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WHS Robbie's Hope Club draws attention of FLOTUS

As part of a series of back-to-school visits, First Lady of the United States Dr. Jill Biden and Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy visited Westfield High School last Wednesday to discuss the importance of prioritizing students' mental health.

A few years ago, WHS student Zoe Milewski found out through social media about an organization called Robbie's Hope which was founded by Kari and Jason Eckert in 2018 following the death of their

15-year-old son to suicide. The word HOPE stands for "Hold On Pain Ends."

As there was no mental health club at WHS at that time, Eckert took the idea to her friends, Analiece Emigh and Nora Flickinger.

What began as three sophomores meeting together has grown into a club that, in its first meeting of this school year, welcomed 100 students.

Though the now international organization is headquartered in the Eckert's home state of Colorado, Kari has previously spent time in Westfield, speaking at the Robbie's

Hope Gala. She came to Westfield on Wednesday to meet privately with Biden, Murthy, and about 20 members of the WHS Robbie's Hope Club who welcomed the guests wearing lavender T-shirts that read "It's OK to not be OK."

Now seniors, Emigh, who is the club's current president, Milewski, Flickinger, and Elyse Menzel gave a brief overview of how students involved in Robbie's Hope at WHS are working to fulfill the mission of removing the stigma surrounding teens

Health Department provides over two dozen AEDs to cities & towns

In an effort to support emergency response in public spaces, the Hamilton County Health Department will provide more than two dozen Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) to the cities of Carmel, Noblesville, and Westfield and the towns of Atlanta, Cicero, and Sheridan.

The AEDs will be strategically placed along popular trails and parks, ensuring a swift response in the event of sudden cardiac emergencies.

"Sudden cardiac arrest is a leading cause of death in the United States, and immediate access to an AED significantly improves the chances of survival," Health Department Administrator Jason LeMaster said. "Having AEDs readily available in high-traffic areas, particularly on public trails, in city parks, and near schools can save lives during those critical moments before emergency medical services arrive."

The initiative started when the City of West-

field and the Westfield Fire Department launched a crowdfunding campaign to purchase AEDs for its parks.

"Our parks and trails continue to see increased usage and it's important that residents are equipped with the tools they need during a medical emergency," Westfield Welcome Director Kayla Arnold said.

The Hamilton County Health Department responded to Westfield's request and has since provided each of the communities with \$20,000 to install public accessible AED stations. The money comes from carryover funds from an education-related workforce development grant and will be administered

through interlocal agreements. Those agreements had to be approved by the Hamilton County Council, which was an easy decision for Councilor Mark Hall.

"I'm living proof that AEDs work," said Hall, who coded during a heart catheterization in 2004. "I was lucky that I was in the hospital and under the care of medical professionals at the time, but so many others won't be. These devices literally save lives."

The AEDs will be housed in climate-controlled cabinets known as a SaveStations, which can tolerate extreme weather and will be monitored 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Use of the devices does not require specialized training.

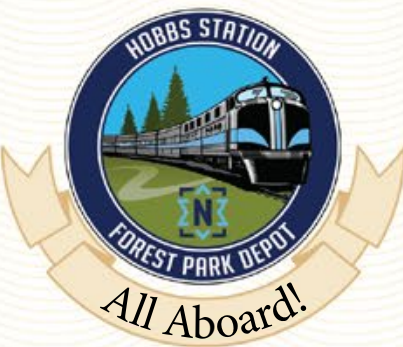

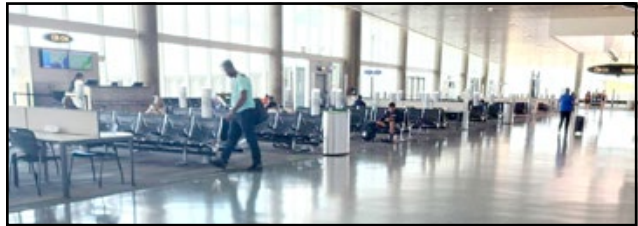

through the cabin, she told the sweet lady she had to put her cane in the overhead. Then, the tug-of-war began. This lady was holding onto that cane for dear life.

The attendant explained it was a hazard and might fall and trip someone. I gently took hold of my row mate's arm and told her I would make sure she got it back at the end of the flight. She let go of the cane.

