Grandpa Howard was a humble preacher man, although he had great intellect.

He also farmed some. He told me the story of a wheat field he had examined. He said he had a field of wheat that looked very encouraging from the roadside, but upon

Likewise in the great field of humanity, he noted, empty heads may stand proudly erect, but those well filled are generally in-

My own chemistry professor at Purdue seemed humble despite his Nobel prize. "Ray," he told me, "half of what I tell you is wrong. I just don't know which half." I've used that admonition many times since.


Jackson Township has been in the Hamilton County Bicentennial spotlight this month, and this Saturday will be the final set of events highlighting the township, its communities, and its people.



From humble beginnings – a journey

My story is one of hope & faith, an abundance of gratitude, forgiveness - and above all, honesty.

Since emigrating from Iran in 1977 at the age of 16 with little resources of my own, I've enjoyed turning challenges into opportunities. Today I am a businessman, entrepreneur and philanthropist who never gets tired of giving back to my community. As a candidate for District 5 on Noblesville's City Council, I hope to be able to achieve better than I've been able to previously.

Initially landing in Bowling Green, Kentucky, I graduated with honors from Bowling Green High, then entered Western Kentucky University to complete my undergraduate work. After earning a multi-major degree in chemistry, animal science agriculture, and computer network engineering, I attended Medical School in the Dominican Republic. Upon graduating I returned to the States as a citizen, moving to Indiana in 1985. While my wife attended law school, I was busy building my first business as a computer consultant.

In 1990, I was a happily married 29-yearold with a two-year-old son. With both my construction company and my computer consulting firm's success – along with my wife joining a reputable firm, we thought that we had it made. And we did, that is until my wife's glioblastoma cancer diagnosis only six months after moving to Noblesville. It was during this time that I found Christ. Two weeks post-diagnosis, she underwent brain surgery and was subsequently placed in a coma for an extended period.

Our amazing community rallied around us even though we were newcomers. For over eight months, our wonderful neighbors helped to keep lunch and dinner on the table, daily. They were able to lend an ear or a hand whenever we needed one. Everyone suffers from a low point in their lives. Mine was during this period. Through paying for her treatments, we were quickly losing everything that we had built through our hard work and fortitude. Looking back, I can still distinctly remember the night that she was placed in a coma.

It was that very night that I made an oath to Christ. I promised to dedicate my life to paying it forward if he would just deliver me from my internal pain and angst. Almost immediately, I began to feel a sense of relief. Despite all our efforts, my wife passed away 16 months after her diagnosis. Our son, Abrahim, was now four years old.

Building From the Rubble

The Fall of 1992. I became employed with a local accounting firm, working 80 to 90 hours a week. Having all our savings swallowed up by medical bills, I was doing everything that I could to ensure that the financial woes that I was experiencing would never happen to me – or my family – again. With the help of an amazing person, Terri Zeigler, I was able to work as much as I could and help build us back up to where we needed to be. Terri, also being a believer in Christ, helped me learn how to walk closer

For the next three years, I could rely on Terri to help me in caring for and raising my son. Throughout the next few years, Abe and Terri formed an unbreakable bond. This led to love blossoming between Terri and I. We were married in 1996 and would spend the next eight years fervently attempting to expand our family. When all routes had been exhausted, we were overjoyed to adopt our newborn daughter, Ava, welcoming her home in June 2004. Terri has been my rock and I am forever grateful for her support, patience, love, and her understanding.

Up until the early 2000s, my main goal wisely, ensuring my family's future. With four love of architecture, history, and its preservation. In 1996, I participated in the renovation and preservation of Downtown Noblesville's Joseph Block Building – which now houses Matteo's Ristorante. Being involved in this project let me build on my love of historic buildings, but I was now hungry for more.

In 2001, I purchased the Model Mill building. I envisioned transforming this historic, yet neglected, space into a building the community could use and thrive on. After a three-year renovation project that included refinishing floors, replacing windows, carving out new spaces, adding modern fixtures, and so much more, I was able to quickly fill the space with tenants. Peterson Architecture was the building's architect and first tenant.

Keeping My Promises

I was ready and able to start paying it forward on a larger scale than I had been able to previously. Now a thriving business owner, I wanted to do more in the community that my family and I loved so much. In 2005, through a partnership with Noblesville City Hall, I acquired three historic homes. I concentrated on having them relocated and preserving their histories. The 2005 'Parade of Homes' was a memorable day for many Noblesville Residents. By the end of the event, the buildings were on their new lots, paving the way for building the new City Hall. During this pro-

and enjoyed getting to know them better. As the community and I grew to know and respect each other, I began to celebrate their successes, while also helping them identify their needs.

