The annual Strut 2 Save Lives starts at 10 a.m. Sunday at Dr. James A. Dillon Park, 6001 Edenshall Lane, Noblesville.

Nearly 200 people are registered for the walk, and more are expected to show up Sunday morning to participate.

This community event includes fun for families, pets included. Participants will start the day with a one-mile walk with their pups to honor all organ donors and celebrate the gift of life.

The walk honors donor hero Bryan Clauson. A Noblesville native, Clauson was a race car driver and organ and tissue donor. He saved five lives and enhanced the lives of more than 75 people across the country. Clauson was also an avid dog lover, and his family and friends continued their annual dog strut to honor of him and all organ donors.

All proceeds from the event benefit the Indiana Donor Network Foundation Bryan Clauson Legacy

Fund, which provides financial assistance to the families of organ donor heroes and transplant recipients and their families.

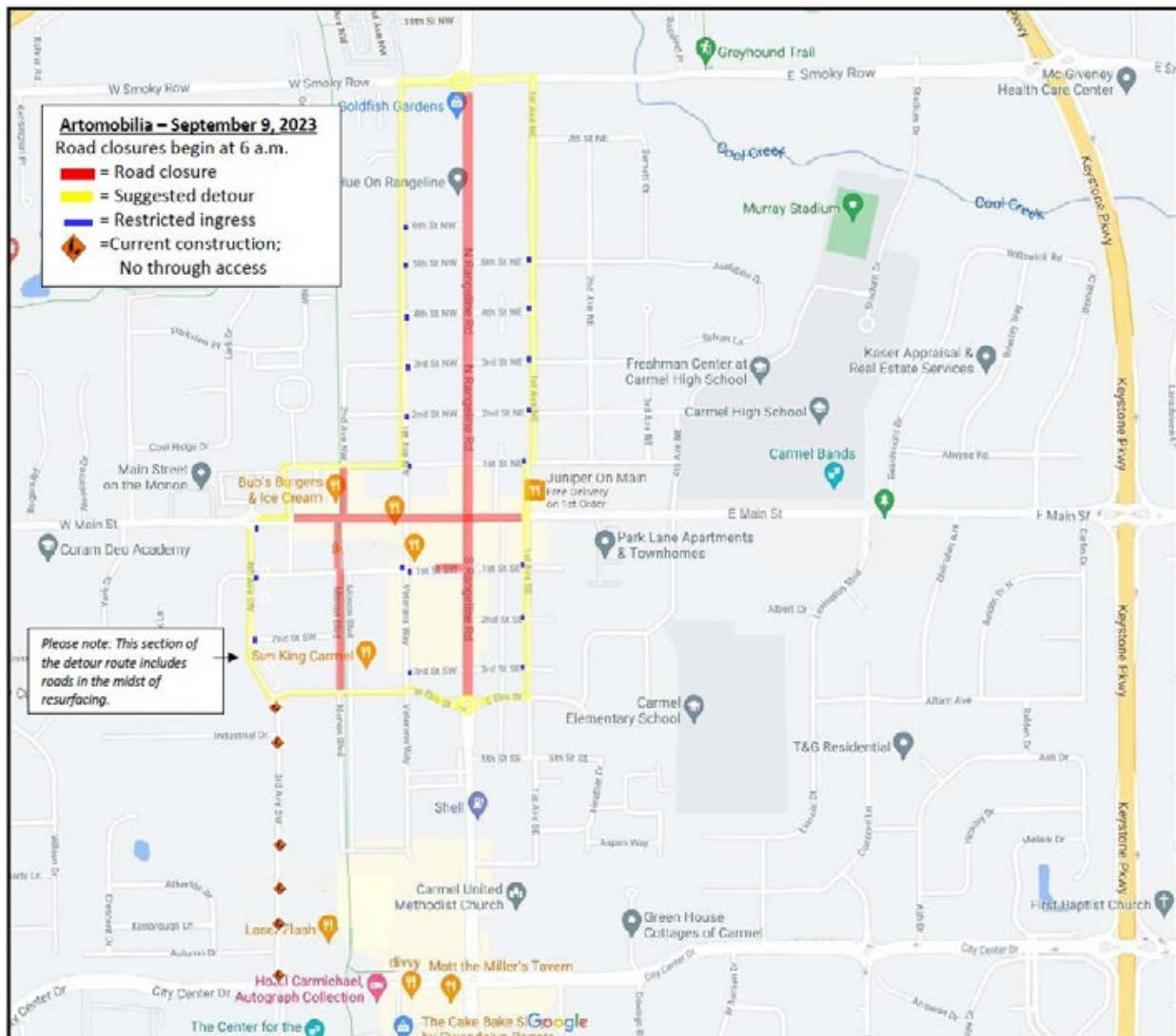

The Constitution & me

Cornelia Colebanks Chapter,
National Society Daughters
of the American Revolution
celebrating Constitution Week

My relationship with the Constitution goes way back – from early childhood, actually. That is because my family emigrated from Cuba after Fidel Castro took power.

Like so many millions of others, my family fled a communist regime to come to the land of freedom. My family and I lived in Virginia for several years where I had the chance to visit Colonial Williamsburg many times. There, I learned about our Founding Fathers and the struggle for independence. So, after turning 18, I decided to become a naturalized citizen. Like all the others before me, I learned about our representative public form of government,

and I studied for the naturalization test. Knowing the stifling government my family left behind and the freedoms that we enjoy here, I struggle to understand why we have a population that does not love the Constitution and our Republic. Maybe it is because they do not know much about our government and the rights they have.

At least once a year we have the opportunity to change that. Constitution Day commemorates the formation and signing of the U.S. Constitution by 39 brave men on Sept. 17, 1787.

Constitution Day became an official holiday alongside Citizenship Day

