Did you pay for your neighbor to move here?

The City of Noblesville in cooperation with [MakeMyMove.com](#) and the Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC) is offering out-of-state families \$15,000 in cash and other incentives to move to Noblesville.

Last year, 15 families took advantage of the offer. City officials told The Reporter this year it will be 30 families, and the program should continue for four more years.

A recent *Los Angeles Times* article on one family's move to Noblesville shed some light on

this program, but also left The Reporter with several questions for city officials.

"In the first year in the program, the city had a goal of attracting 15 people/families – which we did," city officials told The Reporter. "We are in our second year with MakeMyMove and have increased the number to 30 people (45 total after two years)."

IEDC offers a matching grant for communities participating in this program. According to Noblesville, "the half from IEDC covers the administration/marketing side of the program. Our funds are used for the local incentives."

That means taxpayers already in Noblesville are paying the \$15,000 per new family who moves from out of state under this program.

There are other communities offering more than \$15,000 to lure new residents, but in Indiana, that is the top amount. Noblesville is tied with Floyd County for that level of incentivization.

What about Naomi?

Who's Naomi, you ask? Oh, my goodness . . . stay tuned. She has quite the story.

I have been speaking to various women's groups for several months about finding your calling at any age and maybe in places you never imagined.

I am absolutely giddy as I sit amongst a group of women listening to their chatter and, most of all, their laughter. Laughter indeed refreshes a weary soul. If the last three years have taught me anything, we need community. We need to find our tribe.

I talk about Naomi and her influence over Ruth in the Old Testament. During Lent, I read the book of Ruth and researched her, but my mind kept running into Naomi, her mother-in-law.

What about Naomi caused Ruth to leave her family and her gods to follow Naomi back to Bethlehem and to believe in Naomi's God?

You may be familiar with the scripture in Ruth 1:15, "Where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God." NIV

Naomi was the first desperate housewife. Her husband, Elimelech, and her sons, Mahlon and Kilion, died, leaving her with two Moabite daughters-in-law, Ruth and Orpah, and no way to support her or them in a foreign country.

Naomi packed up, and the three of them started on a journey back to her homeland of Bethlehem as the famine there was over. Maybe there would be family to help them in their desperation.

This would be about a 10-day journey and not an easy one as there were no Airbnb or Hyatt Hotels. Partway into their trip, she realized it would be best for her daughters-in-law to return to their Moab home. They would have a better chance of finding another husband back home.

After huddling in an ugly, out-loud cry moment, Ruth uttered those words in that scripture.

Naomi was transparent in her anger with God for taking away her husband and sons. She even wanted to change her name to Mara, meaning bitter. But . . . she still worshiped God and held onto her faith. Her faith as well as her transparency impacted the life of Ruth. If you follow the descendants after Ruth fell in love with Boaz and gave birth to Obed, who became the father of Jesse, who became the father of King David, you know

Making houses feel more like home

Volunteers from across America lend a hand in Hamilton County

CrossRoads Church at Westfield brought nearly 200 high school students and adult leaders from around the country to Hamilton County last week, June 18 to 24, to provide free home repairs for those in need. The Reporter spoke to CrossRoads Pastor Eric Lohe, a couple of the people who received home repairs, and some of the volunteers from across the country who came to help.

Lohe told The Reporter volunteers built wheelchair ramps,

constructed decks, replaced mobile home skirting, or painted the interior and exterior of homes for free to senior citizens, veterans, and families in need in the northern Hamilton County area. The participants were church students and their adult leaders who lived in a Westfield school building for a week and went out each day in groups of six to serve.

This program is offered in partnership with Group Mission Trips, a youth mission organization based in Ft. Collins, Colo.

The Reporter has been proud of our association with editorial cartoonist Tim Campbell since his first panel in our pages on July 4, 2022. Some weeks he makes us laugh. Some weeks he makes us think about things from a new perspective. Some weeks he does both.

Last November, he used his space in these pages to pay tribute to *Peanuts* creator Charles Schulz on what would have been Schulz's 100th birthday. That panel is on display this summer at the Charles M. Schulz Museum along with other artists' works in the Tribute Art Collection to be preserved as part of the story of Schulz's influence on modern cartooning.

While Campbell is rarely one to toot his own horn, we twisted his arm a little to ask for a few thoughts on how it feels to have his work included in a museum dedicated to one of his idols. His full comments are below.

Like most cartoonists, I was greatly influenced by Charles Schulz and *Peanuts*. While I never got a chance to meet him, I had the great fortune of spending some time with his widow, Jean Schulz, a few years ago at the

Charles M. Schulz Museum and Research Center in Santa Rosa, CA.

This past November would have been Charles Schulz's 100th birthday and like many cartoonists around the country I created a 'tribute cartoon' that appeared in The Hamilton County Reporter to mark the occasion.

