Last Thursday, June 15, the STARTedUP Foundation's sixth annual Innovate WithIN State Competition took place at Butler University.

The 2023 Innovate With-IN state competition first place winner is Clean Line, made up of Nathan Dierckman and Makayla Phillips from Carmel High School.

Clean Line focuses on solving the issue of catheter infections. CAUTIs (catheter associated UTIs) affect almost 600,000 people per year and kill about 16,000. Clean Line is a screening tool to detect and treat symptoms before they arise. 





# Night shift heroes roll six deep at our Sheriff's Department

In the early morning hours of May 4, shortly before 1 a.m., the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department Patrol Division Nights B Squad was having a roll call meeting when their shift supervisor, Lt. Brian Niec, became ill, collapsed, and went into cardiac arrest.

The squad members' training kicked in they jumped into action, assessing the situation and starting lifesaving measures - establishing an airway, providing chest compressions, and using an AED. They continued this while other squad members radioed dispatch to start medics for the cardiac event. They were able to revive Lt. Niec, and medics with Noblesville Fire Department transported him to the hospital.

Biodiversity is a term which describes every living organism within a single ecosystem or habitat, including plants, bacteria, animals, fungi, and humans. HCSWCD is looking for photos that exhibit and/or promote the rich level of biodiversity Hamilton County has and has had over the last 200 years.

# History of Arcadia's Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Psi, Part I

Phi Beta Psi, Delta Chapter

As Hamilton County celebrates its bicentennial, plans are underway in Arcadia for a centennial celebration in September for Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Psi Sorority.

### **Chapter beginnings**

Delta was installed as the 15th chapter of Phi Beta Psi on Sept. 6, 1923, with the sponsorship of Pi Chapter in Kokomo. The founding members were Bonnie Karr Hill, Harriett Walker King, Frieda Drumm, Grace Gwinn, Nelle Ryan, Martha Gwinn Cox, and Helen Sowers Rodenbeck. Perhaps someone in our area currently can claim relationship to one of these ladies!

After installation by the National Sorority, Delta Chapter held their first meeting on Sept. 10, 1923, and elected their first officers. At this time, each chapter was expected to pay \$35 a year to the National treasury. Nowadays each member pays \$35 a year. In October 1923, this small group initiated five new members and were now 12 strong.

The National Phi Beta Psi organization started in February of 1904, two years after JCPenney was founded, which means our sorority is older than the Boy Scouts of America, Feb. 8, 1910; Kiwanis Organization, Jan. 21, 1915; and the American Legion, March 16, 1919. We are a philanthropic sorority whose National Project is Cancer Research, which was adopted in 1941. Since that time, we have donated \$11,057,853 to research doctors all across the country.

Please note that every penny given to our National Project goes to cancer research. There are no upfront costs – it all goes to cancer research!

Another project in Delta's first year was the showing of a movie Mighty Lak' a Rose at the Bee Pint theater in Arcadia costing them \$22.50: \$7.50 to rent the theater and \$15 for the film. Delta's ninth meeting as a chapter of Phi Beta Psi was, of all things, a slumber party at Frieda's house! By 1925, they had 15 members and seven inactive members.

In 1926, this young chapter of Delta hosted the first Indiana State Convention. Since Arcadia had no hotel, the sisters made use of their friends' homes for all the delegates. Everything went well until a bad storm came through which knocked out the electricity all over town. There was nothing to do but use candles.

In the fall of 1927, the Arcadia girls branched out to include girls from Cicero and Tipton. This growth led to Theta Delta chapter in Tipton being installed in May 1930. Delta became a mother!

When the 25th anniversary of National Phi Beta Psi was celebrated at the National Convention in Ohio, Frieda Drumm was again honored by being Grand (Natl.) Treasurer after having served as Grand Inspectress the year before.

### **The Great Depression**

Financial standing of Delta during the Depression was much the same as the country in general. For instance, on Jan. 2, 1934, there was \$14.99 in the treasury. However, lack of money didn't hinder the enthusiasm of Delta Chapter. They'd been building a Scholarship Fund for a while and \$150 \$50 to another.

### Duke Energy upgrades grid to help improve service in Carmel

### The REPORTER

Duke Energy is strengthening part of its electric grid in Carmel to improve reliability and reduce power outages.

The company is making upgrades to 14 transmission poles from its Homeplace Substation on East 111th Street to East 116th Street near Car-Central Park. mel Wood poles are being replaced by steel poles that are stronger, more

reliable, and about five to 10 feet taller than the existing poles.