I went back to reading my book. Shutting my eyes for a few moments about an hour into the flight, I was awakened by loud music. The man by the window had turned on a movie, and the music began blaring. I'm not sure what happened to his earbuds, but my attention was drawn to the screen on his phone from where the music was coming. He quickly turned over his screen, but not before I caught a glimpse of what he was watching. I saw a girl doing a bit of dancing ... on a stripper pole. I'm not kidding.

As we were landing, I asked the lady where she was going. She said home but didn't know where that was, only that she had been away for a long time. I so wanted to hug her. I made sure she got her cane after we landed.

Purple Heart recipient George Stavropoulos of Fishers will be honored at national tribute event

A local Purple Heart recipient has been chosen as one of the nation's 2023 Purple Heart Patriot Project honorees.

U.S. Navy Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class (HM2) George Stavropoulos of Fishers will represent his fellow Purple Heart heroes as Indiana's representative at a multi-day tribute to the courage and sacrifice of America's combat wounded.

The Purple Heart Patriot Project is a program of the National Purple Heart Honor Mission. The all-expenses-paid trip includes visits to the U.S. Military Academy

at West Point, historic Washington's Headquarters, a special tour of the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor and other unique tributes.

Asked what he would want younger Americans to know about his service, HM2 Stavropoulos said, "My service taught me the meaning of commitment, discipline, sacrifice for others, teamwork, and pride in what you do."

Originally from Los Angeles, Calif., George Stavropoulos enlisted in the

1967 and suffered additional wounds in May 1967 as a result of a mortar attack. He suffered additional wounds, including a gunshot wound and shrapnel wounds, on July 2, 1967, during a large ambush at the beginning of Operation Buffalo.

Along with his Purple

Heart with three bronze stars, HM2 Stavropoulos was awarded numerous medals and commendations during his service, including the Silver Star Medal, the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with device, the Good Conduct Medal, and more.

Married to his wife, Patricia, Stavropoulos continued serving his community as a member of law enforcement with the Newport Beach Police Department before becoming a DOJ investigator. When not serving his fellow veterans as a member of the Fishers Armed Services Commission, he enjoys golfing and watching football.

talking about mental health challenges.

"I think all of us here today have struggled personally or know someone who has struggled personally," said Emigh.

Regular club meetings focus on building peer-to-peer relationships. In addition, the WHS chapter holds an annual Save A Life Walk in the fall and a gala in the spring. In 2022, the club's first gala raised \$14,000.

Robbie's Hope so that she could speak to and hear from approximately 80 students.

"In the stories I am hearing from you today, there is so much resilience," Biden said. "In this school, you can feel that there is a sense that people can share their stories and get help."

She further encouraged the students to share, publicly or through written notes, anything they thought she should know or should work on.

Senior John Wickam talked about how it needs to be normalized for teens to reach out to mental health professionals and adults who can help.

"It's not our job to fix each other," Wickham said. "I would rather protect your life than your secret. That is the goal."

Other students spoke openly about social media promoting eating disorders, the unique struggles of queer teens, and how students need help learning to recognize and communicate their feelings.

"We are here because the youth mental health crisis in America represents a defin-

ing public health challenge of our time," Murthy said.

In the state of Indiana, according to the CDC, suicide is the second leading cause of death for teens.

Murthy discussed the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act passed in 2022 which allocated \$1.7 billion to mental health care, including in schools. Westfield has benefited, receiving \$400,000 from grants such as Project AWARE (Advancing Wellness and Resiliency in Education) and Stronger Connections.

"What it will take to address the mental health situation in our country is nothing short of a movement," Murthy said.

Robbie's Hope provides that movement of teens across the U.S. who aim to cut teen suicide rates in half by the year 2028.

"We're changing lives, and we have an impact not just in our school but in our community, and that means a lot to me," Emigh said.

Her father, Peter Emigh, gave credit to school leaders and counselors who have helped turn "compassion into action."

WHS Assistant Prin-

cipal Kurt Frederick, who served as the panel moderator, joined WHS Principal Alicia Denniston, Westfield Education Foundation Executive Director Ashley Knott, and others in expressing their appreciation for having the first lady and surgeon general take time to visit Westfield.

"We tell our students all the time, 'Your voice matters,'" Frederick said. "And this was the perfect opportunity to show them that."

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Fishers Health Dept. launches restaurant grading scale

Diners in Fishers will soon be able to see the letter grade their favorite restaurant received from city health inspectors.