Mrs. Schulz requested that my cartoon and others be donated to the Museum for preservation and I am beyond honored that my panel was selected to lead the Museum's Newsletter highlighting the

Shepherd's Center & United Way "Go All IN" for local senior citizens

Shepherd's Center of Hamilton County (SCHC), 1250 Conner St., Noblesville, has partnered with United Way of Central Indiana to "Go All IN" to meet the needs of Hamilton County senior citizens.

Thirty volunteers from Allied Solutions, Trans America, and Ivy Tech recently packed 60 care packages valued at \$35 each and delivered them to Hamilton County's financially fragile seniors. Care packages include personal care items that seniors are unable to get at a food pantry. They consist of toilet paper, soap, shampoo, paper towels, and other household items.

SCHC collects personal care items throughout the year and delivers them to low-income seniors each quarter. If you, your family, or your organization would like to donate care package supplies or participate in care package assembly or delivery, please contact SCHC Programs Director Lisa Albano at lisa@scfhc.org.

In addition to care packages, SCHC provides free resources to help Hamilton County seniors aged 55 and over to age in place with the dignity they deserve, as long as safely possible. SCHC facilitates this through five signature programs: Together Today, Reaching Resources, Community Caring, Counseling, and Guardianship. There is no wait time or fee for SCHC services regardless of income. For more information, call (317) 674-8777.

Former Noblesville Mayors Rowland, Redick & Ditslear to serve as grand marshals in city's Fourth of July parade

Noblesville Mayor Chris Jensen has announced that in celebration of the city's bicentennial, three familiar faces will lead the 2023 Fourth of July Parade. Former Mayors Mary Sue Rowland, Dennis Redick, and John Ditslear, who served a total of 32 years in office, will be the grand marshals on July 4.

"Mayors Rowland, Redick, and Ditslear had a profound impact on our community," Jensen said. "As Noblesville celebrates 200 years, it seemed like the perfect time to honor the previous mayors of our city as grand marshals. In 1990, Noblesville had a population of 17,655 residents. Their vision and leadership helped transform Noblesville into the ninth-largest city in Indiana and home to hundreds of new businesses and corporate headquarters."

Mary Sue Rowland (1988-1995)
Mayor Rowland improved the city park facilities and implemented a new sewage treatment plant. She created the Arts Commission and Shakespeare in the Park, which is the longest running event in Central Indiana. She was responsible for the Logan Street extension from State Road 19 to

River Avenue and restored the former post office into the Public Safety Building.

Rowland developed a plan to help the Old Southside Neighborhood recover after flooding and had a fire station built at Herriman Boulevard and Greenfield Avenue. She also led the restoration of downtown and created a community Thanksgiving dinner.

Rowland was given a Sagamore of the Wabash by Governor Evan Bayh and served on the Noblesville Common Council following her time as mayor.

Dennis R. Redick (1996-2003)
Prior to becoming mayor, Redick served 20 years as a firefighter. He revived the Fourth of July Fireworks Festival. Redick served on the executive committee of the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns. He also created a corporate campus for 146th Street on the city's southeast side.

During his tenure, Redick supported additional facilities, equipment, and salaries for public safety.

John Ditslear (2004-2019)
A veteran of the U.S. Navy, Ditslear moved to Noblesville in 1966 and was an active civic and community leader before becoming mayor.

Ditslear led the addition of several quality-of-life initiatives within the city, including Hamilton Town Center and the conservation of green space. The city expanded its trails system and added Dr. James A. Dillon Park, Federal Hill Commons, and purchased 200 acres for Finch Creek Park.

Ditslear oversaw the improvement and expansion of roadways throughout the city, including the introduction of roundabout intersections and the construction of 146th Street across Noblesville. Additionally, Ditslear improved the ability for

residents to volunteer and has increased community engagement. He currently serves on the Board of Public Works & Safety.

David Moss briefly served in a mayoral role when Noblesville was incorporated as a town in 1851. The first mayor of Noblesville was Edgar C. Wilson in 1887. Since him, 21 other men and two women (Patricia Logan and Rowland) have served as mayors.

The annual Fourth of July Parade through downtown Noblesville kicks off the city's July 4th festivities at 4 p.m. Participants are encouraged to incorporate the city's bicentennial theme into their parade entry. Registration to participate in the parade is \$25 (501(c)(3) nonprofits are not charged) and entries must be submitted by Wednesday, June 28. Forms are available at [NoblesvilleFireworks-Festival.com](#).

The parade kicks off the city's Independence Day celebration. The free Fireworks Festival will take place at Forest Park from 6 to 10 p.m. with The Flying Toasters performing on the main stage. The day will culminate with the annual fireworks show at 10 p.m.

\$32.5M investment coming soon to downtown Fishers

Downtown Fishers is getting a \$32.5 million facelift with a new District South urban village development.

The Fishers' City Council approved the agreement with Rebar Development last Monday. The development is set to bring office, retail, and residence space to underused buildings. Those spaces will include the 20,000 square foot corporate headquarters of The Annex Group, and will be well connected to the city's trail system.

