#### Aspire Indiana Health receives \$2M grant for mental health crisis stabilization unit

Aspire Indiana Health is one of 15 Indiana Community Mental Health Centers (CMHC) to receive a state grant for mental

recovery. The \$2 million will be used for the planning of a Crisis Sta-



Aspire will use the funding to plan the creation of a Hamilton County CSU including examining existing models, meeting with community partners to identify needs, gathering data including identifying the best possible location and partnerships, and researching screening tools.

CSU, so we will be doing our due diligence by meeting with different agencies across the nation who are already providing this service to find the approach that will best meet the needs of Hamilton County," said Beth Eiler, Aspire Vice President of Behav-

bilization Unit (CSU) in Hamilton County. CSUs, also known as crisis centers or drop-off centers, are community-based, short-term facilities that provide stabilization services for people in need of urgent care related to mental illness, substance use disorder or both. They are designed to help some of the most vulnerable Hoosiers and relieve overburdened emergency response infrastructure including hospital ERs.

"There are many different models of ioral Health Services.

The grant cycle totals \$76 million from the Indiana Family and Social Service Administration's Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA) and comes from funding from the National Opioid Settlement and the federal American Rescue Plan Act.







# Carmel citizen concerned for city's financial future

One Carmel citizen reached out to The Reporter recently with concerns about Carmel's financial future as well as his inability to get sufficient documentation from the city to do his own research. Mike Shaver appeared at the Monday, June 19 meeting of the Carmel Common Council to ask council members for the transparency many of them have promised when running for office.

At issue is a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for records on Carmel's financial report, which at least one council member has indicated both exists and which shows that the city's revenues are sufficient to repay its accumulated debt.

According to the United States Department of Justice FOIA guide, "A category of documents particularly likely to be found exempt under the deliberative process privilege is 'drafts,' although it has been observed without much analysis that such a designation "does not end the inquiry." It should be remembered, though, that

the very process by which a 'draft' evolves into a 'final' document can itself constitute a deliberative process warranting protection. As a result, Exemption 5 protection can be available to a draft document regardless final version."

The City Attorney's statement to the council on email categorically confirms that Carmel has engaged a public policy where public documents are effectively

public simply by stamping them "Draft." Such policies are actually the opposite of the transparency promised by the candidates for office, including yourselves.

We respectfully trust that the dichotomy between the City Attorney's response denying transparency and the candidates' campaign commitments for "transparency" needs no further explanation. We hereby respectfully request that the City Council individually and collectively confirm your commitments to transparency by promptly releasing the requested fiscal plan documents.

We further respectfully request that the Council take formal action to end the City's policy of making documents secret simply by stamping them "draft." Again, such a practice is the antithesis of the transparency that was promised.

We are excited that your campaigns have embraced this need for change. Democracy cannot survive when public documents are rendered secret.

# Former player Shepherd returns to lead Indianapolis AlleyCats

# Cats hold off Detroit Mechanix, are 5-2 for the season

WESTFIELD - One of the original AlleyCats is now the top cat for Indianapolis' ultimate disc team.

Drew Shepherd returned to the AlleyCats this season to become head coach of the team, which is going through a pretty good season so far. Shepherd has led the 'Cats to a 5-2 record, including a tough win 20-19 over the Detroit Mechanix last Saturday at the Grand Park Events Center.

Shepherd played on the very first AlleyCats team back in 2012, and was an assistant coach and defensive coordinator for the team from 2014 to 2016.

"I was always a role player when I played," said Shepherd. "And I always felt like I was better at this. I have more fun doing this than I did playing.'

Of course, winning is fun. The 'Cats struggled to start the season, dropping their first two games to Atlanta 23-14 and to Minnesota 23-21. But they got going in their third game, traveling to Chicago on May 13 and winning 19-16.

"We had a really turbulent start to our season," said Shepherd. "And we have course corrected, and we have started playing just a little bit better every game."

That victory began a five-game winning streak. The AlleyCats then edged out Madison 22-21 at home before beating Detroit 21-15 on the road. Indy played its last two games at Grand Park, sailing past Chicago 26-17 on June 10, then holding off Detroit, which came close to ending a long losing streak before the 'Cats scored three goals in the last eight minutes of the

The AlleyCats, in fact, never trailed in the game. Fifty-seven seconds into the game, Joel Close sent a pass to Jason Kempe for the first score. The Mechanix would continue to answer each Indianapolis score throughout the first quarter, getting a

goal with three seconds left in the period to tie the game at 7-7.