The Fishers Health Department began posting letter grades on restaurant doors last Friday. Grades must be displayed on the exterior door of all Fishers restaurants by Sept. 30.

The new retail food inspection grading system for Fishers restaurants was approved by the Fishers City Council last November and was put into effect during 2023 restaurant inspections.

After inspections, restaurants receive an A, B, or C letter grade based on a 100-point scale.

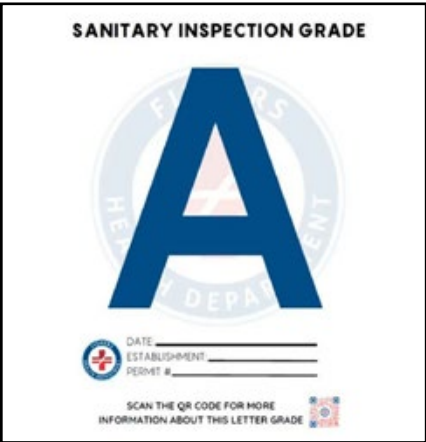
“Although a popular program in cities around the United States, this is not something that Indiana residents are used to seeing as they enter their favorite restaurant,” said Monica Heltz, Fishers Health Department Director. “We hope to lead the charge in improving food safety standards in Central Indiana. Food grades are an evidenced-based strategy to achieve this aim. The health and safety of our residents is our top priority, and we are dedicated to partnering with our local restaurants to ensure they are successful under this new model.”

New grades will be handed out each year during annual inspections. Health inspectors will start grading food trucks in 2024.

Crouch calls for eliminating state income tax

A leading candidate for Indiana governor last Friday said economic growth would more than make up for revenue lost by eliminating the state income tax.

Suzanne Crouch said the states that rank ahead of Indiana in economic growth are those that currently don’t levy any income tax. In an interview for *All Indiana Politics*, she said it’s time for Indiana to join that group.

“When we put money back into [taxpayers’] pockets, they’re going to be ending up supporting the economy,” Crouch said. “And that, in turn, will grow revenues and help us support small businesses and attract other businesses here to Indiana.”

Crouch said her plan also calls for a commission to look for inefficiencies in state government. She said this would help cut the size and growth of government, thereby reducing the need for tax revenue.

Her comments came as state lawmakers began hearings on a potentially large-scale overhaul of the state tax code. Panel members have said their goal is to provide recommendations in time for the 2025 budget session, which also would be the first legislative session under the successor to the term-limited Gov. Eric Holcomb. Crouch is one of five major candidates in the Republican primary to suc-

ceed him.

Crouch also has called for universal pre-K education. She said the state should partner with the private sector to find the best way to implement the program.

“We need to work toward getting every child an opportunity to be able to learn, so that by third grade, they can read, and then be successful later in life,” said Crouch.

Crouch said she does not support lowering Indiana’s current mandatory school age of 7, nor does she support the idea of mandatory kindergarten.

Congressman Greg Pence’s name has been floated as a potential running mate should Crouch receive the Republican nomination. Crouch told News 8 she is considering Pence, but she’s also considering other potential running mates, adding any serious talk of running mates this early in the election cycle is premature.

Pride doesn't come in a box

I am not an artist. I don't have the imagination to come up with the spectacular visions that painters can create. I can't chisel stone or carve wood with any elegance.

However, I love what art can do. It can make people feel proud, awestruck, or even horrified. What I believe is most important about art is the culture that develops around it. One art form that does this impressively well is architecture – the beauty of buildings.

Fewer things make a place more recognizable than the structures that fill it. If you toured any large city across the world, you would certainly find some apparel or merchandise that shows the city skyline. You can identify a city simply by the shape of its skyscrapers. Indianapolis has the Salesforce Tower, Detroit has the Renaissance Center, and Chicago has the Willis Tower (but it will always be the Sears Tower to me). These inanimate icons form an identity that every local identifies with. Almost all Indianapolis, Detroit, and Chicago residents have no legal ownership of their respective buildings, but I would bet almost all of them claim the towers as their own: "That's my town."

It can be difficult for towns without skyscrapers to find their local identity. In many instances the only unique structures are old town halls and churches. Some only remain standing due to preservation efforts by historical societies.

