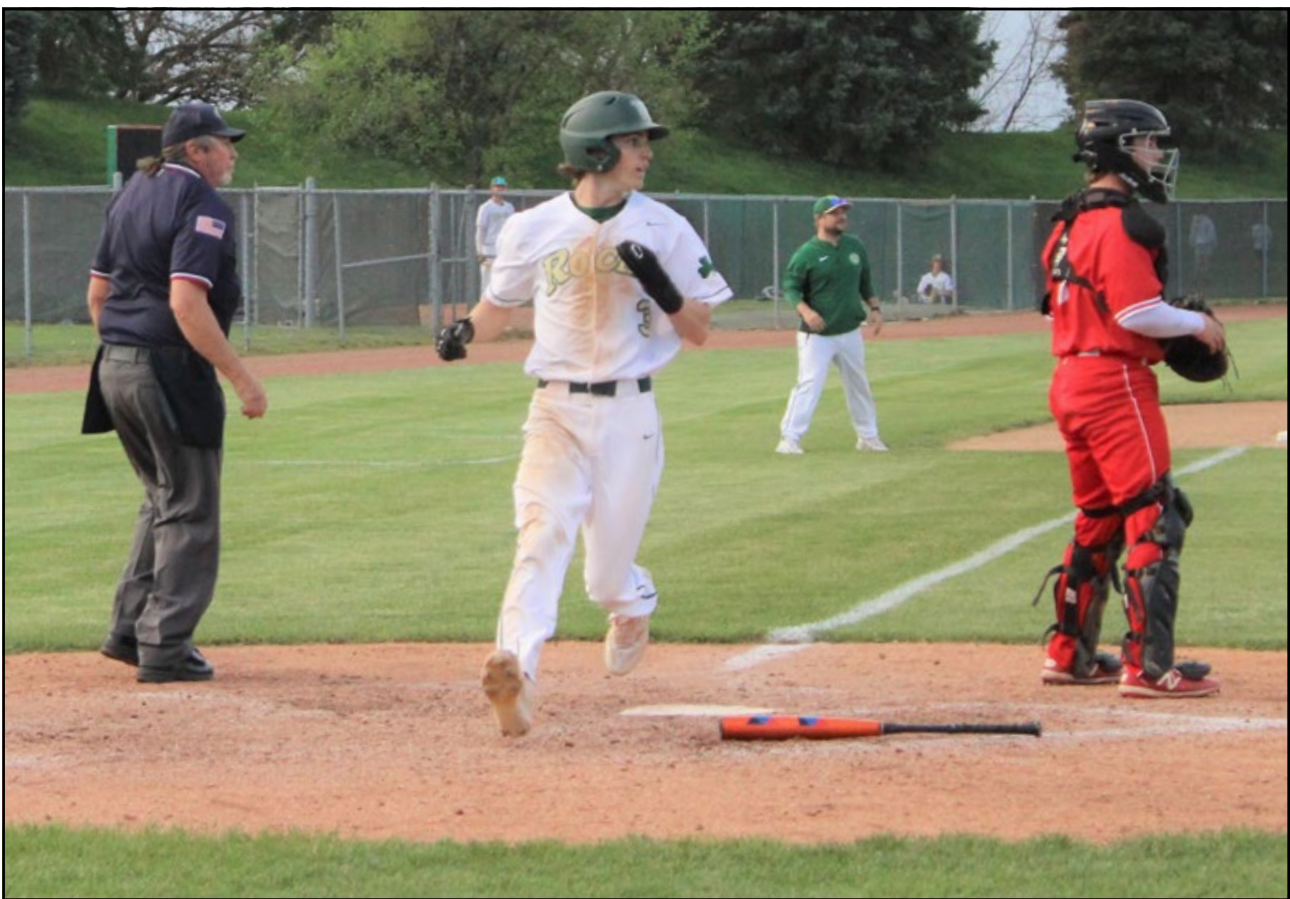
Noblesville is 5-1 in the conference and 10-3 overall. The Millers travel to Columbus North on Saturday.

Hamilton Southeastern dropped a tough game Thursday at Mount Vernon, as the Marauders won 5-4 in nine innings.

The Royals got on the board quickly, with three runs in the top of the first inning. Ty Bradle drew a one-out walk, then moved to second base on Griffen Haas' single. Cole Earlewine then stepped up to the plate, and smacked a center field home run to send everyone home.

Mount Vernon cut the lead to 3-2 in the bottom of the first. The score would stay there until the top of the sixth: Haas connected on a center field hit to score Bradle and give Southeastern a 4-2 lead.



Fishers wins, Southeastern & Sheridan fall on Thursday

The Fishers softball team got a 3-1 win at Yorktown on Thursday.

Yorktown scored its run in the bottom of the first inning, and held that 1-0 lead through four innings. Fishers got on the board in the fifth inning. Hannah Kinder drew a leadoff walk and was moved to second base on Kendall Jordan’s sacrifice bunt. Kate Murray then hit a left field home run, sending everyone home and giving the Tigers a 2-1 lead.

Murray homered again to lead off the seventh inning, sending another ball over the left field fence. Murray also got the pitching win, throwing five innings in relief with seven strikeouts. Brooke Johnson and Jenna Grubb each hit a double.

Fishers is 6-3 and plays Saturday morning at Center Grove.

Hamilton Southeastern dropped a 9-7 game to Lawrence North on Thursday.

The Wildcats scored a run in the top of the first inning, but the Royals answered with two in the bottom of the inning. Payton Fox doubled in Addy Justice for the tying run, then Morgan Hicks brought Fox home with a single.

Lawrence North tied the game at 2-2 with a second-inning run, then hit three RBI doubles to go up 6-2 in the third inning. Southeastern got two back in the bottom of the third: Justice got on base with a bunt, then moved to third base on Fox’s double, her second of the game. Justice scored on Jenna Chase’s RBI ground-out and Hicks hit a sacrifice fly to bring in Fox.

Both teams added three runs in the fourth inning. The Wildcats led 9-4 in the middle of the inning. Fox then smacked a home run in the bottom of the fourth, also scoring Lani Wyrick and Justice. Wyrick hit a double to get on base.

Fox and Justice both were 3-for-4 at the plate.

The Royals are 10-3 and play two games at the Whiteland Warrior Invitational on Saturday. Southeastern takes on East Central at 9 a.m. and Brownstown Central at 11:30 a.m.

Sheridan fell to Eastern 11-0 Thursday in a Hoosier Heartland Conference game.

Jacquellynne Bates had the lone hit for the Blackhawks. Sheridan is 1-9 and hosts Clinton Central on Tuesday in another HHC contest.