There will be a four-story mixed-use building with seven micro commercial spaces, 38 loft residences, 44 apartment homes, and a civic plaza. The development will include a fitness center, café lounge, conference rooms, and a courtyard.

"District South will be a thriving urban village with a great mix of uses and direct connection to both the Cheeney Creek Trail and the Nickel Plate Trail," Rebar Development President Shelby Bowen said. "We look forward to this unique project continuing the smart and vibrant redevelopment of downtown Fishers."

The plan will bring over 80 full-time jobs to the area, and 40 additional full-time positions by 2028.

Construction for the development is set to begin in October and will be completed in 2025.

See what it takes to run Westfield Washington Schools by taking part in Shamrock Academy

With the motto “Educate, Experience, Engage,” Shamrock Academy offers parents and community members in the Westfield Washington School (WWS) district an up-close, behind-the-scenes look at what it takes to run a successful school district.

“The coolest part for me was that we got to go to each of the different schools,” said Ali Hoover. “They each have different personalities, and we got to learn about programs I wasn’t familiar with.”

In addition to having two daughters in WWS, Hoover also serves as PTO president and a substitute teacher at Maple Glen Elementary School. Now she can add Shamrock Academy graduate to her list of experience in the district.

“Being in Shamrock Academy offers a level of access to information and insight that you can’t get anywhere else,” WWS Director of Communications Joshua Andrews said.

As part of the Shamrock Academy cohort, Hoover met with around 30 other participants one morning a month from August to May in different buildings throughout the district. In addition to touring the schools for a first-hand look into the educational experience of students, they heard from those tasked with operating the facilities. They engaged

in dialogue with leaders like Superintendent Dr. Paul Kaiser, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Dr. John Atha, and Assistant Superintendent for Business and Operations Brian Tomamichel. They covered topics such as finances, security, technology, and more.

Participants also got to take part in hands-on experiences while they explored the ins and outs of school operation. A meal catered by the high school’s professional-level culinary team and a school bus ride with Director of Transportation Larry Johnson were among the favorites.

“The facilities are great, the programs are phenomenal, but I think we would all agree that none of it would be possible without our teachers,” said Matt McNally. “You can really tell that these people care not just about the kids but about the community.”

McNally, an airline pilot and senior vice commander of Carmel VFW Post 10003, has a son and daughter who have been in WWS for the past eight years. His son graduated from Westfield High School in May and will attend Ball State University to study sports media and production because of his experience in the media department at WWS with mass media teacher John Oestreich.

As a member of Shamrock Academy this past year, one of McNally’s fa-

vorite topics was curriculum selection.

“It’s a time-consuming, structured, very transparent process, and it’s amazing how much the parents are involved in the process,” McNally said.

He also felt that the data presentation by Director of Student Support and Counseling Services Kyle Miller and Data Specialist and Assessment Coordinator Carmen Carnes helped correct some confusion within the community.

“When our graduates hear something in conversation that they know isn’t correct, oftentimes, they will step in and give proper infor-

mation or provide additional context to the conversation,” Andrews said.

Along with fellow past graduates of the ambassador development program, Hoover and McNally will continue to build genuine relationships with school leaders and to partner on projects to share the vision and mission of WWS. They will often receive information before it goes out to the public and will be invited to share their perspectives and insights with the school board and district administration.

“The district has benefited from building strong relationships with our Academy members,” Andrews said. “Getting their feedback allows us to provide the community with even more transparency and clarity.”

Hoover encourages anyone who has questions about the school district to apply.

“If you are a person who likes to know how things work, it is a really great look behind the scenes at those major operations,” McNally said. “I honestly wish it was something that everyone could do.”

Moving into its third year, Shamrock Academy will see some changes this year, such as extended meeting times. While exact session dates will be announced before the final selection process, the

meetings will begin at 9 a.m. and end at noon to allow for more in-depth presentations and conversations.

Also new this year, participants will be expected to commit to school engagement by attending four additional events, one at the district level, one at the high school, one at the middle levels, and one at an elementary school.

Shamrock Academy is open to any Westfield resident or community member interested in learning more about the school system. To find out more and to apply for the 2023-24 cohort, go to tinyurl.com/Shamrock-Academy by July 1.

In order to qualify for this program targeting remote workers, applicants must:

- Be employed full-time and able to relocate while retaining their current position, or
- Be self-employed and able to relocate while retaining their current clients/portfolio
- Earn at least \$80,000 annually
- Be U.S. citizens
- Be 18 years or older
- Currently reside outside the state of Indiana
- Be able to relocate primary residence to Noblesville within six months

When asked what benefits Noblesville gains from

this kind of residential recruitment, officials told The Reporter the following:

In a nutshell, MakeMyMove helps to grow our population, raises awareness of Noblesville outside of the Central Indiana region and attracts high income wage earners that impact our economy and tax base.