But why is this often the case? Rising costs of building materials, among other logistical concerns, could be the reason. Regardless, what has resulted is the rise of the rectangle – big box apartments, homes, churches, and town halls. I don't believe I am alone on this, but I find it difficult to identify myself with a cube.

But there is nothing wrong with the old town hall and the churches built a century ago. Those are some of the buildings that keep a town unique

by breaking the modern mold. I was pleasantly surprised to find Carmel's City Hall reminiscent of a 1700s New England courthouse, and, despite being a newer addition, the Palladium at the Center for Performing Arts displays the Neoclassical style similar to the monuments of the nation's capital. And while the Hamilton County Government and Judicial Center is a welcomed and necessary addition to the community, the Hamilton County Courthouse Square still stands as a functional reminder of the styles of the mid-1800s.

While these buildings are no skyscrapers, they represent the beauty there is to find in Hamilton County.

Town pride should inspire us to make our homes, cities, and county a better place. It's a love for not just ourselves or our neighbors, but our guests as well. It should drive us to want to keep what we have in pristine condition and motivate us to build even greater beauty in the future. Just because Hamilton County is a rectangle doesn't mean everything inside has to be.

The next time a building project comes along to erect another box, remember your town pride – and build beautiful buildings.

How I wish I could go back in time and tell all of this to my "post college self!" I had to learn things the hard way later in life – and I'm still learning. But I'm doing better.

Let's first look at some ways you can learn to be wise with your money. Trust me, if you don't have this skill, your overall mental load will be twice as bad – and I am talking from experience here! If you already have this wisdom and have done a great job managing and building your wealth, feel free to skip to next week. If you don't have this knowledge and need some assistance, I know of some fantastic resources to help you.

My favorite expert on this topic is Dave Ramsey, an American personal finance guru, businessman, and author. Mr. Ramsey has helped millions of people turn their financial lives around. What I like about him is that he made mistakes, learned from them, and eventually built his wealth the smart way. He even went through the pain of bankruptcy before turning his life around.

Mr. Ramsey offers numerous resources on his website, daveramsey.com. They range from free downloads, apps, guides, calculators, forms, and books to his Financial Peace University course offered at hundreds of locations across the United States or online.

Student loan forgiveness cures the symptom, not the disease

This month, my oldest son headed off to college. It has been an interesting experience to have a child starting his higher education while our country is in the middle of a debate about student loan forgiveness.

While I think it's fair to say that not everyone needs to attend college for their chosen career, I do believe that those who want a college education should have the opportunity. Unfortunately for many Americans, that path is resulting in a lifetime of debt. While the student loan conversation is an important one, I believe it must be part of a larger conversation addressing the extreme changes we have seen to how much college costs over time.

My son will be attending Ball State University in Muncie, Ind. – the current in-state tuition and room and board for one year is around \$26,000.

By today's standards, Ball State's tuition is considered extremely afford-

able, but that tuition doesn't tell the full story. For any college or university, the tuition students and their families pay do not represent the total cost for an individual student to attend college. Grants, research funding, federal funding, and state funding are all applied "behind the scenes" to the cost of educating a student. The tuition money an institution asks students to pay is the balance left over after all other funding is applied.

In Indiana, tuition costs usually cover about 63 percent on average of the total cost of attendance. For Ball State, if we take into consideration all the "behind the scenes" funding, the actual cost per year is closer to \$41,000 per student. \$41,000 per year per student would be much less affordable for the average Hoosier wanting to start their college education. To keep tuition low, Ball State and our other Hoosier higher education institutions need federal and

state support.

Unfortunately, state support of higher education has been reduced significantly in the last 40 years. While tuition covers almost two-thirds of attendance costs today, in 1980, Hoosier students were only asked to cover 28 percent of the total cost of college attendance. A large part of this difference is due to a reduction in state funding. In 1980, Indiana's state government spent the same as the national average on students at roughly \$9,500 in today's dollars. In 2023, the Hoosier State spent only \$6,200 per student compared to \$10,200 nationally.

Moreover, if Indiana had the same funding formula today that we did in 1980, and college cost the exact same, a student graduating from Ball State would walk away with about \$46,000 of student loan debt compared to \$104,000 today.¹

The student loan debt debate has inspired a lot of discussion nationally about the costs of higher education. However, I think it is important to recognize the critical role of our state gov-

ernment in higher education costs. With Indiana allocating 30 percent less per college student today than it did in 1980, our state is making it more difficult for Hoosier students to achieve their higher education goals.