in 2004. In May 2005, the United States Department of Education backed the law when it announced that it would apply to any school receiving federal funds of any kind. The Indiana Supreme Court began offering Constitution Day programming in 2005 with a wide variety of activities inside courtrooms and classrooms around the state.

This year there is an additional opportunity to commemorate Constitution Day in Hamilton County. The Hamilton East Public Library of Fishers will hold a free event to celebrate Constitution Day. There will be an actor portraying James Madison, an exhibit by Remnant Trust Exhibit, a public educational foundation, and Constitution-themed prizes. The event will take place from 6 to 8 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 18. Registration is required at tinyurl.com/HEPLconstitution-day2023.

Even if you can't attend the Sept. 18 event, there is still time for us to call the principals and superintendents of schools to ask what activities they are planning for their students. We can also ask our children and grandchildren how their schools celebrated Constitution and Citizenship Day. I have been told that Noblesville schools will have some form of activity in each grade during their social studies classes.

Communities throughout the nation will be celebrating the spirit and meaning of the country's Constitution beginning Sept. 17. On this day in 1787, at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, 39 delegates at the Constitutional Convention signed the Constitution of the United States of America.

Nearly 170 years later, in 1955, DAR spearheaded an effort to set aside one week annually when Americans could celebrate this iconic signing. After petitioning Congress to set aside the week of Sept. 17 to 23, on Aug. 2, 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed Constitution Week into law.

This year, Carmel Mayor James Brainard has issued a proclamation declaring Sept. 17 to 23, 2023 as National Constitution Week in the City of Carmel and asks all citizens to join in this observation.

The Cornelia Cole Fairbanks Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, invites the community to kickoff Constitution Week at the West Bell Tower at Coxhall Gardens, 11677 Towne Road, Carmel, with a Bells Across America celebration, at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 17. Enter from Towne Road, and park in the South Lot near the Cox Mansion.

