

with a top cross piece for the use of a cripple; a prop, or support to aid persons who are unable to walk without assistance. Grandpa Howard told the story that while he had no actual need for such equipment, he wanted to own a crutch for defensive purposes.



School children played a game in which two groups were stationed in two lines some distance apart. One feature of the play was to catch the boy as he ran between the bases and give him three pats on the back. A certain crippled boy deftly warded off opponents with his crutch, which gave Grandpa the incentive to make one for himself.

The available material consisted of a broomstick and a short piece of wood about two inches thick for the top. An axe and the hammer were the tools at his disposal. Attempting to make the circular cap-piece, Grandpa held the wood in one hand and the heavy axe in the other. The result was a very bad cut on the back of his left hand. His mother used flour and bandages to stop the bleeding; a doctor dressed the wound and placed his arm in a sling. Naturally left-handed, it became necessary to learn to write with the well hand.



Grandpa said it'd been a constant reminder that many attractive, unnecessary things are too costly.

A crutch within itself is but it may reveal the hidden strength of the user. The little crippled boy was hobbling home from school children. Recent rain had caused a muddy place in the road. The boy in crutches was offered help, but he bravely said, "No, I can make it."

William Wilberforce, an imminent statesman, had a

serious physical handicap – so serious that when he was a boy, his parents thought of his future with many misgivings. His career was a striking illustration of the soul's triumph over terrible odds. He exercised great influence over his fellows, and the way in which he championed noble causes made him one of the great moral forces of his generation. Frail and misshapen, a dwarf in body, Wilberforce was a giant in mind and







Postpartum depression is described as unpleasant emotions, sadness, and/ or anxiety at any time between the first few weeks to a full year after the birth of a new child. Although more common in women because of the significant physical changes associated with pregnancy, nearly one in 10 men experience depression. postpartum Whether it's the first child or the fifth, it's important to check on the wellbeing of new fathers during the newborn phase.

The root causes for the symptoms may be different between mothers and fathers as well. While women often experience physical changes that can trigger symptoms, men often experience the pressure of new responsibilities and the need to "stay strong" for the mother, who had to go through the journey of pregnancy and childbirth, and the new child. These feelings of being overwhelmed, ing with household chores, unprepared, or unequipped may lead to feelings of failure. This can continue to grow into severe depression if they don't have an outlet to be vulnerable and share their feelings.

they are not alone if they experience these feelings. While reports indicate that one in 10 men experience depression, postpartum there is limited testing and with postpartum reporting in men, so the true number is likely to be much higher. One reason this condition escalates is that men often avoid discussing their feeling or don't have a supportive environment in which to do so. A spouse, family member or medical provider can provide an outlet for men to express these feelings and feel more comfortable about seeking care.

If you are a family member, spouse, or a friend of a new father, there are other ways you can help to relieve some stress for fathers. First, pay attention to their behavior, mood and activity levels and keep an eye out for any drastic changes in their mood that could be signs of postpartum depression. Offering practical support, such as helpmaking the family dinner, or even watching the baby for an afternoon might seem small, but offering a break from these tasks can reduce stress. It's also important to encourage fathers to main-

tain any social connections, hobbies, or other interests outside of parenting as an outlet to relax.

While fathers might be resistant to help at first, professional support and treatment may be necessary to treat postpartum depression. Sometimes the process of just getting started can be overwhelming, so offering to do some research on providers or even scheduling an appointment for fathers can be a helpful push in the right direction. Encourage fathers to talk with their healthcare provider or mental health specialist about their symptoms. A little support may be all they need to begin to feel better and enjoy their new addition! Finally, let new fathers know that their feelings are valid and that you will be there to support them through the ups and downs of parenthood.

How to avoid scams when booking a hotel online

If you are planning an **upcoming trip**, keep an eye out for hotel booking scams. BBB Scam Tracker has received multiple reports of travelers falling victim to lookalike websites. Always confirm you are on the right website before making hotel reservations.

How the scam works

You search for hotels in the city you plan to visit. Among the top search results is what appears to be

an official hotel website or out that you weren't on the on the hotel's official weba legitimate travel booking agency. When you click the link, you find a website with professional photos from the hotel and reasonable

Everything looks norroom. You enter your credit card information and check out. However, when you review your credit card statement, you notice you've been charged a much higher rate than you agreed. It turns

official hotel website after all. You accidentally clicked on a third-party site without affiliation with the hotel.

One consumer reported this experience: "I was redirected without knowing mal, so you decide to book a it to a 3rd party website ... which looked like the hotel website. I made what I thought was a reservation for two nights. But when I got the email confirmation, I saw that I was charged almost \$1,000. I was immediately concerned and located the ACTUAL hotel, and they said that there is no reservation under my name/email mean it's legitimate. Watch and booking number which out for high-ranking ads that doesn't even line up with the scammers could sponsor. format that they use."

When you contact the company to cancel your reservation, you may not be able to get through to anyone. And even if you do, they'll likely tell you you've made a non-refundable reservation. The best they can do is cancel your reservation and charge you for it anyway.