My family and I are very fortunate that the benefits provided for me by my military service will significantly reduce the cost of his college education, but I know the same cannot be said for all Indiana families. I believe it is past time for our state government to help alleviate the rising cost of college education by contributing more to support our excellent Indiana colleges and universities.

We owe it to all Hoosier students to show them the same support today that our state gave to students 40 years ago.

A bit of history from my mother

Even Klingenstein is unable to be grumpy about this show

It is always fun to hear your parents explain their perception of your childhood. Mom wrote the following story for me.

History is, according to Webster, past events, especially those involved human affairs. Why did they have to add, written in chronological order?

Your Grandmother Verna was not a great seamstress. She could and did so but, due to being blinded in her left eye at age 8, it was not her favorite thing. However, she taught me the rudiments of it at an early age. When I was a high school freshman, all girls were required to take Home Economics. That course included cooking and sewing.

I remember making a cotton dress and a pair of panties. There may have been other items which I have forgotten. While she was teaching me to make those items, the teacher also taught me to hate sewing. She taught me to sew well – I got excellent grades – the hate was incidental.

Every seam had to be marked in pencil. Then every sewing machine stitch had to be exactly on the pencil mark. If it wasn't, I had to rip out the offending stitches, tie threads at both ends and re-stitched the place I had ripped. These threads also had to be tied. Much as I disliked it, sewing was one of the most valuable tools I learned in school. I continued to sew because I liked the results.

Then came marriage and eventually a baby. With the little one outgrowing an outfit soon after I put in the stitch, I learned to love sewing. After a file there was another baby and another. The sewing machine was used often. Sewing leaves a lot of bits and pieces of material. Indiana winters are cold; the growing family always seem to need more warm bedcovers. One solution was to piece comfort tops, buy cotton or wool batts and outing flannel. Then all three layers were knotted together to make warm covers.

One year when I was piecing a top, our young son wanted to piece a top. I gave him a small pile of cloth blocks I had cut, taught him how to sew them together by hand and he set to work. While I used a sewing machine, Raymond busily plied his needle and thread.

Soon he was asking for more blocks. His work grew to an impressive size for a little boy, but as you may guess, the stitches were not very solid. There seem to be only one solution. "Raymond," I asked, "how big do you plan to make your comfort?" What a silly question!

He had already decided it should be big enough for his bed. When I explained that one that large needed sewing machine stitches, he was ready to tackle the learning process. I unthreaded the sewing machine, gave Raymond some lined paper and gave lesson number one. My pupil was an apt learner. Soon the needle holes stayed on the line, at least most of the time.

Time for lesson two: how to thread our sewing machine. We may have both been a little surprised at how quickly Raymond began sewing blocks together. "Mom, this is fun!"

Verna had music to practice, she was learning to cook and never seemed to be far from a book. However, she had quietly observed the sewing process and decided she'd like to join the fun. "Mom, I want to make a comfort for my bed."

So I sent her off to the scrap bag so we could cut more blocks. Sooner than you might think, both children had pieced comfort tops large enough for double beds.

Of course that meant the next project involved knotting two comforts. The three of us worked together on that. Only one more thing to finish. Neither of the children were big enough to handle stitching edges on the sewing machine, so I think I did that.

They both took their comforts along when they got married. Check those edges, if you wish.

That was so much fun they both wanted to piece something the next winter. They also wanted to make Christmas gifts for Grandma and Grandpa Adler. The chair covers they made turned out to be an ideal solution. Those chair covers were used until they became quite shabby.

As Raymond grew, he had more outdoor chores and didn't sew much more. Verna kept at it and became quite proficient in making dresses, suits or whatever struck her fancy.

What about third baby? Did she ever decide to piece a comfort? Be patient. I'll try to answer that – sometime.

Grumpy Old Men: The Musical came into being when actor Jeff Gardner was looking for an established property to transform into a Broadway show. Securing rights from Warner Brothers, his team brought about the musical which opened in the U.S. in 2018 in Ogunquit, Maine. The result was a well-developed, tuneful, and laugh-filled romp, equal parts witty and sympathetic. With positive critical attention, the show opened in Southern California the following year.