Early 2006, I helped form the SW Quad Neighborhood Association – promoting homeownership, as well as providing beautification opportunities, community events and neighborly camaraderie to those living in the SW Quad. We started neighborhood cleanup initiatives, along with beginning our annual SWQ Proud Heritage Picnic tradition. One of the historic homes from the 2005 move is now located on the corner of 8th & Walnut Streets. Not only was I, and still am, heavily involved with the residents that make up the Quad, I enjoy knowing that I've helped provide food for area residents in need, through my sponsorship of the Community Garden located there.

Learning to Adapt

The stock market crash of 2008 affected several of my companies, my business tenants and my plans - greatly. As tenants moved from the newly renovated Model Mill building, I was eager to find a more fulfilling purpose for the space. In 2013, I felt that I needed to do more for my community. God was calling me to make an even bigger impact. It was then that I decided to start giving others second chances. I began accepting applications from and interviewing those who had been offenders. They were model employees, who were eager to do a great job and were humbled to be employed when all others had turned them away. I've always believed that "Your past is your past. Learn from it, then leave it where it belongs ... in your past." I feel good, knowing that I have been able to change the lives of several of my employees. Sometimes, they just need someone to believe in them,

so that they can really shine as a person. **Continued Efforts**

Still feeling the rush of having a memorable impact on others, in 2014 I was searching for the one project that could create the biggest community impact. Having a close relationship with the three churches that I had helped plant, I wanted to help establish a faith-based ministry, concentrating on mental health and addiction. For years, I have watched good people fall into the grips of bad choices, poor mental health and sadly, also

cess, I became more engaged with the public, substance abuse and dependence. I wanted more for my neighbors. I felt that this issue needed some attention. This is when Hope & Recovery Centers, Inc was conceptualized. The plan was to create a faith-based ministry, serving those with addiction. I spent the following years networking with other service providers, observing the processes, analyzing the risks, and learning all that I could about how I could help address this need.

Through obtaining this knowledge, I worked with leaders in the field to create a program that addressed the needs of possible recovery center residents, helping to tackle their issues at the source. This faith-based program was broken down into several steps, being carried out over a two-year period. In the Spring of 2016, I purchased a church property at 2140 Greenfield Avenue. In doing so, I funded and managed an existing children's ministry located in that church. The building was leased to Legacy Church, who occupied it for the next five years. When their lease ended in 2021, the church relocated, and I was ready to carry out my next 'Act of Love' for Noblesville. 

Elwood woman wanted for scamming property renters in Fishers over Facebook

Hamilton County judge issues arrest warrant for Megan Stoner

Hamilton Superior Court 5 has issued an arrest warrant for a woman accused of scamming people by listing false rental properties on Facebook.

Megan Stoner, 25, Elwood, is wanted for a count of corrupt business influence, four counts of fraud, and four counts of theft, according to court documents released Wednesday. Six of the counts are felonies.

Court documents say Stoner allegedly scammed four people from September 2021 to December 2021 by either listing fake rental properties on Facebook or reaching out to people who had posted on the website they were looking for property to rent.

A Fishers Police Department investigation began in September 2021 after a police report was filed against Stoner for allegedly committing renter fraud.

According to court documents, Stoner listed a unit in a luxury apartment complex in Fishers for rent on Facebook. One person reached out, expressing interest in the unit, and, after touring the apartment, from Stoner.

The person told investigators that Stoner had given them four move-in dates, all of which Stoner canceled. After the fourth date was canceled, the person requested a refund. Stoner refused to give the refund, and, according to court documents, threatened to block the person if they asked for the refund again.

The person then filed a police report with the Fishers Police Department. In the following months, detectives spoke with three other people who had been scammed by Stoner in similar instances.

According to court documents, two of the people told officers that Stoner had reached out to them via Facebook after they made posts seeking out places to rent. Stoner replied to each person's respective post, listing a Fishers residence as available for subleasing.

Woman arrested for battery after parent reports abuse at Fishers day care

Court documents released Wednesday provided details into the allegations of battery at a Fishers child care

Molly Taxter, 23, a former employee of a child care center in Fishers, was arrested Tuesday on 19 counts of battery just over a month after a concerned parent reported their child was suffering from bruising, police say. On Wednesday afternoon, online records showed the Noblesville woman re-photographs to Taxter of the child's mained in the Hamilton County Jail on head injuries. a \$150,000 bond.

