I was able to try a new summer drink, the Smores Latte, which has tones of chocolate, toasted marshmallow, and a surprise flavor of gingerbread for the graham cracker kick one needs when eating a smores. This latte is as sweet as Michelle and is perfect for a summertime stroll down the sidewalk. A new summer menu item will be bubbling out soon: the Green Pomegranate Bubble Tea with Kiwi Pearls, which is sure to be a fun drink for the whole family. If you're looking for a bite to eat, try the top-selling breakfast sandwich, The All Americans. Consisting of American cheese, an egg, and bacon that rests on top of your choice of an English muffin or a bagel, it'll be sure to have you at the first bite. As one of the regular customers was leaving the cafe, she told Michelle, "You've got a lot of stuff going on in this little place!" And she's right. 
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

Judge rules Noblesville school shooter to remain in Madison County Jail

The Noblesville school shooter will remain in jail in Madison County, where he is accused of punching a female jail worker while serving time as a juvenile.

A juvenile court judge Wednesday ordered on the shooter, whose name has never been publicly released, to remain in jail until a dispositional status is reached in the case. This could happen through a trial or a plea, the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office confirmed to News 8.

The shooter faces a felony count of battery on a public safety official. He is set to appear in court June 30.

The case will remain in juvenile court, as the incident happened while the shooter was still 17 years old. He turned 18 earlier this year.

The Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office says a psychological evaluation may be ordered between now and the time of the disposition.

The male was sentenced in the fall of 2018 for shooting classmate Ella Whistler and teacher Jason Seaman at Noblesville West Middle School on May 28, 2018. He remained in juvenile detention until a judge allowed his release earlier this week; he was then transferred to the Madison County Jail.





Indy Bard Fest's production of Angels in America stands on its own

Ten years of producing a Shakespeare Festival is no small feat. Adding to that accomplishment by producing both parts of Tony Kushner's Angels in America: A Gay Fantasia on National *Themes* is an act of tempting the very Fates themselves. Part One: Millennium Approaches, as seen on opening night at the Howard L. Schrott Center, proves the effort a worthy one and the grasp almost meeting the reach.

Indianapolis Bard Fest is celebrating the 25th Anniversary of Tony Kushner's epic work by producing Parts One and Two in repertory. This column deals exclusively with Part One, which tells several stories over its three hours-plus run time.

Kushner weaves an amazing number of themes into this first work, crossing the experiences of being gay in America with religion, politics, family, and most directly, the AIDS epidemic of the 1980s.

The main characters confront homophobia in all its forms, including internalized. Their stories are quite specific, but Kushner spins them in ways that feel very familiar. The story of Pryor Walter and his partner Louis facing the horror of AIDS is told in tandem with that of Joe Pitt and his wife Harper, their relationship on the and feel for these ordinary verge of destruction from people in extraordinary cir-

uality and Harper's increasing withdrawal into a world of Valium-induced fantasy.

Oh, and there's the angel's appearance at the climax of the story.

If it sounds dense, it is. But the artistry of the writing and the performances make it engrossing. It is a play so unique in structure and style that a synopsis can never do it justice. Director Glenn Dobbs has assembled a brave and committed cast, tasked with both plays and (for most) multiple roles. They are uniformly strong. Jay Hemphill, Joe Wagner, Chris Saunders, Miranda A. Nehrig, Allen Sledge, Matt Anderson, Nan Macy, and Afton Shepard combine to make you think and laugh Joe's realization of his sex- cumstances. These are all lematic at times, with mi-



performances that will stay with you. Additional support is provided by "shadows" played by Lucy Fields, Eli Robinson, Jeff Goltz, Scott Fleshood, and Kelly Keller.

On Opening Night, several technical aspects were still works in progress. The sound was especially probcrophoned actors suffering from occasional distortions. Scene changes and sound cues need tightened. Even so, the cast keeps the audience focused.

Bottom line: I could say that you should see this play because it is a rare production of an amazing and important piece of literature, disservice to the production itself. Beyond a few quibbles here and there, Bard Fest has mounted a good production and it can stand on its own. Go see Part One, and I'll bet you leave hungry for Part Two!





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LGBTQ advocates say Westfield mayor told staff to delete Pride posts

LGBTQ+ advocates in Westfield say Mayor Andy Cook instructed city staff to take down the Pride Month post from city social media after it was posted on June 1.

"I heard him say that he was the one that said it needed to come down," said Alisha Hunter, the president of Westfield Pride and chair of Gay Lesbian Straight Education Network Central Indiana, or GLSEN. "That it was his decision to pull it down."

Hunter says she was present for a conversation with Mayor Cook about the post.

"I walked up and asked him why he didn't think it was appropriate for the city to show LGBTQ+ residents that they are safe here, belong here," Hunter said. "He got angry and put his finger in my face and was raising his voice, (saying) that I was making comments that are untrue.'

Jennifer Hill is the secretary of both Westfield Pride and GLSEN of Central Indi-

By DANIELLE ZULKOSKY ana. She calls the move disappointing.

"He told some people he was not originally aware of it being posted and that it was the communication team (that) brought to his attention," Hill said. "He told them to take it down. That was really, really frustrating and disappointing."

Hunter and Hill question why other things are posted on the city page such as a prayer breakfast for first responders or posts celebrating Black History Month and Earth Day.

"I think he should say what he really means and not try to label it as a social issue," Hunter said. "I think he's opposed to the LGBTQ+ community and he should just say that."

"To me, that says he's not supportive of the community," Hill said. "He does not want to show that message that was up there."

The cities of Carmel and Fishers posted in support of Pride Month. The City of Noblesville has not posted as of Monday night. Mayor Cook's office has not responded to multiple requests for comment.

The Indiana application for Pharmacy Benefit Managers is now live and all Pharmacy Benefit Managers must now apply for licensure. Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBMs) are third party companies that offer pharmacy benefit management services and function as intermediaries between health plans and pharmaceutical manufacturers. The

In 2020, Indiana passed SEA 241 (IC 27-1-24.5) Indiana requiring PBMs to obtain Code Title 760, Article 5: a license issued by the Indiana Department of Insurance (IDOI). The act gives the IDOI commissioner the authority to adopt rules to set forth provisions for licensure and financial requirements, application and renewal fees, pharmacy link to the application can claims audits, maximum al-

for violations for PBMs. Administrative Pharmacy Benefit Manager Standards became effective is available on the IDOI March 22, 2023, and includes the requirements for licensure.



Carmel's Jessica Remm is one of two Alfred University softball players named to the Division III Softball All-Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) the Empire 8 Pitcher of the Team.

Remm was named as an All-ECAC outfielder. She became the third Saxon in a row and fourth in school history to be named an Empire 8 Rookie of the Year, joining Meghan Neto (Miami, FL/Doral Academy Charter) and Mya Wells (San Ramon, CA/California) in the streak. Remm was fourth in the Empire 8 with a .411 batting average, totaling 58 hits and a conference-high 44 RBI. The 58 hits for Remm are the fourth-highest total in a single season in program history for Alfred University, while her 44 RBI ties for the third-highest mark. She was responsible for 13 doubles, by DeSales University, two triples, and two home Farmingdale State, Springruns this spring for the Saxons.