In the next few weeks, crews will begin work to install temporary construction access and clear vegetation in the utility easement prior to the pole work. These practices are approved by internationally recognized tree care associations. The easement must be clear of vegetation to allow for safe access during construction and safe operation of the line once energized. Duke Energy has been working in partnership with local officials on work that will take place on municipal property.

After the easement is cleared, construction will begin to install the new transmission poles. Customers may see electric utility equipment in the area of the line improvements, including utility bucket trucks, utility pole setting equipment, and specialized material handling equipment. While work is underway, the Interurban Trail between East 116th Street and Central Park Drive East will be temporarily closed. The project is expected to conclude by the end of the year.

'This important work is part of a smart, multi-layered energy grid improvement strategy to help improve electric reliability and resiliency and strengthen the electric grid against severe weather and other impacts," Duke Energy Government and Community Relations Manager Mark LaBarr said. "Making the right investments today means that the energy grid customers and their families depend on will be better, more reliable and more responsive in the future."



But this time I took it a step further and questioned why this happens – this billing for paid accounts. The spokesman said he understood my concern and that sometimes the bills go out before all the claims have been paid by insurance. "And you know that this is often the case?" I said. He said yes. Then I asked about what really concerns me. How often do people who receive a bill like this go ahead and pay the bill, not realizing or understanding that it may be in error. He didn't have that information, so I asked to speak to a supervisor. I was put on hold. A very nice gentleman soon came on the line, and I posed the same set of questions to him. He told me that there indeed are a few people who do remit a payment, and then it is discovered that insurance covers the bill or a portion of it. He went on to say that many people do as I did and call in to question the billing. When I asked about why their billing practice is set up that way - where so many bills are sent virtually in error, he could not say. Either he did not know - or literally could not tell me. So, dear reader - when you receive a medical bill for something you have doubts about - maybe it would be a good idea to call the number on the statement and find out if you owe anything at all. I might add that I have a feeling that the folks who pay and then are covered soon after, may not get a repayment in quick order but I don't know that; it's just a feeling.

But the question is - why DO I get a bill? And, more importantly, what do other people do when they get one that they shouldn't have to pay?

These bills always arrive with a good number of options to remit the full amount. Pay over the phone, pay online, send a check using the envelope provided. Interestingly, there is never a section that says - if you question this bill, please contact us at xxx-xxx. There is a section on seeking help, but that is for seeking help to Pay The Bill.

My routine upon getting this type of mail is to call the payee and clear the ledger. This usually amounts to me questioning it and the rep on the phone saying, "Oh yes, Mr. Klingenmeier. That has been taken care of by your insurance." Case closed. But it's a minor hassle to have to do this every time - if for no other reason than to be sure it HAS been taken care of.

I will say that it is usually only one of the local hospital companies that creates this problem - by billing before they have received all insurance payments. In fact, I would say it is typical of the company. When I called

His career was a striking illustration of the soul's triumph over terrible odds. He exercised great influence over his fellows, and the way in which he championed noble causes made him one of the great moral forces of his generation. Frail and misshapen, a dwarf in body, Wilberforce was a giant in mind and soul.

# Dad set the bar of success too high

In 2019, I toured the mammoth Toyota Motor Manufacturing Indiana (TMMI) plant in Princeton, Ind.

How big is TMMI?

It took a moment for their purpose to come into my mind's focus.

Lockout-tagout boxes.

I lost my breath.

Lockout-tagout is a safety procedure used in industry to ensure that dangerous machines are properly shut off and not able to be started up again prior to the comple- he accepted a generous severance package tion of maintenance or repair work. The boxes support the procedure.

They save lives.

Their sighting came as a happy surprise, leaving me with one thought: Dad.

The green boxes were a customized version of the Saalman Safety System Group Lockout/Tagout Box that my dad patented as a sideline business in 1992.

I remain in awe of him for having the wherewithal to bring his idea to fruition. Even though at that time he was earning union wage at an aluminum plant, it would have been very easy to stick with the status quo and avoid a financial risk that might or to major beer breweries, huge Canadian



might not earn him enough money to be his own boss one day.

My parents never took money lightly. When they married, they were poor. A shotgun wedding in 1962 (both wedding bands totaled \$40). A big move from Tell City to Jasper to find work. When I was born in 1964, we lived in a cinder-block house adjacent to a back alley in Tell City, the home the size of a two-car garage - if that.

Dad convinced Mom that he was onto a good idea. As a lifelong machinist and maintenance employee who serviced large machinery, he knew how important his box would be to the safety of U.S. workers.