Since COVID, remote working is on the rise. This program provides an option to those workers who want to live somewhere else because of the quality-of-life amenities instead of the proximity to their office. The program helps remote workers apply to relocate to a new location. This

program is open across the country, so our goal is to attract new people to Noblesville who would not have resided here otherwise. Applications are reviewed and those selected are extended an offer to relocate to Noblesville.

MakeMyMove estimates that 30 remote worker households that average \$100,000 income would benefit our community a total of \$2,138,780 in the first year (\$41,615 in incremental property tax, \$49,420 in incremental income tax and \$2,047,745 in incremental direct consumer output). After year five, that return-on-investment jumps to \$10,693,900.

With 15 people taking advantage of this offer last year and 30 by the end of this year, that’s an expense of \$675,000 so far. Since the city mentioned incremental returns on 30 remote workers after year five, that implies at least four more years of participation. That will bring Noblesville’s total cost for recruiting out-of-state residents to \$2.475 million.

In case you are wondering who pays for the coffee with the mayor part of package, we are told it’s the mayor’s treat and he personally picks up the bill.

that Jesus would eventually fall into the family line ... all because of Naomi and her faith.

We never know how living out our faith will affect others. Being real in saying we get angry with God is okay. We find this in Naomi’s story. It causes us to communicate more with Him. We eventually realize His ways lead us to a place where we know Him even more and see the beauty in how He works things for good even in the midst of our pain.

Naomi was brave as well as loving towards her daughter-in-law. She even told Ruth to take a bath! Read the story. That bath led to a beautiful romance between Ruth and Boaz.

We can find our calling from the early years of our grownup life into the vintage years. We just need to show up and love well.

At 94, my mother still loved people well and showed them who God was in her life. Her life was not an easy one. She had a few “Listen, God, this isn’t fair” moments. But she had an amazing relationship with

God. I’ve often said that my mother had a hotline to heaven.

My mother and Naomi had amazing stories of faith and how they lived it. They loved people into seeing who God could be in their life. They made a difference in the lives of those who knew them. It’s not in what you say but in how you show God’s love that gets the attention of others. And then ... they will be open to hearing what you say.

Your calling can be found at any age. Your calling can be right where you are and in what you are doing. It is not just in the pulpit or on the mission field. It’s simply making a positive difference in the lives of others.

Even a desperate housewife named Naomi found her calling. Maybe you have a Ruth in your life who needs to be loved and shown kindness ... but you might not tell her to take a bath.

Craig Ekstedt, for whom volunteers replaced the skirting, painted the exterior and repaired the roof on his mobile home in Sheridan, told The Reporter he found out about this program from a flier.

“We filled it out and next thing you know they’re here,” Ekstedt said. “They even coated my roof! The girl named Lizzie – she had to go to a soccer thing I guess this weekend, but she was up there all day. She was my hero that day.”

The Reporter found Delani, a young lady from Nebraska, finishing a new deck on a home in northern Hamilton County.

“The churches around my area were really just interested in helping people out around the United States,” Delani said. “I thought it

would be a great idea to join them. I really love God and my relationship with Him, and I felt like it would really grow if I did this and helped other people.”

While this is Delani’s first time volunteering for this program, she told The Reporter she believes she will continue to give her time and labor in years to come.

“I’ve learned a lot about how to use these tools, but also I’ve grown in my relationship with God,” Delani said. “I’ve learned that He works in crazy ways. This just feels like a really big important thing.”

Elizabeth from Chicago told The Reporter she heard about this program from her sister, who was involved last year.

“My church was pro-

moting it and offering if anyone wanted to join,” Elizabeth said. “Since I really love volunteering and helping out others, I jumped at the opportunity.”

Maddie from Missouri, who was working on the same project as Delani and Elizabeth, said she got involved when her boyfriend invited her to sign up.

“He had been signed up for about six months,” Maddie said. “And a spot opened up on the trip and I found out I was going about two weeks ago.”

Maddie, who said she is still seeing the young man who asked her to sign up for a volunteer program so far from home, told The Reporter she has always had a heart for service.

“I love this,” Maddie said. “I’ve always loved

helping others out. Just helping the resident and getting to know her has been probably one of my favorites.”

When asked what lessons she is going to take back home to Missouri from this experience, Maddie said it was, “Learning that you don’t have to travel to help out anywhere. You can do it from your own hometown. So just whenever you see someone in need, just help them.”

A funny thing happened on the way to the proctologist “Except . . .”

Which would you rather visit, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) office to renew your driver's license or a proctologist's office to get an exam?

A no-win answer either way, I know.

Recently, I had to do both, and believe it or not, I have my proctologist to thank for my new driver's license.

Let me explain.

At the BMV, I was asked to present two items to validate my Indiana residency before they would renew my license.

This proved more difficult than planned.

One document, a W-2, was approved, but when I presented my second item, an envelope that had been mailed to my house, my assigned BMV person shook her head and returned it to me quickly, as if we were in a heated match of Hot Potato. “Do you have something else?” she asked.