How to avoid hotel booking scams

 Only book hotels through official websites. The best way to avoid this kind of scam is to check and double-check you are on an official hotel website before you enter your credit card information. Scammers are pros at building fake lookalike websites to fool you into giving up your information. Look closely at the URL to ensure you are

· Only make reservations through secure websites. You'll also want to ensure websites and their payment pages are secure, meaning they start with https:// and display a padlock symbol. If a web page isn't secure, don't enter your personal information and close the tab.


· Watch out for misleading ads. Look at search results carefully. Just because a website is the first result on the page doesn't

Search for reviews on third-party websites and keep a close eye out for reports of scams. Never share your personal information with a person or business until you know they are trustworthy.

Sen. Todd Young salutes Alice Sanger on Flag Day

On Flag Day, U.S. Sen- much of it in her own hand. ator Todd Young (R-Ind.) spoke on the Senate floor about the legacy of Alice Sanger, who was born in Massachusetts and moved to the first woman to serve on a president's staff in the administration of President Benjamin Harrison and helped establish the celebration of Flag Day.

Sen. Young's full remarks appear below.

I often speak of Hoosiers whose service, patriotism, and sacrifice capture the spirit we celebrate on civic holidays. For Flag Day, however, I rise to share the story of a Hoosier who did not merely embody the occasion – she helped establish it.

And she made history

Alice Sanger played such an important part in Benjamin Harrison's presidential campaign in 1888 as a stenographer that he made her part of his presidential staff. So, Alice left her Indianapolis home for Washington, woman ever to serve on a President's staff.

The historic distinction doesn't quite capture the breadth of Alice's service to the president and the nation. Neither did her title of "clerk" or contemporary reporters' descriptions of her, which often dwelled on her looks and clothes.

Let me share with you Flag Day. what this "clerk" did in the White House.

A renaissance woman who was skilled with a paintbrush and had an ear for muat 200 words a minute without a single misspelling.

She had a discretion seldom seen in Washington and was known as a "jewel of secrecy" in the White House. Not only did she type President Harrison's annual address to Congress, but she was given sole responsibility of safekeeping it until it was Coolidge recognized Flag sent here to the Capitol. During the late 19th Century, no woman's signature was better known in America.

In 1893, after losing his Indiana as a child. She was bid for reelection, Harrison left the White House. But Alice remained. She was so essential to the Executive Branch's function, that the new president, from a different political party, Grover Cleveland, asked her to stay.

In 1894, she moved over to the Post Office Department, which was then a cabinet level agency. She was no less indispensable there.

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




Elwood police shooting involved Noblesville man carrying lighter shaped like gun

A Noblesville man has been charged with burglary and criminal confinement, and the Madison County prosecutor on Tuesday cleared the police officer who shot the domestic battery suspect of any wrongdoing.

Dakota Mc-Creary, 26, also faces charges of domestic battery resulting in moderate bodily injury and theft, the prosecutor says.

An officer on Friday night shot McCreary after he pointed a light-

er designed to look like a McCreary to "drop it!" and handgun at police who'd been searching for him after a domestic violence report earlier in the day in Elwood.

The Madison Coun-

ty Prosecutor's Office on lice bodycams' footage of the incident that happened about 6:30 p.m. Friday in the Madison County city of 8,400 people. Elwood police just be-

fore 3 p.m. Friday received a domestic violence report from the 1300 block of South L Street. McCreary fled into a nearby wooded area when police arrived. Several police agencies began searching for him.

About 3-1/2 hours later, a citizen reported to Elwood Police Department seeing McCreary in the 1200 block

> Elwood Officer Keegan Russell arrived to find McCreary holding what appeared to be a handgun. Russell radioed dispatch that the McCreary was "pointing something in his hand.'

The county prosecutor

bodycam video showed Russell returning to the cover of his police commission and aiming his department-issued rifle at McCreary. Russell gave eight separate verbal commands

McCreary

"put it down!" McCreary responded with "no!" and other expletives and yelled shoot him because he was "not going back to prison."

The prosecutor says video from multiple bodycams showed McCreary continuing to advance on Russell and other officers while pointing the apparent firearm, and Russell then fired two rounds, striking McCreary at least one time. Russell gave more verbal commands for McCreary to drop the weapon.

Officers gave McCreary medical aid until medics arrived and took him to Ascension St. Vincent Mercy in Elwood, from where he was airlifted to Ascension St. Vincent Hospital Inof South J Street. Police ar- dianapolis. It was not im-



mediately known Tuesday whether he remained hospitalized or was jailed.

Investigators learned the apparent firearm was a lighter intended to look like a gun.

Madison County Prosthat officers would have to ecutor Officer Rodney Cummings said in a statement clearing the officer who fired his rifle, "Russell was confronted by a fleeing felon who appeared to be armed with a deadly weapon and pointed that weapon at law enforcement. Officer Russell gave eight separate verbal commands for Mc-Creary to drop the weapon

and he refused to comply with the officer's lawful orders and continued advancing at officers while pointing the weapon. Under any reasonable application of the law to these facts, Officer Russell's use of deadly force was justified under the law as self-defense and the defense of others."

Online court records show an arrest warrant was issued Friday for McCreary out of Hamilton County on a felony charge of failure to return to lawful detention.

No other injuries were reported in the police shoot-