The celebration will include a short program that culminates in the ringing of bells with the West Bell Tower at 4 p.m. Bring your own bell or there will be goodie bags with bells provided at the event. The celebration at Coxhall Gardens is coordinated with other Bells Across America celebrations across the country ringing bells at 4 p.m. to

celebrate the signing of the Constitution of the United States 236 years ago.

Why bells? During colonial and early days of our country, bells – church bells, firehouse bells, town and city hall bells – were used to call people together, to alert them to some important announcement or event. Bells called the people of Philadelphia together to hear the Declaration of Independence read publicly for the first time on July 4, 1776. Then, again, just over 11 years later, on Sept. 17 bells were used to call people together for the first public reading of our new Constitution.

You will be surprised when
your Social Security is taxed

If your only source of income is Social Security and you are single, you may not have to pay federal taxes on your Social Security. But most people will find their Social Security benefits (yes, even disability payments) will be subject to federal taxes. Twelve states also tax benefits, but Indiana does not.

Most of Social Security is indexed for inflation, but how much you can earn before some or most of your Social Security is taxed doesn't go up with inflation. That means that more and more people fall into the tax each year. Since 1981, if you earn more than \$25,000 as a single person, 50 percent of your Social Security benefit will be subject to

federal taxes at your tax rate. If you make more than \$34,000, 85 percent of your benefit is subject to taxes.

My clients are so alarmed at this information that they routinely mishear me. I didn't say that your benefits are taxed at a tax rate of 50 percent. Rather, half your benefits will be included in with your other income when you file taxes. The amount of taxes you pay is dependent upon your tax bracket.

There is a common misconception that at a certain age you won't have to pay taxes. Untrue. You will pay taxes as long as you breathe (OK, a slight exaggeration). If you have little to no income, you won't pay taxes. Since the amounts are not indexed for inflation, more people end up paying taxes on their retirement benefits each year.

If you are a married couple, each of you draw Social Security, and your joint income exceeds \$34,000, some or most of each of your Social Security bene-

fits will be taxed federally. If you want to avoid a surprise at tax time, you must file form W-4V to have your taxes withheld. This form is easily found on Google. You can choose to have 7 percent, 10 percent, 12 percent, or 22 percent of your monthly Social Security benefits withheld.

To file your taxes, you'll need your SSA-1099, known as your Social Security Benefits Statement. This form details how much you were paid by Social Security. Hopefully you've heeded my previous advice to go to [SSA.gov](https://ssa.gov) and set up a free account. If so, you can print off a copy of your SSA-1099 there by signing into your account and clicking on the tab for Replacement Documents. You can access this by Feb. 1 each year.

If you keep working after retirement, you will continue to pay FICA out of each paycheck, too.

There's only one week left before Fishers' biggest race of the year returns. The 2023 Geist Half Marathon & 5K presented by Meijer will celebrate its 15th year with a new fall date on Saturday, Sept. 16. The race kicks off at 7 a.m. on Olivo Road near 113th Street.

The week prior to each closure, watch for message boards posted at Zionsville Road and Shelborne Road to alert travelers of the impending closures.



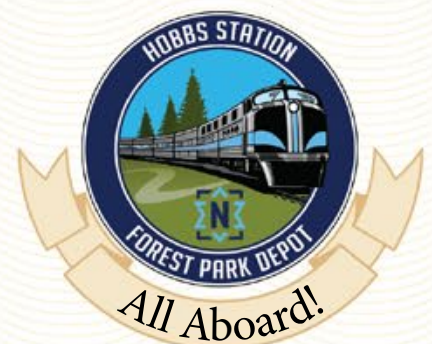

Royals clinch one-point overtime victory in 2023 Mudsock contest

FISHERS – Everybody did their part for Hamilton Southeastern on Friday night, and that led to another Mudsock football trophy.

The Royals held off Fishers 35-34 in an exciting overtime game at the Tigers' field. Southeastern's offense was incredible, scoring four touchdowns in regulation from big plays. Then in overtime, the Royals' defense stepped up, making a crucial tackle on a two-point conversion try.