Department launched an investigation after a parent reported their child was suffering from a handprint bruise on her right leg after they came home from the Kiddie Academy child care center, 11703 Olio Road, a release said Tuesday. The parent immediately contacted the owner of the child care center and met to view the surveillance video from the classroom. Police say the video showed a child care employee physically abusing the child. The owner of the child care immediately fired that employee the same day.

The court documents released Wednesday provided additional detail. The surveillance video showed Taxter "shoving Juvenile Victim 1's head into the changing table, slamming her down, as well as covering her face with a blanket" on March 6. The girl later appeared to be dropped to the floor, and later picked up by one arm and dragged across a room to a "cubby." The girl is then shoved into a chair, and the chair is shoved so hard into a table that it moved forward.

In talking later with the owner of the child care center, Taxter said that

"she may have done it." Taxter said she was agitated and frustrated by the child's frequent crying. Taxter also told the owner that she'd worked at the facility for six years, was burnt out, and should not be working with kids.

Taxter later told a Fishers Police Department detective that she felt guilty for what she did, incidents happened.



Protesters gather East library policy

A small group of protesters gathered outside the Hamilton East Public Library's Noblesville location to protest the new "Collection Development Policy" and also show support for librarians.

The **policy** requires strict attention be given to nudity, alcohol and drug use, profanity, violence, and sexual content before children or teen sections. Books that do not meet the requirement will be placed in the adult section.

Library staff says there are approximately 18,000 items that will require review from the teen section and they estimate this will take 8,000 hours over the next year.

Kara Hwang, a Fishers resident against the new "Collection Development Policy," says since books are being moved from the children's and teen section into the adult section, they could be intermingled with books containing the same themes that the board was trying to protect them from.

"It seems like the solution is worse than the problem because kids are going to be perusing books that are actually written and intended for adults," Hwang

Protesters say this is a waste of time and money for the library. Staff is requesting three permanent full-time staff members

Indiana lawmakers advance mandatory notification of students' pronoun changes

Indiana lawmakers have signed off on a measure to require teachers to notify parents if students want to use a name or pronoun inconsistent with their gender at birth.

House Bill 1608 was approved in the House 63-28 on Monday after the Senate on April 10 approved the measure 37-12. Gov. Eric Holcomb will now decide whether to sign the measure.



Deadline fast approaching to apply for largest tennis scholarship in the Midwest

The deadline to apply for the Kevin Minor Legacy Fund – the largest tennis scholarship in the Midwest – is fast approaching. The Kevin Minor Legacy Fund will award a female tennis player younger than 14 with \$5,000 for training and travel.

The deadline for entry is Monday, May 1.

Kevin Minor was a leading figure in the Chicago tennis community who spent much of his life guiding and supporting young tennis players throughout the Midwest.

Bryan Smith, the director of high performance at Pearson Automotive Tennis Club in Zionsville, has been a tennis coach for over 25 years. During that span of time, he saw families struggle to pay for the sport.

"We've seen parents have multiple jobs. We've seen parents go into debt," Smith said. "That's when Kevin would do his best to help."

One of the people who tion ranking knew Minor best is his daughter, I-Team 8's Jasmine Minor. Jasmine says her father coached her and her sisters to become average of 3.0 or higher Division I tennis players.

Brienne Minor, Jasmine's sister, won the NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championship in 2017. She says tennis is an expensive sport.

"A lot comes with it like paying for flights, hotels, tournaments, rackets, clothes, shoes," Brienne explained.

Jasmine echoed that sentiment, adding that money can put a barrier on who can play.

"Between the ages of eight and 18, a parent is going to spend an average of \$300,000 per player," Jas- nounced by June 1.

mine said. "Brienne would be in Canada playing a tournament, I'd be in Florida, and my older sister would be in California all at the same time. Who's paying for all those flights, hotels, the tournament fees to sign up? It's expensive."

The Minor sisters agree that they had a fantastic support system in their father.

To honor him and continue his legacy of helping others, they started the Kevin Minor Legacy Fund to award a deserving female athlete a scholarship.

"The Kevin Minor Legacy Fund is all about giving affordability and accessibility to other young female athletes," Jasmine said. "This means a lot to us because \$5,000 is a very big deal for any player to have. We want to make sure we really pick someone special for this."

"Kids eligible for the scholarship should send us a little two-minute video explaining why they love tennis and what it means to them," Jasmine said.

Brienne said, "This fund can really make a difference in someone's career. So, I think as a family, we're going to sit down, go through all the applications, and see who is hitting the criteria and who is in the most need of the scholarship fund."