The last thing I wanted was to lose my coveted spot at the front of the line. It had taken 25 minutes to hear my number called, allowing me to proceed to the counter. “Can I run out to my car to see if I can find something else?”

She kindly agreed to hold my spot.

In the glove compartment, I found an Indiana Certificate of Vehicle Registration. It included my current address. It displayed the Seal of the State of Indiana. It was approved by the State Board of Accounts. Clearly, the document would be OK'd by a state-run license branch.

I re-entered the BMV, excitedly waving the Holy Grail of home address proof, then I handed it to her. She waved it off. Again, the headshake.

“We don't accept that.”

“You're kidding?”

She shrugged.



“But it's a vehicle registration approved by the State.”

“I'm sorry,” she said.

From behind, in the crowded waiting room, I heard an impatient, over-exaggerated clearing of throats. The 20-plus people awaiting the announcement of their numbers had just realized their extended BMV waiting room stay was all due to me.

“Can I go to my car once more?”

Again, I was granted a free pass. Had I dared to look at the people in the waiting room, I was certain to have seen 20-plus one-finger salutes and a collective stink-eye, all aimed at me. Technically, I had only experienced a second strike, but to them, I should've been called out already. It was the BMV, not baseball. I worried a riot might ensue.

My second return to the car was nothing short of sheer desperation. If an official, state-issued vehicle registration didn't pass the muster – the very same document, mind you, that had appeased a state police officer enough, on more than one occasion, to give me a warning instead of a speeding ticket – it was doubtful I'd find anything else to meet BMV protocol.

Just as I was about to concede defeat and drive away, I saw a piece of paper on the backseat floor. The word PROCTOLOGIST was typed at the top. A reminder about a dreaded medical exam. It included my current home address. I stared at the paper, then at the BMV entrance, then at the paper, then at the BMV entrance, trapped in a dance of glances and indecisiveness.

Last week I shared with you that I'm starting a new series in this column about how to lighten our mental loads. Unless you're a hermit living in a one-room cabin in the woods in the middle of nowhere, you must carry at least a little of it. It's called life, folks.

8. Vacations (yes, even these are filled with mental loads)

We'll work together to lighten the mental load through technology and other methods. I am literally going on the journey with you (again!) as I write this each week.

Up until about seven years ago, I thought I was doing OK with my mental labor. A friend of mine who doesn't have kids once asked me how I did it all. I simply replied, “I'm really organized!” Yes, I would have the occasional sense of feeling overwhelmed or weary. But most of the time I was able to keep all the balls in the air while I juggled tasks from day to day.

In November 2016, my mom was diagnosed with dementia after yet another fall. My two siblings and I had suspected something was wrong, but we weren't able to persuade Mom to get any help. This was the proverbial straw that broke the camel's



back. We hurriedly moved her from South Bend to an assisted living facility just five minutes from my Noblesville home.

The three of us divided and conquered her care. My sister Vicky lived in Florida, so she supported everything from a distance and did all she could for Mom when she visited. My brother stepped up and he handled Mom's finances and insurance along with his wife Janie. I can't express my gratitude enough that I didn't have to deal with THAT stuff!

I took care of Mom's day-to-day needs such as groceries; medication purchases; doctor, dentist, and eye appointments; and the general weird emergencies that typically pop up about once a month. I made sure we had some fun as well, of course! Having her here to participate in things like my son's choir concerts was a joy. I felt lucky to have had her with us until she died in April of 2022.

However, my mental load gradually got heavier because I became one of her caregivers. Thus, I was a little more... well... cranky. In the past I've not been one to curse often. That changed dramatically! I was ready for some changes like millions of others in the world.

Before we start this journey to lighten our mental load, we'll look at what got us to this point. How did we become a society with minds like computers with hundreds of tabs open?

We'll also talk about how not to add to other people's mental labor. We'll discuss the steps we must take to not carry much of a mental load in our retirement years – the period of life that is supposed to be easy and relaxing but is sometimes just as busy as our working years!

Finally, we'll talk about how to find time to relax, unwind, and take

care of ourselves more often to get a necessary break from that mental labor.

Before we begin, I'd like to thank the French Cartoonist commonly known as Emma for bringing the mental load to the world's attention a few years ago. When I first saw her comic highlighting it, I literally read it three times. In fact, she published a graphic novel on the topic at the same time, which I purchased.

It's been such an eye-opener to realize this is a problem facing people not just in the United States, but worldwide. According to the French Institute of Statistics, women are still devoting 25 times more hours to chores than men. It was almost a relief to see someone finally creating a label for what so many of us deal with every day.

It's like they say, you can't solve a problem unless you properly identify it. Emma's brilliance helped everyone get talking around the globe.

I'm ready to start this journey with you. See you next week!