In 1998, at 53, as a major strike loomed, that promised lifetime healthcare benefits, a feature that proved very valuable when Mom was diagnosed with stage four colon cancer in 2016.

His box was featured in major safety catalogs. The safety companies faxed and emailed purchase orders to him. When the orders became too much to handle, Mom traded in her restaurant hostess job to become Dad's office manager. She forwarded the POs to a plastics plant that produced the boxes. The boxes were shipped to steel, aluminum, borax, and boron mills; to power plants, chemical plants and oil refineries;

Saalman Safety System was a momand-pop shop serving business behemoths. Its business model was so simplistic I doubt the term business model was ever even spoken between my parents. Their only overhead: a computer, a fax machine, a printer, a desk, all placed in my childhood bedroom. It was a consistent cash cow that I wish I could've milked.


I kidded myself that I would take over the family business one day. Ultimately, I lacked the courage (and money). When Mom's cancer zapped her energy, they sold the business to an interested outsider. Dad was too involved in his own machine shop (Saalman Machine and Tool being another dream achieved) to effectively keep up

I had a general idea of Saalman Safety System's success, though I must confess that the boxes really meant nothing more to me than a growing number of multi-colored thumbtacks on a world map in my childhood bedroom. But not until the TMMI tour was I able to see Dad's boxes actually being used within a major manufacturing arena. Suddenly, Dad's box became real. Finally, the magnitude of my dad's dream, his contribution to worker safety, and my parents' courage and business savvy hit home.

At TMMI I came to terms with the fact that I am a son who'll never be as successful as his old man. Dad set the bar too high, as heroes often do. From my arms, though, there sprouted goosebumps of a very proud son.



tal labor. This is not to be confused with emotional labor.

Arlie Hochschild AMY SHANKLAND talked about emotional labor in her 1983 book, Perfectly Imperfect The Managed Heart:

Commercializations of Human Feeling.

In a November 2018 Atlantic Magazine interview, Hochschild stated, "Emotional labor, as I introduced the term in The Managed Heart, is the work, for which you're paid, which centrally involves trying to feel the right feeling for the job. This involves evoking and suppressing feelings. Some jobs require a lot of it, some a little of it."

Mental labor, or the mental load, involves the many - and extremely varied - tasks that are involved in managing a household and/or workplace. This topic has exploded over the past few years, especially for women.

I wrote and published a book on the mental load in early 2020 called Lighten Your Mental Load ... right before the pandemic hit. Not the best of timing. Because of this, not many people read it. But it has tremendous value and I'd like to share tips from it in the weeks and months to come in this column.

As stated in an October 2017 Washington Post article, "The constant stress of trying to stay organized - and to remember to execute so many tasks every single day – is affecting women's relationships with their spouses, children, friends, and colleagues. They are experiencing mental, emotional, and physical fatigue trying to stay on top of it all."

An online Business Wire graphic featured in my book summarizes the situation well. Female breadwinners often run the show at home and at work. Seventy-one percent manage family finances, 70 percent register their kids for extracurricular activities, and 34 percent handle home maintenance.

Yes, many times the mental load is carried by women. However, I know some men have it as well. My brother Mark is one of them. I interviewed him for my book to get a picture of one of his typical days.

Mark captures all his "to dos" every morning. He not only worked in the insurance industry, but owned his own business called Expo Design. Here's what Mark had on his list for the day in his Florida home when I spoke with him a few years ago:

Being a dad is the most important thing I'll ever do in my life. I love my four-year-old daughter with all my heart, and I receive more joy from being with her than anything else I do.

### III. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

The Project involves the development, design, construction, procurement of FFE (furniture, fixtures, and equipment), for the full operation and maintenance of the new Events Center and Parking Garage. The location of the Events Center and Parking Garage must be in the City with a preference to a location east of State Road 37 and in proximity of exit 210, Finch Creek Park, and Hamilton Town Center. The Parking Garage must be located adjacent to the Events Center. The City currently contemplates that the Project will include:

• Offerors should also submit proposals for the operation and management of the Events Center, under guidance from the City. Operation and management proposals should assume that the Events Center will be used as the home court for a G-League basketball team and the G-League team will need the facility for around 40 days per year. Operation and management proposals should emphasize the revenue generation expectations and community benefit considerations of multi-purpose uses that are anticipated to be viable for the market and project features.

• Commitments from a selected offeror partner to provide minimum taxpayer contributions, revenue guarantees, risk share provisions, and related deal structure nechanisms that protect City interests in this community investment.