The Tigers went first in the extra period, and it only took two plays: Khome Martin ran the ball in from six yards to put Fishers ahead 34-28. The Tigers then went for two, but Southeastern's Judah Parker made a tackle just shy of the goal line to deny Fishers any additional points.

"It was a big stop," said Parker. "I have faith in our offense. We have a great offense."

The Royals' offense also scored quickly, with Jalen Alexander making a six-yard run into the end zone

on second down. The score was 34-34, so Southeastern just needed one point, and Hugo Belmonte stepped up and kicked the game-winner.

"I trusted all my teammates, I trusted myself, I trusted my holder, my snapper," said Belmonte. The junior had tried for a 49-yard field goal with the clock winding down in regulation, but it was just short.

"But I knew that all my teammates trusted me, and I came back, made the extra point and won the game," said Belmonte.

Going for two in overtime, kicking 49-yard field-goal attempts – there was no shortage of guts in this game. There was also no shortage of enthusiasm, with very few people in a sellout crowd leaving early.

"You live for these moments," said HSE coach Michael Kelly, who has now coached the Royals to four straight Mudsock victories. He called Fishers a "really good team" and enjoyed the atmosphere as well.

"You like it when it's a competitive game," said Kelly. "This was a competitive game."

Southeastern added two more touchdowns in the second quarter. Chandler Weston took off on a 67-yard run to the end zone, then later threw a pass to Donovan Hamilton that turned into another 67-yard score. With that, the Royals led 21-7 at halftime.

Fishers began the third quarter with a drive downfield that ended in a touchdown. Joel Gates caught a pass to set the Tigers up, and Gorak took the ball in from the 1. In the fourth quarter, Fishers tied it up after Khobie Martin scored from a six-yard run. That tied the game at 21-21.

“Their offense is a very, very, very hard offense to stop,” said Kelly. “You’re not going to stop them. “We were going to try to contain them and limit their big plays and big-play opportunities. They got some big plays on us and their receivers are phenomenal. Their running back is really, really good.”

Alexander stepped up for the Royals again, taking off to the end zone on a 72-yard run. Belmonte’s kick made it 28-21. He would go on to make all five of his extra-point attempts.

What a year it has been. The INDYCAR Championship was decided last weekend at Portland International Raceway when Chip Ganassi Racing standout Alex Palou took both the victory and the championship.

Winning his second championship in three seasons, Palou had a phenomenal year and absolutely dominated INDYCAR with five wins, 12 top-5s, and an astonishing 16 top-10 finishes – a season where Palou never failed to finish outside of the top 10. Palou

has firmly established himself as the premier talent in American open wheel racing, a distinction that he hopes will translate into a seat in Formula 1.

However, not everything is unicorns and rainbows for Palou. After being embroiled in a contractual dispute with his current team, Chip Ganassi Racing, in 2022, he finds himself in a similar situation with Arrow McLaren and the McLaren racing team. Palou had signed to drive a third car for Arrow McLaren for the 2024 INDYCAR season. However, early this summer Palou allegedly made it clear to Zac Brown, CEO of

McLaren, that he would not be driving for Arrow McLaren in 2024.

As of now it appears Palou will be back with Ganassi next season. But could Palou's recent maneuvers with McLaren be paving an alternate path to Formula 1? Multiple Formula 1 teams have open seats for next year, including Williams and Red Bull affiliate, Alpha Tauri. Red Bull have been in a multiyear search to find a suitable pairing for Max Verstappen. Given Palou's experience and success in INDYCAR, a year at Alpha Tauri could make him a suitable candidate to replace Sergio Perez at Red Bull in 2025.

If Palou wants to make the jump to Formula 1, 2024 is his best and likely last opportunity. It would

certainly be interesting to see if, like Montoya and