Coursework designed to decrease turnover & increase leadership skills

Hamilton County is partnering with Ivy Tech Community College in Hamilton County to provide employees with leadership training as well as safety and compliance courses. The classes are designed specifically for Hamilton County employees and will be conducted during work hours.

"We wanted to develop training programs that close skill and compliance gaps within our workforce," Hamilton County Director of Human Resources Sheena Randall said. "These courses are designed to decrease employee turnover, help people grow their careers, and strengthen our workforce."

The free courses will offer a combination of hands-on training, theory, and project application and will only be available to Hamilton County employees. All participants will receive a Certificate of Completion and, in most cases, three hours of college credit.

"Fortunately, we don't have a lot of turnover at the county," Randall added. "But that also means we have an aging workforce. We need to start planning for success-

sion, to upskill our younger employees, and to build a pipeline for future leaders so they're ready to fill those gaps when they open."

Hamilton County has worked with Ivy Tech+ Career Link to help to create a semester-long Leadership Training Series that includes such issues as addressing poor performance, delegating with purpose, and resolving workplace conflict. Microsoft Office training will also be included.

Aspire Indiana Health receives \$2M grant for mental health crisis stabilization unit

The REPORTER

Aspire Indiana Health is one of 15 Indiana Community Mental Health Centers (CMHC) to receive a state grant for mental health and recovery. The \$2 million will be used for the planning of a Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) in Hamilton County. CSUs, also known as crisis centers or drop-off centers, are community-based, short-term facilities that provide stabilization services for people in need of urgent care related to mental illness, substance use disorder or both. They are designed to help some of the most vulnerable Hoosiers and relieve overburdened emergency response infrastructure including hospital ERs. Aspire will use the funding to plan the creation of a Hamilton County CSU including examining existing models, meeting with community partners to identify needs, gathering data including identifying the best possible location and partnerships, and researching screening tools. "There are many different models of CSU, so we will be doing our due diligence by meeting with different agencies across the nation who are already providing this service to find the approach that will best meet the needs of Hamilton County," said Beth Eiler, Aspire Vice President of Behavioral Health Services. The grant cycle totals \$76 million from the Indiana Family and Social Service



Administration's Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA) and comes from funding from the National Opioid Settlement and the federal American Rescue Plan Act. "Crisis receiving and stabilization services are critical to providing crisis services," DMHA Director Jay Chaudhary said. "Currently, too many Hoosiers experiencing a mental health crisis end up in emergency departments or county jails. These grants will help bridge gaps and offer a therapeutic and compassionate alternative pathway for individuals and communities in crisis." **About Aspire** Aspire Indiana Health is a fully integrated nonprofit health system serving central Indiana that addresses behavioral health, primary medical care, substance use disorders, infectious diseases, deaf services, veteran programs, abused/neglected children, and social drivers of health such as housing and employment. Former Golden Eagles state champ wins Amateur Championship trophy

Last year at this time, Connor McNeely was celebrating a state championship with the Guerin Catholic Golden Eagles.

McNeely got to pick up another big trophy last Wednesday. The Noblesville man won the Indiana Amateur Championship, which took place this week at the Pfau Course at Indiana University. McNeely scored a 211 over 54 holes, finishing two-under par for the entire tournament.

The 2022 Guerin Catholic graduate played great golf throughout all three rounds. McNeely began with a brilliant first round score of four under par 67, the lowest round by any golfer for the tournament. McNeely made three birdies and drained eagles on two holes, No. 9 and No. 16.

McNeely continued his solid form in the second round, where he carded an even-par 71, making three birdies. In the third round, McNeely held off a back-nine run by Lafayette’s Nic Hoffman, who briefly took the lead before McNeely moved back in front. McNeely also showed his mental toughness, shrugging off a double bogey on the 11th

hole by putting in a birdie on the 12th hole. He ran out the next six holes with pars on each one.

McNeely played golf for Butler University during his just-completed freshman year, but is transferring to the University of Cincinnati for this next school year.

Hoffman finished second with a 213, going even par for the tournament.

Another Noblesville man finished in the top three at the Amateur. Kenny Cook placed third with a 214 for his three rounds. Cook went under par for his first two rounds, carding one-under 70s each day. He made three birdies in the first round and two more in the second. Cook scored a 74 in his third round, also making two birdies.

Luke Prall, a Carmel graduate now playing at Purdue University, finished in a four-way tie for fourth place with a score of 215. Prall had a great first round, going three under with a 68, draining six birdies along the way. Prall was even par at 71 for his second round (three birdies), and scored a 76 in the third round (one birdie).

One more Noblesville

golfer finished in the top 10. Drew Shafer scored 73s in each round to finish with a 219, good for 10th place. Shafer totaled three birdies in the first round, four in the second and one in the third.




In its 38th year of honoring the nation’s best high school athletes, Gatorade announced last Friday that Ava Bramblett of Noblesville High School is the 2022-23 Gatorade Indiana Girls Soccer Player of the Year. Bramblett is the second Gatorade Indiana Girls Soccer Player of the Year to be chosen from Noblesville High School.

