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














# Duke pitches in to help clean up Morse Reservoir

# Welcome to the Fairgrounds of the Future, Hamilton County

The Hamilton County 4-H Fair kicked off last Thursday morning with a groundbreaking at Centennial Pavilion. Numerous local officials and 4-H'ers took part in the ceremony, including Hamilton County Commissioners Mark Heirbrandt, Christine Altman, and Steve Dillinger, seen at right. Part of the three-phase, multi-million-dollar improvement plan will be the rebranding of the fairgrounds as "The Silos at 37 Hamilton County: 4-H Fairgrounds and Events Center." The Bicentennial Pavilion, scheduled to open late next year, will replace the O.V. Winks and Annex Buildings that will be lost to the expansion of Pleasant Street. The second and third phases of the project are contingent on funding and would include the construction of two silos at the main entrance. They would also include the demolition of seven outdoor buildings to be replaced by eight air-conditioned buildings that could be used year-round. Construction on Phase I is set to begin this fall.



Leveling at 30,000 feet after departing LaGuardia Airport, our jet was jostled. We represented nothing but a tubular chew toy in the jaws of a masticating, mythical sky beast. The plane's drop was

We bumped through the potholed heavens. I refused to look out the window, scared to see pilots' parachutes opening below us. I closed my eyes, rested my forehead on the back of the seat before me, and pretended to be riding on my old school bus which had rocked and rattled with similar violence via interconnected, potholed southern Indiana rural route roads in the 1970s. Recalling the bus brought comfort; we always arrived at St. Paul's Catholic Grade School alive. Suddenly, I was a 58-year-old fourth grader.

I feared the return of The Fear. The Fear, as in fear of flying. At its peak, my aerophobia produced hideous, full-body hives. My fear was so profound, I nicknamed it The Fear.

My job entailed infrequent domestic and international travel. I had to work hard picking apart the terror-based tethers of my earth boundedness to achieve the right stuff. I saw a professional therapist trained in Eve Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing

Zyrtec cured the hives. I learned to stop viewing an upcoming flight as an EVENT. Airplanes aren't events; they are modes of transportation taking me from point A to point B to point C (sometimes) and to point D (in cases of extreme global travel). The destination was the REAL EVENT. I learned to focus my energies on the reason for flying, not the actual flight. The more flying, the more I became comfortable with plane sound and movement, the calmer I became.

Never had an inflight incident warranted my worries. I never experienced a "near miss." No oxygen masks dropped. I actually helped talk firsttime passengers down from their perches of petrification. I came to recognize commercial air travel for what it really was: blessed mundaneness. Irwin Allen disaster movies no longer gnawed at my psyche. I embraced the boringness of the friendly skies. Yawning, I earned my feathers.




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

# From Babe Ruth to the big leagues, GC's Caleb Robinson is living the dream

If you ever watch a Philadelphia Phillies game and think the field looks beautiful, give some credit to a young man who once "lived" at the Noblesville Babe Ruth fields at Forest Park.

That would be Caleb Robinson. He started volunteering at Babe Ruth as a pre-teen, then became the head groundskeeper before graduating high school. Several years later, at age 26, Robinson is now the Manager of Field Operations for the Philadelphia Phillies.

Robinson talked with the Reporter during last week's Major League Baseball All-Star break. Before working for the Phillies, he got his first professional experience with the Indianapolis Indians, then spent a few months with the Boston Red Sox before heading to Philadelphia's Citizens Bank Park.

Robinson said the experience begins with his time with the Indians, where he worked for Joey Stevenson, the team's Director of Field Operations.

"I ended up liking it so much that I wanted to turn it into a career," said Robinson. "He got me in contact with other people in the industry, so that led to my Boston internship."

The origins of Robinson's career date back to 2008, when his father joined the Noblesville Babe Ruth Board of Directors. At the time, Robinson was 11 and begin

# Guerin Catholic's Jeff "Doc" Franciosi inducted into Indiana Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame

To many student-athletes and colleagues over the past 39 years, he's been known as

Last month, Jeff Franciosi got a new title: Hall of Famer.

Franciosi, a longtime athletic trainer and teacher in Hamilton County, was inducted into the Indiana Athletic Trainers Association and Forte Orthopedics in Indianapolis.

"I'm very humbled, but very excited to promote our profession," said Franciosi.

Franciosi has been the athletic trainer at Guerin Catholic for four years, and had previously been the trainer at Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers for 10 vears. He started his athletic training career at Noblesville High School, where he spent 24 years. Franciosi has also been a teacher at Noblesville for nearly four decades - he will be entering his 39th year teaching at NHS this fall.

Franciosi has been an athletic trainer for a long time, which is unusual for the business, since he said trainers are always "the first to arrive at the school and the last to leave at the end of the game." So why has he stayed so long?

"It's a passion just to being on the sidelines," said Franciosi. He also said there's a "sense of accomplishment when you can get an ACL kid or a kid that's been hurt for a while, and you can get them back on the field and they excel. You're a part of their success by being the athletic trainer."

Franciosi also loves his teaching position. He came to Noblesville right out of graduate school from Indiana State – his first job out of col-

lege in 1985 after getting his Masters in Athletic Training. He got his undergraduate degrees at St. Joseph's College in 1984, in physical education and health.

Having been around so long, Franciosi has seen quite a few changes. The obvious one is how technology has evolved over the years, and how it has helped get student-athletes back on the field quicker.

As for the classroom, Hall of Fame on June 22 at Franciosi said that teaching Franciscan Sports Medicine has become more hands-on over the years. A good example would be his sports medicine class.

> "We'll do a project out of clay, and build a knee, and the kids watch an ACL surgery," said Franciosi. "And then they get to work in groups to do an ACL surgery on a clay knee that they made. So that's really fun.

"I talk about kids having what I call 'Oh!' moments. They're like 'Oh, I get it!" And once they get it, that makes me feel good as a teacher. That's huge when they do that."

Franciosi noted that the education part of sports training has increased over the years. He spent four years at St. Joseph's College before advice, you got to be able to going to grad school, then tell the kids what not to take took his certification test.

"Now they're making kids go four years plus two," said Franciosi. "You do undergrad, like in exercise science, and then you take an athletic training program that's going to take you another two years. "So, a lot of the stuff we do is preventative, so with nutrition and what to take, and energy drinks and protein shakes and things like that. And so we have to be very astute at that. And then obviously first aid, immediate care, concussion knowledge we need to have, and heat illness knowledge we need to have."

"I am going to keep going because I still love it." said Franciosi. "I like walking in the classroom every day and I love being on the sidelines Friday night. My wife always says, 'Even if we didn't have a game, you'd go to the sidelines and you'd watch anyway,' and I said 'She's probably right.'

"And I appreciate my family so much, my wife understanding the time commitment. She's been awesome. She's a personal trainer and owns her own business. A fitness business. It's called Franciosi Fitness. Makes it simple."

Franciosi is the third Hamilton County trainer to be inducted into the IATA Hall of Fame. He joins Linda "Dee" Mahoney from Westfield (2018) and Jan Clifton-Gaw from Hamilton Heights (2020).



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