Beef and Boards' production (sharply directed by Curt Wollan, and smoothly choreographed by Sally Scharbrough) reunites B&B favorites Eddie Curry, Jeff Stockberger, and Sarah Hund for the latest of their array of shows together. Curry and Stockberger have frequently worked together on-stage since college days, and their inspired comfort-level shows in their tight interactions here. Though much of the crossplay is insult hurling, with some of the best put-down lines you may ever hear, these roles also take them to softer characterizations which are very well set down.

Curry's John Gustafson ranges nicely as he faces changes and opportunities in his life. I have said it before, I always learn something about acting watching Curry's work and his ease of portrayal is a wonder to observe. As neighbor Max

Goldman, Stockberger makes the most of his clowning skills – give that man a prop to play with and the results are most often hilarity – but he also shows a more touching side we don't often see in his performances – set forth in his lamenting solo number "Family or Friend."

Sarah Hund joins in the fun as comely new neighbor, Ariel Truax. Ms. Hund takes the role to its proper level, attracting the attention of the old gents without overplaying the part. I have, in the past, named her as the most talented person I know, and she did not lose any ground in that title. All three main roles are so well cast – I believe the familiarity these three have for each other paid dividends. It's a lot of fun to watch them work together.

The script offers many good supporting roles, and the cast comes through with very high marks. Jacob Butler as Max's son Jacob and Logan Hill as John's daughter Melanie provide a solid sub-plot as they both trouble about what to do with their lives. Butler and Ms. Hill are excellent vocalists, and both show their skills in several numbers. B&B Chief Douglas E. Stark brings just the right portrayal as raunchy Grandpa Gustafson. His delivery is pitch perfect for the crotch-centric curmudgeon's humorous observations and advice. (This show does carry a PG-13 label, by the way.)

Devan Mathias is divine as IRS agent Sandra Snyder. She plays the role to the hilt, raising her comedic talents to new heights I haven't seen from her before. Ty Stover is delightful as bait-shop owner Chuck Barrels, while Karen Pappas plays cousin/newcomer Punky Barrels with apt guilelessness. Jad-

dy Ciucci offers accident-prone Harry the mail carrier with underplayed aplomb.

Every single cast member is vocally gifted and the precise work of Musical Director Terry Woods is present in the finely tuned songs and choruses. Likewise, costume design by Kathy Henry and wigs by Andrew Elliot add polish to the proceedings.

The set design by Michael Layton fills the bill. As the program for this show noted: "The curtain is going down on an era, as Michael Layton, our scenic designer of over 40 years, is retiring." Mr. Layton has shown his tremendous talents repeatedly (designing 330 sets in his

run with the theatre company) by transforming B&B's limited stage space into designs for productions large and small. His genius and innovative efforts always added much to the workings. Happy retirement to a true artist!

Bottom line: *Grumpy Old Men – The Musical* is a surprisingly satisfying stage show. Filled with humor and covering an engaging storyline portrayed by a very skilled company of performers, B&B's entertaining production has something for everyone. It's a complete success in my eyes.

mention a jackknife on my nightstand). She needs narrations of Bill Curtis (*Cold Case Files*) and Keith Morrison (*Dateline*).

To be fair, there's a softer side to Brynne that I should tell you about. By day, her favorite mental escape is tending to the flora in our yard.

Streaming murders by night, planting flowers by day. The dichotomy that is my wife.

Sometimes the cat and I look at her from my upstairs writing room window. She seems at peace down there on her gardener's bench amongst her countless pots, watering petunias that will add color to the coming Fall, digging dirt, enjoying a serenade of cicadas and Paul Carrack's blue-eyed soul. I once heard Barbara Streisand singing "ageless and ever evergreen" from the outdoor Bluetooth speaker, and my heart became a yo-yo. The cat yawned. I returned to the keyboard, inspired by my wife's creativity. I imagined how at the onset of each new Spring our dormant yard must appear to her as a blank page, a clean canvas, awaiting her next masterpiece.

Fishers: nothing’s gonna stop us on the road to win over Noblesville

NOBLESVILLE – The Fishers Tigers set out on a mission on the short road trip to Noblesville last Friday. Both teams were looking to get to a 3-0 start on the young season and unfortunately only one could still remain undefeated.

From the opening drive on defense, there seemed to be nothing that was going to stop, or even slow down, the visiting Tigers on their way to a 48-22 romp of Noblesville.