The award, which recognizes not only outstanding athletic excellence, but also high standards of academic achievement and exemplary character demonstrated on and off the field, distinguishes Bramblett as Indiana’s best high school girls soccer player. Now a finalist for the prestigious Gatorade National Girls Soccer Player of the Year award to be announced in June, Bramblett joins an elite alumni association of state award-winners in 12 sports, including Alyssa Thompson (2020-21, Harvard-Westlake School, Calif.), Mallory Swanson

(2014-15, Mountain Vista High School, Colo.), Heather O’Reilly (2002-03 & 2001-02, East Brunswick High School, N.J.) and Abby Wambach (1997-98, Our Lady of Mercy School of Young Women, N.Y.).

The 5-foot-11 senior midfielder and forward led the Millers to a 20-1 record and the Class 3A state championship this past season. Bramblett scored 17 goals and passed for seven assists, recording the lone tally in Noblesville High School’s 1-0 win over Carmel High School in the state final. Also the Indiana Soccer Coaches Association Player of the Year, Bramblett participated in the High School All-American Game in December. She is ranked as the nation’s No. 54 recruit in the Class of 2024 by PrepSoccer.com.

Bramblett organized a service project through Serve Noblesville to renovate local youth soccer fields. She has also volunteered as part of multiple fundraising campaigns to

benefit breast cancer research through the Megan S. Ott Foundation, and she has donated her time as a youth soccer and basketball coach. “Noblesville would not be the state champion without Ava,” said Frank Dixon, head coach of Carmel High School. “Although she had a great team around her, Ava was the straw that stirred the drink. She is a total team player.”

Bramblett has maintained a weighted 4.27 grade-point average in the classroom. She has signed a

Former player Shepherd returns to lead Indianapolis AlleyCats

Cats hold off Detroit Mechanix, are 5-2 for the season

WESTFIELD – One of the original AlleyCats is now the top cat for Indianapolis' ultimate disc team.

Drew Shepherd returned to the AlleyCats this season to become head coach of the team, which is going through a pretty good season so far. Shepherd has led the 'Cats to a 5-2 record, including a tough win 20-19 over the Detroit Mechanix June 17 at the Grand Park Events Center.

Shepherd played on the very first AlleyCats team back in 2012, and was an assistant coach and defensive coordinator for the team from 2014 to 2016.

"I was always a role player when I played," said Shepherd. "And I always felt like I was better at this. I have more fun doing this than I did playing."

Of course, winning is fun. The 'Cats struggled to start the season, dropping their first two games to Atlanta 23-14 and to Minnesota 23-21. But they got going in their third game, traveling to Chicago on May 13 and winning 19-16.

"We had a really turbulent start to our season," said Shepherd. "And we have course corrected, and we have started playing just a little bit better every game."

That victory began a five-game winning streak. The AlleyCats then edged out Madison 22-21 at home before beating Detroit 21-15 on the road. Indy played its last two games at Grand Park, sailing past Chicago 26-17 on June 10, then holding off Detroit, which came close to ending a long losing streak before the 'Cats scored three goals in the last eight minutes of the game.

The AlleyCats, in fact, never trailed in the game. Fifty-seven seconds into the game, Joel Close sent a pass to Jason Kempe for the first score. The Mechanix would continue to answer each Indianapolis score throughout the first quarter, getting a goal with three seconds left in the period to tie the game at 7-7.

The 'Cats took control in the second quarter with three straight goals. Colin Ringwood threw to Conner Henderson to put Indy up 8-7, then Ben Landry's pass to Jacob Fella got the AlleyCats up by two. Nick Hutton made a block to give Indy the disc back, then seconds later caught a throw from Xavier Payne. Just like that, the 'Cats led 10-7.

"We expected for our de-

fense to get a lot of blocks," said Travis Carpenter. The veteran AlleyCats player gave credit to Detroit, saying the Mechanix "did a really good job connecting on a lot of deep throws and a lot of difficult throws. And then whenever the deep throws weren't there, they were really patient."

Detroit scored the next two goals, but Indianapolis stayed ahead for the remainder of the half, leading 13-11 at the break. The AlleyCats were in control with their passing game, making deliberate and purposeful throws to get down the field.

Shepherd said one of the team's mottos is "take the shortest, most open look. And usually when you find yourself throwing somethings really high-risk, you might have had a teammate who has more open than that, but it's more fun to throw something really crazy or something really deep.

"So, it's just having the discipline to say, whoever is the most open, that's who we're going to throw it to. Is our passing better? Probably, but I think our selection is really the difference."

The Mechanix worked their way back into the game in the third quarter, scoring back-to-back goals to tie it up at 14-14. Just like in the first quarter, the 'Cats would score to take a one-goal lead, then Detroit would score to even things up.