“We knew that we had to get a quick start on them. We wanted to take control of the game early. Our offense, they were just clicking,” stated Fishers head coach Curt Funk.

After three plays, the Tigers forced Noblesville to punt. Then, Fishers made it look easy on its first drive. Ten plays and 56 yards later, quarterback Bennett Gorak plunged across the goal line for the first score and a 7-0 lead.

The next Tiger drive didn’t take much time at all. Fishers had a third down and six at the Noblesville 39 and took advantage.

Tailback Khobie Martin ran up the middle almost untouched for a 39-yard rushing TD for a 14-0 cushion.

“They executed tremendously on third down. Were we out of position? Not by much,” said Noblesville head coach Dave Sharpe.

“We told Khobie to go out there and dominate. And, he was possessed tonight and ready to go,” said Funk.

Noblesville cut the Fishers lead in half early in the second. On third and goal from the 17, Jacob Baker found Aiden Brewer for a 17-yard touchdown pass to make it 14-7. But, that would be the closest that the Millers would be all night.

The Tigers would answer midway through the second. A short field helped Fishers on its third series, starting at the Miller 49.

Martin would find his way into the end zone from 13-yards out for his second score, pushing it to 21-7.

The game started to get out of hand following Noblesville’s third punt. The Tigers executed yet another scoring drive. This time, Gorak orchestrated the Tigers down the field with his arm. The drive finished off with a 21-yard touchdown grab to Noah McPeck from Gorak for a 28-7 advantage.

“Bennett keeps improving every week. His best is yet to come. He’s just a great kid and he works hard and with that, you’re always go-

ing to see improvement. He has the characteristics that you look for in a leader,” continued Funk.

Gorak looked completely comfortable and in a zone all night, because everything was working.

“We watched a ton of film, scouted them, so we had a really good idea what was happening,” said Fishers quarterback Bennett Gorak.

“The o-line gave me all of the time in the world that I could ask for and really helped me out,” continued Gorak.

The Millers wasted very little time to get its second score. Logan Shoffner caught a screen pass from Baker and

sprinted 58-yards to the end zone. After an offside penalty on Fishers, the ball was placed at the one. Gabe Belan then dove his way over the goal line to convert the two-point conversion for a 28-15 score.

That gave Fishers too much time. They were able to march quickly down the field, grabbing a three-score lead at halftime. Tight end Joel Gates was all alone up the middle of the field for a 28-yard touchdown. That accounted for the 35-15 halftime score.

“Bennett Gorak played just beautifully tonight. The conditions were beautiful to throw and obviously they

have Khobie in their back pocket. That is a great team. They play really well on defense,” Sharpe continued on Fishers.

The Tigers started to drive well again in the third, but that came to a screeching halt. Gorak got anxious and threw to the end zone, but the ball was picked off by Gage Gulley for a touchback.

“They played really well on defense and got us out of our offense pretty quickly, because of the big lead they were able to get,” stated Sharpe.

Martin was at it again late in the third. The Miami (Ohio) commit scored for the third time on a four-yard run. The snap for the PAT

Huskies deliver dominant shutout victory over Knights

“[Scoles] was special, stepping up in the 11th hour to punt in this game as he is not our normal punter. And Jaylyn was phenomenal on special teams and defense. Our secondary was flying to the ball,” Kirschner praised.

In the second quarter, the Knights attempted to stage a comeback with a lengthy march down the field. Nevertheless, the Huskies’ defense stood firm, ultimately forcing a pivotal turnover on downs at their own 22-yard line. Despite their own fourth-and-1 conversion attempt falling short at the 31-yard line, the Huskies’ defense continued to shine, stopping the Knights once again at the 21-yard line, preserving their 8-0 lead as they entered halftime.

The second half unfolded in a manner consistent with the first, with Scoles and Pugh continuing to make critical plays. In the third quarter, Lafayette Central Catholic received the kickoff and made significant strides toward the red zone. However, their aspira-

Coach Kirschner expressed his satisfaction with how the defense and special teams operated, particularly

in light of the physicality posed by the LCC team.

“Preparation wise, we played these guys last year in a hard-fought game. We knew that we would need to beat their physicality and discipline; they are very good at what they do,” Kirschner explained. Looking ahead to conference play, he added, “Now

we are going into [Hoosier Conference] division play with quality teams coming up; I expect us to keep fighting and getting better day by day.”