"We've been saying all season long: Champions hold," said Carpenter. "Hold means that on offense, we score like we're supposed to." Carpenter said that the team "scored at a very high percentage tonight,

and I think that really helped carry us tonight."

Indianapolis finally broke away in the middle of the fourth quarter. Carpenter threw a goal pass to Keegan North with 7:19 left to put the 'Cats ahead 18-17. Minutes later, Carpenter struck again, throwing to Cameron Brock for a score, and Indy led 19-17.

Detroit answered quickly to get within 19-18, but Payne's pass to Jeremy Keusch with 2:48 left moved the AlleyCats ahead 20-18 and clinched the game. The Mechanix scored a goal with one second left, but all Indy had to do was put the disc in play, and it had the win.

"They really played a fantastic game, so we could make very few mistakes and survive, which is exactly what happened," said Shepherd. "So, I think us getting tested like this is great. It forces us to cherish every opportunity and not take for granted, thinking later on we won't want for those same opportunities back."

Keusch led the AlleyCats in scoring with four goals, while Rick Gross had three. North, Henderson and Brock all scored two goals. North led the assists with seven, followed by Carpenter, Payne and Close with two each.

Win streak continues in Madison

Indianapolis continued its win streak last Friday by beating the Madison Radicals 23-22 in an away game.

The AlleyCats battled with Madison in the first quarter and the first couple minutes of the second quarter before pulling

away. The Radicals scored the first goal, but the 'Cats ran off a streak of four straight scores to lead 4-1.

Madison came back to tie the game 5-5 by the end of the first period, then led 7-6 early in the second. But another four-goal binge pushed Indy ahead 10-7 and it never trailed again. A pass from Brock to North tied the game at 7-7, then after a caused turnover, Seth Gudeman sent a throw to Will Quigley for the go-ahead score. Hutton later made a block, then threw to Landry for a 9-7 lead. Payne assisted Fletcher Hare for the goal that put the 'Cats ahead 10-7.

The AlleyCats led 13-10 at halftime and 18-15 after three quarters. The Radicals continued to battle, cutting the Indianapolis lead to one eight times during the second half. But a last-second goal by Levi Jacobs on a pass from Payne sealed the win.

Brock, Lucas Coniaris, Landry, Keusch and Levi Jacobs all scored three goals against Madison, with Gross scoring two. North continued to dominate on assists with six, followed by Payne with four, Brock and Carter Hawkins with three each and Jacobs with two. William Wettengel made three blocks, followed by Hutton with two and Gudeman with one.

With the two victories the AlleyCats improved to 6-2 and are tied for first place with Minnesota in the American Ultimate Disc League (AUDL) Central Division. The 'Cats will play Madison again this Saturday at Grand Park, with the game beginning at 7 p.m.

Six Hamilton County players play in 2023 North-South All-Star Weekend



Executive Committee amends Four-Class Proposal, Tournament Success Factor adjusted

Both measures take effect in 2024-25

During its final meeting of the 2022-23 school year, the IHSAA Executive Com-mittee approved a rule that changes the way schools are classified in four-class sports.

The Executive Committee voted to amend the original rule proposal from the Indiana Interscholastic Athletic Admin-istrators Association (IIAAA) that would have changed how schools were classified in four-class sports by using fixed enroll-ment figures. Instead, by a 13-4-1 count, the Committee opted to maintain a per-centage-based system and adjusted it to a 20-25-25-30 ratio.

Beginning with the next reclassifica-tion cycle, Class 4A will include the larg-est 20 percent of schools, Class 3A will be the next 25 percent, Class 2A the next 25 percent and Class A the smallest 30 percent of schools. Since 1997-98, the rule has re-quired equally distributing schools (25 per-cent) among the four classes.

“The Board of Directors recognized the concerns brought to us by the IIAAA which were the enrollment gap in Class 4A and the smaller schools that were being moved up to a larger class without a significant enroll-ment change due to new member schools joining the Association,” said IHSAA Com-missioner Paul Neidig. “This change also addresses a desire for schools to be in the same class in baseball, basketball, softball, and volleyball but it also give us an oppor-tunity to adjust those percentages in the fu-ture if necessary.”

The next two-year reclassification cycle begins with the 2024-25 school year with the certified enrollment fig-ures reported to the Indiana Department of Education from the upcoming school year being used. Those will be released next winter. Additionally, classifying the four-class sports will be based on the en-tire membership total and not only those schools participating in a given sport ef-fectively keeping sectional alignments similar across each sport.

The original proposal had been sub-mitted by Neidig on behalf of the IIAAA but had been tabled by the Board of Directors for further study at its May 1 meeting and was brought back for action at today’s meeting.

Tournament Success Factor

Two proposals affecting the Tournament Success Factor (Rule 2-5) that had been tabled in May were also brought back for action.

A proposal from Board member and Barr-Reeve Principal Jeff Doyle was approved after being amended. New language requires that a school’s per-formance and points accumulated in a