Next up for the Hamilton Heights Huskies is a matchup on the road Friday against the Northwestern Tigers, with kickoff scheduled for 7 p.m.

CARMEL — Carmel hosted another state championship last Friday night for Week 3 of the Indiana high school football season, and the result was dramatically different.

King was set to punt near the end zone, but Uchenyo Ojata blocked the kick, then picked it up and made the short run in to score. It was the first-ever touchdown for the 6-foot-4 junior defensive lineman.

On Aug. 26 at the Hall of Fame tournament at The Legends, Brown made a hole in one on the fourth hole of the Road 9 course. Brown said she felt like she was hitting the ball thin during the first few holes, so she felt like she "needed to get something going."

Unbeaten Royals keep pushing, sweep 11 teams

FISHERS – Nearly three weeks into the IHSAA volleyball season, and Hamilton Southeastern is off to a perfect start.

The defending Class 4A state champion Royals are ranked No. 1 in Indiana and No. 3 in the country, according to the MaxPreps rankings. Southeastern is unbeaten so far in eight matches, continuing their run with a 25-11, 25-14, 25-16 victory over visiting Brebeuf Jesuit last Tuesday at the Royals’ gymnasium.

Something that’s just as impressive is that Southeastern has yet to drop a set – all 11 of its wins have been three-set sweeps. The Royals swept Avon last Thursday in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference match, then swept Belmont and Fort Wayne Carroll at a tournament last Saturday at Carroll.

“We’re pleased,” said HSE coach Jason Young. “Obviously, we see areas where we can get better and those are the things that we’re working on in practice.”

The Royals are not just an experienced team, but a very talented one as well. As of this moment, seven Southeastern volleyball players are committed to play at Division I colleges. That includes senior Lauren Harden, the 6-foot-3 outside hitter who is headed to the University of Florida next year.

“We’ve been playing together for a really long time, so we have a really deep and strong chemistry that goes

a long way with our team,” said Harden.

The Royals are fierce competitors against other teams, but that also extends to their own practices. Harden said that in practices, “we’re always competing to get better between each other,” and she believes that’s a reason why HSE has yet to drop a set.

Southeastern’s eight wins have come across a group of historically strong teams. In order, the Royals have beaten McCutcheon, Warsaw, Carmel, Lawrence North, Brownsburg, Floyd Central, Providence and Brebeuf.

“We know a lot of these teams have good, solid players and everything like that,”

said Harden. “We just know for every single game we just have to come out with the same intensity no matter what team it is, and just play our best game that we can and be aggressive and just do what we need to do to win.”

The other commitments so far among the senior class are from Sophie Ledbetter (Ball State), Macy Hinshaw (Santa Clara), Tiffany Snook (Memphis) and Breonna Goss (Duke). Juniors Lindsey Mangelson (Mississippi State) and Ava Hunter (Loyola Chicago) have also

announced their commitments.

Defensive energy

The Royals put their defensive abilities on display against Brebeuf on Tuesday. Ledbetter collected 17 digs, while junior Kaylyn Christy had 13 digs. Harden made eight digs and Hunter had seven. Snook also totaled 3.5 blocks while senior Maddi Evett made three.

“We’re somewhat known for our attackers,” said Young. “But what we have stressed in our gym is, the defensive energy and the defensive effort, because when you put that together with the

personnel we have up front, it can be tough to stop. That defensive energy is what propels the engine. And when we have that, I think we do some good things.”

Southeastern’s offense was also solid, of course. Harden put down 11 kills, with Mangelson hitting eight and Goss spiking six. Hinshaw served up three aces and Christy had two aces.

The biggest intangible with the group is its attitude. The Royals team had quite a bit of cheering and smiles as it was winning. The team is playing loose, but Young said that’s when good things happen – “we’re going to train them and trust them,” he said.

“We just believe they’re going to be able to figure things out on their own,” said Young. “They’re smart volleyball players. They’re going to a lot of different programs after Hamilton Southeastern where they’re going to be expected to do great things, so now it’s just an opportunity for them to kind of learn on the fly.”

“I feel like the only pressure that you’ll see is just ourselves being tough on each other,” said Harden. “Because we know what our standard is. We know the level that we need to play at, and if we’re not there, we’re going to push ourselves to get better and just work harder and everything like that.”
